For safety's sake

Cobalt municipal office doors staying closed

COBALT - Cobalt council is asking residents to be patient with the fact that the municipal office door remains closed.

At Cobalt's regular council meeting Tuesday, September 15, Cobalt discussed concerns that have been raised from the public that the municipal office door remains locked, although staff continue working inside.

A few residents have asked why they cannot go into the municipal office to pay bills.

One resident noted payment of a bill through the mail costs \$1 per mailing.

Councillor Angela Adshad expressed ongoing concern for the safety of their staff members, and noted that the municipal office is a small space, and that the town cannot afford to have a staff member off on sick leave at this time. The administrative staff currently

in the office number three when ordinarily it's a complement of four. With a limited staff in the office at this time, and a small workspace for them, coun-

cil is being protective of their health during the COVID-19 pandemic, it was noted during the council meeting.

The question of installing a lockbox

something that everyone would be touching.

Obtaining a lockbox had been discussed previously, but council was unsure whether any steps were taken toward obtaining one.

Council is not interested in obtaining a lockbox at this time, however.

"It is definitely something we could entertain down the road," said Adshead.

"Right now there are several methods people can use to pay their bills," said Mayor George Othmer, adding that the current system is working and bill payments are coming in.

The discussion arose primarily from a letter written by a resident complaining about the situation and the cost of mailing a bill.

Councillor Bill Gabbani acknowledged that the resident is angry, but noted that residents can also make bill payments through their financial institutions.

Councillor Pat Anderson also acknowledged that people are complaining because they can't enter the municipal office, but she said that she explained the situation to one resident who "was very understanding," once the town's concerns were outlined.

Latchford to install stop signs to combat speeding

LATCHFORD – Latchford council approved a bylaw to erect stop signs at the corner of Mortson Avenue and King Street at its regular meeting on Tuesday, September 15.

Council feels that installing the stop signs will help to slow the rate of speed along King Street.

"I think it'll be very effective,"

Councillor Mike Brooks said.

Council had previously received a letter from a resident of King Street who felt the rate of speed of vehicles driving by was too high and they were concerned for children's safety.

The town will install two of the stop signs at the corner of Mortson Avenue and King Street right now, although public works foreman Roger Clark

had received a quote for four of them, if need be.

Council also agreed the town would put up a pair of "Slow down for children" signs at the laneways near the playground area on King Street.

"So you're looking at a couple hundred dollars for those four stop signs and then for the slow down for children sign," clerk-treasurer Jaime Allen said.

Chamberlain setting standards

CHAMBERLAIN TOWNSHIP - Chamberlain Township is preparing a property standards by-law, along with a power of entry bylaw.

The township discussed the need for the bylaws at its regular council meeting and also gave both bylaws first reading.

This will give the public a chance to review the bylaws themselves and comment before they receive second and third reading and are finalized.

Reeve Kerry Stewart commented at the council meeting September 1 that the township does have some problem areas that it would like to get cleared up.

Stewart explained that property standards would be acted upon if there were a complaint about a specific site.

The municipality would be interested in properties where

there are concerns that threaten other properties, such as environmental considerations, or sites where items are not fully stored on a private property and overflow onto a municipal road, or an area where a beaver dam is impeding use of adjoining properties, it was explained during the council meeting.

Among the issues addressed in the bylaw is the storage of motor vehicles and boats that are inoperative and are going to be wrecked or dismantled. However, that portion of the bylaw does provide for some exemptions.

In the proposed bylaw it is noted that the township does provide amnesty days at its disposal site.

“We’re not out to have everyone have a pristine place, but when it gets to a certain point that’s when we have to step in,” said public works superintendent Jon Schenk.

Straightening out a parking problem

ENGLEHART - The Town of Englehart is going to look at eliminating angle parking on Fourth Avenue in 2021.

Englehart Public Works Superintendent Ryan Vickery told council that consideration is being given to the possibility of putting in a curb and a sidewalk along the north side of that street between Second Street and Third Street. Vehicles would then be allowed to parallel park on that side of the street.

Speaking at council’s regular meeting Wednesday, August 26, Mayor Nina Wallace explained that problems are arising for people using the angle parking. She said there are times when there is a lack of visibility when attempting to back out into the traffic from an angle parking

position.

Councillor Jerry Mikovitch agreed that problems are emerging.

He noted one incident where a car with a canoe on the roof used the angle parking, resulting in the canoe extending into the area where traffic would be passing.

“That’s our truck route,” he pointed out, emphasizing the need to ensure space on the roadway.

