“Back in the dark ages”

Library says budget cuts will limit services

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – The Temiskaming Shores Public Library is warning that recent provincial budget cuts will have serious impacts on the services it can provide.

Library CEO and head librarian, Rebecca Hunt, says a 50 per cent cut to each of the provincial library services organizations - the Ontario Library Service-North (OLS-North) and Southern Ontario Library Service (SOLS) – will be a disaster.

The Doug Ford government announced it was cutting \$1 million from the budgets of the two services.

She said Northern libraries rely on the OLS-North for a variety of services.

“They administer a consortium, or a buying group, in Northern Ontario called the Joint Automation Server Initiative that provides us with the software that we use to check in books, check out books and search our collections.



It is what allows people to look at our collection from home and to go into their account online and renew their books or place holds on books they want,” noted Hunt in a re-



lease April 23.

“They also help librarians and library boards get the training they need to do their jobs.”

Rebecca Hunt She says Temiskaming Shores library patrons will see a “big drop in service without OLS-North support.”

Temiskaming Shores library board chair Donald Bisson is also concerned about the funding cuts, saying, “SOLS runs the interlibrary loan service and the Overdrive eBook collection.”

The Interlibrary loan program enables library patrons to access books not in local collections from other libraries across the province.

STOPPED SERVICE

Hunt noted the interlibrary loan program filled 375 requests for Temiskaming Shores patrons in 2018 but as of the budget cuts, it has been cancelled.

Because of the budget cuts, the library has had to stop interlibrary loan services at this time.

Bisson says the library has no idea what those services will look like in a year’s time.

“Will we still have them,” he asked.

“We also don’t know if cuts are coming to our e-book purchasing consortia,” said Hunt.

To put the cuts into perspective, she said Temiskaming Shores patrons on the OverDrive system checked out 6,793 e-books and audiobooks in 2018.

“It would be a hardship to provide e-book service to our patrons if SOLS was not able to maintain that consortium. It would really put us back in the dark ages to lose access to our e-resources.”

The library board is encouraging library patrons to contact Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof and Michael Tibollo, the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport, to voice their concerns.

TEMISKAMING SHORES — A home’s interior was gutted by fire on Tuesday, April 2, on Highway 65 West in Dymond Township, part of the City of Temiskaming Shores.

The New Liskeard fire department received the call to respond at 1:30 p.m. said Temiskaming Shores Fire Department chief Tim Uttley in a telephone interview.

They responded along with the Dymond and Haileybury Fire Departments.

According to Uttley, the fire was noticed by a volunteer firefighter, who happens to work for the city.

“He was out on patrol and spotted the fire,” said Uttley. “There were no injuries and no one was home at the time of the fire.”

Uttley says the fire started in the basement of the home and the cause of the blaze has yet to be determined. The Ontario Fire Marshall’s office won’t be called in to investigate the blaze.

Cobalt library sees declining grants

COBALT - The Paul Penna Library is continually being forced to reduce its books and DVD budget as revenue sources decline, Cobalt council’s committee-of-the-whole meeting heard recently.

Board chair Liz Cooper and treasurer Georgette Saxton attended council to present their budget after a request to the town for its regular funding to meet its current financial needs.

“There aren’t too many grants out there,” Saxton told council. “Grants keep getting cut and there’s nothing to replace them.”

Salaries and utilities account for the majority of the library budget, Saxton said.

Capital projects are needed at the library including the repair of external brick work, making the building handicap accessible, replacing a large water tank which is costing the library

dollars because the size is excessive, repairing the retaining wall which is starting to erode, and plaster and paint.

Saxton said the library board feels there is a question regarding the Drummond Cairn. The library board does not feel it is their responsibility, Saxton explained.

“There is not a lot of revenue coming in,” said Saxton at the March 5 meeting. Of the funding the library does receive, 88 per cent of it is taken up in mandatory costs, leaving only 12 per cent of the budget for discretionary spending.

“There is not a lot of place where we can cut back on our budget,” said Saxton.

Cooper noted that the door to the library is not handicap accessible and is also leaking and tiles in the area are starting to peel.

The library has two employees who provide service to patrons. It also has a janitor who is

on contract and tends the building once a week.

Mayor George Othmer said the town will do what it can to help the library board.

Is it just leg pain....or Peripheral Arterial Disease?

PAD is a term used to describe diseased blood vessels that are not related to your heart. It results from a build-up of plaque in the walls of blood vessels (arteries). This reduces or blocks the flow of blood to your legs and other organs. PAD is most commonly seen in the legs.

