TEMISKAMING SHORES – If a pandemic means you're stuck at home, what do you need help with?

Getting groceries and running essential errands are at the top of the list in Temiskaming.

They're the most common calls for help to Connexions Timiskaming Connections, an initiative launched by the Timiskaming Health Unit in April.

It matches volunteers with district residents in need of assistance.

"To date, we have helped 30 residents connect with a volunteer, and helped two special projects find numerous volunteers," said Krystal Oviatt, public health promoter with the health unit, in an email.

For one of the projects, it helped recruit volunteers for the weekly distribution of nutritious foods at locations also assisted with the registration of across the district under the Northern Fruit and Vegetable Program.

In Kirkland Lake, volunteers wrapped

Northern College organizing video interviews with alumni

HAILEYBURY – The Northern College Student Association at the Haileybury campus is looking to set-up video interview question and answer sessions with its alumni.

The purpose of the project is to seek out some information on how their college experience helped them to achieve their education and career goals.

"The primary angle is that we are interested to hear where their careers took them," said Mhat Briehl, who recently was elected as student association vice president, in an email inter-

"Did they jump right into work after graduating? Did they go back to school? If so, was it a continuation of the program area they were taking at Northern or did they switch directions? Did they stay local? Did they have the opportunity to travel abroad? What other interesting experiences did they have that were made possible because of the education they received at Northern College?"

The secondary angle, Briehl said, is to look at what college life was like back when the alumni attended the school.

"Some questions we might ask would be along the lines of: what was their favourite part of attending Northern College? What sort of community lived within the walls of the college? What extra-curricular activities were available for students to participate in? What were some of the popular hangout spots in town? We are hoping to use the interviews to entice prospective students into this beautiful northern area whilst encouraging current students with positive material," said Briehl.

He said that the association would also like to make connections within the greater community, "with hopes of uniting our elders with some of the younger generations."

"In time of great isolation, it is so important that we are able to reach out and connect with others in our community," he

"I personally believe this project has the potential to create a

positive relationship with many people who live in the area (or who have moved away) and reflect on achievements and their unique experience. Our objective is to show students how endless the possibilities are once graduated and how many opportunities can arise once a Northern College Credential is achieved."

The student association would like to do the Q & A video interviews with those who attended the college 30plus years ago, however, they would still be happy speaking with more recent graduates as well (10+ years).

"I was drawn to post an article in The Speaker newspaper because I know a lot of the older generations either do not have access to digital media, do not understand – or are limited in their understanding- of how the internet works, or have no interest in using the internet," said Briehl.

"I wanted to reach out to members of our community in a tangible platform that is familiar and that would be accessible to all. Having said that, I should note that we are also using digital platforms to connect with more tech-savvy alumni. We are considering making a community announcement on the radio, however, that has not yet been finalized."

OPEN AIR BURNING PERMITS

May 22, 2020 - In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, City and fire department officials have faced difficult decisions about how to adjust day-to-day operations in order to both protect their employees while continuing to serve their

As a result of the closure of municipal buildings and facilities the City of Temiskaming Shores and the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department wants to advise all residents that all residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open air-

Please note, any resident requiring a new burning permit are asked to contact the fire department by calling (705) 672-3363 ext. 4701 or 4702 and leave a detailed message and someone will contact you to arrange an inspection. For tenants requesting a burning permit, you will require written permission from the property owner to have a fire. Also, there is no cost to obtain a burning as Municipal Council has waived all fees for burning permits for 2020.

Residents are reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters:

- No Day Burning You may only burn from 6pm 8am.
- Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that may cause
- Always Stay with Your Fire A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times.
- Respect Your Neighbour Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility.
- Control Your Fire Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't even consider burning when it is windy

When a Municipal Fire Ban or Restricted Fire Zone is in effect, no open-air burning is permitted and all burning permits are suspended.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

The processor of the City's recyclables has recently noticed an increase in the amount of garbage or non-recyclable materials in our shipments. Non-recyclable materials can cause problems during the sorting process and are expensive to dispose of, as the processor hand sorts the materials to get the garbage out. Mixing garbage with recycling significantly increases program costs, and ultimately the cost to the taxpayer.

Beginning immediately, random inspections will be completed by looking inside the recycling bins to check for garbage. Recycling bins found with unacceptable materials will be tagged to identify why the notice was issued, and to ensure the bin is not collected. Further occurrences may lead to fines or the suspension of collection services.

