CERB recipients being moved to **El program**

DISTRICT - Canadians receiving Canadian Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) payments during the pandemic will see their payments shift to the EI (Employment Insurance) program at the end of this month.

Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota explained the goal of the federal government is that "as the economy begins to restart ... we want to make sure it restarts safely. The federal government wants to make sure all Canadians have access to the support they need. The last thing we want to see is somebody being left behind."

Rota noted the CERB program "has supported about 8.5 million Canadians and their families" since its launch. Many Canadians had to stop working due to the pandemic, or saw their hours reduced "which made it very difficult to sustain themselves," he commented in a telephone interview.

At the end of July the federal government announced Canadians receiving CERB payments would be moved to the EI program, he said.

"The transition was planned from the beginning."

The transition will allow people to be moved between the programs without disruption to their benefits, and with no increase in employment insurance premiums, he said.

The federal government is making a change in the unemployment rate by which calculations are made to determine eligibility for applicants, Rota explained. The new rate of 13.1 per cent is being applied across the country to help Canadians access the support. In Northern Ontario, the rate is 13.5 per cent so the change is not expected to have an impact locally, but

will assist those who are in other regions where there was a better employment rate prior to the pandemic.

"What happens is it creates a floor so everyone can have a certain amount of coverage," Rota said. "The temporary measures will establish entry requirements for El across the country.

"This is just recognizing the pandemic continues to make labour conditions very uncertain and unpredictable across the country, so it's setting a floor."

He explained that the base rate of 13.1 "will help more Canadians access El regular benefits and provide eligible Canadians with access to a minimum of 26 weeks of benefits."

The amount of El payments will depend on the amount of money the individual was earning prior to becoming unemployed.

"Some will qualify for more, some for less. It will depend on what they were earning, but it should be comparable," Rota said.

There are different programs available to help people as they seek reemployment, but they are not through the CERB program, he commented.

Rota noted that he has heard from people who have received CERB funding, and have expressed appreciation for the support.

"It's allowed them to live with some dignity."

Rota said the wage subsidy made available for employers has also worked out well for the region and "allowed employers to stay afloat and allowed them to keep their employees. By subsidizing their wages, the government has allowed employers to Continued on 3a

Armstrong Township hires new bylaw officer

EARLTON - Pete Gilboe is a busy man these days.

Armstrong Township council passed a bylaw for an agreement with Gilboe to supply the township with contract bylaw enforcement services at its August 12 meeting.

They also appointed him as their bylaw enforcement officer.

Gilboe joins Armstrong Township while already providing bylaw enforcement officer services for Latchford, Cobalt and Coleman Township.

"It's pretty much just a similar (agreement) as Coleman Township. He's going to carry out the requirements," said clerk-treasurer Amy Vickery-Menard.

"He's going to wear proper distinguishing clothing to show that he is the bylaw enforcement officer. We're going to pay him an average rate of \$25 an hour, thirty cents per kilometre (travelled). He said he could probably give us approximately four hours per week. We didn't talk about, in this contract, that it would kind of be like on-call, nominated by his partner as needed. It wouldn't be like a guaranteed four hours per week."

Gilboe recently retired from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) where he had an award-winning career as a conservation officer for 31 years.

He brings many years of experience to the position of bylaw enforcement officer and is familiar with the district.

Gilboe started off as a summer student in Temagami in 1984 where he worked at fish and wildlife parks across Ontario until he was hired as a conservation officer in Carleton Place in 1989, where he patrolled the City of Ottawa.

He then transferred to Moosonee in 1993 and worked there for four years before moving on to Sault Ste. Marie in 1997.

Gilboe was chosen as the Ontario Conservation Officer of the Year. He was and friend, Michael Schenk, and was selected to receive the award by a provincial committee comprised of natural resources law enforcement staff, including representatives of the Ontario Conservation Officers Association (OCOA).

He previously received the Queen Elizabeth ll Diamond Jubilee Medal, Peace Officer Exemplary Service Medal, an OCOA Award of Valour and an OCOA Lifesaving Award.

