



## City prospects met for PDAC

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Coordinating the Northern Ontario showcase at an annual mining conference has raised the city's profile, says Temiskaming Shores' mayor.

"Definitely," said Mayor Carman Kidd earlier this week after returning from the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada (PDAC) conference and trade show in Toronto.

This was the fourth year that the city has organized the showcase of mining-related businesses and institutions from across Northern Ontario, with funding from FedNor.

That inaugural presence in 2014 attracted 37 exhibitors.

This year's showcase, held March 5 through 8, had 90. They included about 10 from the Temiskaming area.

At one time, Kidd said many conference-goers questioned Temiskaming Shores' presence, saying it had no mining in the area.

"And I said, 'We do. We have Matachewan, we have Kirkland Lake Gold, we have Detour Lake.'"

There are area residents who work in the mines, "and we have a lot of suppliers that supply a lot of goods to the mining industry, so we're very, very heavily involved in the mining industry."

That's becoming more apparent "all the time," he said.

The 2016 Northern Ontario showcase was credited with creating 66 new jobs, 133 new partnerships and more than \$6.9 million in sales.

In talking to exhibitors this year, Kidd said almost all reported getting contracts or new interest.

"I talked to one exhibitor that, within half an hour of being open down there, he'd already got a contract," he said.

He said James Franks, the city's economic development officer, was busy leading tours, including five or six international delegations.

He said traffic through the Northern showcase may have been twice that of last year.

Overall attendance at the PDAC conference was reported to be up by some 25 per cent, he said.

As for the 2018 PDAC, he said the city will have to analyze feedback from this year's participation.

If it decides to coordinate another regional event, he said it would have to re-apply for FedNor support.

# Latchford wants Montreal River info to flow

LATCHFORD -- Latchford council is pushing for improvements to communications regarding potential flooding issues on the Montreal River.

At its Thursday, March 16, meeting, Latchford council passed a resolution calling on the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNR) to implement a water management plan previously created for the Montreal River and its tributaries. The resolution also called for the creation of a standing advisory committee to monitor the plan.

The Montreal River has five power dams and four control dams, noted Latchford Mayor George Lefebvre, adding that water management would deal with fluctuations in levels and bring together interested parties, such as trappers and tourist camp operators, as well as councils.

Lefebvre later told The Speaker that the then Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, with Ontario Power Generation, developed such a plan 15 years ago.

A water management plan was established for the Matabichuan River, but never implemented for the Montreal River and its tributaries, said Lefebvre.

"We are now seeing rapid fluctuations in temperatures and precipitation," commented Lefebvre in his concern.

The creation of a standing advisory committee would improve communication, he continued.

Four municipalities sit along the system and include Matachewan, Elk Lake (James Township), Coleman Township and Latchford. The system also flows through two districts of the MNR, making it difficult to coordinate the informa-

tion, Lefebvre added.

However, he expressed satisfaction with the level of information being provided by the Ontario Power Generation Timmins office.

### DRAFT FORM

MNR spokesperson Emily Kirk outlined communication strategies currently being taken by the ministry with stakeholders on the Montreal River.

"The water management plan for the Montreal River is a complex plan currently in draft form," she said in an email to The Speaker.

The plan for the Montreal River was started under the 2002 guidelines, but she said it will also incorporate the new October 2016 *Maintaining Water Management Plans* bulletin.

She explained that the bulletin "transfers the responsibilities for administering standing advisory committees from MNR to the proponents/owners/operators."

She added that, "during spring thaw and at other times of the year when there is risk of high and/or low flows, MNR district offices issue watershed condition statements to area municipalities and other stakeholders including the Town of Latchford, as conditions warrant.

"In addition to receiving watershed condition statements, the North Bay district office communicates regularly with the Town of Latchford and has been meeting with the Town of Latchford and other stakeholders on the Montreal River system annually, prior to spring thaw, to outline the process on communicating watershed condition statements and review of responsibilities of MNR and townships/municipalities in the event there is flooding or high water in their community."

### Deadly distraction

The Ontario Provincial Police have launched an all-out campaign against distracted driving.

They say there are more people killed on Ontario roadways by distracted drivers than by drunk drivers.

In 2016, deaths attributed to distracted driving were double that of impaired driving: 38-19.

The latest police statistics say one in seven Ontario road deaths are due to cellphone usage.

If you are on your phone you are four times more likely to crash your vehicle.

Many people would not even think to get into a vehicle if the driver was drunk, yet they don't have a problem if someone has a cellphone in their hand.

Each and every one of us has to make an effort to make distracted driving socially unacceptable.

Distracted driving may very well be the newest addiction in Ontario.

Sadly, people cannot stop using cellphones in their cars for texting or talking purposes.

We see it everyday in the Temiskaming region. Someone is checking their mes-

sages at the streetlights, or someone is looking into their lap while driving down a street.

And haven't more than a few of us seen that 18-wheel trucker checking his phone while driving down Highway 11?

It is really amazing that so many drivers continue to risk their lives and the lives of others for the sake of a cellphone message.