Vickery added that vehicles have gotten bigger since the time the angle parking was first established on Fourth Avenue.

He said the project will be looked at in 2021. He noted that the drainage on that side of the street will have to be worked into the project, along with a possible raised slab. The project is “going to be a little costly,” he said.

Lakeshore Road safety

Speeding drivers are a major concern for the people living along Lakeshore Road in New Liskeard and Haileybury.

Several residents have taken to social media voicing their concerns about people speeding along the stretch entering New Liskeard.

They say drivers are ignoring speed limit signs and driving at high rates of speed.

They are also concerned about children living in the area crossing the street to get to bus stops as school is back in.

And still others are concerned about people not using the left lane as a passing lane only.

There are various ways to improve public safety with regards to this stretch of highway.

Having an increased police presence would slow traffic down along that stretch of roadway and installing LED speed indicator signs letting drivers know just how fast they are going plus educational campaigns advising drivers of double-lane usage would help.

A sign of strong leadership is to recognize a problem before it becomes an emergency.

A flock of 500 or so Canada geese passed over me as I sat in my canoe on a glass-like northern lake.

They flew right through a brilliant rainbow after a dark cloud drenched the landscape with rain.

I managed to paddle fast enough to get off the lake just as the torrential rain fell.

Sweater weather has arrived and I am still on the lake.

The lake water is turning over now and it is darker and moodier looking.

Thankfully, the COVID-19 pandemic hasn't stopped the fall bird migration or my daily canoe outings.

I am on the lake in the outdoors for my health and wellness, plain and simple.

And in this current pandemic mode, health and wellness is on everyone's minds.

It has been absolutely wonderful to see so many people, especially families, getting outside during this pandemic discovering their own regions.

Besides humans, birds and animals need the life-giving Boreal forests to nurture and raise their young. However, we know there is a poisonous, possibly cancer-causing herbicide being aurally sprayed around our region.

Hundreds of hectares of the Boreal forest are sprayed each summer with Roundup and its active herbicide glyphosate.

And yet in my absolute joy about what nature offers us in this beautiful region I call Wild Temiskaming, I have a real concern with chemical aerial spraying.

We know aerial herbicide spraying is used by forest managers to control vegetation so competing species can be controlled.

Why aren't students being hired to clear-cut areas on the ground instead of using a potentially deadly chemical?

The fact is Americans claiming it causes cancer have successfully sued the makers of Roundup. The herbicide is now banned in several U.S. states.

Is a "safe pesticide" an oxymoron?

Passing the pandemic by exploring the past

COBALT/COLEMAN TOWNSHIP - Exploring history online, or walking it on foot, are two ideal ways to pass time during the pandemic.

Ever since moving to Cobalt five years ago from Southern Ontario, Maggie Wilson and her partner Reiner Mielke have been immersing themselves in projects relating to the story of the Cobalt Mining Camp.

Wilson is now president of the Cobalt Historical Society.

During the pandemic, she has been researching and weaving more of the pieces into the story of Cobalt's past.

At the same time, Mielke has been on the Silver Heritage Trail, along with Reg Holdsworth of the Cobalt Mining Museum, ensuring trails are clear and safe for the many visitors taking advantage of a great pandemic activity -exploring the Silver Heritage Trail and visiting the many historic mining sites along the way.

To add to the experience this year, Kyle Audette of the Teck Park Recreation Program, in partnership with the Lions Club of Cobalt and Coleman, has organized a scavenger hunt for participants, and included geocaching sites along the trail.

Maps for self-guided tours of the Silver Heritage Trail are provided in a kiosk in front of the Cobalt Mining Museum.

Wilson has a "dream team" of contacts for her research work, which includes people like Charlie Angus, Brian Dobbs of the Haileybury Heritage Museum, and Rocky Larocque whose expertise focuses on areas like Matabitchuan, the Montreal River, and area hydro installations.

Recently Angus posted that a painting by Sir Frederick Banting, titled *Cobalt 1932*, is going up on auction at Cowley Abbott Fine Art in Toronto on September 24. The painting could sell for up to \$35,000, according to the auction house's post.

Wilson added the information on the Cobalt Historical Society Facebook page, ensuring people are aware of the interesting art news relating to Cobalt.

Wilson noted that Banting created several paintings of the Cobalt area.

DOORS TO THE PAST

The Cobalt Historical Society

recently received a donation of a painting by Reverend Ernest Gilmour Smith from the estate of Jim Bailey.

Smith was an important figure from the Cobalt area's past, as well as an accomplished artist. His adulthood began with a three-year period in France during World War I where he received a serious shoulder injury. He continued his education after returning from the war and was ordained and served in Manitoba and the mining camps in the north before coming to Cobalt.

