Pressing weights turns to pressing waits

COBALT - Cobalt's Hoist Room renovation has been put on hold until 2021.

Councillor Angela Adshead, in addressing the 2020 budget, proposed to council on June 10 that the town should defer the project for this year.

"Realistically, it doesn't make sense to allocate funds to something we can't do right now," Adshead commented at the June 10 budget meeting.

The Hoist Room project has met a couple of obstacles. One is that the equipment remains in the former Cobalt arena and the building no longer belongs to the town. The matter of accessing the equipment, along with another debate, is now in the hands of lawyers.

"We don't know where we're at with it," Mayor George Othmer also commented at the June 10 meeting.

Adshead added that she anticipates legal matters "are going to be backed up" as lawyers and courts deal with issues that have developed during the pandemic.

"It's not going to be a quick fix." The second obstacle which has

held up the project is the pandemic itself. Volunteers had been working on preparing the space next door to the municipal office. The pandemic social distancing restrictions have hindered people working together on the project.

However, the town still plans to move forward with the Hoist Room eventually. In an interview, Othmer assured that the town has not forgotten about the project where a new accessible door has been installed.

At the June 16 committee-of-thewhole meeting, it was clear that council was facing a bare-bones 2020 budget. While it left many items off the budget, and resigned to doing only the most necessary projects, it resolved to address important needs, such as maintenance items needed for the water treatment plant, as top priorities for January 2021.

The town is also facing the serious need for a new garage for its public works department, with health and safety of the town employees as a strong impetus. A high price tag has been attached to an initial presentation for a new garage and council is hoping to find a more modestly priced solution.

Dangerous Plant Species in the Area

Giant Hogweed

The stems and leaves of this plant are covered with small hairs coated with poisonous sap. Even the slightest touch can cause painful blisters and severe skin irritation. The symptoms can take a couple of days to develop with the skin becoming highly photosensitive producing large watery blisters; however the effects can be long lasting, with contact resulting in recurrent dermatitis. This is a particular concern for small children who may use the stems as pea-shooters or pretend telescopes resulting in horrific injuries.

What does Hogweed Look Like?

- · very tall, 8-14 feet
- · Stems have rigid hairs, purple blotches and are hollow
- Flower clusters up to 2 ft across occurring from mid June to late July
- Has a reddish purple stem with fine spines that make it appear furry

Wild Parsnip

Is another weed that should also be avoided. The effects are similar to those associated with Giant Hog Weed. Irritation can occur if your skin contacts the plant's fluids and is then exposed to sunlight. Contact with the eyes can cause temporary blindness and in rare cases permanent blindness.

Wild parsnip can be found within uncultivated land, roadside ditches, parklands, nature trails and sports fields as well as on and around residential properties.

What Does Wild Parsnip Look Like?

- smells like parsnip
- stands 20-60 inches high, branched, hollow stem
- small yellow clustered flowers
- flowers from late June into late fall (resembles dill)

Being able to readily identify wild parsnip and giant hogweed will minimize accidental exposure to these plants and the painful results that follow.

Anyone having information on specific locations where these weeds are posing a public risk should contact the Invading Species Hotline at 1-800-563-7711. You will be asked to send in photos for identification. DO NOT touch, cut or collect parts of the plant.

Elk Lake fire out

DISTRICT (Staff) – A fire spotted on the weekend west of Elk Lake has been declared out.

Located about 15 kilometres west of the community, the fire – called Kirkland Lake 3 – was reported to have started the evening of June 14 and was 0.8 hectares in size.

In an update issued late June 16, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forests Aviation, Forest Fire and Emergency Services reported the fire was out.

That left only one active fire in the South Temiskaming area.

Kirkland Lake 1, located about two kilometres north of Belle-Vallée, continued to be observed, at 15.8 hectares. It began May 21.

Help for increased drinking, cannabis use during pandemic

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – If you're turning more to alcohol or drugs in recent weeks, you're not alone.

According to a recent study cited by the Timiskaming Health Unit, one in five Canadians say they've increased their alcohol consumption as they spend more time at home during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Help is available.

In a media release, the health unit said it's joined forces with the Canadian Mental Health Association Cochrane-Timiskaming (CMHA-CT) branch to increase the public's awareness of the reasons for increased consumption of alcohol and cannabis, and where to seek help.

"People sometimes drink more alcohol and use substances to help them cope with stress and anxiety," said Dr. Glenn Corneil, the district's acting medical officer of health. "COVID-19 has reminded us of something that's always been important: to be mindful of how much and how often you are using substances, including alcohol, and their impact on your life and the people around you."

The health unit said changes in drinking patterns were uncovered by a Nanos poll commissioned by the Canadian Centre on Substance Use and Addiction.

Increased alcohol consumption was reported by 21 per cent of Canadians aged 18 to 34; 24.5 per cent of those aged 35 to 54; and almost 10 per cent of respondents aged 55 and older.

