City diving into water system upgrades

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Greater clarification is coming to water issues in the city.

Temiskaming Shores is planning to upgrade the McCamus Avenue treatment plant, which now serves both Dymond and New Liskeard.

It's also launching a pilot project to track water usage in the restaurant and accommodations sectors.

It'll use the data to develop a single bylaw for water billing in the sectors across the entire municipality, said Mayor Carman Kidd after council met earlier this week.

The big-ticket item is the replacement of the McCamus plant's aging iron removal filters.

The cost will be offset by up to \$516,400 from the federal and provincial governments under the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund.

Iron is an aesthetic concern causing discolouration, said public works director Doug Walsh.



Walsh said new technologies have been developed to remove iron.

The city is releasing a request for proposals from consultants and contractors to design and build a new system.

The existing system is in riod. "pretty rough shape," Kidd said. trying to keep them going, so

this will give us a new system." He said water volumes going through the plant have also increased since the New Liskeard and Dymond water systems were linked last year.

At its June 20 meeting, coun-said. cil also approved the \$12,500 purchase of nine cold-water meters from Sudbury-based Wamco Waterworks Northern.

They'll be installed in various restaurants and hotels across the municipality to track consumption over a one-year pe-

In a report to council, city "We've been patching and staff said the municipality has no accurate water consumption data for the sectors.

> Establishments are billed differently for water usage under existing bylaws in the former municipalities of New Liskeard, Haileybury and Dymond, Kidd

Some have meters while others don't, and in some cases, restaurant billing is based on seating, he said.

He said the data collected during the study will be presented to the business sector as a new bylaw is drafted to equalize measures across the municipality.

Water meters are not under consideration for residential use, he continued.

After looking at the cost of installing and monitoring residential meters, "it's not really cost-effective for us," he said.

There is big money being spent by the provincial and federal governments during this sesquicentennial year.

> Indigenous children as young as five experienced loss of culture, language, and identity while suffering mental, physical, spiritual and sexual abuse.

Yes, this happened in Canada, the country we live in.

We have Justice Murray Sinclair's Truth and Reconciliation Report recognizing the past injustices done to Indigenous Canadians.

If you aren't aware of the residential school experience, or the Truth and Reconciliation report or the missing and murdered Aboriginal women inquiry, educate yourself.

Maya Angelou said, "When you know better, you do better."

Sorry, but the feel good "kittens and rainbows" story we is not the reality of this country.

Perhaps this country has fallen short of its own values and

our imagined superiority aside if our beliefs segregate us into a hierarchy making some matter more than others. No one is less important than anyone else.

Keeping the cottage safe and secure

TEMAGAMI (Special) - One of the biggest areas of concern for cottage owners is the increase of cottage break and enters, thefts, and damage that have occurred this year.

The Temiskaming and Temagami Detachments of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) along with the Temagami Lakes Association and the Temagami Lake Watch Program are working together to reduce these crimes.

Cottage break and enters, damage and theft are serious concerns impacting police, cottage owners, the cottagers association and insurance companies. The OPP encourages crime prevention at the cottage in support of local cottagers' associations and Cottage Watch initiatives across Ontario.

Local residents can assist police. All suspicious matters

need to be reported and obtain as much information as possible. This includes physical descriptions, clothing descriptions, vehicle descriptions (licence plate), island numbers and the area where they were last seen. Note the direction that the suspects are heading.

Operation Identification is a property marking initiative designed to help discourage the theft of valuables by facilitating the identification of recovered stolen property. Thieves like to target the easy to carry items so that it doesn't hinder their movement.

ETCHING

One easy way to help discourage theft of these items is to etch them with an identifying number such as your vehicle licence plate number or to use a tool similar to the TRACE pen.

This pen is a personal anti-

theft marking system that helps when they suspect property is individuals protect their property. TRACE pens have tiny discs, about the size of a grain of sand and each hold a unique personal identification number, linking your property to you within a global database. The use of the TRACE pen allows police to positively identify when an item is stolen, when labelled with the TRACE pen. This anti-theft tool is already being utilized in the Temagami area and the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police approves and supports its use with the goal of reducing property theft in Ontario.

The cottagers association encourages cottage owners to use these pens to assist police in locating stolen items. When you identify your property with the TRACE pen, police are then able to access the database stolen.

In association with this, it is always a good idea to copy down a list of the serial numbers of all electronic devices, tools, generators and to keep this list in a secure area as these numbers can assist in investigations.

Remember to assure your safety at all times. Contact police immediately and do not tamper with the crime scene as valuable evidence can be lost.

Inspection of Approved Aerial Herbicide Spraying Abitibi River and Timiskaming Forests

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) invites you to inspect the MNRF-approved aerial herbicide spray project. As part of our ongoing efforts to regenerate and protect Ontario's forests, selected stands on the Abitibi River and Timiskaming Forests (see map) will be sprayed with herbicide to control competing vegetation, starting on or about July 20, 2017. The herbicide Forza, registration P.C.P.# 26401 Pest Control Products Act will be used.