While in Cobalt Smith held the position of president of the Kiwanis Club, and formed the committee which preserved the Dr. William Henry Drummond fireplace as a cairn, and planted trees by Drummond's home near Kerr Lake. Smith organized the Cobalt Art Club and an art exhibition that included entries by A.Y. Jackson, Banting, Ernest Sawford-Dye, George Cassidy, Carol Cole, as well as Smith. He helped organize the Kiwanis Temiskaming Music Festival, and was the business manager for Camp Lorraine. When Smith moved to Timmins he organized a music festival for that community.

"The man was a dynamo," Wilson commented.

Wilson has also been helping others in their genealogical searches.

"Other people are also going through the same sort of lockdown around the world, so they're turning to their roots and doing research projects, so I'm getting lots of interesting requests from them," she explained.

An interesting contact came from the Trethewey family who have been researching their ancestor William Trethewey who was the prospector who discovered a major silver vein during the early days of the Cobalt silver boom.

"It was neat to make that connection because in my mind Trethewey was one of the big names in the Cobalt story," said Wilson.

She had an exciting moment one day when viewing a YouTube posting by Angus of some early Cobalt photographs. Wilson had earlier been contacted by a man researching the life of his grandfather Jules Alexandre Castonguay. Castonguay was a photographer who achieved fame for his work, particularly while in Ottawa. He left Ottawa in 1904 to prospect in Cobalt, and decided to pay his way by taking pictures, Wilson said.

A fire resulted in the loss of most of his photographs but through assistance from Dobbs and the Haileybury Heritage Museum, some have been located which connect Castonguay to the area, including Latchford and the Montreal River.

Wilson related that one day Angus posted a video which at one point zoomed into a photograph showing a sign on the wall of the Prospect Hotel in 1907 advertising Castonguay's photography business.

"For me it just jumped off the page and that was really exciting."

Currently she is working on a project relating to New Liskeard turn-of-the-century lawyer Albert Norton Morgan. Recently the Cobalt Historical Society received two large boxes of Morgan's letters from an antiques dealer. Wilson is now curating and digitizing the letters.

C.M. FLOWER

Another interesting person from the past was Caroline Ma-ben Flower, a lady prospector and musician. Wilson contacted a few of Flower's family members who had researched her story. She was born in the United States and was musical, adventurous, and determined to achieve wealth and fame.

Flower obtained a musical education in Berlin, and set about promoting her music. At the same time she was looking for a wealthy husband. The problem was that Flower wasn't that great as a musician. She bought a large brownstone home in Manhattan, but "got herself into some financial hot water."

To make ends meet, and to furnish her home, Flower posed as a chambermaid at a large hotel, where she stole silverware

Protect Against the Flu

Getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever this year to protect yourself, your family, and your community from flu.

What is the Difference between the Flu and COVID-19?

Influenza (Flu) and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses. COVID-19 is caused by infection with a new coronavirus (called SARS-CoV-2) and flu is caused by infection with influenza viruses.

Both COVID-19 and the flu can have varying degrees of signs and symptoms, ranging from no symptoms (asymptomatic) to severe symptoms. Common symptoms that COVID-19 and flu share include:

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue (tiredness)
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle pain or body aches
- Headache

Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

Because many of the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone, and testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis.

Tips to Avoid Getting and Spreading the Flu and COVID-19:

- Wash your hands often
- Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- Don't touch your face
- Stay at home when you're sick
- Wear a mask when unable to maintain a 6-foot distance from anyone outside your bubble
- Clean (and disinfect) surfaces and shared items

Flu shot clinic dates will be held in various locations throughout the District of Temiskaming – watch for further details from the Temiskaming Health Unit. The Temagami Family Health Team will be hosting drive-thru flu clinics in October. Watch for further details specific to dates and times. Appointments will be required so please call the office at (705) 569-3244 to schedule yours.