Did You Know?

- 50% of people living with PAD do not show signs
- People with diabetes are two to four times more likely to have PAD

The signs of PAD are:

Cramps in the leg muscles (buttocks, thigh or calf) that occur during activities like walking or climbing stairs

Colour Changes in the skin of the feet, including paleness or blueness

Pain in the legs and/or feet while at rest or that disturbs sleep

Lower Temperature in one leg compared with the other leg

Sores or Wounds on toes, feet or legs that heal slowly, poorly or not at all.

Poor Nail Growth and poor hair growth on toes and legs.

How is PAD Diagnosed?

Your health care provider may check: the pulse in your legs and feet to see if there is enough blood flow; the colour, temperature and look of your legs and feet; and signs of poor wound healing on the legs and feet. Your provider may also perform a series of simple tests:

- **Ankle brachial pressure index (ABPI)** – this test compares the blood pressure readings in your ankles and arms.
- **Doppler ultrasound test** – this test uses sound waves to measure the flow in blood vessels in your arms and legs.
- **Transcutaneous oxygen measurement** – this test measures the oxygen level of tissue beneath the skin.

Ask to be tested if:

- You are over 70
- You are over 50 and have other cardiovascular risk factors such as high blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol
- You are a smoker or a former smoker

the "voice of spring."

It was a beautiful Easter weekend.

The sun was shining, the sky was blue and the warm air felt so good.

I missed an early morning call from my daughter in Scotland as she and her partner went camping on the weekend.

Apparently it was a record setting warm weekend in Scotland with temperatures rising to 20 C.

So the young lovers gathered up their camping gear and headed out into the countryside to enjoy a campfire and the beauty of nature.

That girl sure takes after my own heart.

I would love to have gone camping but our nights are still cool and of course there is all that snow.

So, I went to the arena of my delight, the outdoors, to photograph migrating birds on their way to nesting grounds in the life-giving Boreal forest.

I happened to spot several beavers in courtship mode along the shoreline of a local lake so I hauled out the telephoto lens and got busy photographing them.

All of a sudden two beavers stood up on their hind legs as if they were listening or smelling something in the wind.

An animal's sense of smell is a mystery to us but so powerful as a survival tool.

Sure enough, about five minutes later I heard three sandhill cranes approaching as they swooped down over me and landed on the ice near the beavers.

If you have ever heard it, the sandhill crane call is loud and distinct and has been defined as

These birds are huge with big bodies, long necks and legs and a wide wingspan of up to two metres. They are elusive and hard to get close to.

I was definitely in the right place at the right time as these magnificent birds migrate through our region heading to Northwestern Quebec and further north to the James Bay coastline.

The literature on these birds tells me they are named after their preferred habitat, the sandhills of Nebraska where thousands of cranes gather during migration.

They nest in wetlands and their chicks are called "colts."

Apparently the cranes chatter amongst themselves as they fly northwards.

I heard them doing this and it was a "wonder of nature" moment for me.

Scientists say the cranes have survived extinction because of their innate wariness, social adaptability and care of their young.

I wonder if these birds have ever been banded at the Hilliardton Marsh or elsewhere?

Since ancient times the cranes have been viewed as representing longevity, good fortune, harmony and fidelity.

I viewed their sudden and welcome appearance as my good fortune.

Nature got it right with the sandhill cranes.

Literacy health

In the aftermath of the 2019 provincial budget, aimed at reducing the deficit, the cuts just keep coming to public services.

Last week we talked about budget cuts and realignments in the public health sector and this week we examine cuts to public library services.

Libraries across the province were just informed the Southern Ontario Library Service (SOLS) and Ontario Library Service-North (OLS-North) are facing a 50 per cent reduction in their budgets.

These cuts represent a threat to library services across Ontario, but none more so than in rural regions like Northern Ontario.

While Southern Ontario readers have access to a library on every corner with Internet access, northerners aren't so fortunate.

Every small town library is important to the promotion of literacy, just like a community newspaper.

SOLS provides critical services like courier services between libraries who are sharing resources.

They also provide training for library staff and have greater purchasing power for expensive online resources and they provide services to Indigenous libraries with the most up to date information

available.

OLS-North provides many of those same services such as affordable pricing for OverDrive e-books and e-resources, the provincial Inter-Library loan system, library software and online catalogue, website development and hosting for smaller libraries, strategic planning support for smaller library boards and staff and board training and networking abilities.

These budget cuts are severely impacting our local libraries as Temiskaming Shores Public Library has ceased their inter-library loan service.

