#### **Study of microplastics** in lake inconclusive

VILLE-MARIE, QUEBEC - Microplastic levels in Lake Temiskaming appear to have decreased.

A recently released 2019 study of microplastic residue in sediments around Lake Temiskaming and on sites further down the Ottawa River seems to show levels have decreased since 2016.

However, those involved in the study are uncertain.

Different systems were used in each of the studies, and more studies are needed, however the pandemic has created a pause in the project.

The most recent study was carried out under the leadership of Carleton University PhD student Shaun Forrest, under the supervision of the Ottawa Riverkeepers.

Citizen scientists were used to collect the samples at various sites around the lake and down the river.

Forrest told The Speaker in an email interview that he had planned to do more sampling in the New Liskeard area this summer, "but for obvious reasons that is on hold." He hopes he can get some more samples around Lake Temiskaming in the future when pandemic concerns ease.

Forrest's ultimate objective is that "hopefully it will put in place some kind of urgency to make testing for microplastics a recurring practice for monitoring purposes."

Yves Grafteaux of Ville-Marie, director general of Organisme de bassin versant du Témiscamingue (OBVT) which participated in the 2019 and 2016 studies, commented in a telephone interview that it was difficult to assess the difference in levels because the techniques were different.

The 2016 study looked for microplastics in water, while the 2019 study looked in sediments.

"In 2016 the results were surprisingly high, and this year it was quite low," he commented.

Whatever the case, the numbers in the Lake Temiskaming area were much lower than in areas of higher population further south along the watershed, he noted.

But he said, "we cannot really interpret the results for now. It's too early to say there is no problem with microplastics."

The 2019 study found results ranging from 12.31 microplastic particles per kilogram in Sutton Bay to 1.76 in Ville-Marie.

A microplastic is any small piece of plastic less than five millimetres in length which can enter the water system through a variety of sources. Microplastics can originate from clothing, cosmetics and industrial processes. They can also originate from degrading plastic materials such as plastic bags, fishing nets, and plastic bottles.

Fish and other marine animals can get the microplastics embedded in their bodies through their respiratory and digestive systems.

### **Proving local saleable cobalt possible**

**TOWNSHIP COLEMAN** (Staff/Special) - First Cobalt has produced battery-grade cobalt sulfate.

This is the second time First Cobalt has produced the product using its refinery flow sheet, but this time a different feed source was used.

The second trial produced battery-grade cobalt sulfate which assayed with 21.4 per cent cobalt, which surpasses the reference grade for sulfate pricing.

First Cobalt notes that the "ability to treat different feedstocks underlines flowsheet versatility of the permitted hydrometallurgical facility."

As of March 30, First Cobalt anticipated having a definitive feasibility study completed

"Once we have settled on buyers for the product, we are confident that we can make a sulfate product that will meet the quality requirements of their batteries," said First Cobalt president and chief executive officer Trent Mell in a press release,

Mell stated that the COVID-19 economic impact is not expected to have a lasting effect on the company's strategic plans. The company has a partnership with Glencore which Mell says will place it "at the centre of this transition for the North American and European markets."


First Cobalt owns the only primary cobalt refinery in North America, and believes it could become a strategic asset for the North American and European battery markets.

The feasibility study and the completion of a long-term feed supply agreement with Glencore will be the determining factors in whether the refinery will be put back into production.

First Cobalt had originally anticipated having its definitive feasibility study completed in early April but slowdowns related to pandemic responses have resulted in setting a new deadline for the end of April.

Discussions are also underway regarding funding arrangements.

The processor of the City's recyclables has recently noticed an increase in the amount of garbage or non-recyclable materials in our shipments. Non-recyclable materials can cause problems during the sorting process and are expensive to dispose of, as the processor hand sorts the materials to get the garbage out. Mixing garbage with recycling significantly increases program costs, and ultimately the cost to the taxpaver.

Beginning immediately, random inspections will be completed by looking inside the recycling bins to check for garbage. Recycling bins found with unacceptable materials will be tagged to identify why the notice was issued, and to ensure the bin is not collected. Further occurrences may lead to fines or the suspension of collection services.

Please help to reduce the amount of garbage found in our recycling, and do not place the following prohibited materials in the blue recycling hin:

- Batteries Extension Cords
- Clothing, shoes, other fabric materials
- Garbage Bags and Diapers
   Christmas Lights Garden Hoses

#### OPEN AIR BURNING PERMITS



May 22, 2020 - In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, City and fire department officials have faced difficult decisions about how to adjust day-to-day operations in order to both protect their employees while continuing to serve their communities.

As a result of the closure of municipal buildings and facilities the City of Temiskaming Shores and the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department wants to advise all residents that all residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open air-burning permit.

