# Students collecting equipment for medical workers

DISTRICT — Medical student Emma Goddard is volunteering her time to a campaign aimed at collecting personal protective equipment (PPE) for health care workers across Northern Ontario.

"Many of our frontline health care professionals do not have adequate access to personal protective equipment such as face masks, gowns, gloves and N95 respirators," said Goddard, a second year student at the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) in Sudbury.

"The current shortage is placing our healthcare providers at a greater risk of contracting COVID-19 and spreading it amongst themselves and to patients," she said in an email interview with The Speaker.

Goddard said healthcare students from across the north have banded together to organize Northern Ontario #PPEforHCP, a campaign asking organizations and individuals to donate PPE items.

Since she is from Temiskaming Shores, and is the daughter of local physician Steve Goddard, she is collaborating PPE equipment donations from the Temiskaming region.

"I am joined by several other NOSM students and community volunteers in the coordination of the campaign in Temiskaming."

The members of the Temiskaming Shores and Area team include NOSM students Megan Harvey, Lindsay Leduc, Dominique Lachapelle and Lasha Gorecki, along with community volunteers Madison Brunke and Jordan Sutton.

She said donations big and small are critical for frontline healthcare workers.

nity to the healthcare institutions like hospitals and clinics operating across the north.

"The campaign is operating in more than 30 communities in Northern Ontario, we are focusing on redistribution of existing PPE for non-essential services to healthcare centers as well as accepting monetary donations in order to fund these PPE initiatives. The donations made by the community are reassigned to local healthcare centers in need," explained Goddard.

What's needed are surgical and procedure masks, N95 respirator masks, face shields, visor attachments, goggles, disposable gloves, isolation gowns, sanitizer and cleaning supplies.

Also closed are trails at Pete's Dam Park and Devils Rock and walkways at the New Liskeard Waterfront and Haileybury Waterfront.

The STATO trail is closed between Wellington St. South and Beach Blvd. in New Liskeard and Browning St and City Hall in Haileybury. All other portions of the STATO trail are open to use at your own risk.

If you have a suspended driver's license, your fine can be paid at Service Ontario located at 280 Armstrong Street (New Liskeard) or pay online at serviceontario.ca

Extension of Time to Pay forms or Reopening documents can be placed in drop box at City Hall. There is an Order made by the Chief Justice pursuant to s. 85 extending timelines for applying for re-openings (s.11), when a fine is due (s. 66) and when a fine goes into default (s. 69). The extension is granted until April 23, 2020. Unless your matters went into default prior to March 16, 2020, the applications are not considered urgent.

Courts are cancelled until further notice.

### **TEMISKAMING TRANSIT UPDATE**

The Temiskaming Transit Committee is committed to keeping Transit Service operational for as long as possible. Many essential service workers use public transit to get to work and many families need public transit for grocery shopping and medical appointments. Public safety and trust in the transit system is paramount. We all need to work together to ensure we continue to have a safe and reliable transit service.

- FREE Transit will continue for the month of April. Monthly bus passes will not be issued.
- Continue to use the rear entrance of the bus. Those with accessibility requirements will still be allowed to use the front entrance and ramp.
- Please do not use the Transit system for "JOY-RIDING" or because you "need" something to do. You should only be riding the transit because it is necessary! Every effort needs to be taken to ensure physical distancing. If the public does not cooperate with minimizing transit use for essential purposes we will have no choice but to limit ridership.
- The Transit Committee and Stock Transportation have increased cleaning protocol for the transit, but everyone has a role to play. Remember to wash your hands, maintain physical distancing and if you are sick – STAY HOME!

# SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SERVICES

In support of the Provincial Government's Stay at Home recommendation, effective Tuesday, April 14, 2020 the Haileybury Landfill will be closed to the general public until further notice. Only contractors who continue to work on essential construction projects as outlined in the Government of Ontario's directive will be allowed to deposit waste. Contractors must have a City approved account to charge prior to disposal as no cash payment will be accepted.

In addition, effective Tuesday, April 14, 2020, the hours of operation to accept contractor waste will be adjusted to Tuesday to Friday, Noon until 4:30pm.

The City understands the inconvenience that this closure may cause and is reviewing options associated with the Landfill Amnesty program. Please stay tuned for further updates.

Curbside collection of garbage and recycling will continue as normal.





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
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# **Austerity?**

Instead, I concentrate on what I need to do on a daily basis to keep my sanity and get through

I stood in line at the grocery store this past weekend maintaining a six-foot distance from the person in front of me. Then someone came up behind me in the line and touched my shoulder wanting to talk.

