New initiative offering masks for free

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) -Psst...do you need a mask?

In light of the directive to wear face coverings in indoor public spaces, the Timiskaming Health Unit is partnering with local businesses to set up "mask depots" where people in need can pick up disposable or reusable cloth masks for free.

"Everyone should have the opportunity to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our communities. But for many getting face masks for themselves or their families isn't as easy as it sounds," said Krystal Oviatt, public health promoter at the THU, in a media

"One of the many roles of public health is to be aware of and try to minimize the negative impacts of programming for key population groups," she said.

"We don't want anyone to be restricted by this requirement or to feel stigmatized."

Rabies Awareness

What is rabies?

Rabies is caused by a virus that can infect any mammal, including humans. Birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish do not get rabies. In infected mammals, the virus is found in saliva and can be spread through three

- Bites that break the skin
- Getting infected saliva in an open cut, sore, or other wound
- Getting infected saliva in the mouth, nose, or eyes

The animals that most often transmit rabies in Ontario are bats, foxes, skunks and raccoons. Once signs of rabies appear, in any animal, the disease is virtually always fatal. A series of vaccinations and treatment with rabies antibodies can prevent infection in humans in most cases if administered soon after exposure.

If you're exposed to rabies

If you're exposed to the saliva of a potentially rabid animal:

- wash the bite or scratch with soap and warm water immediately (use hand sanitizer if there's no soap or water nearby)
- call your primary care provider or go to the nearest hospital for treatment right away
- report the bite or scratch to the Timiskaming Health Unit

Symptoms of rabies in people

In adults, signs of rabies will usually appear within 2 to 8 weeks of exposure. In rare cases, it can take one year or longer for signs to appear but this depends on where you were bitten, how bad the bite was and the strain of rabies.

Early symptoms of rabies may include:

- numbness around the site of a bite
- fever
- headache
- feeling sick

Once symptoms of rabies begin to appear, the disease is almost always

The Rabies Vaccine

Rabies can be treated with a vaccine if you seek treatment before symptoms of infection appear. Once symptoms appear, it's too late for treatment.

You will get five shots over 14 days and treatment is much less painful today than in the past.

Reflecting on the struggle of substance abuse

DISTRICT (Staff) - The Pavilion Women's Centre, based in Haileybury, is organizing an event in three locations across the district to recognize International Overdose Awareness Day on Monday, August 31.

Staff from the centre will be just outside the New Liskeard Community Hall, at the Major Holland VC Park in Cobalt on Silver Street, and at the tree in front of 15 Government Road East in Kirkland Lake on Monday, August 31, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. They will be handing out Naloxone kits (used to treat opioid overdoses) and harm reduction supplies at that time.

From August 26 to September 4, members of the public are also welcomed to visit the sites where they can take a ribbon left there for that purpose and tie it around the tree. At that time people are invited to reflect on the struggle many individuals and loved ones experience with substance abuse. The ribbons will remain up until September 4.

"We hope that this event reduces the stigma and judgement towards those who use substances and reminds us all that we are all human," Pavilion Women's Centre executive director Melanie Ducharme stated in a press release.

In a telephone interview, she said that she believes "it's important that harm reduction supplies and (Naloxone) kits are available in as many places as possible."

The Pavilion Women's Centre is also asking individuals to anonymously share their story or pay tribute to their loved ones as a way to remind others that they are not alone in their journey. Submissions can be made online at https://www.facebook. com/pavwc.

Ducharme commented in the press release, "While it is difficult to host large public gatherimportant to us that we take a moment to acknowledge the challenges many of our community members are facing around substance use, the pain and grief that families experience and the role that substance use plays in violence against

She later commented that the Pavilion Women's Centre sees "higher levels of (substance abuse) in coercive relationships."

She added that there are also some women that the centre sees who use substances, and the Naloxone kits will help to ensure their safety.

She added that there are others in the community "who just have family members who are experiencing addiction." The kits are also for them.

The Pavilion Women's Centre offers services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and to women in crisis. It also offers crisis support 24 hours per day through its toll free crisis support line, and short-term shelter for women and children, as well as counings due to COVID-19, it was selling services for women and children who have experienced physical, sexual and emotional violence or abuse.

New foot care clinic steps forward

TEMISKAMING SHORES -Registered practical nurse Kim Campbell has opened her own foot care clinic in Temiskaming Shores

Based at the Scott Chiropractic Health Centre at the Quality Inn building in Dymond Township, the service runs from Monday to Thursday.

Campbell brings her existing clientele to the new business, and is also accepting new clients.

She is affiliated with the Timiskaming Diabetes Program and can accept referrals from health care professionals to assist those who are diabetic and want foot care.

She started recalling clients on June 23 and worked steadily for three weeks to help clients who had not received foot care from the time of the onset of the pandemic, she related. She is now at the point where clients are returning for repeat appointments, and she has room on her schedule for new clients.

