Spring cleaning in the time of COVID

Wash your hands

First and foremost, please wash your hands. We can't stress the importance of good hand hygiene enough. This means washing your hands as often as possible with warm, soapy water for a minimum of 20 seconds.

"The virus has an outside coating, and the stuff inside - DNA or RNA - is what actually causes the disease," explains Richard Sachleben, organic chemist and member of the American Chemical Society.

"For a virus, that coating is a protein, and the soap breaks up the coating, so the virus spills its guts and falls apart."

The CDC has also referred to the coronavirus as a "fatty" virus because of this outer protein layer. If soap and water are not available, disinfect your hands using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 70 per cent alcohol.

Focus on high-touch surfaces

High-touch surfaces are those we touch often throughout our day such as doorknobs, handles, faucets, toilets, light switches, cell phones, remote controls, keys, etc. These surfaces should be cleaned and disinfected several times a day to help reduce the spread of germs and viruses.

According to current evidence reported by Public Health Canada, the COVID-19 virus can live on surfaces made from a variety of materials for a few hours to several days. Frequent cleaning and disinfecting of high-touch areas is a best practice measure for the prevention of COVID-19 and other viral illnesses in households and at work.

When in doubt, throw it out

The room in the home just brimming with things that really need to be cleaned, replaced and tossed out is, of course, the bathroom. It's a good idea to toss cleaning tools like your toilet brush and toothbrush and replace these with fresh ones, especially if you have recently been ill or have experienced gastrointestinal distress. Also, each family member should store their toothbrush away from the others so that they are not touching and possibly spreading germs.

When cleaning the toilet, don't forget to scrub and disinfect the flush lever.

Open cosmetics and makeup should be replaced every three months to two years depending on the product. For example, eye products, like mascara and eyeliner, should be thrown away every 2-4 months after opening, but powder cosmetics are okay for up to two years.

Most skin care products, such as those in a pump bottle, are typically safe for six months to a year before becoming susceptible to developing bacteria, mold and yeast - icky things that can cause skin infections that can be serious.



Can't touch this

You've heard it before, and we'll say it again - don't touch your face. We know it's hard. Face touching is a subconscious act we all do but, as much as possible, avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, especially:

- After using the bathroom
- After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing on your hands
- Before and after eating or preparing food
- After contact with pets or animals
- Before and after contact with another person who is or may be ill

Use what you have

According to health experts, many household cleaning products, when used properly, are effective at killing the coronavirus. In many places, however, disinfecting wipes and cleaning products are in short supply. Fortunately, there are many other products you can use, most of which are likely already in your pantry or closet.

Soap - any kind, though ones that foam are best. Soap, when mixed with warm water breaks down and removes the viral particles that may have attached themselves to the surfaces in your home.

Bleach - a diluted bleach solution is very effective at killing viruses and germs. The CDC recommends a dilution formula of 5 tablespoons (1/3 cup) of bleach in 4 liters (1 gal.) of water or 4 teaspoons of bleach in 1 litre of water. Bleach can harm your skin or cause damage to the surface you are trying to clean, so be cautious and wear gloves and protective eyewear, if available, to avoid bleach splashing onto your skin or into your eyes.

Hydrogen peroxide - this can also be used as a disinfectant, though not as strong as bleach. It does not need to be diluted but can discolor fabrics, so be careful where you use it.

Rubbing alcohol - products that contain 70 per cent or higher alcohol content will kill the coronavirus. Again,

don't dilute it; rubbing alcohol is safe for most surfaces.

What products are not recommended? Consumer Reports warns: "There is no evidence that [white vinegar is] effective against the coronavirus." Vinegar is another common household product that people often clean with since it is natural and inexpensive, however, in this case, save your vinegar for your French fries. Additionally, vodka and other distilled spirits are not good disinfectants.

Technique is essential

How you clean is just as important as what product you clean with. A quick swipe is not enough, you must vigorously scrub the surface thoroughly, making sure that the entire area is wet, and then let it dry on its own. Do not wipe the product off with a dry cloth or paper towel. What's most important is that you use plenty of disinfecting product and physical force and give the product time to work.

If surfaces are visibly dirty, they should be cleaned using soap and water before being disinfected. This two-step process will help ensure maximum efficiency of the disinfecting product. Remember to use disposable gloves when cleaning and disinfecting your home and discard them after each cleaning. Wash your hands immediately afterward. Gloves will also provide protection from harsh chemicals in some cleaning products that can cause skin irritation. If you don't have access to disposable gloves, you can also use reusable rubber gloves, just make sure to wash them with hot soapy water when finished, only use them for household cleaning, and store them safely away between cleanings. Try to use these products when kids and pets are not around and keep the room well ventilated, if possible, as some products can trigger asthma.

