Bucke Park still slated to close

TEMISKAMING SHORES — After a split vote ending in a 3-3 tie, with Councillor Patricia Hewitt declaring a conflict of interest, the status of Bucke Park remains unchanged.

A tie vote on a motion means a defeated motion for maintaining city ownership of the prop-

City of Temiskaming Shores council met Tuesday, September 17, and agenda item 15 (m), which generated the tie vote, saw discussion during the meeting concerning the future of Bucke Park.

Bucke Park has been operated by the city since 1996, with 37 seasonal sites, four transient sites

Health Unit advising of blue-green algae blooms

DISTRICT (Staff/Special) -- The Timiskaming Health Unit issued a statement Wednesday, September 18 that the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks, has reported blue green algae blooms on Larder Lake near the Big Narrows.

The Health Unit stated that it has also received information that there are blue green algae blooms at the Loon Lake beach and the New Liskeard beach locations.

The Timiskaming Health Unit advises people using lakes and rivers to be on the lookout for algal blooms and take precaution.

The Health Unit explains that cyanobacteria, commonly known as "blue-green algae", is a type of photosynthetic bacteria commonly found in freshwater bodies. When conditions are

good, growth increases and cyanobacteria accumulate within the water as a "bloom" or as a blue-green scum" on the water's surface. In addition to the fouling and odour problems caused by blue-green algae blooms, several species of cyanobacteria have the ability to create toxins. Timiskaming Health Unit states it will notify the public if there is a risk to public health. The public should avoid swimming, bathing, drinking the water, and allowing pets into the water if the algae bloom is present. If no bloom is present, water can be used for regular recreational activities. If cyanobacteria blooms are reported, the public should avoid using the lake water for drinking, bathing, swimming or showering and do not allow children, pets or livestock to drink or swim in the lake water.

I live in our family home, on Galena Street, one street over from Helen Street, where my mother, the baby of her family,


I used to say to my mother when she was alive, "Mom this is your street. It has your name in it." She liked that.

White ribbons for Melanie

People in Temiskaming Shores may have noticed the large white ribbons attached to the Wabi River Bridge in New Liskeard this week.

They are a stark reminder that a young girl named Melanie Ethier hasn't come home yet and her mother, Celine, is waiting for her.

Melanie Ethier went missing on September 29, 1996, while walking home from a friend's house.

Melanie was 15 at the time of her disappearance.

She was a young, outgoing girl with the world at her fingertips.

Her mysterious disappearance is a senseless tragedy that continues to affect the community.

No one seems to have any idea where she went. Was she abducted? Was she a victim of human trafficking? Was she murdered? Is she still alive?

These are the questions on the minds of many in the South Temiskaming re-

The Temiskaming Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police have never closed the case and are actively pursuing any and all leads that will help to solve Melanie Ethier's disappearance.

No lead is ever refused and your help could be the catalyst the police are looking for to help solve the case.

More accountability

The taxpayers of South Temiskaming dole out monies to the Timiskaminig Health Unit (THU) for a percentage of operating costs and programming.

The THU board of directors is made up of municipal representatives from the communities of South Temiskaming.

The THU underwent a strike, a changing of executive directors, two moves - one to the Temiskaming Hospital and one away from the hospital and back to its current location. The THU downsized when the mental health services division was eliminated from its programming schedule.

The THU is now undergoing an internal review for which former District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration chief executive officer, Don Studholme, has been hired to complete.

And recently, THU board of directors' member Merrill Bond has resigned from the board.

Perhaps the biggest organizational blow came when Medical Officer of Health (MOH) Dr. Monika Dutt resigned from the THU. In a letter to the Temiskaming Speaker, Dutt said, "It saddens me that I felt I needed to resign. However, I was not comfortable with the circumstances I was given to work under. I hope that proper governance practices will be followed going forward."

Proper governance practices?

At what cost to the taxpayers and under how much duress to staff have all these mega changes been made?

The costs to hire Studholme to complete an internal review may not come cheap.

Taxpayers have a right to more accountability and transparency when it comes to the operations of the THU.