I was not about to begin chatting and I wasn't interested in waiting until I could enter the

I simply walked away.

My tolerance fuse is short these days and I think we are all feeling the anxiety of this pan-

Desperate times call for desperate measures, but let's not get too desperate that we forget about civility and compassion.

I'd like to kiss a baby and smile like the legendary John Prine said, but that would be dangerous to the infant. I take comfort in knowing my neighbours brought a beautiful baby boy into the world about a

I was horrified at what happened at the Quebec nursing home where some staff walked out and 31 people died, some stained with their own feces.

# Coleman enacts COVID-19 Measures

COLEMAN (Special/Staff) – Essential services in Coleman will run as usual as the township takes additional steps to prevent potential spread of the COVID-19 virus.

In a press release, the township said its municipal emergency control group has been activated and essential services related to road safety, fire response, waste collection, and water treatment and distribution "will continue to operate as normal."

Its office, however, is closed to the public and may be reached by phone or email. It has requested that payments be made by internet banking through the individual's financial institution or by mailing cheques.

The municipality has made no changes in interim tax instalment due dates.

But it will apply no penalty or interest to outstanding property tax balances, including utility accounts, for April, May and June.

Its landfill operator will also not handle cash. Invoices and receipts will be mailed.

In terms of recycling, its provider, Eco-Logix, has requested that all recyclables, with the exception of cardboard, be placed in clear bags.

While employees typically enter some buildings to pick up recyclables, it's now requesting that the materials be placed curbside.

It stressed that it will not pick up non-recyclable materials such as tissue, toilet paper, napkins or paper towels.

Eco-Logix operator Belinda Beairsto also requested that anyone who is ill or at risk of exposure refrain from recycling for now.

"As a recycling company, we are in an oddly exposed position as we directly and indirectly handle a huge amount of material that has been exposed to people's mouths. We are potentially exposed to the saliva of thousands of people every day.

"We feel that our service is essential for communities and intend to continue service as per usual.

"In the event that our staff is quarantined or we are mandated to discontinue services we will work with communities for alternate options at that time."

Coleman is also a member of the Temiskaming Municipal Services Association, which provides building inspections.

The association's services continue, but with changes.

No interior inspections of occupied premises will be done, and on-site inspections will be conducted only where physical distancing is possible.

Building permits will be accepted electronically, and approved permits will be emailed to applicants.

# **Latchford wants** reduced payment demands

LATCHFORD - Latchford council is calling on area agencies to delay calling on municipalities for levy fees now due.

Municipalities pay levies to service organizations such as the District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board, the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation, the Timiskaming Health Unit and the Ontario Provincial Police, as well as the school boards.

The major share of the taxes collected by northern municipalities are used for payments to these agencies. But this year, as a result of the shutdown of much of the Ontario economy to battle COVID-19, municipalities are receiving requests from ratepayers about deferring their taxes for the time being. However, municipalities continue to feel pressured to pay their levies to the agencies.

At Latchford council's meeting of Thursday, April 9, Mayor George Lefebvre expressed the opinion that those larger service organizations should look at ways to defer their payment requests to help offset the financial pressure on the municipalities.

Council agreed to remove interest from current tax accounts for its ratepayers. That will continue for the next three months.

The councillors expressed support for the mayor's viewpoint that boards and organizations should reduce their demands for payments from the municipalities.

"If we're all in this together, let's get together," said Lefebvre.

Clerk-treasurer Jaime Allen noted that the town had not yet received any direction from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs on the matter.

Lefebvre noted that the school boards experienced several strike days where the teachers were not being paid, and they should be able to reduce their demands on the municipalities which he said have now become the tax collectors for these boards and organizations.

"I don't think it's fair," he commented.

Councillor Mike Brooks stated in support, "There should certainly be some consideration for all the municipalities in that regard."









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# More testing, patient transfers as district tackles COVID-19

DISTRICT – Appointments had already been booked for the opening day of COVID-19 virus assessment centres in Temiskaming.

Three drive-through centres - located at the northern clinic entrance at Temiskaming Hospital, the Englehart and District Family Health Team clinic and Heritage North in Kirkland Lake – opened April 15.

They'll remain open until the end of April on an appointment-only basis, with referrals from the Timiskaming Health Unit.

Testing had been available in the district, but on a more limited basis.

The assessment centres are part of a regional initiative to better understand the status of COVID-19 in the region.

