Free Seniors' Exercise Classes to Help Reduce Falls Risk

DID YOU KNOW...

- One in three adults over the age of 65 falls at least once per year;
- · Half of all falls occur in the home;
- Falling can cause injury, loss of mobility and independence;
- is the sixth leading cause of death in seniors;
- Seniors' falls and injuries cost Canadians \$3 billion per year.

The good news is that falling can be prevented! One of the most important things you can do to prevent a fall is to begin a regular exercise program. In Temagami, **free** seniors' exercises classes are offered twice weekly, on Monday at Ronocco House from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. and on Wednesday at the Temagami Legion from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. No experience is necessary. Everyone is encouraged to exercise at their own pace.

If you are 65 years of age or older and a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team, you can expect to be asked to complete a Falls Self-Risk Assessment once every 12 months. It consists of 12 simple yes or no questions with a risk score assigned based on your answers.

Every patient 65 years of age and older that is screened, will receive an information package including a list of free seniors' exercise classes available throughout the entire district. You can also ask our new Occupational Therapist for a home risk assessment. He can do a room by room falls risk assessment in your home to remove any potential slip, trip or fall hazards.

Our goal is to keep you safe, healthy and living independently in your home for as long as possible.

If you are interested in the free seniors' exercise classes, please call the office at (705) 569-3244.

Giants of the forest

I had the most amazing weekend.

My sense of wanderlust returned as the nice warm sunshine permeated the region and energized me.

During my travels I saw a great deal of northern wildlife, including a fox walking by me so close I could have touched it.

I inadvertently came upon two moose, a mother with her yearling calf, near the Hills Lake Fish Hatchery in beautiful Charlton.

I was taking photos of two Trumpeter swans at the time and for some reason I sensed something was going on up the road from my location.

I spoke softly to the moose while walking towards them hoping they wouldn't panic so I could take a decent photograph of them.

They were scruffy looking and who wouldn't be after the winter we've had.

Moose are easily recognized as the national animal of Canada.

They are huge and magnificent to behold in nature, giants of the northern forest.

The mother and her calf had bare patches on their shoulders and back indicating the presence of ticks.

Former Timiskaming District Secondary School teacher, Doug Fraser, spoke to me via a Facebook post about the moose. He mentioned several interesting facts about moose and ticks.

He had been involved in a moose/tick study in Algonquin Park so his knowledge about the consequences for moose and subject is second to none.

Fraser says moose have heavy infestations of thousands of ticks resulting in hair loss.

This is a huge problem because moose need hair to keep warm in winter months.

"Even a massive moose can't stav warm in Northern Ontario without a decent winter coat," said Fraser.

Adult ticks fall off in spring and lay egg masses on the ground. The larvae then hatch from the eggs and remain dormant through the summer only to attach themselves to moose in the fall.

But its not only moose and deer being infected by ticks, it is people.

I've found ticks in my camping gear.

Please note - it is only deer ticks that spread Lyme disease.

A friend of mine contracted Lyme disease and was quite ill as a result.

Climate change is being blamed for the spread of ticks and for declining moose populations. Moose thrive in cold climates.

Ontario's moose population has declined by 20 per cent and this is cause for concern.

Banning the hunting of moose calves would help to increase herd populations and directing resources to keep female moose alive would also work.

Also deforestation has huge

Cold water hazards

With warm weather on the horizon (finally), the temptation to soon get out on the water to fish, canoe or kayak is high.

Right now the water is extremely cold and despite a lack of ice in some places, that water will remain cold for several weeks.

If you don't have any cold water immersion gear, then stay off area waterways altogether.

It is tempting for children to go where water flows in the spring so extra caution is needed when children are playing near streams, rivers and lakes.

And walking on ice at this time of year is also extremely hazardous as spring temperatures create unsteady and unsafe ice conditions.

Be cautious anytime you or your family are near rivers or lakes.

Water is starting to open along rivers and streams and particularly deltas where water is entering or exiting the larger bodies of water.

It is important to understand water safety, fast moving water and undulating currents that can quickly drag even the most experienced swimmer under.

Hypothermia can quickly set in and overwhelm even the strongest of swimmers, becoming too weak to escape.

Always let someone know where you are going and when you are arriving home before venturing out near open waters.

And above all, stay safe!

Renewing the Promise in CEW

During the week of May 6 to May 11, the Northeastern Catholic District School Board will celebrate the significant contribution that Catholic Education has made to the community, the province and to Canada. Police said the ad was purportedly from a woman seeking a caregiver for her elderly mother-in-law suffering from dementia.

Police said it turned out to be scam.

Police said the ad was booked and paid for by credit card via email. The payment cleared, and nothing about the submission appeared to be out of the ordinary.

Police said, however, the culprit's goal appeared to be the collection of personal data, particularly banking records.

The OPP received two complaints but no money was lost.

Police said a Google search found cases related to the ad throughout Canada and the U.S.

Police advise people to refrain from responding to such advertisements.

They offer the following tips to protect oneself from scams:

- Don't give out personal financial details or information over the phone.
- Don't believe callers who say they're from your bank or credit card company. If you have a concern, visit your bank.
- Educate yourself about banking practices. Banks would never advise you to transfer funds to another outside account to protect your funds.

For further information about frauds and scams, it referred people to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, Consumer Protection Ontario, Canadian Bankers Association, and the OPP.

