## Operation launched

### Christmas cheer in a shoebox

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – What surer early warning sign of Christmas is there than a shoebox?

Operation Christmas Child is preparing to launch for the 2017 season.

It sends shoeboxes packed with toys, school supplies, personal care items and good wishes to children around the world.

Local donations this year are headed to Chile and the West African countries of Senegal, Guinea, Gambia and Ivory Coast, said Elaine Glassford, coordinator of the campaign in South Temiskaming.

Last year, the area compiled 887 shoeboxes. Canadians assembled more than 664,500 boxes in 2016.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, a Christian relief and development organization headed by Franklin Graham, son of evangelist Billy Graham.

Glassford said the local collection runs until November 17.

Empty shoeboxes can be picked up at Temiskaming Physiotherapy Clinic in New Liskeard, the Leisure Inn in Haileybury and the Elk Lake Public Library.

Filled boxes can be dropped off at the same locations.

But if a batch of boxes is being prepared, Glassford requested that it be delivered to First Baptist Church in New Liskeard.

### Falls and Injury Prevention...from Assessment to Intervention

#### DID YOU KNOW...

- One in three adults over the age of 65 falls at least once per year;
- Half of all falls occur in the home;
- Falling can cause injury, loss of mobility and independence;
- is the sixth leading cause of death in seniors;
- Seniors' falls and injuries cost Canadians \$3 billion per year.

The good news is that falling can be prevented!

Our goal is to keep you safe, healthy and living independently in your home for as long as possible. If you are 65 years of age or older and a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team, you can expect to be asked to complete a Falls Self-Risk Assessment using tablet technology the next time you visit the office. It consists of 12 simple yes or no questions that you can answer simply by touching the screen. A risk score is assigned, based on your answers and the result is automatically uploaded into your electronic medical record. If you score 4 or higher, a follow up appointment will be scheduled for you to have a comprehensive clinical assessment with our Nurse Practitioner.

#### FOUR THINGS YOU CAN DO TO PREVENT FALLS:

1. **Begin a regular exercise program**
2. **Have your health care provider review your medications**
3. **Have your vision checked**
4. **Make your home safer**

Every patient 65 years of age and older is encouraged to attend one of the free seniors' exercise classes that are available in Temagami and in other locations throughout the District. We also have free copies of the Independent Living Guide which is a room by room checklist to make identifying and removing slipping, tripping and falling hazards much easier.



### Health unit amalgamation

The proposal to amalgamate Ontario's 36 public health units into 14 regional hubs should come as no surprise to people living in the north. Time and time again we've seen cutbacks to basic services in the name of perceived efficiencies by the gang at Queen's Park.

Efficiencies that often leave us on the short end of the public services stick.

While consolidating public health care services into bureaucratic mega centres is perceived as a good idea and a cost-saving one, it should be unacceptable to each and every northerner.

The basic understanding of challenges facing northerners and a coherent vision for the future is something we must insist on from our provincial government.

Our population density is too low to warrant local health services being stripped away and awarded to the larger players, and our changing population demographic should be a further red flag for such changes.

We are going to need every local health care agency to overcome the tide of ageism as the baby boomers dominate the landscape of the North.

We must not allow the government of the day to hand us an amalgamated health unit model approach designed to fail the grass roots people of the North.

Amalgamations often reward the larger player.

Local health units partner with community organizations such as school boards and hospitals and if services go to a regional set up, that will all be lost.

How will dental services, maternal health care and immunization clinics then be administered from a regional hub hundreds of miles away?

Amalgamating the two Northern Ontario entities, the Porcupine and Timiskaming Health Units, with a regional hub will not bode well for the health of northerners.

It may not even save money, as is the impetus for such a move in the first place.

Here's why— if northerners cannot access timely health services their health could be compromised and this could end up costing the system more money in the long run.

Why should the health of northerners be sacrificed so the government can save money off our backs?

And there will be local job loss if amalgamation plans proceed, which doesn't bode well for those workers or the local economy.

Is it really "patient first" in terms of health care in the north?

# Possibly better

It's one of Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's favourite phrases: "Better is always possible."

When our government first rolled out proposed tax changes for private corporations around mid-July, it was the start of a conversation. Our goal was to make the system fairer and address situations where some wealthy individuals were using planning strategies in order to pay less tax.

We invited stakeholders – small businesses, doctors, lawyers, accountants and other professionals, farmers and fishers – to tell us what they thought.

We wanted to get this right, so we consulted broadly across Canada and received thousands of submissions.

