Local woman among missing indigenous women

OTTAWA/COBALT -- The federal government has officially announced the launch of an online survey to guide the design of an inquiry into missing and murdered indigenous women and girls.

The announcement was made January 5. In mid-December 2015, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) released a comprehensive report on missing and unsolved murdered indigenous people in OPP jurisdictions.

The report also noted the cases of missing indigenous persons. That list included the case of Shelley May Anderson who went missing in the late summer of 2009.

Ms. Anderson, then 50, had been living in Cobalt for a short period of time when she disappeared. She had lived in the Timmins area most of her life.

On average, five per cent of population uses food banks

DISTRICT -- On average, about five per cent of the population here and across Canada turn to food banks for assistance.

Food Bank Canada issued a statement that 1.7 million people across Canada turn to food banks. That's out of a population of just over 35 million people.

Those who regularly turn their thoughts to the need of fellow residents for food assistance, both locally and internationally,

generally agree that the need is probably higher than that five per cent figure.

In some areas the need is higher. The Cobalt Coleman Latchford and Area Food Bank has figures showing that ten per cent of its catchment area turns to the food bank for assistance.

STATO trail gets \$150,000

TEMISKAMING SHORES -- An extension of the STATO trail has received a \$150,000 leg-up from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

In a recent funding announcement, the foundation said the multi-use South Temiskaming Active Travel Organization trail fosters "more active lifestyles."

Hospital integration moving forward

ENGLEHART – The pace of integration at the Englehart and Kirkland Lake hospitals has surprised even their new integrated chief executive officer.

Gary Sims, who took over the post at the end of November, had considered it "quite reasonable" to expect the process to take two, three or even five years.

"Instead, what I'm met with is a strong willingness to embrace the change," said Mr. Sims in an interview last week.

The hospitals share other key personnel, including a chief financial officer and chief nursing officer, and payroll is now integrated.

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



"It's never an easy topic to deal with, but I think the legislation itself is sound, and I think I'll be supporting it. It makes sense."

The proposed legislation was introduced April 14. It details who is eligible for medical help in dying, and proposes safeguards - such as requirements for medical opinions, a waiting period, and informed consent during the process.

Province backs off seniors' drug increase



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


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