Avoiding wildlife on the road

DISTRICT (Special) – With the promised arrival of spring, the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry reminds motorists that wildlife will be on the move.

The ministry is advising drivers to be extra cautious.

"Moose, elk and deer are particularly active along roadways in the spring, especially at dawn and dusk," it noted in a news release.

"Deer rarely travel alone, so when motorists see one there are likely more nearby."

It urges drivers who spot animals on the road to slow down

and sound their horns in a series of short bursts.

At night, it said animals can be disoriented by headlights and run on to the road. Motorists should blink their headlights to warn wildlife and give them a chance to move out of the way.

It advised drivers to slow down at night and to brake firmly if an animal is standing on or crossing the road.

"Avoid swerving; it may result in loss of control and a more serious collision," it continued.

Drivers are advised to take extra care at certain locations

 where roads cross creeks or rivers, in wooded corridors, where field edges run perpendicular to the road, where fences meet roads, and where deer and moose crossing signs are

Any motorist who wants to keep wildlife (including white-tailed deer, moose, elk, black bear, hawk, eagle, owl or furbearing mammal) that has been killed or found on a roadway must submit a Notice of Possession promptly upon acquiring the dead animal.

Special rules apply to endangered or threatened species.



Hospital stages mock evacuation

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – Temiskaming Hospital put planning into practice when it recently staged its annual emergency evacuation exercise.

It recently conducted a mock evacuation that saw patient proxies and visitors moved to a safe area on the same floor.

It enabled staff to practise how they would safely and quickly evacuate patients in the event of a fire.

"Safety is a top priority at Temiskaming Hospital," said Erin Montgomery, the hospital's chief nursing officer, in a news release.

"Emergency planning, training and mock exercises are a few of the ways we focus on patient and staff safety, ensuring effective processes are in place to identify and respond in the event of a real emergency situation," she said.

"The mock emergency exercise was an excellent opportunity for staff to test our plan in identifying and responding to an emergency requiring patient, family and visitor evacuation." The hospital said Ontario's Fire Code requires certain organizations to prepare and implement a fire safety plan that has been approved by the Chief Fire Official.

In addition, several changes were made to the Ontario Fire Code as of January 1, 2014, that affect "vulnerable occupancies."

As a care and treatment facility, the hospital is considered a vulnerable occupancy Steve Langford, Temiskaming Shores' fire prevention officer, was on site March 15 to evaluate the awareness and implementation of the hospital's fire safety plan, and in particular, to carry out an emergency evacuation.

The hospital extended thanks to the many staff, volunteers and partners who made the exercise a success.





Temiskaming Geopark seeking national recognition

HAILEYBURY - The Temiskaming Rift Valley Geopark concept is continuing to be developed, and an application is being made to the national Geopark organization for consideration.

The goal is to obtain national recognition and then to seek recognition of the park by the UNESCO Global Geopark organization. As the Temiskaming Geopark advances, so will opportunities for tourism marketing as the Geopark advances, proponents envision.

At the annual general meeting of RockWalk Park Inc., which took place at Northern College on March 20, three non-profit organizations committed themselves to support the Geopark concept.

More founding members will continue to be sought. A minimum of three founding members are required to apply for evaluation by the executive of the Canadian National Committee for Geoparks. More founding member supporters will be required to apply to the UNE-SCO Global Geopark organiza-

The three existing founding members are RockWalk Park Inc., the Temiskaming Metis Community Council and the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre.

RockWalk Park president Graham Gambles, who has been promoting the value of developing a Geopark, said it is the hoped that Temiskaming will be chosen for two representatives of the Canadian Geopark to "come and take a look to see if we have what we think we have."

ASPIRING GEOPARKS

The applications will be eval-

executive in May, said Gambles, noting that only two applications are selected in any given year.

"It just depends on how many aspiring Geoparks have applied," he said on whether the Temiskaming site will be chosen for a visit.

Gambles believes the area offers much to qualify it as a Geopark. He noted that along with a number of tourism-oriented activities in the region, there are also several activities oriented specifically to geology, which he said the national representatives would be looking

These include the Colonial Mine Adit Tour, the Cobalt Mining Museum, the Rock-Walk Park in Hailevbury, the Fossilarium in Notre-Dame-du-Nord, and the Toburn Operating Authority in Kirkland Lake which exhibits mineral displays and provides tours.

There are also a number of sites which are available for touring, such as the Silver Heritage Trail in Cobalt and Coleman Township, and rock cuts along the sides of the roads.

"There are lots of things for people to see," said Gambles. "It's a question of making sure people know where they are."

ROCKWALK PARK

Approximately 16 people were present at the March 20 meeting. Northern College manager Tammy Mackey raised an old idea regarding the benefit that would be realized if there were all-season exercise equipment located at the RockWalk

Gambles said the concept was considered five years ago, but that was before a dormitory was also placed at the site.

Dr. Blount is a GP who provides anaesthesiology services, looks after hospital inpatients and takes care of a small office practice. He delivered about 600 babies and then gave it up to see if he could get a good night's sleep once in a while. He did coroner's investigations for many years until the OR got too busy.

Dr. Blount is on call 24 hours a day, 182 days a year, to provide epidural anaesthetics, spinal taps, and anesthetics for all kinds of surgery. After medical school at the University of Toronto, Dr. Blount took 18 months of post graduate training at Dalhousie University and then spent a year practising in lnuvik and in Whitehorse. 