Do you really need to take that call now? Is it necessary to send that message?

And when there are children in the car we shake our heads.

We know insurance companies run the world these days. So why aren't insurance companies offering premium discounts for the installation of mobile device management systems that prevent cellphone usage.

Why aren't they jacking up the rates for people who have been caught and charged with distracted driving?

Put your cellphones and other electronic devices in the trunk of your car away from your gaze and concentrate on steering your three thousand pound automobile safely to your destination.

### Ice hut removal

Friday, March 31, is the deadline for all ice huts to be removed from area lakes in this region, including Lake Temiskaming.

You don't have to stop ice fishing, but you have to remove your home-away-from-home because of changing ice conditions.

And please remove anything you bring out onto the ice including supports, garbage, etc.

Always remember to be safe, analyze the condition of the ice before you venture out and enjoy some of the best fishing in mid- to late-March the North has to offer.

# Meaningful conversations

Dear editor,

As Minister of Education, I know schools are the heart of a community. We know that there are a number of difficult discussions that are taking place between local school boards and parents about the future of the schools in their area, especially in rural and remote communities.

I am continuing to encourage the Boards to have active and meaningful conversations with their municipality and the parents to find solutions that work best for the community, while ensuring students have an equal opportunity for an excellent education.

We have taken great strides in ensuring student success and building up our public school system. In 2003, we inherited a broken and under-funded education system. We moved forward and made the necessary investments in our students and our schools. We have done this by increasing per-student funding by 63 per cent and investing more than \$16 billion in school infrastructure, including nearly 450 new and improved schools in rural Ontario. We have made changes to the education funding formula to be less dependent on enrolment, in fact, per-student funding for rural school boards is now about \$1,000 more than in urban boards. We are also moving forward with our commitment to provide secure, affordable broadband access to all Ontario students and educators, especially in rural and remote parts of the province to enable equitable access to innovative e-learning opportunities.

But we know that there are communities still concerned about the status of their schools.

This is why, I along with my colleague Minister Chiarelli sent a joint letter to school boards and municipalities ... to provide an update on our government's commitment to finding solutions that meet the needs of Ontario's students and communities. We are demonstrating this commitment by working with local leaders to:

- Pursue more opportunities for school boards to share space with each other, particularly if doing so will maintain a school presence in a rural or isolated community. Going forward, we will be reviewing all school board requests for capital funding to ensure joint-use between boards has been pursued before funding is granted.

- Encourage and support more opportunities for community hubs to use excess space in schools by facilitating collaborative local partnerships, including through capital investments to retrofit space for community use and by hosting a Community Hubs Summit in May.

- Ensure school boards and municipalities are working together to jointly plan and consider community impacts. We will be working with municipalities and school boards on how to best include community impacts in the pupil accommodation process, so that school trustees can understand these impacts alongside impacts on student achievement, transportation and outcomes.

- Launch an engagement on new approaches to supporting education in rural and remote communities, led by three Parliamentary Assistants, MPPs Granville Anderson, Grant Crack, and Lou Rinaldi, to gather feedback across Ontario on how we can further strengthen the future of rural education.

It is our hope that this engagement will allow us to highlight opportunities that will proactively enhance the quality and delivery of education in rural and remote communities in Ontario.

Patrick Brown has no plans on how to build up our education system in rural Ontario, but his proposed arbitrary moratorium on school closures would limit locally-elected school boards from collaborating with their communities and implementing creative solutions based on the needs of their students and their communities. Mr. Brown has not specified how long his moratorium would be in place, what the cost would be or if new modern schools under construction would be halted in the meantime.

It is our government's expectation that all school boards will continue consulting with their local community and municipalities to provide the best programming and overall classroom experience that supports student achievement and well-being.







### March 24th is World Tuberculosis Day!

Healthy people, who are infected, typically have no symptoms. The symptoms of active TB of the lung are coughing, sometimes with sputum or blood, chest pains, weakness, weight loss, fever and night sweats. Tuberculosis is treatable with a six-month course of antibiotics.

#### SCREENING

The objective of screening for active TB disease is to identify undiagnosed infectious respiratory cases so they can be treated successfully.

#### WHO SHOULD BE SCREENED?

- Close contacts of people with known or suspected active TB disease
- Persons with HIV infection
- Persons with a history of active TB disease or with chest x-ray findings suggestive of past TB
- Urban homeless and the under-housed, including staff at homeless shelters
- Staff and residents in institutional settings, such as nursing homes
- Health care workers
- Persons who have lived in a country with high TB incidence, have immigrated to Canada within the previous 2 years and have either been living with or in known contact with a person with TB
- Persons employed in settings where they may infect children, such as a child care facility
- Persons with a history of substance abuse

#### DIAGNOSIS:

Diagnosing active tuberculosis based merely on signs and symptoms is difficult. A diagnosis of TB should, however, be considered in people with signs of lung disease or a group of symptoms lasting longer than two weeks. A chest X-ray and multiple sputum cultures are typically part of the initial assessment.