Campbell held an official ribbon-cutting ceremony August 7. She was welcomed by the Temiskaming Shores and Area Chamber of Commerce, the City of Temiskaming Shores, and the office of MPP John Vanthof.

Campbell related that in addition to her background as a registered practical nurse, she has taken speciality courses to provide advance and diabetic foot care

"I'm dealing with people who have diabetes, the elderly, and people who have issues with their feet," she said.

All the equipment used in her practice is autoclaved and sterilized at the hospital, she noted, to meet required standards.

Campbell will assess clients' feet for issues such as deformities, callouses, corns, ingrown toenails and thickened nails.

"I can take care of all of that," she said.

Campbell encourages people to pay attention to their feet, even before problems begin to be noticed.

She noted that for some people, as they get older, they can't bend over to look after their feet, "so coming to see someone is beneficial" to ensure their feet are still well

For most people, "they worry about their hair, their clothing, or the type of shoes they are wearing, but then they forget about their feet, but that's the basis of our health structure." Knees, hips, and backs can be affected if the feet have problems, she explained, "so if you don't take good care of your feet you can end up with issues later on in your life."

Campbell took her most recent upgrading course in the fall of 2019, and was doing home visits when she was approached by the Timiskaming Diabetes Program to see if she would see patients in a clinic setting, she explained.


Another nurse had been providing the service, which was known as Foot Wellness, but that nurse closed her business recently, creating an opportunity for Campbell to open her footcare business after she received the go-ahead from the Timiskaming Health Unit.



TORONTO (Special) - The Temiskaming Shores Police Services Board has received funding for enhanced drug and street crime enforcement.

The grant will offset the salary of an officer who will be designated as the detachment mental health liaison.

Small confined fires for cooking and warmth, that comply with the regulations and are contained to your own property, or a property in which an individual has permission to use, are exempt from requiring a Fire Permit under the Open Air Burning By-law No. 13-23.

HILLIARDTON — Bird banders at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre (HMREC) are getting a bird's eye view of the fall mi-

The fall migration of birds, flying from the northern hemisphere to the south, is in full swing at the HMREC, located in Hilliard Township.

gration, which began at the Marsh on August 1 and runs until the end of

The marsh serves as an important stopover for migrating birds.

Birds can find places to rest and eat on their long journeys to the Southern United States and further afield.

STATION

November.

The bird banding station at the Hilliardton Marsh is just one of three in Northern Ontario - the other two are located near Thunder Bay.

Normally, banding season is open to the public but because of COVID-19 the Marsh is closed, except for group bookings.

"We are offering group online bookings for now of up to 10 people at a cost of \$30 each until the end of August," noted expert bird bander Bruce Murphy.

HMREC recently welcomed a group from Timmins.

He noted the bird banders at the marsh have so far banded 4,450 birds in 2020 with 1,700 this month alone.

"There are four times as many birds passing through in the fall because they have babies with an average of four chicks per nest," noted Murphy.

A surprise opportunity landed when two black-billed cuckoos were banded bringing the total number ever banded at the Marsh to eight.

"Two in one year is unusual," said bander Chris Shulka.

When describing the 2020 banding season Shulka noted the spring migration was slow because of "strange weather patterns. It was warm early and the birds shot right over us. Then it turned cold in May and then warmer again and they shot right over us again. It was a hit and miss season of banding. The species we are seeing are warblers, vireos, thrushes, hummingbirds and rose breasted grosbeaks so far this fall."

Bird banding is a valuable tool in studying migration patterns and the conservation of birds while teaching citizen scientists about the wonders of birds.

Bird banding involves the capture of migratory birds in mist nets and retrieving them to take measurements such as species, sex, age, weight and general health. A bander applies a tiny numbered band to the bird's leg and then the bird is released back into the wild. If the bird is ever re-caught at the same station or elsewhere, researchers can use that data to learn how birds survive and their migration routes.

BANDERS

Former Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation-sponsored intern Sarah Manderstrom left the marsh to be closer to her family during the COVID-19 pandemic, which proved a boon to university student Doug Manners who arrived from finishing his studies just in time to step into her role as the intern at the Marsh.

"Doug will be with us until June of 2021," noted Murphy. "He is familiar with the Marsh because he was a ranger crew leader a few years ago. We could not have asked for a better cohort this year."

And because of COVID-19 pandemic safety measures, the Marsh has had to limit the number of volunteers participating at the banding facility this year.

Julia Turner is another volunteer bander working alongside Murphy, Shulka, Manners and Joanne Goddard.

A big disappointment for the Marsh banders was the cancellation of the annual Hummingbird Garden Party where adults and children could see hummingbirds up close and learn about them and monarch butterflies which hopefully leads to a lifelong interest in birds and insects. The marsh continues to band hummingbirds and tend to the lush hummingbird garden, which has grown exponentially this summer.

Volunteers Jane MacLaughlin and Deborah Murray "do a fabulous job of managing the garden and next year we will have some new activities to offer visitors," noted Murphy.