Christmas time in the city

TEMISKAMING SHORES – It's never too early to begin thinking about Christmas.

And the festive season is on the minds of Village Noël Témiskaming organizers.

A new schedule and expanded activities for students, a log sawing competition, and on-site demonstrations by artisans are planned for 2017, committee chair Réjeanne Bélisle-Massie told Temiskaming Shores councillors June 6.

Village Noël, launched in 2015, has "huge" potential for growth,

And the larger it becomes, she said, "the more economic spinoffs we will have."

She provided council with a summary of last year's festivities.

Organizers estimated attendance at 5,000 from the Temiskaming Shores area, 1,500 from

Quebec, and 500 from other parts of Ontario. Some 1,500 students from eight schools took in events.

Twenty-seven wooden kiosks were located throughout the downtown. Four more will be added this year.

Forty artists and craftspeople from Ontario, another 11 from Northwestern Quebec, and six food producers took part.

That tally doesn't include vendors at the Riverside Farmers' Market, which was one of six partners joining Centre culturel ARTEM in the event.

Twenty-nine local musicians as well as several groups and individual performers from outside the area provided live entertainment.

Anglophones, francophones and First Nations participated, Bélisle-Massie said.

"We're trying to represent the three cultures around the lake."

Behind the scenes, more than 250 volunteers in addition to city staff were working.

FINANCES

On the financial front, revenues tallied almost \$196,000, with almost two-thirds of the support coming from FedNor.

Of that sum, sponsorships accounted for \$4,000.

Bélisle-Massie said demand for sponsors was high in 2016, which saw the final Bikers Reunion and the One Foot Forward fundraiser.

Businesses and organizations provided in-kind help valued at \$68,600.

Almost \$6,000 came from kiosk rentals, and souvenir sales raised \$3,000.

Revenues outstripped expenses by about \$5,300.

She said Village Noël has also created some tangible assets, including a downtown sound system and improved electrical infrastructure as well as the kiosks.

"It's important that the community takes on ownership of this tourism event," Bélisle-Massie said.

"It's not a francophone event, it's a community event."

This year's Village Noël Témiskaming will run November 23 through 25.





Should You Get the Pneumonia Vaccine?

What is the Pneumonia Vaccine (Pneumovax)?

Pneumococcal Disease (PD) is an infection caused by a type of bacteria (streptococcus pneumonia). When this bug invades the body, it can lead to serious illness, such as pneumonia. But the bacteria can also cause blood poisoning and meningitis, which is inflammation of the tissues around the brain and spinal cord.

PD bacteria can travel through the air and spread by close contact, through sneezing, coughing or kissing. It can also be picked up from surfaces and objects. The most common signs and symptoms are fever, chills, sweat, aches and pains, and headaches.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

People 65 and older and those with conditions that affect the immune system, such as:

- Cancer
- Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
- Chronic lung disease
- Nephrotic syndromeCirrhosis of the liver
- Alcoholism
- Diabetes
- HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- Now also recommended for asthma

About eight out of 10 cases occur in these high-risk groups. The vaccine protects against 65% of people. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Five Tips for Reducing Your Risk of contracting PD:

- 1. If you are 65 or older or in the risk group noted above, see your primary care provider about getting the vaccine.
- 2. Wash your hands
- 3. Be active
- 4. Get enough sleep, as this can help to keep your immune system strong
- ${\it 5. \ Have \ regular \ follow \ up \ visits \ with \ your \ primary \ care \ provider.}$

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – There may be a lot of shoes without boxes in Southern Temiskaming.

Tallies for the 2016 Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Campaign have been released.

A total of 887 shoeboxes filled with toys, school supplies, personal care items and good wishes were packed in South Temiskaming.

That's up from the 854 boxes sent to the Christian organization the previous year.

The recent collection will be distributed to children in need in Haiti, Chile, Costa Rica, Senegal and, for the first time, the West African country of Gambia

"This program allows individuals and groups to help bring joy and hope to children in desperate situations around the world," writes Elaine Glassford, the effort's district coordinator.

"The shoeboxes help the children feel loved and to know that they have not been forgotten."

Canadians assembled more than 664,500 boxes last year. Around the world, more than 11.4 million boxes were distributed to children.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, a Christian relief and development organization headed by Franklin Graham, son of evangelist Billy Graham.



DECODING THE OAT



In practice, this means that eating oats makes you feel full for longer, as slower digestion maintains levels of hormones associated with feelings of satiety.

Canadian farmers already produce 15 per cent of the 22 million tons of oats harvested worldwide each year. Cracking the genetic code of the oat would be a huge win for Canada's agricultural industry, especially for farmers in more difficult climates. Enjoyed in muffins, break-