Library budgets are normally very lean as it is.

However, the words alcohol and beer appear 46 times in the 2019 budget leaving people to question the priorities of the Ford government.

The Ford government is modifying alcohol regulations changing the way booze is sold (for easier and more convenient access) and consumed in Ontario.

But yet education and literacy aren't being given the same priorities?

We know there are addiction issues in our communities straining the health care system and ruining lives.

Some improvements suggested for Cobalt

COBALT - The indicators from 2017 make it look worse than it is, according to Cobalt chief administrative officer David King, but Cobalt's tax receivables, as a percentage of total taxes levied, were up to 34 per cent at the end of 2017.

"The indicators aren't so bad, but there's work to be done," he acknowledged.

"It doesn't reflect what we're doing day to day."

Municipal Affairs and Housing senior municipal advisor Liana Bacon was present at the council meeting to explain the 2017 indicators and to suggest some tools for the town's consideration.

She pointed out the indicator at a presentation to Cobalt council March 19. But she also stated that five of seven other indicators from 2017 show Cobalt has been making improvements in its financial situation.

Regarding the tax receivables, Bacon said that "if you have more than 15 per cent, it can present a challenge for the municipality."

Bacon acknowledged that the town has some strategies in place to resolve some of its tax re-

ceivable issues, and if those are accomplished it will bring the tax receivables down to 16 per cent.

She noted that Ontario municipalities are now able to move more quickly on properties where taxes are outstanding, and after two years, instead of three, proceedings can begin for a tax sale of the property.

Bacon said that overall the town is in a positive position with its finances "because you have shown improvements on most of your indicators."

But, she emphasized, "It is always a good idea to ensure you are collecting your arrears."

Bacon also pointed to the town's low reserves, and said the ministry recommends a reserve policy for the municipality. She suggested the municipality could discuss a strategy for creating reserves.

"Your reserve indicator is in a high level of risk," she said.

The municipality should consider if there is room to increase taxes, she suggested.

All other indicators for the municipality showed a low level of risk, she said.

Englehart interested in potential area efficiencies

ENGLEHART - Englehart council is giving the nod of approval to a meeting between area clerks to explore possible efficiencies in how the municipalities do business.

The provincial government's Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing has provided a one-time grant to municipalities to explore ways to find efficiencies through such undertakings as service sharing or investments which will lead to long-term savings.

The grant is essentially unconditional, which means that the municipalities can choose how to spend it.

Englehart and the surrounding areas of the Municipality of Charlton and Dack, Evanturel Township and Chamberlain Township have received grants which collectively amount to over \$600,000.

At a recent meeting, Charlton and Dack initiated the idea that the clerks of the four municipalities could meet to discuss whether they could achieve more efficiencies.

At Englehart's committee-of-the-whole meeting Wednesday, April 10, clerk-administrator Shawn LaCarte asked whether council approved his participation in a meeting of the area clerks.

"It would just be a session to try brainstorming what could be done," he said.


"Efficiencies usually have a cost upfront but save money in the long-term," he added.

An interest put forward by Councillor Doug Metson is that of water services.

The town now has a water agreement with Charlton and Dack, and is providing water to two of its subdivisions to the west of the town. However, reaching a water agreement is still a goal for both Englehart and Evanturel. That township has a significant amount of developed land bordering the town to the east and south and sees the potential for a new subdivision if a water agreement can be reached with Englehart. The

municipalities have an understanding that they jointly benefit from growth in their neighbours and are working together on more than one front.

Englehart Mayor Nina Wallace noted at the meeting that pursuing the water project would not help Chamberlain, but the council agreed that general discussions with the other clerks could be beneficial in finding joint projects which could help the municipalities.

ASK THE EXPERTS

With warm weather and great fishing around the corner, here is a little refresher on how to



When it comes to walleye fishing, jigs are the most consistent type of fishing lure. They are effective in either shallow or deep water, in warm and cold conditions such as ours, fishing during the day or night, and literally the whole year round.

Successful walleye catchers know how to work a jig. Keeping the following in mind can help you accumulate great catches or at least add to your fish stories:

Jigs come in various shapes, designed for specifically different fishing situations. Choosing the right one can make all the difference.

The most common shape is the ball-style jig. These are very versatile and can be used in the current or in still water. If in doubt, this is almost always a good walleye lure option. Ball-style jigs can be casted or trolled and are great for vertical jigging as well.

When you're fishing in the weeds for walleye, try a swimming snagging and tempts those walleye to come out from their hiding spots.