Don't forget fabrics

For soft surfaces such as carpets, rugs, drapes, clothing, etc. remove viral contamination by cleaning with appropriate products indicated for use on the item's label. Wash all laundry, except for delicate items, on the hottest water setting on your washing machine, rather than with cold water.

Change the bedsheets, vacuum the carpets and use an antibacterial fabric spray on mattresses, couches, and other soft surfaces.

Tackle the big stuff

Lastly, wash your windows, rearrange the furniture and clean behind the larger appliances. These are all things we tend to put off because we are too busy. Now, use some of the extra time on your hands to give your home a deep clean. It is spring cleaning season after all!

Exploring the world with the The Royal Canadian Geographical Society

OTTAWA (Special) – How’s Big Lonely Doug, a 1,000-year-old Douglas fir in a B.C. clear-cut, doing? What does urbanization look like in Lagos, Nigeria?

They’re among the topics tackled in a new, bilingual online offering from the Royal Canadian Geographical Society.

The society recently announced that it is launching #OnlineClassroom to support teachers, parents and students isolating at home during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a press release, Paul VanZant, Chair of Can Geo Education and Governor of the society, said:

“While we’re launching our new virtual classroom, we’ll also be hosting Google Hangouts, where participants can join explorers for video chats on a variety of topics, and other activities such as trivia challenges and mapping exercises. We want to keep students engaged by having them visit the website onlineclassroom.cangeoeducation.ca!”

It’s starting off with a bang by launching The Anthropocene Education program, which will take students on adventures through augmented and virtual reality.

Geared toward grades 4 to 12, this initiative develops students’ understandings of our world’s most pressing environmental challenges, such as plastic waste issues, species extinction and climate change.

Can Geo Education partnered with The Anthropocene Project, an internationally celebrated Canadian project created by renowned photographer Edward Burtynsky and award-winning filmmakers Nicholas de Pencier and Jennifer Baichwal.

Through evocative photography, a documentary, 360-degree cinematography, and captivating augmented-reality installations, this multimedia project explains the emergence of the Anthropocene epoch, distinguished by human-caused changes to our planet.

“We hope that the photographs, videos and new media included in the program will offer a window onto the world at a time when we need to catalyze awareness of our global village in ways that inspire positive change,” said de Pencier.

Students need only a smart phone or tablet to explore a 3D model of Big Lonely Doug, or learn about issues such as urbanization in Lagos, Nigeria, or resource extraction in Italy’s marble quarries.

And students can also watch 360-degree virtual reality films online or download them to a VR headset. All these resources, and many more, include lesson plans.actions. This would allow seniors, other at-risk populations, and returning travellers to remain at home.

“We need to remember that we all have an obligation to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 to our families, friends, neighbours, and communities. Please do not underestimate the impact that your actions will have in helping to stop the spread of this virus.

An Ontario government message to truckers

TORONTO – Truckers are among Ontario’s heroes.

On April 2, Deputy Premier and Health Minister Christine Elliott and Transportation Minister Caroline Mulroney issued the following statement on supporting truck drivers during the COVID-19 outbreak:

“In these extraordinary times, we have extraordinary heroes. Our truck drivers are these heroes. They are working long hours, day and night delivering food and equipment and other essential supplies for Ontario families.

Our truck drivers deserve our respect, our support, our thanks and our best efforts to help them as they continue to make sure we can put food on our tables and pick up other necessary items.

We have heard from those working within the trucking industry of the treatment that truck drivers have faced while travelling on our roads. In response, we are calling on all business owners to support truck drivers when they are stopping to rest, get gas or use washrooms.

This will better keep our truck drivers safe and healthy and on the road.

We expect businesses who rely on truck drivers to provide necessary facilities for these heroes. We need everyone to do their part to make sure drivers can keep doing their jobs safely.

As a government we are working closely with truck drivers and associations to respond to the issues they face on the road.

We are providing more safe places for truck drivers to stop and rest across the province and are keeping all 23 ONroute travel plazas open for take-out, grab and go and drive-through services, including washrooms with enhanced cleaning. We are also providing portable washrooms at 32 truck inspection stations so trucks have a place to stop and rest safely.

These actions build on measures announced last month that allow the 24-hour delivery of goods without the restrictions of municipal noise by-laws, and the extension of the validation of driver’s licences, Commercial Vehicle Operator’s Registration certificates and other products that expired on or after March 1, 2020.

Ontario is committed to supporting the trucking industry and we would like to thank commercial carriers and truck drivers for everything that they’ve done to keep goods moving during the COVID-19 outbreak.”

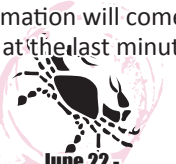
