

Kap Kig Iwan Road reconstruction starting

EVANTUREL TOWNSHIP - Evanturel Township is busy with a road project that has long been discussed and is now getting done - at least halfwav.

The Kap Kig Iwan Road is being reconstructed from Highway 11 to the intersection with Spruce Grove Road over a distance of 850 metres.

The work includes ditching, replacement of culverts, excavation, pulverizing and recycling of asphalt, as well as recycling of granular materials.

Township roads foreman Justin Mitchell said that there is a total of eight culverts to change.

PEDESTRIAN TRAFFIC

Hard-topping of the road will be completed in 2018. The hardtopped area will also extend across the entire roadway, from ditch to

"There will be a wider shoulder for pedestrian traffic," said clerktreasurer Amy Vickery-Menard at the council's meeting of Wednesday, September 13.

Reeve Derek Mundle said that two metres of hard-topped surface are being added to the east side of the road.

Work planned for 2017 started

Monday, September 11, and will be completed no later than October 13, Vickery-Menard stated.

One of the entranceways off the road leads into Kap Kig Iwan Provincial Park.

The township hopes to be able to complete the second section of the road in the future. But Mundle noted that the portion of the road closest to the park gates "is in better shape" than the section to the north which extends to the highway and is now under reconstruc-

Mitchell noted that there are a number of campers who use the park and travel the road's entire length. The park is also a popular hiking area.

Traffic controls have been keeping one lane open at all times, said Mitchell.

The \$240,000 project is being assisted through the Canada 150 Fund, administered by FedNor. That portion will account for 42 per cent of the project's cost, or up to \$100,000. The Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund is providing \$50,000 to assist with the project. The township also intends to use eight per cent of the township's Gas Tax Fund. The remainder will be financed directly by the munici-

Information Centre support defeated in Cobalt

COBALT - At its committeeof-the-whole meeting, Cobalt council defeated a resolution to pay \$1,000 for the Information Centre service in Temiskaming Shores this year.

The Information Centre promotes area points of interest and activities, including those in Cobalt.

In August, Information Centre representative Helene Culhane attended council in response to Cobalt's decision not to provide \$2,000 this year, as it has annually in the past.

At the September 5 meeting, a motion was put forward by Councillor Mike Harrison to pay the Information Centre at least \$1,000, but that was defeated in a split vote. Mayor Tina Sartoretto, Councillors Mike Harrison and Sue Nielsen were supportive of the motion, Councillors George Othmer, Rochelle Schwartz and Perry Wuest opposed.

Temiskaming Shores and Cobalt have been the only two municipalities to fund the Information Centre in recent years.

2018 BUDGET DISCUSSIONS

At the September 5 meeting of Cobalt committee-of-thewhole, Wuest suggested that

the matter should be discussed at the town's next budget deliberations for 2018.

"We will put it all in the pot and see what happens," he said, noting that other similar questions are deferred until budget

Othmer agreed the matter of support for the Information Centre should be discussed for the next budget.

Chief administrative officer Michelle Larose stated the town's advertising budget includes funds for such advertising as Requests for Proposals.

Wuest noted that the town still has a membership with the Temiskaming Shores and Area Chamber of Commerce.

Nielsen commended Culhane's work on behalf of the town through the Information

"Immediately when someone comes in she directs them right here," she said.

Harrison agreed saying that the \$2,000 for the Information Centre has been "money well spent."

Sartoretto commented that the museums in Cobalt don't have their own marketing arm.

Othmer commented, "It's too bad we didn't have these arguments when the budget was being deliberated."



Signs and Symptoms of Prostate Cancer

- Difficulty urinating
- Urgent need to urinate
- Frequent urination, especially at night
- Burning or pain when urinating
- Inability to urinate or difficulty starting or stopping urine flow
- Painful ejaculation
- Blood in the urine or semen

Risk Factors

While any man can develop prostate cancer, you may be at a high risk if you are...

- Over 50: Age is the strongest risk factor for prostate cancer. Your risk increases starting at age 50, and most cases are diagnosed in men over age 65. Depending on your risk, your health care provider may recommend that you think about testing at an earlier age - as young as 40.
- Have a family history of prostate cancer: Your risk is higher if a first-degree relative (father or brother) has had prostate cancer. Your risk increases with each additional first-degree relative who has the disease.
- African or Caribbean: Prostate cancer is more common among men in these ethnic groups. (Men of Asian descent have lower risk.)

Don't Ignore Symptoms

The sooner symptoms are reported to your health care provider, the sooner testing to help diagnose and treat the problem can begin. Symptoms may be caused by prostate cancer or by another health problem.

Symptoms are not always present especially in the early stages of prostate cancer. If detected and treated in its earliest stages, the chances of survival are greatly increased. Early detection is key!

Drones are also being used for livestock surveillance. They can check temperatures, apply insecticides and herd and locate lost animals.

With more and more companies entering the rapidly evolving drone industry, other functions will be developed. The Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems International predicts that in the future agricultural drones will account for upwards of 80 per cent of the commercial market.

UAVs are like any other new agricultural technology. Experts advise producers to do their homework before buying a drone. They suggest that farmers prioritize their needs and investigate federal aviation regulations and registration requirements. They should also get informed about additional hardware and software requirements, training programs and the UAV's construction components