Pancake jigs are designed to cut through moving water (also called "current cutters"), and are best used while walleye fishing in rivers and streams.

Learn more from those who have the answers!

Fishing lure size is another important factor. A 1/8 oz. jig is a pretty good place to start in most fishing conditions. The most important thing to consider is whether you are getting all the way to the bottom. If you can, try going lighter with a 1/16 oz. Or you may need to go a bit bigger with a 1/4 oz. or 3/8 oz. These four walleye lure sizes should cover most situations, but other options in your tackle box are great too.

If you're fishing at night or in murky water you might try a bulkier walleye lure with fluorescent colors for increased visibility. No matter what, it is always a good policy to keep trying new fishing lure colors. Light conditions change very quickly underwater and good part of walleye fishing will always be a game of chance.

After you have the right walleye lure picked out, consider tipping it with either live bait or a plastic substitute. Both options have their advantages and you're better off having both available to you. When it comes to live walleye bait, minnows, leeches, and night crawlers will work best. Generally minnows work best in cooler water (spring and fall), leeches in warmer, and night crawlers in either. You should experiment, however, with all three regardless of when you are walleye fishing.

Plastic substitutes are nice because they require less maintenance and can be just as effective as live bait. This will make it more comfortable on your hands when the weather is chilly and you don't want to be fumbling with minnows.

Of course, you still need to find the fish. Electronic fish finders can be a fisherman's best friend. Once you've found them and your lure is in the water, you should vary the lure motion on your retrieve. First, let the walleye lure sink all the way down. Try popping it off the bottom then let it sink, dragging the fishing lure along the bottom with subtle shakes, and slowly lifting and dropping it as you reel in. These methods take some practice to perfect but will help make your fishing lure look more natural and attractive to 'the big one'.

New book traces story of Northern skating champs

TEMISKAMING SHORES – In 2018, Canadian figure skaters Meagan Duhamel and Eric Radford capped a competitive career as double medallists at the Winter Olympics.

But how did the Northern Ontario skaters reach the pinnacle of amateur sports?

Getting “the story behind the results,” says writer Laura Young, is what she finds intriguing – “okay, you won the game, but what got you there, and what happened after?”

Young was at Chat Noir Books in New Liskeard March 30 to

discuss *Soulmates on Ice: From Hometown Glory to Top of the Podium*, which she wrote with the figure skaters.

The book was released last fall, only eight months after Duhamel and Radford competed at the Olympics and just a little more than a year after Young began work on the manuscript.

It was a fast process, but Young said they wanted to capitalize on the recognition for the skaters at this point in their careers.

At the same time, the idea for the book took root years earlier.

As a sports reporter at the Sudbury Star, Young had covered Duhamel as she developed as a competitive figure skater.

She continued to follow Duhamel’s career after the skater moved to Barrie at the age of 14 to continue her training.

More recently, Young said she approached the Duhamel family and reconnected with Duhamel in 2017.

“I’d covered a lot of very good athletes out of Sudbury who went to the Olympics and I didn’t want Meagan Duhamel’s story lost.”

Eric Radford grew up in Balmertown, about 100 kilometres from the Manitoba border.

In a move unusual at the time, he came out publicly in 2014 as a gay athlete while he was in the midst of his competitive career.

“That’s one of the things I like about Meagan and Eric’s story,” Young said, “what they’ve been able to advocate for and how they’ve used their platforms as elite level athletes to advocate for inclusion.”

Soulmates on Ice is published by Latitude 46 of Sudbury.

It’s Young’s second book.

Her first, *Solo Yet Never Alone: Swimming the Great Lakes*, was published in 2014.

It draws on interviews with more than 40 Canadians who have made crossings of the Great Lakes.

Young is herself an open-water swimmer.

“I was reading a lot of books on open-water swimming, and there was nothing on Canadian swimmers. So I filled that niche with my Great Lakes swimming book.”

Sports has always been a passion for Young, both outside and inside the workplace. The local sports scene was one of her beats in her first journalism job as a reporter at the Temiskaming

Speaker from 1986 to 1988.

Young said the level of commitment exhibited by elite athletes, who begin training at such early ages, “blows me away.”

“That mindset just is really fascinating to me.”

And there’s always the question, she said, of what happens if an athlete falls short “of what society thinks you should achieve.”

As for her own work, she’s currently teaching a couple of writing courses in Cambrian College’s public relations program. She writes a sports column for the Sudbury Star and is a freelance writer for other publications.

She’s also contemplating a third book, but hasn’t yet decided whether it’ll be related to the world of athletics or a work of fiction.