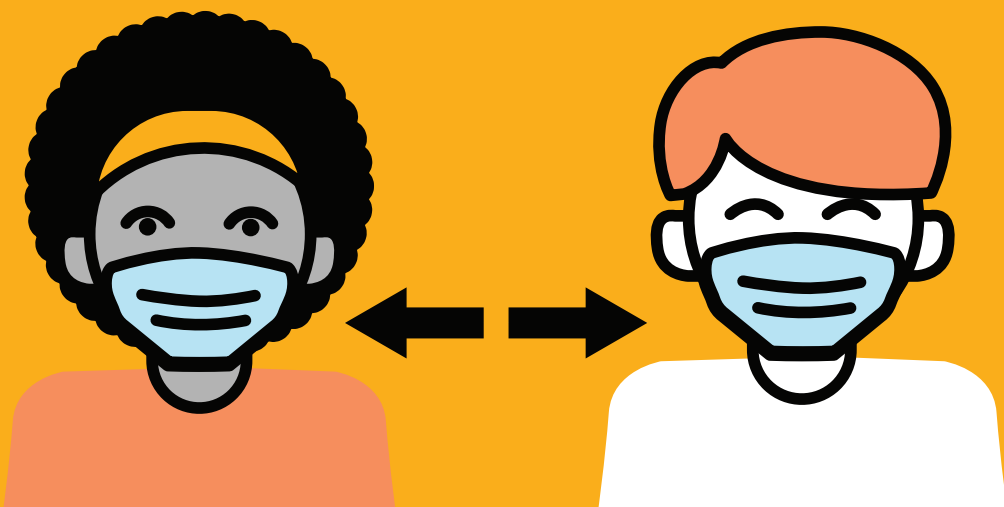

High monthly maintenance fees for elevators

ENGLEHART - Englehart Councillor Jerry Mikovitch raised a concern over the lift at the Englehart and Area Historical Museum.

Fundraising has been taking place to get a new lift or elevator installed in the building, but Mikovitch pointed out a cost that should be considered.

At Englehart's regular council meeting August 26, Mikovitch inquired about a line on the town's monthly financial report.

An amount of \$1,468.48 is listed for the maintenance fees on the elevator at the Englehart and Area Community Arena Complex.

Mikovitch first asked if it is a monthly fee, and that was confirmed.

Mikovitch noted that there have been efforts to secure money to install a new elevator at the museum, but "then there

is the cost every month just to have it maintained."

Council did not further discuss the point, but now it has been pointed out by Mikovitch for budgetary consideration when moving forward with the elevator project at the museum.

The elevator would replace a lift that has connected three floors of the old school building, all of which contain displays.

There is a main stairway leading upstairs to community displays, and there is a smaller stairway leading down to local agriculture and similar industrial displays.

The lift formerly installed in the building stopped working a few years ago after a malfunction. Since that time efforts have been slow in raising funds to replace it.

The museum has been closed during 2020 due to the pandemic.

and linens. Eventually she was caught, but managed to run away. She ended up in Cobalt.

Wilson said she has found documentary proof of Flower's time in Cobalt, where she prospected and also performed on stage. She was also in Porcupine during the gold rush.

Wilson speculates that the lifestyle wore Flower out. She returned to New York State where

she lived with her sister until she died in 1917 in her 40s.

These are only some of the interesting stories Wilson is researching, and the people who made up the story of Cobalt's past.

Practicing air search and rescue

EARLTON - That large airplane in the sky over the weekend was not cause for making your way down to the basement with a month of food and water.

In fact, the visit of the Hercules is always good news for the area, as the Canadian Air Force Search and Rescue squad is in the air and practicing the skills to respond when they are needed.

Temiskaming Search and Rescue (TemSAR) is a local civilian group that also practiced Saturday, September 12, when the Hercules and its military crew were in the area. It's part of TemSAR's evaluation process required every two years.

The evaluation helps ensure TemSAR is operationally ready and able to perform tasks required during search and rescue operations, explained zone director Lesley Tomblin.

"We passed and we're very happy," she said of the evaluation.

The weekend activities, which were based at the Earlington-Timiskaming Regional Airport,

were unique because the military used both the Hercules and a Griffon helicopter, so the day's activities were extended from the morning evaluation into an afternoon of spotter training from the Hercules and a familiarization ride aboard the Griffon from some of the TemSAR members.

The military was on site doing a practice search and rescue scenario in which TemSAR participated. SARtech (Search and Rescue technician) paramedics were on board the Hercules and jumped to a mock site that depicted a scene where a plane was crashed and there were two survivors. One of the survivors was transported to hospital and another was taken to hospital by a private vehicle.

"It was a major search scenario," said Tomblin. "We were all out looking for a locator device which is called a PLB (personal locator beacon)." TemSAR set up the site in preparation for the training exercise.

Captain Marty Zimmer was in charge of assigning tasks to the participants.

TemSAR currently has 12 members who train to be ready

to assist if there are actual plane crashes in the region.

"If there were a plane crash in our area, like there was in Timmins last year, we can get called out to support (the military search and rescue crew)."