Lack of a regular schedule, boredom, stress and the increased quantity of alcohol kept in the home in recent months were identified as the leading reasons.

The health unit said increased alcohol and substance use is linked to many health and social risks.

It can weaken the immune system, which increases the risk of contracting the COVID-19 virus and, if infected, worsens the symptoms.

The health unit and CMHA-CT urge those who are turning to alcohol and other substances because of stress and anxiety to assess their risk, using Canada's Lower Risk Guidelines for alcohol and cannabis use.

"To anyone concerned about their alcohol or substance usage, reach out," said CMHA-CT executive director Paul Jalbert.

"There are several services in place to support you. You are not alone, and you don't need to deal with this alone."

OPEN AIR BURNING PERMITS

May 22, 2020 - In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, City and fire department officials have faced difficult decisions about how to adjust day-to-day operations in order to both protect their employees while continuing to serve their communities.

As a result of the closure of municipal buildings and facilities the City of Temiskaming Shores and the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department wants to advise all residents that all residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open air-burning permit.

Please note, any resident requiring a new burning permit are asked to contact the fire department by calling (705) 672-3363 ext. 4701 or 4702 and leave a detailed message and someone will contact you to arrange an inspection. For tenants requesting a burning permit, you will require written permission from the property owner to have a fire. Also, there is no cost to obtain a burning as Municipal Council has waived all fees for burning permits for 2020.

Residents are reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters:

- No Day Burning You may only burn from 6pm 8am.
- Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that may cause excessive smoke.
- · Always Stay with Your Fire A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times.
- Respect Your Neighbour Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility.
- Control Your Fire Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't even consider burning when it is windy.

When a Municipal Fire Ban or Restricted Fire Zone is in effect, no openair burning is permitted and all burning permits are suspended.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

The processor of the City's recyclables has recently noticed an increase in the amount of garbage or non-recyclable materials in our shipments.

Non-recyclable materials can cause problems during the sorting process and are expensive to dispose of, as the processor hand sorts the materials to get the garbage out. Mixing garbage with recycling significantly increases program costs, and ultimately the cost to the taxpayer.

Beginning immediately, random inspections will be completed by looking inside the recycling bins to check for garbage. Recycling bins found with unacceptable materials will be tagged to identify why the notice was issued, and to ensure the bin is not collected. Further occurrences may lead to fines or the suspension of collection services.

Please help to reduce the amount of garbage found in our recycling, and do not place the following prohibited materials in the blue recycling bin:

- Batteries Extension Cords
- Clothing, shoes, other fabric materials
- Garbage Bags and Diapers
- · Christmas Lights · Garden Hoses
- Medical WastePlastic Shovels, Toys, Buckets
- Electronics• Large Plastics: Tarps, Pool Covers/Liners
- · Wood Yard Waste: grass clippings, leaves, sticks, branches Prior to setting out your recycling bin for collection, please

ensure all of your mixed recyclable materials are placed in the bin loosely (except for shredded paper packaged in a clear plastic bag). Any items received at the processing facility in garbage bags are considered non-recyclable, as these bags are not opened and the contents are not sorted. Rash of thefts

It seems like almost on a daily basis in our communities there are thefts taking place.

People are stealing canoes, bikes, solar lights, ATVs, tools and even garden plants.

And they are often doing it in broad daylight.

A good deal of the thefts might be directly tied to the drug trade where people are stealing to support a drug habit.

It might be a good idea for neighbours to alert the police when they see someone roaming around their streets that aren't necessarily tied to that area of town.

Last year the rate of police-reported offences in rural Canada was 30 per cent higher than in urban areas, according to Statistics Canada data.

You want to kill a community? Allow a drug and theft trade to flourish.

But there is one thing that small communities can boast about.

As survey after survey indicate, people in smaller communities report greater levels of happiness than those in cities.

If you see something out of place, report it. If you know someone who is selling hot merchandise cheap, report him or her because it could be your house where the thieves strike next.

Cash strapped

It might be a daunting task for local municipalities in the Temskaming district who are perusing their cash flow situation while formulating their annual budgets.

And certainly due to the COVID-19 pandemic, those municipalities may have been negatively impacted by the pandemic.

The deliverance of public services has not decreased in price and yet the provincial government has done little to address the need for additional funds directed to the over 400 municipalities across Ontario.

In order to fully recover from the financial challenges of the pandemic, a helping hand from the provincial government would help struggling municipalities in need of capital works projects and other costs completely outside their meagre budgets.

Many revenue streams normally available to municipalities from user fees to public transit dried up during the pandemic, thus challenging mayors and councils and their budgets.

And with non-negotiable social services, water management, health unit and policing costs taking a big bite out of those budgets, towns across the north could use a helping hand right now.

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
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Armstrong council to consider 2020 budget

EARLTON – Armstrong Township council will consider the 2020 budget and set tax rates and other rates at their June 24 meeting, to be held electronically at 7 p.m.