Please note, any resident requiring a new burning permit are asked to contact the fire department by calling (705) 672-3363 ext. 4701 or 4702 and leave a detailed message and someone will contact you to arrange an inspection. For tenants requesting a burning permit, you will require written permission from the property owner to have a fire. Also, there is no cost to obtain a burning as Municipal Council has waived all fees for burning permits for 2020.

Residents are reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters:

- No Day Burning You may only burn from 6pm 8am.
- Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that may cause excessive smoke.
- Always Stay with Your Fire A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times.
- Respect Your Neighbour Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility.
   Control Your Fire Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't
- even consider burning when it is windy.

  When a Municipal Fire Ban or Restricted Fire Zone is in effect, no open-

air burning is permitted and all burning permits are suspended.

**6** Reading is an exercise in empathy; an exercise in walking in someone else's shoes for a while. ? ?

Often, when I am faced with a situation outside my scope of understanding, I read books.

I exhaust the literature, if you will, on a subject.

I've been doing this all my life and lately over the last few months in regards to Indigenous issues and racism in Canada.

Last week on a Minneapolis street, George Floyd was killed by a white police officer showing us man's capacity for brutality. For officer Derek Chauvin to have kept his knee on Floyd's neck even after he had passed out, even as witnesses begged him to stop, is an act of cruelty few of us have ever witnessed before.

This is the world we live in

Many people were appalled at the looting and rioting that took place after the murder of Floyd.

That behaviour falls short of honouring an innocent man's need for justice?

The black community rightly concerned about whether sons, fathers, brothers and husbands will be murdered for merely walking, jogging or watching birds in a park.

We utter the word "equality" fairly easily don't we?

While the average American white family has a net worth of \$171,000, the average black family has \$17,000.

A white knee on a black man's neck has exposed white power, white privilege and the underbelly of police brutality towards people of colour.

This is also true of Indigenous people in this country.

I must say not all police officers are bad and not all are rac-

Meanwhile America is imploding and President Donald Trump held up a bible, of all things, in a staged photo op endorsing violent intervention towards peaceful protestors. He's not the leader that America so desperately needs. Great leaders unify people and they speak calmly about what's best for all Americans.

He is not a man of prayer, peace or literature, but a phony two-bit hustler.

How do we rationalize what's going on in our world?

One of the best ways to understand racism is through reading.

Books confront our stereotypical attitudes about people showing us how we are all connected and belong to each other

Books that challenged my beliefs for the better are Seven Fallen Feathers by Tanya Talaga, Born a Crime by Trevor Noah, Anne Frank's diary, To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee and others.



# Support for building addition at Village Noël

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – A FedNor tourism initiative will help showcase Aboriginal and Métis communities at the next Village Noël Témiskaming.



#### A message from Temiskaming Hospital President & CEO Mike Baker

"Our Drive-Through Regional Assessment Centre located at Temiskaming Hospital has expanded both its hours of operation and criteria for testing.

As done previously, those presenting with COVID-19 symptoms will continue to be eligible for testing. Symptoms include:

- fever
- cough
- shortness of breath
- runny nose
- sore throat
- nausea
- vomiting

Our expanded testing criteria will now include people who are not showing symptoms but are concerned that they may have been exposed to COVID-19 through contact with a confirmed or suspected case of the virus.

We will also be expanding testing to those who are at high risk of exposure through their place of employment. This includes grocery store workers, health care workers and retail workers even if they are not showing symptoms.

If you are showing symptoms, please stay home, and call the Timiskaming Health Unit at 705-647-4305 extension 7 or our Regional Assessment Centre at 705-648-1844 right away to schedule an appointment. Please note that all testing, including the expanded testing, will require an appointment.

Through this expanded testing in Temiskaming Shores, we hope to be able to detect the virus sooner and avoid spread through the community especially with individuals who have the virus but aren't showing symptoms."

## Charlton Sustainability Hub gets Englehart's support

ENGLEHART (Staff) - The meeting Wednesday, May 27, Town of Englehart is also stepping up to the list of municipal councils who are giving their support to the proposed Charlton Sustainability Hub.

At the town's regular council Fund Corporation.

deputy clerk treasurer Malorie Robinson explained municipal support is important for the cooperative in its application to the Northern Ontario Heritage

The cooperative is seeking funding from the fund and Fed-Nor in order to be able to hire a consultant to move the project forward.

The Charlton Sustainability Hub would teach people and organizations how to have an economy in a low-carbon setting, and would facilitate sharing and building low-carbon products, including producing and harvesting food locally.

Englehart Mayor Nina Wallace commented that the concept behind the Hub is now "more critical than ever."

Providing municipal support gives the town the opportunity to participate in the development of a regional plan.

Ambrose Raftis of Savard Township is heading the initiative which is being developed around the former Charlton-Savard Public School.