Gilboe has also received a Volunteer of the Year award from Ducks Unlimited Ontario and numerous letters of recognition for his assistance during emergency situations. In 2010, he was awarded the Peace Officer Exemplary Service Medal for 20 years of service as a Conservation Officer.

"We're doing it for a week to give people time to participate in a format that works for them," said Keetha Willard, an organizer of the event and member of the Willard Bus Lines team.

The educational event runs August 24 through 28, and can be accessed through the Timiskaming Health Unit's website at District Road Safety Coalition. timiskaminghu.com.

"I'm hoping that the parents will watch the videos with the child," she said.

She said they'll offer "lots of good messaging" on, for example, the safety zone where kids are visible to drivers and how to behave while on board.

The advice is also something to consider if children walk or bike to school, or caregivers drop them off, she said.

And given the quickly evolving practices surrounding the resumption of school, she said the health unit site offers health and safety information on, for example, the wearing of masks.


The Young Rider's Day has been a pre-school tradition since 2010. It's hosted by the Timiskaming Bus Buddies under the umbrella of the Timiskaming

Temagami pursuing logo protection

TEMAGAMI – Temagami council is looking into how much it would cost the municipality to seek the appropriate legal assistance to move forward with the protection of its name "Temagami" and its logos.

The Municipality of Temagami enjoys recognition as a unique cottage, canoeing and wilderness area and it is becoming common for companies to name products and services using the "Temagami" brand name.

As such, the municipality now feels it is in its best interest to consider seeking protection of the word and its logo as official marks with the understanding that such protection is available to public authorities like a municipality.

Normally geographical names, such as those used by towns, villages and regions, are not available for exclusive use, such as a registered trademark would provide. However, public authorities, such as a municipality, can apply for protection of their name and logo as official marks.

This protection is different from the conventional trademark in that there is no requirement to identify a product line or specific goods or services in the application, and once approval is received, this official mark protection does not have to be renewed.

"When you're looking at a logo, like Temagami Dry was already an established trademark, but whether it's an 'Experience Temagami' or a new logo is developed if we're trying to refresh the image, then we would have a logo or a mark that we could provide protection to," treasurer-ad-

ministrator Craig Davidson said at the August 6 council meeting.

"Not that I think we should be

in the business of buying up a whole bunch of logos, but there is like five or six right now that have been licensed already by different companies for (use by) their business. One that springs to mind is the Temagami Canoe Company does have a copyright on their logo. Anybody that was setting up business in Temagami, or actually anywhere in the world, if they wanted to have Temagami be their brand name, I don't know how much protection we could actually provide saying that you had to be within the municipal boundary in order to be able to use it because it is a regional name. It's more looking at trying to protect the image of Temagami that we're trying to put forward as we work through our strategic plan."

Protecting the name and official marks would better position the municipality to restrain the use of the official marks or marks that would be so close that they could be mistaken for them.

In this way, while not limiting the use of the name, over time, a Temagami brand could emerge through the use of the official mark and logos.

"Right now I haven't done any research as to what the cost would be but we all know that lawyers aren't cheap," Davidson stressed.

Councillor John Shymko commented that one thing he felt council should keep in mind is that the name Temagami is an Anishinaabemowin phrase and that he didn't think it would be in their best interest to "put limitations upon another language's phrase.

"So just bear in mind that we have people who still speak Anishinaabemowin and we should probably take them into consideration as well before we try to put ownership on that," he said

Temagami Mayor Dan O'Mara commented that right now the municipality is just investigating what the logo protection would cost and how it would go forward, "so that's the intent."

Councillor Barret Leudke said that he supports the logo protection initiative and that he encourages "the investigation, in the least, just so that we have an idea.

"I know when you get into trademarking or copywriting a logo and you get into the details of describing the logo, we'll find through your investigation and as a group and have a report back to council, that it's pretty complex," he said.