Continued from A Front and room for tents and 500 metres of shoreline frontage on Lake Temiskaming.

It has been operating in a deficit position and council has assessed the park's viability with regards to its budget position.

Agenda Item 15 (m) stated two options for council consideration: that council approves the sale of Bucke Park by way of a Request for Proposal format with the evaluation weighted in favour of the land remaining as a public park and that the current date set for the removal of the trailers from the park (October 14, 2020) remain in effect; or that council approves continuing the operation of Bucke Park as a function of the Recreation Services Department and trailers are not required to be removed prior to October 14, 2019.

RECREATION MASTER PLAN

Councillor Danny Whalen, seconded by Councillor Doug Jelly, put forth a motion supporting the draft motion to retain the park under city ownership. An amendment was made to that option which added "until such time as the recreation master plan is completed." The amendment was approved, paving the way for council to take a vote on the two options.

Whalen explained the rea-

that he didn't understand why the City is spending \$80,000 on a recreation master plan while trying to divest itself of recreation infrastructure before the plan is completed, which is expected sometime early in 2020.

Voting in favour of the motion to retain the park were Councillors Jeff Laferierre, Whalen and Doug Jelly. Opposed were Councillors McArthur, Jessie Foley and Mayor Carman Kidd.

"To be honest, I don't see why we are in the business of running the park. But spending \$80,000 for a recreation master plan and selling off our assets before the plan is completed doesn't make sense," noted Whalen in a telephone interview the following morn-

Mayor Carman Kidd commented after the vote, "We had two options tonight, to sell the park or keep it. After a tie vote it will continue as status quo (to sell the park). It can however come back to council at the October 1 meeting and if someone puts forward a motion at that time then things may change."

If retained, the future of the park could hinge on the City of Temiskaming Shores recreation master plan as the city moves forward in assessing

son for the amendment was recreation infrastructure as it pertains to their budget.

> In attendance were a crowd of Bucke Park supporters including park recreation committee member Robert Ritchie, who outlined cost-saving measures he felt could be considered for the Bucke Park chalet upgrades, in contradiction to an engineers' report valuing the upgrades at over \$100,000.

> Councillors Laferriere and McArthur assessed the park by the negative impact it would have on the upcoming municipal budgets if it continued to operate in a deficit position, while Jelly favoured leaving the campground under Cityrun infrastructure.

This has been tested as an effective treatment for SAD because it tricks the body into thinking the days are longer and brighter than they really are. It involves sitting under a special bright light for a certain amount of time each day. You could ask your health care provider about this or just try to get as much sunlight as you can outdoors every day and keep your curtains and blinds open to let the light in.

Socialize Often

If you tend to make excuses for not going out in the fall and winter, you need to get yourself out of that habit. Keeping to yourself will only make you feel lonely and that's what you're trying to avoid so pick up the phone and call a friend or family member – make plans to go out for lunch and/or for a

ENGLEHART - The brilliant collage works of Berdina Beaven are now on display at the Englehart and Area Historical Museum where they will remain throughout September.

Beaven will be at the museum during the Englehart Area Artists' Tenth Annual Studio Tour which will take place Saturday, September 28, and Sunday, September 29. While there she will be giving demonstrations of her art techniques.

Beaven has been an exhibiting artist since 1963 when she moved to Canada from Ohio.

The long-time Charlton resident has been involved in the art community, or with art-related activities, throughout much of her life.

A few years ago, Beaven relates, she fell and broke her arm. Her fingers became stiff as a result of the injury. In an effort to recover the mobility in her fingers, she started doing collage work.

She got the inspiration for the art technique from attending exhibitions by other artists and by attending workshops as she searched for new techniques, she explained.

Beaven explains that most of her time spent on her collage work takes place during the winter.

She uses photographs taken from throughout the Temiskaming area, and chooses scenes which appeal to her artistic sense.

"I look for colour and value and I often change those from the photograph."

The collage that emerges represents her feelings, and the majority glow in rich golden palettes, while others sink into the royal blues of winter evenings or waterscapes of the many northern lakes.

