Gas Spill

Cleanup continuing after highway collision

ENGLEHART – Cleanup efforts continued this week following a gasoline spill caused during a Highway 11 collision north of Englehart.

About 20,000 litres of gasoline spilled from one of two tractor-trailers involved in a November 26 collision between Road 4 and Road 5 in Chamberlain Township.

"We expect the cleanup to take several days," said Gary Wheeler, a spokesperson for the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks, in an email the following night.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO TAXPAYER

Legislation related to the amount of time that property taxes have to be owing before the municipality can start the tax sale process has changed from three (3) years to two (2) years.


What this means is that a property cannot have taxes owing for more than current taxes plus one year. The legislation allows action to be taken if any portion of the prior year taxes are owing, the full amount billed does not have to be outstanding before the collection process can begin.

For example, if a property has taxes owing for 2017 (any amount) and 2018, then the municipality can proceed with the collection process of registering a lien on the property for the amount of the tax arrears on January 1, 2019.

Letters have been mailed out to all properties that will be affected by the updated legislation. In order to avoid a lien being registered on a property, the property taxes for all prior years up to and including 2017, plus all applicable penalty and interest charges would be required to be paid in full by December 31, 2018. The City wishes to advise that it will be utilizing the new legislation and its collection processes to their full extent.

We understand that a lump sum payment to clear the prior year taxes may not be feasible for all property owners; however, I would urge you to contact the undersigned to discuss payment arrangements.

"Thankfully, it appears that none of the fuel went into the nearby Blanche River or any intermediary waterways.

"Environmental crews have removed the remaining gasoline from the tanker and are now focusing on remediating the impacted environment," he continued.

"Ministry staff will continue to be involved as necessary."

He said the ministry takes all spills and threats to the environment "very seriously."

"Ministry staff were at the site to ensure that the owner of the transport truck takes the necessary steps to clean up the spill."

The collision left the driver of the fuel carrier with injuries described as serious but non-life threatening.

The driver of the other vehicle and a passenger were reported to have sustained minor injuries.

That driver was charged under the Highway Traffic Act with careless driving.

The Dairy farmers of Ontario say there will be huge concessions made as a result of the newly negotiated North American Free Trade Agreement.

This new version of NAFTA is called the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA).

It seems like the auto industry benefitted from USMCA but concessions had to be made off the backs of Canada's dairy farmers, some of whom operate farms in the South Temiskaming region.

Farmers say concessions made in the USMCA will affect their bottom line cash flows.

- Eat close to your usual times to keep your blood sugar steady. If your meal is served later than normal, eat a small snack at your usual mealtime and eat a little less when dinner is served.
- If you plan to have a sweet treat, cut back on other carbs (like potatoes and bread) during the meal.

2. **Outsmart the Buffet**

Make healthy choices easier:

- Start with vegetables to take the edge off of your appetite
- Eat slowly. It takes at least 20 minutes for your brain to realize
- Avoid or limit alcohol. If you have a drink, have it with food. Alcohol can lower blood sugar and interact with diabetes medications.

3. Fit in Favorites

If you plan for it, no food needs to be on the naughty list. Slow down and enjoy a small serving.

Keep Moving

Being active is your secret holiday weapon; it can help make up for eating more than usual and reduce stress during this most stressful time of the year. Take a walk with family and friends after a holiday meal.

5. **Get Your Rest**

Sleep loss can make it harder to control your blood sugar and when you're sleep deprived, you'll tend to eat more and prefer high-fat, high-sugar food. Aim for 7 to 8 hours per night to guard against mindless eating.

Increasing highway traffic concerns Latchford

LATCHFORD - Latchford town council wants the Ministry of Transportation to conduct a traffic count on Highway 11 in the area where it passes through the community.

At its Thursday, November 15, council meeting, council discussed their observations that the traffic is heavier than it was in the past and that there are more transports going through the town than there were in recent years.

"It would be good to get a traffic count down and compare it to five or ten years ago," commented Latchford Mayor George Lefebvre.

"With the heavy traffic going through town, even removing snow at corners becomes hazardous for our staff to do," he added.

Latchford chief financial officer Lise Remillard commented that it is "very scary to be on the highway." Councillor Mike Brooks added that when he crosses the highway on foot he makes sure that he has enough time to walk across the highway, but adds in an additional amount of time in case he should fall, so that he would have enough time to get up again and get off the highway before a transport came along.

Council commended the work of the Ontario Provincial Police in ticketing traffic passing through the town at a speed higher than the posted 60 kilometres an hour.

"All they're doing is making our community safer," said Brooks.

Lefebvre later commented to The Speaker that he doesn't see speeding as the problem, but "it's just an overall traffic problem."

He added that in winter conditions, the high rate of traffic makes it difficult for Latchford residents to get onto the highway.



Winter road support offered

TEMAGAMI (Staff/Special) – Temagami First Nation is receiving \$18,200 this year to maintain the winter road linking Bear Island and the Lake Temagami Access Road.

The funding was included in \$5.7 million from the province to 30 communities to build and maintain 3,160 kilometres of temporary winter roads.

The winter road network provides seasonal connections to all-season roads in remote and Far North communities.

Winter roads provide "vital connections" that make it easier to bring in essential services and goods like food, medical and construction supplies, said Greg Rickford, the minister of Energy, Northern Development and Mines and of Indigenous Affairs, in press release.

"The winter roads network also supports the local economy in Far North communities by providing more affordable transportation options for the mining industry."

Rickford announced the funding November 21 at the Chiefs of Ontario Special Chiefs' Assembly in Toronto.







 No ruts. With a blower you will achieve a better uniform, level surface.

• There are many options to choose from based on your specific needs and budget. i.e., front mount, rear mount, hydraulic or manual chute, etc.

Slow go, you must go slower with a blower than with a plow or blade.

Have to have a larger accumulation. You don't want to run the blower over an inch of snow and risk picking up stones or debris.
More fuel consumption, tractor runs at high RPM.



THE STRAIGHT BLADE

• These blades clear snow quickly and easily in narrow or large environments.

• For increased maneuverability, a straight blade can be angled 30 to 45 degrees right or left for exact plowing.

• Usually the least expensive and fastest option for snow removal attachments.

Con's:

- Multiple passes. You will have to go over more than once, as the snow will spill over the side edges of the blade as you go.
- Needs a larger area in which to place the snow.
- Snow will build up where you are pushing it over time. Eventually you will have to dig it up and move it elsewhere.
- You must be careful of your down pressure as not to scrape too deep. You could do damage to your paved or interlock stone driveways or lawn.

ARTICULATING V-PLOW

- V-plows allow better control, the direction of the push, when compared to a straight blade.
- The V-position cuts through heavier snow and can be used to break through deep unplowed snow.
- The scoop position allows for better cleanup or maneuvering in tight spaces, as well as carries more snow. Can also be used as a conventional straight blade.

Con's:

• Has the same cons as a straight blade. Although V-plows are significantly

SNOW PUSHER aka BOX PLOW Pro's:

• If you have a large amount of snow to move in a small amount of time, this attachment is for you. Best for large, wide driveways or parking lots.

- If the operator is skilled, snow can be removed in one pass, as the snow does not spill over the side because of the side wings.
- You are better able to control where the snow is placed.

- Again, snow will build up and you will have to handle it again.
- Built more for wide open spaces, as the pushers are usually larger and more cumbersome.



HAND SHOVEL (NOT RECOMMENDED)

- It's cheap.

Con's:

- It's cheap.
- Risk of injury.
- Extremely time consuming. You will have to handle the snow multiple (possibly hundreds) of times before area is clear.
- May lead to extreme fatigue and irritability.