Raftis has been working to introduce the project to area municipalities and Indigenous leaders.

"The Charlton Sustainability Hub will help communities to adapt to climate change by reducing their impact on the environment while increasing their quality of life," said Raftis in a document outlining the project.

"The Sustainability Hub with its charitable status will be self-sustaining by design. The low cost of operation will ensure its long-term viability."

It is envisioned that the centre "will be sustained through a cost-recovery business model by client accommodations, community support, volunteerism, and incomes from training, and a year-round farmers market."

The Hub would also "include the development and use of renewable energy technology as well as local four-season food growing, processing and storage technology within a community co-op structure."

#### Hyperthyroid and Hypothyroid **Disorder Awareness**

According to the Thyroid Foundation of Canada, 1 in 10 Canadians suffer from a thyroid condition of one type or another. And as many as 50% of those are undiagnosed.

The two most common types of thyroid disease are:

- Hypothyroidism (underactive thyroid)
- Hyperthyroidism (overactive thyroid)

Clinical features of hypothyroidism may include: poor appetite; intolerance to cold; dry, coarse skin; brittle hair; fatigue; constipation; muscle weakness; and poor memory retention. Sometimes the voice becomes croaky and hoarse. Examination may reveal dry, scaly, cold, pale skin; a thickening of the skin and underlying tissues; very slow reflexes; and a slow heart rate.

Clinical features of hyperthyroidism may include: weight loss, nervousness, irritability, intolerance to hot weather, excessive sweating, shakiness, and muscle weakness. Other signs include a rapid pulse, loss of body fat and muscle bulk, thyroid enlargement (goitre), fine tremors of the fingers and hot, moist, velvety skin.

Thyroid disorders for the most part are treatable; however, untreated thyroid disease can produce serious results in other parts of the body.

Each person's experience of thyroid illness will be different depending on a number of factors; a patient will not necessarily have all (or even any) of the above symptoms and some patients have the symptoms in the absence of thyroid disease, perhaps due to other causes. A primary care provider should be consulted if thyroid illness is suspected.

# Twice monthly meetings considered by Charlton-Dack

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack is considering returning to meeting twice a month.

At their regular meeting Monday, June 1, which took place electronically, council also discussed whether they will be able to return to meeting in person.

Acting Reeve Debbie Veerman suggested that meeting in person could be possible if physical distancing is provided.

To have five people meet together is currently permitted, it was noted.

Currently Reeve Merrill Bond is out of the area and has been keeping contact through phone calls and emails, and attending the meetings online through the Zoom app. The remaining four council members and chief administrative officer Dan Thibeault constitute five people.

Veerman continued that if the provincial regulations regarding gatherings are relaxed to 10 from five, the full council could start meeting in person again when Bond returns to the area.

Councillor Sandra Parkin observed that "our meetings seem to be going a lot faster when we're on Zoom."

Council agreed that they will have a second meeting this month, which is slated for June 15, in order to discuss the municipal budget and a contract matter.

Councillor Clem Yantha commented that it the decision could be made monthly whether it would be necessary to call a second meeting.

Councillor Jim Huff expressed support for having two meetings a month


"I don't think we're being very effective when we're a month apart between meetings," he commented.

However he agreed that by meeting through Zoom "the meetings do seem to be much shorter."

# Artists continue creating during lockdown

DISTRICT - Artists around the world are experiencing varying levels of impact on their sales and their ability to show their work as the pandemic lockdown continues.

In Northeastern Ontario, scheduled exhibitions for 2020 and into 2021 have been either put in question, postponed, or cancelled outright.

Three local artists were contacted about how they have been impacted by social distancing.

Lionel Venne of Elk Lake is still seeing sales occurring for his paintings, but he noted the closure of the exhibition venues. However his paintings are still selling online, and a collector regularly reaches out to him, he said in a telephone interview. Venne spends the days painting, sitting on his deck, and listening to music.

Coleman Township artist Cal Knight says, "social distancing is impacting sales but it will pass."

Knight also noted the cancellation of exhibitions.

"I miss going to all our area shows. We are blessed with some strong art and great local organizations, and the volunteers that make it work."

In the meantime, he is focusing on creating.

Mckenzie said he is still receiving some calls and orders for his artwork, and is receiving some big commissions.

While he can still order and receive canvas and paints, it is difficult to get frames, he noted.

Bruce Cull of Henwood Township says, "the arts are taking yet another big step backwards" during this time. Online sales are non-existent, he says, on top of galleries and shops being shut. "Prior to the pandemic it was a struggle for artists, but now, for me, I continue to work and produce good work, much of which is reflecting the times we're living in, but there isn't a proper outlet to have the work seen."

For now he is working in his studio "on themes of grouse drummers, on themes of courageousness, persistence and faith."




















