LifeLabs health data breached

ical data and personal information of some 15 million clients may have been exposed in a cyber-attack on a Canadian company.

LifeLabs, which has an office in downtown New Liskeard, is reported to be Canada's largest provider of general diagnostic and specialty lab testing servi-

On December 17, LifeLabs president and CEO Charles Brown issued an open letter to clients advising of the breach:

"Through proactive surveillance, LifeLabs recently identified a cyber-attack that involved unauthorized access to our computer systems with customer information that could include name, address, email, login, passwords, date of birth, health card number and lab test results.'

The "vast majority" of customers whose data could have been accessed are in British Columbia and Ontario, he said.

"In the case of lab test results, our investigations to date of these systems indicate that there are 85,000 impacted customers from 2016 or earlier located in Ontario; we will be working to notify these customers directly.

"Our investigation to date indicates any instance of health care information was from 2016 or earlier.'

Brown said LifeLabs' cybersecurity firms have advised that the risk to customers from the attack is low "and they have not

TORONTO (Special) - Med- seen any public disclosure of customer data as part of their investigations, including monitoring of the dark web and other online locations."

> He said the company has taken several measures to protect customer information, including retrieving data by making a payment.

> "We did this in collaboration with experts familiar with cyber-attacks and negotiations with cyber criminals."

> He said the company also engaged with cyber security experts "to isolate and secure the affected systems and determine the scope of the attack" and has strengthened its systems to deter future incidents.


> It's also offering one year of free cyber protection to customers that includes dark web monitoring, credit monitoring and identity theft insurance.

> It recommends that registered users of its online services "continually update their passwords regularly so they are strong, complex and unique.'

> It has also established a dedicated call centre - at 1-888-918-0467 - for customers with concerns.

Brown said law enforcement is investigating. The offices of the information and privacy commissioners in both Ontario and B.C. have announced they also are undertaking a coordinated investigation.

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THU declares district-wide whooping cough outbreak

ter five cases of whooping cough in the Kirkland Lake area, the Timiskaming Health Unit has now declared a district-wide outbreak of the respiratory infection.

It follows the declaration in mid-November of an outbreak in the Temiskaming Shores area where 13 cases of whooping cough, formally called pertussis, have to date been confirmed or deemed probable.

In a December 18 news release, the Timiskaming Health Unit (THU) said public health nurses are contacting parents and guardians of students at Sacred Heart Catholic School in Kirkland Lake who are at the highest risk of exposure.

"Whooping cough is an infection that causes coughing fits or spells that may end with vomiting or gasping for air," said Glenn Corneil, the district's acting medical officer of health.

"The germs spread easily from person to person. Babies under the age of one are at the most risk for severe infection. Immunization provides the best protection against whooping cough," he

The THU said local health care providers have been "a valued system partner" in their promotion of vaccination.

It said coverage remains high in the district - in the 2017-18 school year, 94.6 per cent of seven-year-olds had been vaccinated against whooping cough.

But it cautions that immunity to whooping cough can wane four to 20 years after vaccination or a natural infection with whooping cough.

At this time of year, the THU notes that many respiratory illnesses are circulating in the community.

But whooping cough is distinctive in the severity and duration of the cough.

While it begins like a common cold, with sneezing, runny nose,

DISTRICT (Staff/Special) - Af- low fever and a mild occasional cough, the cough will worsen over two weeks.

> After two weeks, coughing spells develop and the cough may end in a whooping sound. Coughing may be so severe that the individual can gag or vomit. A thick, clear mucous may be

> The coughing spells can last for weeks or even months. Older children and adults may have prolonged cough without the 'whoop" or vomiting.

It is treated with antibiotics. The THU advises:

• Check with your health care provider or the THU to ensure vou and your family are up to date on your whooping cough (pertussis) vaccination.

The vaccine is free and part of the routine immunization schedule for infants, children, and teenagers. It's given at two, four, six, and 18 months of age. A booster dose is needed between four and six years of age and again at 14 to 16.

Immunity decreases over time, therefore one booster dose of vaccine is recommended for

• Individuals who receive immunizations at the THU or who report immunizations to THU through licensed childcare or school may review their immunization record online at http:// timiskaminghu.com/281/Immu-

· Pregnant women of individuals with compromised immune systems should consult with their health care provider to confirm their history of vaccination against whooping cough (pertussis). A booster of the pertussis vaccine is recommended for all pregnant women in their third trimester.

• If you develop symptoms of whooping cough in the next 21 days, follow-up with your health care provider and notify the




TEMISKAMING SHORES - "I've been around cows all my life," said Ashley Fisher.

It cost more than \$4,000 for the club and cattle to make their way to the Royal.


The club extended thanks to all its sponsors "because without them this trip would never happen," said club supporter Marty Loach in an email.

The STOP with Family Health Teams (FHTs) Program has two goals:

- 1. To improve access to nicotine replacement therapy for FHT patients across the province of Ontario who wish to quit smoking; and
- 2. To increase capacity of health care practitioners in FHTs to provide comprehensive smoking cessation treatment to their patients.

Since the Temagami FHT started participating in this program it has supported many patients in their attempts to quit smoking by providing free nicotine replacement therapy and ongoing one-on-one support as needed.

The current placement of the question period is toward the beginning of the meeting before discussions take place among the council.

Harrison questioned if the change could be made to follow the agenda of the St. Charles council, after which the policy of allowing questions was modelled.

Mayor George Othmer advised Harrison that he would look at the procedural bylaw to see if that request could be accommodated.

Chief administrative officer Brian Walker said moving the time of the public questions to a later point in the meeting will require the council to make an amendment.

This will require some specific steps and paperwork to bring about.

OUR COMMITMENT: A PROJECT FOR THE TRANSPORTATION OF NATURAL GAS AND NATURAL GAS ONLY

Dear readers,

I would like to take this opportunity to express a formal commitment regarding the Gazoduq project. While the purpose of the Gazoduq project has always been solely to transport natural gas, we have heard concerns that our natural gas transmission line could eventually be used for transportation of crude oil. We believe that it is essential to confirm our position on this matter.

Under no circumstances will our project serve any purpose other than for natural gas transportation. From both a technical and a regulatory perspective, the right-of-way (the cleared corridor that is referred to) will be used for one project only, namely, our own.

OUR COMMITMENT IN THIS REGARD IS CLEAR AND UNEQUIVOCAL.

I would also like to point out that in the event of a leak, natural gas—unlike oil—does not mix with water nor seep into the ground. It dissipates quickly into the atmosphere. Moreover, gas transmission lines remain the safest means of energy transportation, according to Transport Canada.

Safety is a priority for Gazoduq. We are engaging in a rigorous, multi-faceted collaboration with all first responders and public safety officials in the applicable regions.

From the beginning, our team listened to the concerns of communities in Ontario. Shortly, we will be inviting the public once again to take part in our continuing consultation activities to further the cooperative development of our project.

We hope that this communication will alleviate any concerns you or others in your region may have regarding the use of our natural gas transmission line. Should you have continuing questions or require additional information, my team and I are always available for dialogue regarding our project.


