Garbage moves

Illegal dumpsites being investigated on Latchford road

LATCHFORD - Tower Hill Road in Latchford has been the site recently of human negligence.

A pair of illegal dumpsites have been spotted along the side of the road, located just north of Latchford.

John Aitchison, a Latchford resident, was made aware about one of the dumpsites by a friend on July 20.

"I just found out about this last night, (my friend's) husband was up here on a four-wheeler and saw this and went home and told her and she contacted me," Aitchison explained to The Speaker at the dumpsite.

"I'm going to clean all of this up and I've contacted the town. They're going to let me into the dump and dump it because it shouldn't be here, you know? This is stupidness."

Among the waste dumped beside Tower Hill Road are many non-biodegradable materials, such as an old Continued on 8

Temagami seeking input on Temagami Dry trademark purchase

TEMAGAMI – The Municipality of Temagami has been presented with a unique business opportunity.

Fortier Beverages, which in recent years has bottled and distributed Temagami Dry, has made the decision not to continue producing those products.

The company now has offered the trademark and the production/distribution rights for Temagami Dry to the municipality for \$7,500.

The municipality noted that some generous donors have offered to pay for the entire puranything with it at the moment. the trademark purchase matter. chase amount.

Temagami would have ownership and control of the Temagami Dry trademark, which has been bottled and sold in the area since 1916, as well as the ability to licence its production and distribution.

Trademarks also are required to be renewed every five years, which costs between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

The municipality now has three options: not purchase the trademark; purchase the trademark and associated product lines and take the necessary steps to licence their use; or do a combination of both and purchase the trademark but not do



What are Sharrows?

A bicycle sharrow, two chevrons painted above a bicycle symbol on the road,

indicates the lane is shared by both bicyclists and motorists.


Vehicle and bicycle traffic may be in the lane. Remember sharrows do not mean that the indicated space is exclusively for bicyclists.

Bicyclists

Bicyclists should "take the lane" by riding closer to the middle of the lane to reduce the risk of vehicles passing too closely.

Motorists

Sharrows closer to the middle of the lane remind you that it is unsafe to drive sideby-side with bicyclists. When bicyclists claim the lane, be patient and share the road.

OPEN AIR **BURNING PERMITS**

May 22, 2020 - In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, City and fire department officials have faced difficult decisions about how to adjust day-to-day operations in order to both protect their employees while continuing to serve their communities

As a result of the closure of municipal buildings and facilities the City of Temiskaming Shores and the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department wants to advise all residents that all residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open airburning permit

Please note, any resident requiring a new burning permit are asked to contact the fire department by calling (705) 672-3363 ext. 4701 or 4702 and leave a detailed message and someone will contact you to arrange an inspection. For tenants requesting a burning permit, you will require written permission from the property owner to have a fire. Also, there is no cost to obtain a burning as Municipal Council has waived all fees for burning permits for 2020.

Residents are reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters.

- No Day Burning You may only burn from 6pm 8am
- Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that may cause
- Always Stay with Your Fire A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times
- Respect Your Neighbour Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility
- Control Your Fire Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't even consider burning when it is windy

When a Municipal Fire Ban or Restricted Fire Zone is in effect, no open-air burning is permitted and all burning permits are suspended.

Mandatory





Mask exemption card? It's a scam

GREY-BRUCE – Dr. Ian Arra, medical officer of health for Grey-Bruce, advises that there is no need for a mask exemption card if someone has a health condition that keeps them from wearing a face covering or mask.

"Exemption is based on self-identification," he said, during a July 15 virtual business information session on masks.

He stated at that time there was potential for scams – people trying to sell exemption cards. Concern over the cards led to a press release later in the week showing a fake card and reiterating that no card, doctor's note or other document is needed under the public health order.

Under the order, people exempt from wearing face coverings include those under two years of age or under the age of five chronologically or developmentally who refuse to wear a mask; those who are unable to remove the mask without assistance; those who find it difficult to breathe while wearing a mask; and those who, for any other medical reason, cannot safely wear a mask - for example, cognitive difficulties, difficulties hearing or processing information, or respiratory disease. The Human Rights Code requires reasonable accommo-

He stressed that a requirement for a medical note had been considered, but "we decided there was no need for it."