Tomblin has been out on three actual exercises in the past year, she noted. TemSAR also frequently sets up mock sites for the Hercules and crew to practice search and rescue.

People interested in air search and rescue are invited to apply. The CASARA website includes an application form.

Those who join the TemSAR unit could be trained as a spotter, or a ground person, or as a navigator.

TemSAR also welcomes any interested pilots with planes to join them.

"We would be glad to take on another pilot or two with planes," said Tomblin.

Providing support and helping with actual searches is what the TemSAR unit trains toward, said Tomblin.

"You don't want to see a plane crash ever," she said, but when they do, TemSAR works toward being able to do its part.

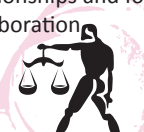



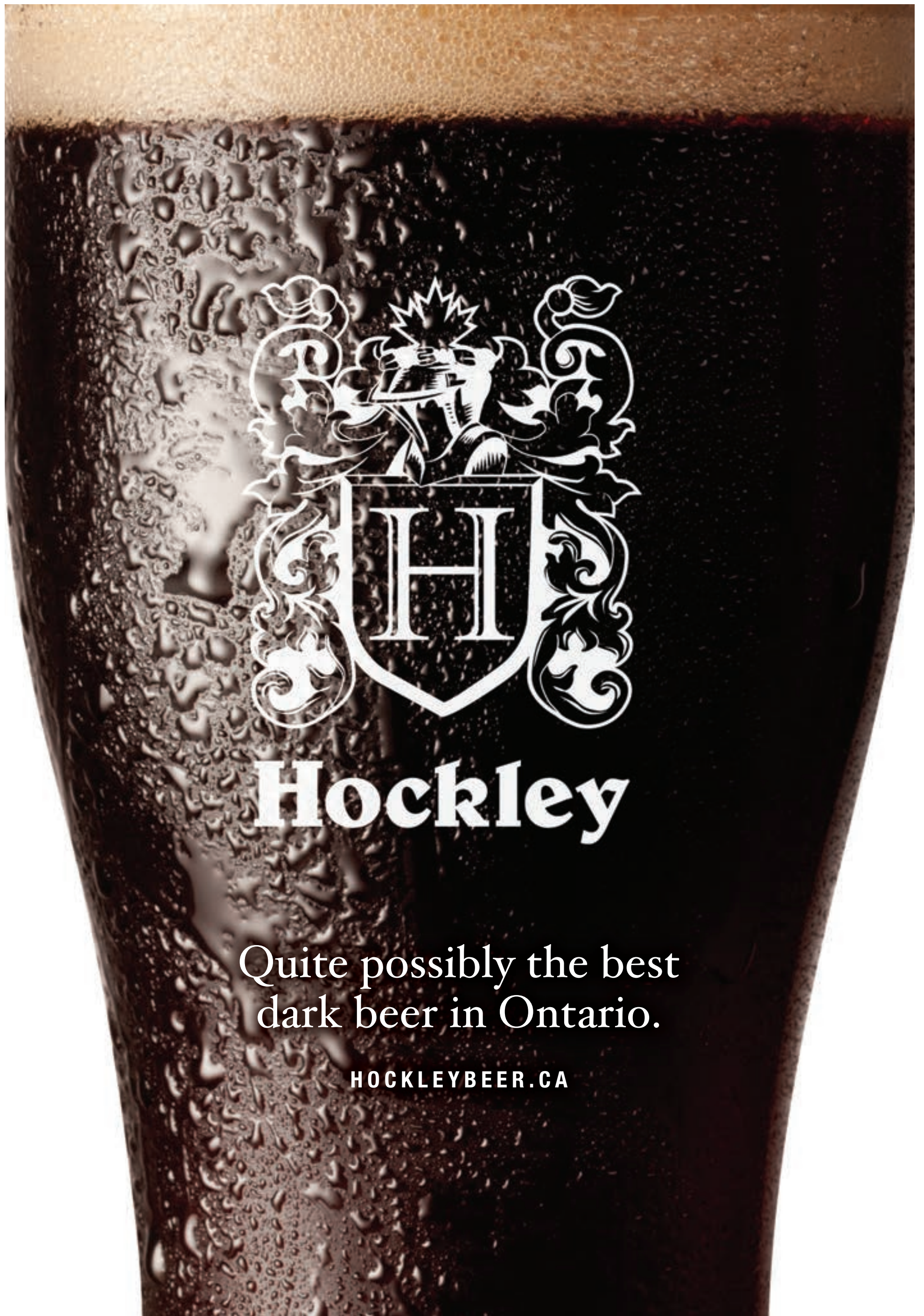
