Funding hitting the road in South Temiskaming

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Almost \$8 million in funding has been announced for a new bridge and busing in South Temiskaming.

The Larose bridge in Coleman, which links the township to the north end of Cobalt, will be rebuilt, at a total cost of \$4.8 million.

The Temiskaming Transit system will receive \$3.12 million over 10 years for five new buses as well as improvements to bus shelters and a modernized fare payment system.

"This is going to get people where they want to go, when they want to get there," said Vic Fedeli, Nipissing MPP and Ontario's minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade.

But the support wouldn't have been possible without "the partnership and collaboration" of the federal, provincial and municipal governments, Fedeli said.

He was among the provincial, federal and municipal leaders who took part from a variety locations in the funding announcement August 28.

What is Gout and What Can You Do to Better Manage or Prevent it?

What is Gout?

Gout is a type of arthritis caused by a surplus of uric acid in the body. This excess can trigger the formation of urate crystals in joints, cartilage, tendons, and bones, causing inflammation, swelling and pain.

While many people associate gout with being overweight, and this does increase your risk, but gout is also linked to kidney disease, drinking large amounts of alcohol, and eating foods that are high in purines (e.g. meats. seafood, peas, beans, lentils, spinach). The risk of getting gout increases with age and men are at a higher risk than women.

Treating gout involves a two-pronged approach that combines medications and lifestyle changes. Medications for gout ease the pain and inflammation of acute attacks and control uric acid levels to prevent future attacks.

Adopting healthy lifestyle habits is a key part of an effective gout treatment plan. Eating a healthy diet, getting regular physical activity and losing weight (if needed) can lower your risk of repeat gout attacks, as well as the chances of developing heart disease, which is common in people with gout.

Developing a lifelong eating strategy that focuses on following a hearthealthy diet should be the goal for people with gout. This diet includes all of the food groups, especially vegetables, whole grains, plant proteins such as nuts and legumes and low-fat dairy.

The following foods are known to trigger gout attacks:

- Red meat and organ meats (liver, tongue and sweetbreads)
- Shellfish such as shrimp and lobster
- Sugary beverages
- Excessive alcohol (more than one alcoholic drink for women and two for men within 24 hours)

Physical Activity and Weight Management

Being physically active is an important part of managing weight, but getting started on losing weight or being active isn't always easy. A health care provider can help set realistic goals and choose appropriate exercise.

Hive removal sees workers bee-ing diligent

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A heavy presence of honey bees at one of the pumps behind the New Liskeard Husky/Esso station on Highway 11 resulted in a very careful and conservation-minded effort to relocate them.

The bees had settled in one of the vertical pipes which comprised one of the columns under the canopy behind the truck

Wagg's Petroleum Equipment Ltd., which had constructed the pumping area 13 years ago, was called in from North Bay.

Angelo Collinassi and Maurice Montreuil arrived on scene August 13 to attempt to locate and remove the beehive.

Local beckeeper Felicity Buckell also took part in the effort, and brought bee suits if they were needed.

An electrician was also called in later to turn off the power to the pillar area.

A Toronto trucker, who was refuelling his truck when the bee removal efforts were underway, commented that about ten days earlier, the site had been alive with bees.

"It was (like) the Pearson no one got stung. International Airport," the trucker (who did not wish to be identified) commented, "They weren't aggressive. They were just on a mission."

The Husky/Esso had put up fences around the pump as well banging on the pipe, and alas a sign warning people about



EDITORIAL

Without judgment

There is a public health crisis happening in our country and communities that came before the COVID-19 pandemic and in many ways will last long after the pandemic

And it will likely continue to take the lives of thousands of people and destroy families and entire communities.

We are dealing with an overdose and opioid epidemic of huge proportion.

Overdose Awareness Day on August 31 was a day to remind us of the seriousness of the situation when it comes to the overdose crisis in Ontario.

We know that the people who use drugs are our family members, friends and coworkers.

We have seen how quick-

ly governments have pooled resources and funding to address COVID-19 in hospitals, at health units and in public places.

The speed at which public health and governments have acted in terms of the virus clearly indicates it can and should happen the same way when dealing with addiction.

Deaths from drug use are entirely preventable and if enough action is taken lives can be saved and people can go on to lead healthy, happy lives.

Since 2016, 15,000 Canadians have died from overdoses and the death toll continues to rise.

Understanding and compassion goes a long way when people feel heard and respected, not judged and demonized.

We are all in this together.

Remains of missing hiker found southeast of Latchford

- Human remains found near Latchford late last month have been identified as those of a missing hiker
from Pickering.

Temiskaming OPP say that remains located August 25 have been identified as Raymond Chan, 60.

Chan was reported to have last been seen in the Latchford area in December after embarking on a cross-country hike late in the year.

Foul play is not suspected, said Constable Jennifer Smith, commun-

ity safety and media relations officer at the Temiskaming OPP detachment.

Temiskaming OPP say they were informed that Chan was missing July 20.

On August 25, human remains were found southeast of Latchford in a search effort involving members of the detachment, the OPP Aviation Service and the OPP Emergency Response Team.

Identification was made following a post-mortem examination at the Centre of Forensic Sciences in Toronto August 31.

Investigation is continuing, and involves the Temiskaming OPP, the OPP crime Unit and OPP Forensics Identification Services Unit.

Temagami throwing its support behind canoe project

TEMAGAMI – There is a group that is working to create a landmark in Temagami - a 50-foot long canoe, which would become the world's largest wood canvas canoe.

Temagami council agreed to support the project in principle at its Thursday, August 27, meeting.

The municipality has worked with the Ontario Ministry of Transportation and have a potential location for the canoe in front of the train station.

Temagami's understanding is that there is sufficient community interest in the project that all the costs will be covered through donations.

Since the municipality would be the benefactor of this project, donations made through the municipal office are eligible for a tax receipt that can be used by the donor as permitted by the Income Tax Act.

'The whole idea of the 50-foot canoe was that the community would get behind it and it wouldn't actually cost the municipality anything," treasurer-administrator Craig Davidson said at the Aug. 27 meeting.

"Municipalities are able, through the Income Tax Act, to issue receipts for donations to municipal projects. Any costs for the project would be paid out of the donations received and if there's cost overruns, then the organizers need to figure out how that's going to be paid."

In order to ensure these costs and donations are segregated from the rest of municipal operations, Davidson noted that council had a pair of options.

They could set up a reserve account or a trust fund for the project.

A trust fund would have a separate audit, at an additional cost, while a reserve account would be included with the accounts examined during the annual financial audit.

Council agreed to establish a reserve account for the purpose of receiving donations from the community for the canoe project and that costs for the project would be paid through those funds.

TEMISKAMING SHORES -The Temiskaming Shores Public Library plans to reopen in its new location Tuesday, September 8.





Inspection of MNRF-Approved Prescribed Burn Plan for Slash Pile Burning - Temagami Management Unit

As part of our ongoing efforts to regenerate and protect Ontario's forests, some recently harvested areas have been selected to be burned under the guidelines of the MNRF's *Prescribed Burn Manual*. The prescribed burn will reduce the area covered in slash piles while increasing the area available for regeneration and reducing the fire hazard. The burn is scheduled for ignition between **October 1**, 2020 and **December 31**, 2020.

The approved prescribed burn plan for slash pile burning, including specific locations and maps, is available electronically for public inspection by contacting First Resource Management Group (FRMG) and on the Ontario government website at www.ontario.ca/forestplans until March 31, 2021, when the Annual Work Schedule expires