Arra stressed that the goal of the public health order is "education and awareness ... there is no need for a heavy-handed approach."

"The order is a tool," he said, requiring a "best effort" that would involve asking people to wear a mask, not escorting them out of the store if they refuse.

VARIOUS REASONS

There are many reasons why the goal of the province is to reopen as fast as is safely possible. In addition to economic needs, there are also social needs to consider including mental health and domestic violence.

There are lessons to be learned from other countries, he said

Sweden initially decided to ignore COVID-19 and "let it burn through" to achieve that 70 per cent herd immunity necessary to stop the disease. This led to a significantly higher number of deaths than in neighbouring Norway and other countries, while achieving a herd immunity of less than 10 per cent. He warned that to see what happens from not following "evidenced based" measures to control the disease and opening too quickly, all you need to do is look at the United States.

Countries that implemented universal masking and banned mass gatherings have had a much lower infection and death rate.

The ultimate goal is herd immunity, achieved through a vaccine that may not be that far off. Arra said he is "cautiously optimistic" there will be a safe and effective vaccine by the end of the year, or early next year. After that, it would take three to six months to mass-produce it and immunize people.

A phased reopening depends on three things – virus spread, system capacity and testing capacity. Predicting what businesses and activities could be opened first – a good example being golf courses, where a few people gather in a large outdoor area with virtually no chance of contact, unlike bars which have crowds in a small indoor area – proved successful in stages one and two.

The province has made the decision to move to stage three, which still has some restrictions but allows more freedom. The situation will be re-evaluated in three to four weeks, Arra said. If there's a significant increase,

going back to stage two is a possibility.

EFFECTIVENESS

The reason why mandatory wearing of masks waited until stage three is this is when they're most effective, Arra said, explaining that in the first stage, most people were locked down in their homes. Their houses served as their masks. As more businesses opened, other protections came into play. The chance of contact is now greater, and "PPE will be helpful to carry us until we have a vaccine."

Some of the information he and the others gave was in response to specific questions.

Arra acknowledged there is fear of COVID-19 being contracted in the workplace, but said there has been no case of the disease being transmitted to a co-worker, except in that first long-term care facility. Masks were not being worn at the time, be said

There is no need to shut down the business and "deep clean" everything if a worker is diagnosed with COVID. He explained that by the time there's a diagnosis, three or four days have passed and time, plus ordinary cleaning, have disinfected the area.

When it comes to effectiveness, Grey County physician Dr. Robert Basilij said if two people are in the same area under six feet from each other for five, 10 or 15 minutes, there's a 90-95 per cent transmission rate for COVID. If the person with COVID is masked, it's 30-40 per cent. If both are masked, the transmission rate drops to 1.5 per cent.

Basilij said there'll be some push-back but masks are an important tool for reopening "without the disaster south of the border."

The general consensus is social distancing and hand washing remain important, but masks have a role to play in keeping numbers down until a vaccine is available.

Giant hogweed can grow up to five metres, has white umbrella-like flowers and many toothy like leaves.

So, when you are out hiking on one of the great nature trails that Temiskaming has to offer please pay close attention to the foliage that may be on or beside the trail that you are hiking on.

Nature hiking trails are so amazing with hidden beauty behind leaves and tree foliage. From multicolored mushrooms to colorful flowers and berries, not to mention birds like the ruffled grouse who will defend its area by puffing up its neck and wings. I had and encounter with one last week and they will react that way when you are close to their nest. It's very interesting to watch especially when you're less than 10 feet away.

It's wonderful exploring nature on trails that exist in Temiskaming, so go out and discover a new plant, animal or just enjoy the atmosphere and the fresh air that nature trails provide.

Also campers love when visitors come to their campsite to visit and have a look around, therefore another reminder to our visitors is that in most campgrounds the speed limit is set at 10 km. One of the reasons for such a low speed is to be on the look out for children playing. They can run across a road at any time.
