TEMISKAMING SHORES – The city is the final municipality to board a proposal to create an airport authority for a one-year phase-in period.

Temiskaming Shores council endorsed the new entity that would take over the Earlton Timiskaming Regional Airport from Armstrong Township.

It'll cost the municipality \$91,430 in 2017, up almost \$11,000 from \$80,500 this year.

The increased funding reflects an increase to \$9.03

The increased funding reflects an increase to \$9.03 per capita from \$7.95 from all supporting municipalities.

The hike is anticipated to cover an estimated \$17,000 in property and education taxes and \$3,000 in payroll administration.

City council had already expressed support for the creation of the new authority, which would take over ownership and operation of the financially troubled airport from Armstrong Township. See **"Takeoff" on 6a**

THE STUDY

The Ontario Ministry of Transportation (MTO) has retained MMM Group Limited, a subsidiary of WSP Global, to undertake a Preliminary Design and Class Environmental Assessment Study for replacement of the Highway 11 culvert at Calamity Creek located north of the community of Dymond.

THE PROCESS

This study has followed the Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) for Provincial Transportation Facilities (2000) for Group 'B' projects, with the opportunity for public input throughout. Based on the information collected during the study process, it has been determined that the project will not result in any significant adverse environmental effects. Accordingly, MTO is proposing to step-down this project from a Group 'B' to a Group 'C' project. If this project is stepped down to a Group C project, a Transportation Environmental Study Report will not be prepared and no future public notices will be provided for this project.

You have the right to request that this project remain a Group 'B' project. Should you wish to make this request, please contact the representatives below by July 24, 2016. If no objections are received by this date, the project will be stepped down to a Group

DISTRICT -- Some Ontario Northland stops are going to be lost in the Tri-Town area, although the wait time in North Bay is going to be reduced.

Departure and arrival times are also being changed for all but the northbound late afternoon/early evening runs.

Changes in the Ontario Northland bus schedule are planned to become effective July 17.

Haileybury, Cobalt and Latchford are going to see the elimination of their morning northbound bus stops, and the elimination of their evening southbound bus stops. The three communities will continue to have late afternoon northbound bus stops and early afternoon southbound bus stops.

Changes will also be made to the time when the Ontario Northland bus passes through the area. The bus will pass through the area between one-and-a-half to two hours earlier heading north on the morning run. The bus will also be passing through the area close to two hours later on its evening southbound run. The early afternoon southbound run will be slightly earlier as well. The late afternoon/early evening northbound run will remain unaffected.

Fares are also being increased three per cent, effective July 17. Travellers will now see their two-and-a-half-hour night wait time in North Bay cut to 25 minutes.

EAST-WEST SUCCESS

Ontario Northland is seeing good success with its pilot project of bus runs between Ottawa and Sudbury, and has received approval for the pilot project to be extended throughout the remainder of the year to determine its effectiveness, according to Ontario Northland communications manager Renee Baker.

She told The Speaker that Ontario Northland has made the changes to reduce commuter times, and these changes are based on costumer feedback.

She said the fare increase was needed "to adjust to rising operational costs."

Ontario Northland has also announced that Greyhound Canada will be using the Ontario Northland bus depot at 1663 Kingsway in Sudbury, effective June 26. Ontario Northland anticipates this arrangement will improve service for customers of both carriers who are arriving and departing from Sudbury. The bus depot is fully accessible with WiFi, parking and a comfortable waiting area, Ontario Northland noted in a press release.

Ms. Baker told The Speaker that Ontario Northland is "constantly reviewing our data" as it works on its transformation, which has been ongoing for over a year.



The Influential Community Trailblazer Award was presented to Mrs. Gravdon because she is viewed as someone who contributed to the evolution of her community through her volunteer and community work. She was acknowledged for inspiring others with her character, skills and hard work opening doors for other women.

In order to be considered for the award a nomination application is put forward on behalf of the recipient.

While Mrs. Graydon isn't quite sure who nominated her for the award she has a good idea who it was.

There are a million people who deserve this award and they all do good things. I always say it takes a community to support a child and it takes a community to support a community," said Mrs. Graydon about her award in a recent interview at The Temiskaming Speaker office.

She said, "I would much rather give an award than receive it."

Mrs. Graydon lives in New Liskeard and is married to Peter Graydon. The couple have three children: Sanne, Darren and Trevor.

Peter and Sharron are owners of the McDonald's Restaurants in Kirkland Lake and New Liskeard.

But it waited to see how many other municipalities signed on before agreeing to be a partner, said Mayor Carman Kidd after council met June 21.

"We're confident now we have enough municipalities onside" he said.

The next steps, he said, are the preparation of the legal agreement incorporating the author-

for the airport property and assets.

Participating municipalities will approve the documents, he said.

Once the authority is incorporated, he said it can begin submitting applications to Fed-Nor and the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund for grants to assist with immediate capital improvements required at the airport.

He hoped a five-year business plan for the airport would be ready for review by participating municipalities in the fall of 2017.

TEMISKAMING SHORES – It's an overcast day and you're a little apprehensive as you head to the dentist.

What should you wear? Abbey Foley thinks there should be an app for that.





WEEKENDER **Film fest** coming to Temagami

TEMAGAMI (Staff) - The Temagami Canoe Festival may be focused on the water, but paddling fans are invited to take a seat on land for the Reel Paddling Film Festival.

Armchair adventurers are invited to a movie night July 9 at the Temagami Welcome Centre.

They'll see eight short films promising humour, stunning outdoor photography, tales of real-life adventure and conservation messages.

It's the festival's first visit to Temagami and is sponsored by the municipality of Temagami.

It's presented by the Temagami Canoe Festival, which will be staged for the second year July 15-17.

The films were selected from 21 works shortlisted for the tour.

They include *Expedition* Q, which follows a group of friends as they make their way on skis and hand-built Inuit-style kayaks across the south end of Baffin Island.

In Stories of Survival, paddlers tell harrowing stories of their near-death experiences on the water.

Martin's Boat takes viewers down the Colorado River on the maiden voyage of a new Grand

Canyon dory.

Voyagers Without Trace is the longest film, at 45 minutes. It sees a contemporary paddler recreate a 1938 kayaking journey by three Parisians on the Green and Colorado rivers.

There are short films about standup paddlers on the whitewater of the Ottawa River and on one man's discovery of meaning - and fun - in nature.

There's also Temagami content.

The Path of Grey Owl follows Ray Mears, a British bushcraft instructor and TV host, as he explores the landscape of the writer and conservationist who was born Archie Belaney.

FILMED

It was filmed last year in and around Temagami, Bear Island and Lady Evelyn-Smoothwater Provincial Park, and includes interviews with elders Alex Mathias, Virginia McKenzie and Tom Saville.

The Reel Paddling Film Festival opens at 7 p.m. at the Bunny Miller Theatre, and includes a 15-minute intermission.
