Considering demolition

Another Cobalt building slipping away

COBALT - Concerns are mounting about the building housing the Cobalt, Coleman, Latchford and Area Food Bank, and the Cobalt Northern Ontario Firefighters Museum.

Brickwork is beginning to fall away and a crack is forming on an exterior wall. It is anticipated that, in time, the front wall of the building at 22 Lang Street might fall away.

That was the outline given by Cobalt manager of public works and properties Wayne Sutherland at Cobalt's committee-of-the-whole meeting Tuesday, July 2.



Considering demolition

Another Cobalt building slipping away

Sutherland said he has had the building examined with the goal of obtaining an estimate for repairs, but he was advised that the repair of the building would cost more than it's worth.

"They felt nothing could be done," he said. "The entire front section is letting go." Sutherland advised that the conclusion for the building would be to demolish it.

He left these findings with council for their consideration.

He said he would obtain a quote for the cost of demolishing the building, so that council would have that figure when deliberating their next steps.

He stated it is not possible to tell how long it will be before the brickwork will begin to fall off the building.

Councillor Mike Harrison expressed concern about the artifacts in the museum and finding them a new home. He also noted the need to find a new location for the food bank.

DECISIONS

Councillor Bill Gabbani urged that a timeframe is needed and

the town needs to begin moving on the matter now.

Mayor George Othmer stated that a decision cannot be made until the quote is received for the cost of demolishing the building.

Council agreed that a walk through of the building would help them visualize more about the issue. Gabbani questioned if the building is safe to walk through, to which Othmer responded that he believes it is.

The food bank continues to operate, but a sign on the door states that the museum is closed until further notice.

The Speaker later spoke to Sutherland who stated the concern is only with the building in which the food bank and museum are located. Two other buildings to the southwest share walls, but Sutherland said those buildings are not considered part of the prob-

He stated that previously

there was another building sharing a wall with 22 Lang Street to the northeast, but that building was demolished. He suggested the removal of that building likely contributed to the problems now encountered with the museum

and food bank building.

Sutherland expressed disappointment that the town is losing the older buildings in this way, which he said are historical assets, but with time, the original structures are fail-

Temiskaming's predominant crime

People living in South Temiskaming might be rightly concerned with drug trafficking and the spinoff crimes that come with it such as violence and theft.

But the predominant crime taking place in our communities is not directly related to drug use.

The most prominent crimes in the Temiskaming region are domestic violence and sexual assault, according to Temiskaming Victim Services (TVS) statistics for the year from April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019.

Domestic violence is violence and other abuse by one person against another in a domestic setting, such as in a marriage or cohabitation.

There are four main types of Intimate Partner Violence or domestic violence They are sexual violence, stalking, physical violence and psychological aggression.

According to the Ontario Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services, domestic violence is gender based.

The majority of spousal violence victims are women, representing 83 per cent of all victims. Women are almost four times more likely than men to be victims of spousal violence.

Out of 298 crime-related referrals from Ontario Provincial Police to TVS, 209 were domestic violence related and 39 were sexual assaults.

There were also 89 calls for victims of tragic circumstances and 22 related to assault (not domestic violence).

Crime rates are up across the region and calls to TVS for services for victims rose by 17 per cent.

So the crime that is happening most predominantly in our region takes place in homes, perhaps with children present.

Perhaps government agencies could take a serious look at domestic violence rates across the province and provide more education, services and preventative strategies to combat this type of crime that hurts so many

More time needed for Englehart splash park

ENGLEHART - Englehart area residents are eager for the installation of a new water and splash pad park, but patience is being urged as more steps are needed before a decision can be made about the project.

At Englehart council's Wednesday, June 26, meeting, Councillor Jillian Plaunt inquired about setting up a fundraising committee for the project.

But Councillor Doug Metson suggested it is still too early.

Clerk-administrator Shawn LaCarte explained that there might be some infrastructure requirements before the project can be undertaken.

Plaunt noted the town has many young families looking for the park to be constructed.

But Councillor Pauline Brassard cautioned against fundraising too far ahead of the actual construction. If funding is raised, and then the project does not become a reality, the original donors have to be contacted to be asked what they would like to be done with the money.

LaCarte noted that government funding and other grant sources usually give a year for the project to become a reality.

The concept of recycling water in the park was discussed, but LaCarte said, "there is a lot more work to be done" before a decision can be made about how the park can be set

It was noted that a New Liskeard splash pad project now is estimated to cost more than half a million dollars.




COMMUNITY LANDMARK

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








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
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
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