### **TEMISKAMING HOSPITAL**

Temiskaming Hospital was approved for an assessment centre in March, but changes in recent days made the expanded local testing "a viable option," said hospital CEO Mike Baker.

He said the original testing criteria had been very restrictive, and the hospital was receiving only "a trickle" of the swabs used for testing.

However, the list of potential COVID-19 symptoms has been expanded, and so too has the eligibility for testing.

He said more capacity to analyze tests is now available in the region through labs in Timmins and at Health Sciences North in Sudbury, and a bulk order of swabs arrived April 14.

He repeated the mantra that the hospital has adopted during the pandemic - "COVID-19, not in our house."

To that end, he stressed the need for people to stay home, even if they're not sick; to practise physical distancing when around others; to wash their hands frequently; and to avoid touching their face.

# IN ENGLEHART

In the northern half of the district, meanwhile, hospitals in Englehart and Kirkland Lake are realigning services and patients to cope with COVID-19.

At the Kirkland and District Hospital, the district's first and, to date, only hospitalized patient with COVID-19 is reported to be out of intensive care and improving.

Over the course of a week, about a dozen alternate-levelof-care (ALC) patients have been transferred from Kirkland Hospital, explained Sean Conroy, interim president and CEO of the two hospitals.

The move increases the capacity of Kirkland Lake hospital to handle any surge of COVID-19 cases, said Conroy in an interview earlier this

Kirkland and District Hospital is equipped with ICU facilities, a CT scanner and support staff, he noted.

And by relocating ALC patients, he said the hospitals have created "basically a COVIDfree in-patient area in Englehart."

ALC patients, often longterm care patients, don't need a hospital's acute care services but don't have suitable accommodations elsewhere. They can also be among the most vulnerable to the virus.

Conroy said two Kirkland Lake staffers who typically work with that hospital's ALC patients have also made the move.

He said they'd be familiar faces for the transferred patients and a new resource for Englehart patients.

Within the Englehart hospital itself, he said ALC patients are separated from other acute care patients "as an extra precaution."

Englehart's emergency department remains open 24-7, he said.



The district's Emergency Lake to Englehart and District Medical Services will continue to transport patients with serious conditions – a heart attack, stroke or serious bone breaks, for example – to Englehart.

But he said the hospitals

are working with the district's ambulance service and doctors to determine when patients with less urgent conditions can be diverted to Kirkland Lake.

Conroy said the hospitals are also trying to minimize any cross-over of staff between the two facilities.

It's implementing personal protective equipment requirements to reduce the risk when staff must move between the two, he said.



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# Pavilion's doors remain open

In a media release, she said it's important for women to know that support is available 24 hours a day.

The centre is working on adapting services to address the needs of women self-isolating with their partner.

offering Counsellors are appointment non-traditional times and alternative options for communication.

Anyone worried about their safety can reach out at any time of day so that the Pavilion can help put a safety plan in place.

"If you or someone you know is in immediate danger, please call 911," it said.

# Province deferring **Provincial Land Tax**

TORONTO (Staff/Special) -Property owners in unincorporated townships will see some well-timed relief during the COVID-19 outbreak.

The provincial government has announced it is deferring \$15 million in property taxes for people and businesses in parts of Northern Ontario located outside of municipal bound-

Through these measures, Ontario is giving taxpayers in unincorporated areas more time to pay each of the four 2020 Provincial Land Tax installments. Taxpayers will have 90 extra days to pay without incurring interest or penalties.

This action is complementary to new support for municipalities that were announced in Ontario's Action Plan: Responding to COVID-19. In this plan, the Province announced it is deferring the upcoming quarterly (June 30) remittance of education property tax to school boards by 90 days. This will provide municipalities with the flexibility to, in turn, provide property tax deferrals of over \$1.8 billion to local residents and businesses.

"Additional cash flow during these tough times can help keep food on the table for people in every corner of the province," said Ontario Minister of Finance Rod Phillips in making the announcement Monday, April 6.

The Provincial Land Tax is the

property tax paid in unincorporated areas of Northern Ontario outside municipal boundaries. The province directly collects this tax to help fund community services, such as policing, land ambulance, public health and social services in unincorporated areas.

To ensure this deferral does not have a financial impact on Local Roads and Services Boards, which provide additional services in these remote communities, the province will continue to make payments to these partners, as scheduled. In addition, to ensure this does not have a financial impact on school boards, the province will adjust payments to boards to offset the deferral.





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


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