Please help to reduce the amount of garbage found in our recycling, and do not place the following prohibited materials in the blue recycling bin:

- Batteries Extension Cords
- Clothing, shoes, other fabric materials
- Garbage Bags and Diapers
- · Christmas Lights · Garden Hoses
- Medical WastePlastic Shovels, Toys, Buckets
- Electronics Large Plastics: Tarps, Pool Covers/Liners • Wood • Yard Waste: grass clippings, leaves, sticks, branches

Prior to setting out your recycling bin for collection, please ensure all of your mixed recyclable materials are placed in the bin loosely (except for shredded paper packaged in a clear plastic bag). Any items received at the processing facility in garbage bags are considered non-recyclable, as these bags are not opened and the contents are not sorted.

At least the upheaval with the teachers' strikes has been settled as that went on way too long, threatening the outcome of the school year.

If there is a take away from this past school year it is that what was once taken for granted in terms of the privilege of receiving an education, should now be fully appreciated.

Zoom in

During the COVID-19 pandemic, people whose employment relied on virtual meetings with fellow employees and clients as well as students have discovered online and teleconference options aren't so bad after all.

Long hours travelling to and from work and classes have been eliminated into the scant seconds it takes to log onto a computer and adjust a camera angle.

While Zoom meetings are convenient, they are not ideal for people living in rural regions whose internet connections are less than ideal.

But where we have seen a difference is the way the various municipal councils in South Temiskaming have been using technology to reach the taxpayer.

It is rare that taxpayers would be attending meetings in person unless there

was a hot button issue pertaining to their individual needs.

But with the use of Zoom meetings taxpayers can now easily check in on their municipal councils and see what's happening for themselves.

This is a pleasant development from the pandemic and here's hoping taxpayer engagement continues long after the pandemic nas passed.

While we acknowledge some aspects of council meetings can be boring when dealing with the mundane issues of local governance, they can also be eye opening for taxpayers to watch how elected officials do their work.

This could be a valuable lesson for municipal governments to continue to connect with the people they represent and serve in a fully transparent fashion.

ENGLEHART - Campers with tents or trailers can now enjoy nights at Kap-Kig-Iwan Provincial Park.

Registration for a campsite can be done online through Parks Ontario.

Day users can also enjoy the park. Walkers can use self-serve envelopes at the entranceway to provide their admission fee, which ranges between \$1 and \$2. The fee guideline is posted at the building.

Day users can also drive in, and can also use the self-serve envelopes. Vehicle admission also has a range of fees, with the maximum amount being \$12.25.

A season vehicle pass is available by calling the Town of Englehart at 705-544-2244. The amount is \$125 and allows the user to also access other provincial parks during the season.

The park has been opened due to the agreement of surrounding municipalities to provide financial support. For several years Englehart has been operating the park alone, with some financial assistance from the province. However this year Englehart council was debating whether it could afford to manage the cost alone. The town sent out requests for support to surrounding municipalities and all came forward with assistance based on a proposed dividing of the cost.

The Municipality of Charlton and Dack and the Township of Evanturel agreed quickly, allowing the town to proceed with signing an agreement with Ontario Parks to operate the park. The Township of Chamberlain held back while it finalized its 2020 budget, but then also came forward with funding

The surrounding municipalities did respond positively and stepped forward with funding assistance. Charlton-Dack provided \$2,864.60, Evanturel

\$2,357.36, and Chamberlain has provided \$1,879.34.

At Englehart's June 24 council meeting, Mayor Nina Wallace expressed thanks to the three neighbouring municipalities for their support.





Should You Get the Pneumonia Vaccine?

What is the Pneumonia Vaccine (Pneumovax)?

Pneumococcal Disease (PD) is an infection caused by a type of bacteria (streptococcus pneumonia). When this bug invades the body, it can lead to serious illness, such as pneumonia. But the bacteria can also cause blood poisoning and meningitis, which is inflammation of the tissues around the brain and spinal cord.

PD bacteria can travel through the air and spread by close contact, through sneezing, coughing or kissing. It can also be picked up from surfaces and objects. The most common signs and symptoms are fever, chills, sweat, aches and pains, and headaches.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

People 65 and older and those with conditions that affect the immune system, such as:

- Cancer
- · Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
- Chronic lung disease
- · Nephrotic (relating to the kidneys) syndrome
- · Cirrhosis of the liver
- · Alcoholism
- Diabetes HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- · Now also recommended for asthma

About eight out of 10 cases occur in these high-risk groups. The vaccine protects against 65% of people. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Five Tips for Reducing Your Risk of contracting Pneomococcal

- If you are 65 or older or in the risk group noted above, see your primary care provider about getting the vaccine.
- Wash your hands
- Be active
- Get enough sleep, as this can help to keep your immune system 4.
- 5. Have regular follow up visits with your primary care provider.