The budget, valued at just over \$3 million, requires a 3.7 per cent increase to the taxation levy. The impact to the residential tax class is a 4.4 per cent change over 2019, with the tax class average experiencing a \$52 increase from 2019.

The township's 2020 capital projects include new municipal welcome signage, technology improvements, updates to the gym facility, single surface treatment of 2.2 kilometres of road, gravelling of 1.3 kilometres of road and inspection and repair to wells one and four.

The 2020 budget highlights include:

- Revenue from taxation totals of \$1,382,096
- Capital Projects planned total \$204,300
- Long-term debt repayment of \$183,289
- Transfers to reserves totalling \$68,250
- Water rates at a 0.5 per cent increase
- Waste water rates at a one per cent increase
- Garbage/recycling at a two per cent increase.

Council meetings are open to the public and will be held at 7 p.m. on the following upcoming dates: June 24, July 8 and August 12.

LTC residences reopening to visitors

DISTRICT – Visitor restrictions at Ontario's long-term care residences are slowly being lifted.

Last week, the Ontario government announced that visitors would once again be granted access beginning June 18, but under what it described as strict health and safety protocols.

They include requiring visitors to pass active screening every time they visit, confirming with staff that they've tested negative for COVID-19 within the previous two weeks, and bringing and wearing a face covering during visits.

Visits will not be permitted at residences experiencing an outbreak of the virus.

In Haileybury, Extendicare Tri-Town is "so pleased" that it will soon be able to welcome families to visit with residents, said Extendicare regional director Susan Enouy in an email.

"These visits are so important for our community, and we look forward to reconnecting loved ones after so much time apart," said Enouy June 17.

It has informed residents' family members and substitute decision-makers of the steps to be taken to limit potential exposure to the virus.

Visits, for example, must be scheduled in advance and will be limited to 30 minutes. A resident may have one visit with a single visitor per week.

The precautions announced by the province also apply.

In Englehart, Northview Nursing Home reopened to visitors this week, following provincial directives and guidelines, said Lori Turcotte, senior manager, nursing operations, at Conmed Health Care Group which owns the residence.

"Based on the Directive, as of June 18, one family member per week will be permitted to visit a loved one outside," said Turcotte in an email.



ochrane to get highway bypass

COCHRANE (Special) – The ers by reducing traffic on local Town of Cochrane will be getting a long-awaited highway bypass project, the Ontario government has announced.

While improving safety and reducing travel times for families and truck drivers, the project also will create jobs in local communities as the province reopens the economy.

The government says the project will connect Highway 652 to Highway 11, providing an alternate route for travellers and trucks moving goods and reducing traffic on municipal roads.

It is anticipated that the bypass could divert approximately 960 vehicles and 195 trucks per day away from municipal roads.

"This is a critical project as it will make it easier and safer for both travellers and truck drivmunicipal roads," Minister of Transportation Caroline Mulroney said in a statement.

"We understand the unique transportation challenges of the North and are committed to ensuring everyone has access to a safe transportation network that supports northern businesses, communities and families. This also includes optimizing bus services and options for passenger rail service."

The province says it will be proceeding with the planning, preliminary design and environmental assessment for the extension of Highway 652 to Highway 11 at Cochrane.

"Our government recognizes the need to improve transportation options for the people and businesses of Northern Ontario," said Greg Rickford, Minister of Energy, Northern Development and Mines, in a statement.

"Today, we are taking the next step in this important project that will better connect Northeastern Ontario and help grow the local economy."

The bypass would provide a connection for travellers on Highway 652 to access Highways 11, 574 and 579.

This is the first phase of the project, which is expected to take up to two-and-a-half years. Work is anticipated to begin in 2020.

The bypass is expected to be two-lanes wide and between three and six kilometres in length.

The planning, preliminary design and environmental assessment will review the connection to the Rockshield, Tembec and ONR industrial facilities.

Temiskaming Hospital COVID-19 Update



A message from Temiskaming Hospital President & CEO Mike Baker

"On June 10th, 2020, the Surgical Department at Temiskaming Hospital resumed elective surgeries after a three-month hiatus due to COVID-19.

While equipment has been purchased to minimize turnaround times in the operating room, it is expected to take five weeks for Temiskaming Hospital's Surgical Department to reach 70 per cent of pre-COVID-19 surgeries.

We are currently working to reschedule over 400 surgeries that were put on pause in March. An ethical triage methodology has been used to determine the priority of back-logged surgeries with priority being given to cancer cases.

Patients awaiting surgeries are reminded to refrain from calling or visiting the hospital to inquire about surgery dates. All patients will be contacted when the hospital is ready for them.

We want to remind patients with scheduled appointments to follow social distancing guidelines while in the hospital and be aware of any directional signage in order to manage patient flow.

We continue to review all patient services in Temiskaming Hospital in order to continue to keep our staff, patients and community members safe.

Visitor restrictions remain in effect at this time.

We will keep you updated as more services reopen.


