On the road to history

TEMISKAMING SHORES - When the Ferguson Highway opened in 1927, travellers had to register at North Bay and Latchford.

It was a safeguard to ensure they wouldn't be lost on the newly constructed road that ran through rock and swamps.

"This thing was built essentially by hand and by horse," said Graham Gambles.

The Haileybury man was a leading organizer in efforts to recognize the crucial role played by the highway's opening 90 years ago.

It was the missing link in the provincial highway system that joined the growing mining developments, farming communities and forestry operations in the Northeast to Southern On-

The 90th anniversary of the Ferguson Highway's opening was commemo-



"It is a real piece of automotive Temiskaming history," said Doug Inglis of the 1911 Oakland. He said the car, owned by the businessman for whom the Yates Block in downtown New Liskeard was named, was delivered by train. But while the vehicle is authentic, he said it's not original. He found the front part in Belle Vallée, where it was being used to power a saw, and located other sections in Saskatchewan and Colorado. (Staff photo by Diane Johnston)

rated September 3 in Rockwalk Park at Northern College's Haileybury campus.

The celebrations also tried to recapture the spirit of the Great Northern Cavalcade on this weekend 90 years ago.

At that time more than 1,200 Northeastern residents in up to 400 vehicles were reported to have made the trek to Toronto from as far away as Timmins and Cochrane.

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD)

What is FASD? FASD is a brain injury that can occur when an unborn baby is exposed to alcohol. It's a lifelong disorder with effects that include physical, mental, behavioural and learning disabilities that can vary from mild to severe. FASD is the leading known cause of preventable developmental disability in Canada.

Signs and Symptoms

Every unborn baby will be affected by alcohol differently. FASD is often called an invisible disorder because the majority of people with it have no obvious signs of disability. Their learning and behavioural challenges are often mistaken for other problems. Some babies are born with facial features that are characteristic of FASD. These features are only evident when a fetus is affected by alcohol at a specific stage in pregnancy. Only a small number of people with FASD will have these features. The features include:

- little or no groove or ridge between the nose and upper lip
- small eyes or shorter distance between one corner of the eye to the other

For all people with FASD, there will be different degrees of brain damage. These may include problems with:

- learning
- memory attention
- language social skills
- motor skills
- controlling behaviour reasoning and judgement

In everyday life, problems with behaviours may look like:

- being impulsive
- acting out from frustration not understanding consequences
- being unfocused and easily distracted
- difficulties with keeping up with classroom learning
- forgetting how to do something they've done before a hard time with handling money or learning how to tell time

An early diagnosis followed by appropriate interventions and support help to minimize the disabilities associated with FASD. If you are a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team and are concerned about the possibility of FASD, please call the office at



Hurricanes, wild fires, tsunami, earthquakes, floods and famine are becoming a common thread on the six o'clock news.

And what has become a common thread is the incredible ways people are responding to natural disasters.

Hundreds of people drove thousand of miles with their boats and goodwill to help the flood victims of Houston.

The photograph of the seniors sitting in waist-high contaminated water waiting to be rescued was heartbreaking.

One of the richest men in Houston, Jim "Mattress Mack" McIngvale of Gallery Furniture, opened two of his huge stores as a shelter and gave out his personal cell phone number to those in need.

We saw ordinary people standing side-by-side in a human chain in chest-high water sasters in the region. searching for survivors and risking their own lives doing it.

I admire all those wonderful people who didn't have to be asked or paid to dig in and help - they just did it out of the goodness of their hearts.

What galled a good many people were the actions of a wealthy televangelist pastor who refused to get his 16,500seat church dirty from the floodwaters until he was shamed on

social media.

And for those who have a bone to pick with organized religion, this was a watershed mo-

A ridiculously wealthy, selfserving man-of-god pastor hesitated to help the needy when they needed it the most.

Yet he has his hand out taking money through his televised ministries.

You don't wait to receive an invitation when disaster strikes, you react swiftly and with the goodness of your heart.

And that is exactly what has happened in this region, most notably when the 1977 fire swept through Cobalt and destroyed over half the homes in

People from across the country did not wait to be asked to respond, they stepped up and helped out. They sent money, food and clothing to the emergency depot set up at the Cobalt Arena at that time.

The same goes for the Great Fire of 1922 and other mega di-

And on a different scale from a natural disaster, it warmed my heart when compassionate people here opened up their hearts and wallets to help a Syrian refugee family in need.

We are each other's keepers and we are all just walking each other home aren't we?

In the wake of Hurricane Harvey, it's the ordinary citizens making the hero honour role.

Stop for flashing red lights

If a driver fails to stop for the flashing red lights of a school bus, a child or children could be killed or seriously injured.

This is true.

A little over 15 years has gone by since five-year-old Adam Ranger was struck and killed by a truck on February 11, 2000, just east of Mattawa, Ontario.

Adam was attempting to cross the road as the flashing red lights of his school bus were activated that fateful

Two years later a verdict was returned of manslaughter and criminal negligence causing death against the driver of the truck that hit Adam Ranger.

It was a precedent setting judgment at the time.

School buses have returned to the streets of the South Temiskaming region and it is incumbent on drivers to be

aware of the flashing red lights when buses are stopped to pick up and drop off children.

There are several large billboards placed around the region with Adam Ranger's face on them reminding people to stop for the flashing lights of a school bus.

Hopefully the precedent setting judgment against the driver who killed a five-year-old boy, plus the billboard campaign and the messages from law enforcement, result in one driver making the decision to not drive through flashing red lights of a school bus, then children will be that much safer when exiting or getting onto their school buses.

Please be alert and aware of school buses and children riding and walking to and from school.

Open Letter to Transportation Minister Del Duca

Dear Minister Del Duca,

Over the course of the last few weeks, my constituency staff and I have fielded numerous calls regarding the condition of Highway 11 between the communities of Iroquois Falls and Cochrane. At this time, this portion of Highway 11 is under construction (Contract 2017-5105 - Highway 11 - Iroquois Falls).

While people generally understand the nature of road construction and its accompanying delays, many of my constituents have expressed real concern regarding their safety when using this road. Several have also suffered damage to their vehicles, due to the condition of the road.

We have contacted your Ministry's liaison, and have received a reply. While I appreciate the clarifying comments, it is hard to understand why the road has been allowed to deteriorate so badly during construction. As Highway 11 forms a portion of the Trans-Canada Highway, it is reasonable for travellers to expect a consistent quality of road surface across the country. The contract information posted on the Ministry's Traveller's Road Information Service website as of August 25, 2017, states that there will be no reduced speed limits, but the Ministry's response dated August 22, 2017, states that reduced speed limits have been posted. Could you clarify whether all conditions of the contract are being met at this time, particularly those pertaining to driver safety during construction?

We appreciate that the weather has been challenging, but it is vital that the road remain in good condition for travellers, regardless of the weather. Our office has been assured that paving will commence this week. It is my sincere hope that it does, and that on-going maintenance is brought to a higher standard during the remainder of the construction phase. It is imperative that people feel safe on our main public transportation route in the North.

I trust that you will look into this matter. I look forward to your response.




