Fraud charges laid relating to solar farm construction

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - A topic of much local concern five years ago is now going before the courts.

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged four individuals following a lengthy investigation into allegations of construction fraud, they state in a press release issued Tuesday, December 10.

The charge dates back to July 25, 2014, when the Temiskaming OPP detachment received a fraud complaint related to the construction of solar projects in three jurisdictions in Ontario.

The matter under investigation occurred in the Temiskaming Shores area when a major solar panel farm was being constructed to the west of the city.

In 2014, Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof outlined the matter in the Ontario Legislative Assembly. At that time he stated: "In 2012, construction began on one of three ten-megawatt solar farms in the City of Temiskaming Shores.

"Local contractors were eager to begin on the project.

"The project was subcontracted, and then sub-contracted, and some of the players along the line did not pay their bills.





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

HAILEYBURY — They say you can't know about another person or empathize with them unless you step inside their shoes.

Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof did just that when he recently worked alongside personal support workers (PSWs) as they performed their dayshift duties at Tri-Town Extendicare.

He arrived for his shift in Haileybury at 7 a.m., put on a uniform and was eager to understand the workings of one of the most important and undervalued jobs in health care.

He started off November 13 in an awkward way when he was given a uniform to put on and went into a bathroom to change.

The bathroom was right across from the nurse's station where the PSWs were having a meeting.

He threw his coat over the faucet and changed into the uniform, not knowing the tap was motion sensor equipped. The tap kept on running as he left the room and

here was water all over the floor. "I was supposed to be helping out I just created more work," he said.

His mother is a resident at the facility so he has a personal interest in the care being provided to he residents.

But he also wished to understand the complexities of the job. "Carol Johnson asked if I would ike to do a shift with the PSWs. She felt it would boost the spirts of the workers and add some profile to their profession. There s a shortage of PSWs now and inless something changes there is a looming crisis," said Vanthof in

an email interview. SHORTAGE OF WORKERS

One of the biggest challenges for assisted living facilities like Extendicare is being able to recruit enough qualified personal support workers, said Registered Nurse/ Administrator Carol Johnson.

Extendicare currently employs 4 full-time and 14 part-time PSWs.

"At this time we are recruiting and hiring PSWs. We are work-

ing in collaboration with Northern College to provide work placements and hiring bonuses to graduates of the PSW program. Our PSWs are the backbone of our home, and the entire health care industry," said Johnson in an email interview.

"We appreciate their dedication and hard work in the service of others."

Vanthof mentioned turnover is high for the profession as the pay is often low which contributes to a shortage of PSW workers.

"There are cases in the riding where people cannot get homecare services simply because there is no PSW to provide it. The burnout rate is high and the number of people dropping out of the program is high," said the MPP.

"The one thing that struck me is the PSWs in long-term care are closer to the residents than their family because they deal with the most intimate needs at one of the most vulnerable times of a person's life. This can be very emotionally draining. At the same time demands on their time are

daunting."

He said time spent by PSWs with a resident is regulated by industry standards but it is often not practical.

DEMANDS

The demands of the job require a worker to perform a number of tasks in a single shift.

"I heard a few times from the workers that the people who are making the rules should spend some time on the floor. Just because a form says a task can be completed in seven minutes does not make it so. My mom has always been very well treated and after having seen things behind the scenes, I feel even more secure with her there."

He came away with some definite thoughts on the work that PSWs perform for family members and friends.

He feels they are underpaid and overworked and with the aging of the baby boomer generation, there is a need for many more PSWs.

"It is a very noble profession serves."

NORTH BAY (Staff/Special) -Ontario Northland and United Steelworkers Local 1976 have reached a five-year labour agreement.

Last year, Ontario Northland completed over 51,000 passenger trips on its Polar Bear Express passenger train and over 311,000 on its motor coaches. Express freight shipments between Cochrane and Moosonee amounted to over 4.8 million kilograms of goods moved, while over 33,000 carloads of freight were shipped in and out of Northeastern Ontario.