"It's more so than just saying it's a couple of wind-swept trees, to actually cover it and protect (the logo) well, you have to be very detailed and then other logos that are similar, you could be competing with that description. I have some experience in it myself and I'd offer what I know at a later time, but I'll let the administration do their work. I'm interested in seeing what the costs are to date and what kind of feedback they get when they investigate it."

Council approved a recommendation to seek the appropriate legal assistance to move forward with the protection of the Temagami name and its logos and further that municipal staff report back to council once details have been finalized along with the cost of the initiative.

keep employees. As the economy starts picking up again and it restarts, employers don't have to go looking for new employees. They have them already employed."

Rota said the other program that has worked out well for the region has been the availability of loans to small businesses, allowing them to borrow up to \$40,000. A portion of that loan is forgivable, he explained.

"It gives companies, especially small businesses, that opportunity to get back into a restart mode as the economy starts to pick up."

Rota said the federal government has been adjusting its programs as it learns more about COVID, and those programs will continue to be adjusted.

Those having difficulty with the programs, or other difficulties, are welcomed by Rota to telephone his office in Temiskaming Shores at 705-647-6262, or his North Bay office if they are in the south end of the riding.

"We will help them get through it," he said.

Active travel and healthy lifestyles

Dear editor,

We in public health share the community's grief for the recent tragic deaths of two community members who were cycling and express our deep condolences to the victims' families and others involved. While grieving and processing continue, we understand many are reflecting on active travel and that it might be helpful to share a public health perspective.

Encouraging people to walk and wheel is a really good idea: for the people doing it, for the families whose children play beside or in the streets, for our downtowns, for all of us as we keep working to build communities that are resilient, lively and strong.

For many, the best way to travel in town is in non-motorized ways (e.g. on foot, by bike or scooter known as active travel) or other types of mobility devices.

These types of travel are good for your body, your mood and connect you to others in your community. You sleep better, think more clearly and feel happier. This is all well-known and well-researched.

These ways of moving make sense. Less traffic plugging up the roads in our downtowns, fewer fast-moving vehicles in areas where we want our kids playing outside. Studies of downtown areas where cycling lanes have been added show time and again that business is better when there is more space for people to arrive by ways other than their car.

We are in the midst of a climate crisis, a known public health emergency. One way (of many) to help reduce the impact of this crisis and to lessen how badly our communities will be affected is to reduce the use of gas-powered vehicles.

None of this is new. Streets can be designed to be safe for everyone: people who walk, cycle, take transit, or drive, and people of all ages and abilities. Off-road paths give space for people to travel without being near motorized traffic. Some proven solutions are easy and low-cost, others need a bigger investment now to see the payout over time.

Our communities are moving in the right direction. Municipalities have taken steps to start making roadways safer, and

things like public transit, sidewalks and active travel routes reduce individual car rides and help everyone get around more easily. As the main decision-makers of policy, road and land use, municipalities need all of our support in making this a


As individuals or in groups we can all encourage and support healthy community design. People can also help make roadways safer by following posted speed limits, sharing the road, role modelling active travel, and ensuring young people have the skills to use roads

Workplaces can promote active travel with policies and supports; schools can teach the importance of active travel and encourage young people to walk and wheel to school; even the health sector can promote active travel to patients.

Let's keep working together for transportation systems that meet the needs of everyone for healthy communities in Timiskaming.

Helping Your Child Maintain a Healthy Weight

Parents want their children to grow up healthy, happy and ready to succeed in life. But, childhood obesity is undermining children's health. According to Statistics Canada, almost one third of Canadians aged five to 17 are overweight or obese.

Many of the physical problems associated with being overweight or obese as a child - such as heart disease, diabetes, or arthritis - may not appear until adulthood, but the social and emotional problems start early. Some overweight kids are bullied at school. They often have low self esteem and suffer socially resulting in a higher likelihood that they will experience depression.

TIPS FOR PACKING A HEALTHY LUNCH BOX

Get your kids to help you so that healthy lunches are a family affair.