The assembled paper and acrylic compositions leap from their frames like interwoven jewels. Beaven writes poems for each of her creations, to further comment on the beauty of the Northern landscape.

"I've always found the North country peaceful and that's what I try to convey. Other people have termed it as spiritual, which it is in a sense."

Her works have been viewed through the Northern Ontario Art Association and have garnered awards and praise. Beaven has also exhibited in Phoenix, Arizona.

ENGLEHART -- Englehart council updated its user fees bylaw Wednesday, August 28.


The main change in the bylaw is a ten percent increase in water and sewer rates.

Englehart clerk-administrator Shawn LaCarte stated that the decision to increase the water and sewer rates by ten percent was made by town council with their 2019 budget.

LaCarte said there were also a few other small changes in the user fee.

The ten percent increase in the water and sewer rate was made to cover a deficit which had occurred in the water and sewer budget as a result of the water and sewer projects which have been undertaken over the past years, he said.

"We basically had a deficit in our water and sewer from our projects over the last few years and to help with future projects," he commented later.





Cobalt finishing water treatment plant upgrade

COBALT - The Town of Cobalt has been in the process of bringing its upgraded water treatment plant on line.

The first official shutdown of the plant, required to get the system back on line, occurred on September 3.

A new stand pipe has been constructed at the plant, making it possible to hold water while the main water tower is off line. This will be required to repair and upgrade the main water tower. The stand pipe was completed August 1.

The work in the water treatment plant will mean that there will be four pumps in place, chief administrative officer Brian Walker told Cobalt committee-of-the-whole September 3.

Walker added that new high lift and low lift pumps are ready to be installed.

At the time of the committeeof-the-whole meeting, Walker told council that the flushing of town hydrants would be completed by the end of that week.

Walker also advised that public works will be replacing the water lines in the trailer park, and hopes to have it all done in September.

Speeding problem on Englehart's First Street

ENGLEHART -- There is interest on Englehart council on having stop signs placed on First Street which runs along the east side of the town.

The residential street has occasionally been seen to attract drivers who either forgetfully or intentionally drive along the street at a higher rate of speed than the town speed limit, which is 50 kph.

Members of council feel that placing one or more stop signs between the railway tracks and Highway 11 would slow drivers down, and prevent the street from seeing vehicles racing through at a higher rate of speed than the town's speed limits allow.

Englehart public works superintendent Ryan Vickery has been asked to investigate ways of slowing down traffic on First Street.

At Englehart's regular council meeting Wednesday, August 28, Vickery was asked whether there was progress on the investigation.

He noted that First Street was set up without stop signs intentionally to allow fire response vehicles to have a route by which they can exit the town quickly to attend emergency calls.

The Englehart and Area Fire Department station is located near the intersection of Sixth Avenue and First Street.

Town clerk administrator Shawn LaCarte later stated that the information and recommendations gathered by Vickery will be used when the time comes for council to consider and formalize a plan to slow vehicles down on First Street.

Englehart replacing public washroom facility

ENGLEHART -- The Town of Englehart will be replacing its public washroom, located in the Centennial Park.

Englehart clerk administrator Shawn LaCarte explained that the town had some funding available through its Mainstreet Funding for municipalities to undertake projects that would improve their communities to attract businesses. The funding was provided by the provincial government.

"Our first choice for the Mainstreet Fund was to look at upgrading a few of the sidewalks in the downtown area," LaCarte stated in an email, in response to a question. "After receiving quotes we found that the funding would not cover much of a sidewalk project.

"Therefore, the Town has decided to use some of the funds to

replace the public washroom in the Centennial Park.

"It is in very poor shape. For the past five years we have done many repairs to the washroom and it is now time to replace it. We will be replacing it with a new facility which will house two washrooms with a change table."

LaCarte said the new wash-room will be fully accessible.

"We are still waiting for final quotes and hope to have the washroom constructed before winter.


"The facility is the only public washroom in our downtown area na dmany of the businesses direct customers to use the facility.