As with anything, change isn't always easy. And we didn't expect these proposals to be any different.

The tax topic seemed to be top of mind as I travelled throughout Nipissing-Timiskaming over the summer and fall months. Many people wanted to stop and talk. Some wrote. And others phoned.

Chambers of Commerce in North Bay and Temiskaming Shores, who are the de facto voice of small business in their communities, also weighed in during informal encounters and more official meetings.

As someone whose father ran a small business and with my own background as an entrepreneur, the concerns they raised were legitimate.

The feedback was always relayed respectfully and in the true spirit of co-operation and engage-

ment. I heard many well-reasoned and thoughtful comments.

The conversations usually ended the same way. We'd part with an undertaking on my part to take what I'd heard and share it with the Finance Minister.

As the Prime Minister and Finance Minister said when they outlined changes that came about as a result of the consultations, they were listening when caucus colleagues, like me, brought the views of Canadians to the table.

And our government responded to what we heard.

The end result:

- The small business tax rate will be cut to nine per cent by January 2019 from the current 10.5 per cent;
  - A simplified proposal to address income sprinkling so that businesses with family members who make meaningful contributions will not be affected;
  - A modified measure to limit tax deferral on passive investments. We will create a \$50,000 annual threshold on investment income. This gives small businesses the flexibility to save for new equipment or such things as parental leave or retirement.
  - We will work to make the transfer of a family business to the next generation more efficient.
- We've come a long way over a relatively short time. And we will continue to refine the proposals and take into account the detailed feedback we have received over the months to come.
- Is our plan perfect? Perhaps not. But with your input, better is always possible.

# Path forward

## Latchford hoping to upgrade town trail

LATCHFORD - The Town of Latchford is hoping to be able to secure funding to upgrade a trail around the town.

Town public works foreman Roger Clark presented the project at council's regular meeting Thursday, October 19.

The purpose of the project would be to create a paved accessible activity trail.

Clark said that if the project is not approved for funding, the boards along the trail will have to be pulled up over the next four to five years and replaced. Some areas where new culverts are required have also been identified.

The trail is 840 metres in length.

Councillor Mike Brooks commented that the trail has deteriorated and there are now some points where boards have become tripping hazards.

A cost estimate in the amount of just under \$150,000 has been made for the project, which would include the work by a professional construction company for the paving. The cost would also include work by the town staff who would be responsible for removing the existing wood walkway and restoration of the areas after the paving is completed.

The trail includes a section from Sullivan Avenue to Mowat Avenue, Mowat Avenue to the bridge, the bridge to the dock, a small section at the dock, a small section at the cenotaph, a section at the intersection of Mortson Avenue and King Street, and the section from McLeod Avenue to the dam.

The application for funding was submitted October 13.

# Managing meds to prevent falls

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special/Staff) – Medication can help, but it can also hurt.

Some medications increase the risk of falls, says the Timiskaming Health Unit.

November has formally been designated “fall prevention month.”

It’s estimated that one in three older adults fall each year. In Ontario, adults over the age of 65 are more likely than the general population to suffer an injury after falling.

This year’s fall prevention campaign focuses on medication management, which has been deemed one of nine risk factors for falls.

Medications include prescription drugs and over-the-counter products as well as vitamins, supplements, herbal products and topical creams.

As people age, the health unit says the effects of medication can also change.

“Asking questions about your medications, taking them as directed and having your meds reviewed with a health provider or pharmacist annually can help older adults maintain independence and prevent a fall,” it said.

It also urges people to properly dispose of expired or unused medications.

Throughout the month of November, people can pick up a medication cleanout bag at the health unit’s offices.

Or, it said people can pick up bags at their pharmacies when they drop by to have their medications reviewed.


Bags with medications can then be returned to pharmacies for safe disposal.





- 1. Tell someone where you're going:** Make sure you tell a person or two where you are going, for how long, and when they should expect you back.

**4. Wear a safety harness in a tree stand:** Why? The biggest reason is sleepy hunter syndrome. You get warm, you were up early, and suddenly you're nodding off. A safety harness properly attached to you and the tree will prevent you from going more than a few feet from your seat.

**5. Mind your muzzle:** Don't get lazy walking down the trail with your weapon for the obvious reasons.

**6. Carry water and food:** It is easy to become dehydrated when you're hunting, and having some food not only keeps your energy up, it could also be wise if you have to handle an animal and are in the field a few hours longer than planned. Sandwiches, fruit and jerky are good choices.