- Get out the cookie cutters not for cookies, but for sandwiches. Kids love food in shapes. Serve sliced meat rolled up into tubes and offer the bread separate. Tuna
- salad can be offered with crackers. Use leftovers. If your child liked last night's beef stew, serve it up for lunch
- in a thermos after heating it up in the morning. Breakfast for lunch? Pancakes or a sliced boiled egg can be a hit too (remember to put in an ice pack though).
- Fruits and veggies are always a part of a nutritious lunch. To make them more fun, include a dip.

TIPS FOR BEING PHYSICALLY ACTIVE

- On average only 4% of Canadian children take part in enough physical activity. Children need physical activity to build strength, coordination and confidence. All of these characteristics lay the groundwork for leading a healthy lifestyle in the future.
- Children should participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity per
- · Limit the amount of screen time your children have. In fact, if they are younger than 2 years of age, the Canadian Paediatric Society does not recommend any screen time at all. If they're between two and five years of age, the recommendation is one hour per day – that's right, just one
- Be aware of the opportunities your community offers to help your family stay healthy.

Physical activity can include everyday activities like walking the dog, planting a garden, playing tag, building a snowman or tobogganing, and even household chores like sweeping or shoveling the driveway. Be your child's role model and set a positive example by being physically active as

OFFICE REOPENING/OPEN AIR **BURNING PERMITS**



On August 4th, 2020 many municipal buildings and facilities in the City of Temiskaming Shores, including the Fire Administration Office at the Dymond Fire Station, will be reopening to the public.

The Fire Department would like to advise all residents that no member of the public will be permitted to enter the office unless they are wearing a mask or face covering in a manner that covers their nose, mouth and chin. Also, during this time, only one member of the public at a time will be permitted to enter the Fire Department Office until further notice. The City and Fire Department will continue to follow the directions of our Medical Officer of Health in order to help reduce the spread of COVID-19, and we appreciate your everyone's cooperation during these difficult times.

Residents requiring a new Burning Permit may once again obtain a burning permit at City Hall in Haileybury or at the Fire Department Administration office at the Dymond Fire Station at no cost. You may also contact the Fire Department by calling (705) 672-3363 ext. 4702 or 4703 and leave a detailed message and someone will contact you to arrange an inspection. Those residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may still continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open air-burning permit.

Residents are also reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters:

No Day Burning - You may only burn from 6pm – 8am.
Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials - Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that may cause excessive smoke.

Always Stay with Your Fire - A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times.

Respect Your Neighbour - Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility. Control Your Fire - Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't

even consider burning when it is windy.







TEMISKAMING SHORES — Rescuing abandoned, ill, abused and stray animals is an endless task - and a costly one.

A local animal shelter located in New Liskeard called Northern Animals Rescue and Sanctuary (NARS), operated by Jennifer MacKewn, is providing a home, love and comfort to animals.

But the sanctuary itself is in need of help as food, medicine and care don't come cheap.

Lake Temagami resident Reina Lee has taken it upon herself to organize an online auction with all proceeds being donated to NARS on August 22 and 23.

She operates an art gallery on Lake Temagami called Gallery 212 and she is admittedly 100 per cent an animal lover.

The online auction begins at 9 a.m. on August 22 and concludes at 8 p.m. the next day.

"Jennifer MacKewn and the volunteers work very hard to help many, many animals. And not just local ones. The rescue runs on donations and volunteers and now more than ever they need money and donations," said Lee.

All the money raised through the auction will be turned over to NARS to help offset costs of running the shelter, for medicine, food and spay and neuter bills.

She has created a Facebook group where she will host the online auction and post photos and descriptions of donated items.

Lee is currently looking for donations of handmade arts and quality crafts for the auction.

"We already have some magnificent pieces that have been generously donated from different artists including Lori Nawrocki, Lynda Shaw, Debbie Baron and Jeannie Craig Porter."

WHY HOST THE AUCTION?

Lee said the fundraiser serves two purposes:

It raises much needed monies for the purchasing of necessities for the shelter and it offers exposure for the talented artists that generously donate their works of art.


