Councillor wants **Carnegie** building discussion reopened

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Temiskaming Shores council will be considering whether it wants to revisit its decision on calling for tenders for the sale of the Carnegie building in downtown New Liskeard.

Councillor Patricia Hewitt has given a notice of motion that she would like council to consider whether it is willing to review its decision on the building which housed the New Liskeard branch of the Temiskaming Shores Public Library.

The motion at the city's October 6 council meeting will ask only if council is willing to review its decision.

If council approves revisiting the de-

cision, the actual discussion about the building will take place later in October. Hewitt's interest in reopening the discussion opened a review of the city's

procedural bylaw, and the changes that were recently implemented in the bylaw. Hewitt had been absent from the council meeting when the decision was made to sell the building. Under the former guidelines of the procedural bylaw, a decision made by council cannot be revisited in that same calendar year unless one of the voting council members decides to reopen the issue for reconsideration.

Under the revised bylaw, however,

Hewitt can bring a motion to the table his consent to the motion. Kidd did give his consent to allowing the question to be brought to the council table.

A majority vote to reconsider the decision would be needed before the matter could proceed to the next council meeting where discussion would be held and a vote would be taken again on whether the city intends to sell the Carnegie building.

Hewitt noted that the city received to have it reviewed if the mayor gives a letter from the Ontario Centre for Archaeological Research and Education (OCARE), and that letter has been since revised and has "new information" which deserves to be considered.

> The revised letter was sent by OCARE chair Ryan Primrose on August 28, while council's decision to proceed with selling the Carnegie building was taken on August 11.



ESCSM challenged by leaky roof and damaged gym floor

TEMISKAMING SHORES — A major hail storm and heavy downpours have seen water pour into classrooms, hallways and the gymnasium at Ecole secondaire catholique Sainte-Marie (ESCSM) in New Liskeard.

The extensive damage to the school's gym floor has caused the school to seek out other facilities in the region to host gym classes.

"We had a bad hail storm at the beginning of July and our roof sustained damages and this is causing problems," said ESCSM principal Annik

"Our gymnasium floor has been damaged and will need to be redone so we are going to use the New Liskeard Community Hall as our gym. The amount of rain we've had lately isn't helping either," she said in a telephone interview.

She reached out to Temiskaming Shores council to ask for permission to use the New Liskeard Community Hall to

host gym classes for her Grades 9 to 12 students.

"We have some classrooms right now that we are using for strength training and physical activity, but the students will be able to actually play games at the Community Hall, with all social distancing and COVID-19 precautionary measures in place."

All of the damage to the school's roof and gym floor is covered under insurance, noted the principal.

"A contractor was to begin repairs to the roof ... on September 14 but because it has been wet and rainy that has been backed up," noted Boucher. "The roof repairs depend on dry conditions. We have been flexible and adapted our schedules to this challenging situation."

CITY APPROVAL

At its regularly scheduled council meeting September 15, the City of Temiskaming Shores directed staff to prepare a bylaw to lease the New Liskeard Community Hall from September 21 to December 18 to Sainte-Ma-



Councillor Mike McArthur noted the use of the community hall by the students would not interfere with other user groups.

The estimated completion date of the school gym repairs is December 2020. The lease with the city includes an option to extend the lease agreement up to an additional 120 days at a cost of \$1,000 per 30 days, accompanied by liability insurance documents from the user and COVID-19 precautions.

It was deemed that city staff would incur additional cleaning hours to accommodate the school usage and this was estimated at eight hours per month.

The overall lease agreement with the city and ESCSM is for \$3,000 plus HST.

Dementia Awareness

Dementia is an overall term used for a set of symptoms that are caused by disorders affecting the brain. Symptoms may include memory loss and trouble with thinking, problem-solving or language, severe enough to make it hard for a person to carry out everyday activities. A person with dementia may also experience changes in mood or behaviour.

Dementia is progressive, which means the symptoms will gradually get worse as more brain cells become damaged. Dementia is not a specific disease. Many diseases can cause dementia, the most common being Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia (due to strokes).

Some treatable conditions can produce symptoms similar to dementia, for example, vitamin deficiencies, thyroid disease, sleep disorders, or mental illness. It's very important to arrange for a full medical assessment as early as possible. Getting a timely diagnosis can help you access information, resources and support, benefit from treatment, and plan ahead.

Not being able to remember details of a conversation or event that took place a year ago	Not being able to recall details of recent events or conversations
Not being able to remember the name of an acquaintance	Not recognizing or knowing the names of family members
Forgetting things and events sometimes	Forgetting things or events more frequently

You are worried about your memory, but your relatives are not	Your relatives are worried about your memory, but you are not aware of any problems

If you are worried about your memory and are a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team, talk to your primary care provider about a referral to our Memory Clinic. The goal of the clinic is to provide early diagnosis and treatment for problems associated with memory loss.

It's important to know when to see your primary care provider about memory concerns but it's equally important to know that forgetting someone's name doesn't necessarily mean that you are getting dementia.

Latchford Fire Hall expansion project coming along

LATCHFORD – The Latchford Fire Hall expansion project is progressing nicely.

"(We) just got the roof done this weekend, that should keep the rain out and (we'll) be working on the soffit and fascia next," Latchford Volunteer Fire Department Chief Mike Beaupre said in an email message.

"So, it's coming along."

There's a lack of space in the current hall and the expansion was needed to house all of the vehicles and equipment.

Members of the fire department raised funds for the project for the last 10 years.

With Latchford council's approval, and with some lumber provided by EACOM Timber, the fire department was able to move forward with their plans.

"We obtained our building permit for a 30×60-foot concrete pad in October 2018," Beaupre had told The Speaker.

He said that the weather turned cold too fast, so the department had to postpone the project to the spring of 2019.

Then on April 1 of last year, a train containing oriented strand board (OSB) and other lumber derailed just north of Latchford.

"After some phone calls with (Ontario Northland Railway) personnel, the Town of Latchford Fire Department was given the salvage rights, giving the fire department the funding boost it needed," said Beaupre.

With the funds from the sale of the OSB and lumber totalling \$75,441 and with a \$35,000 donation from the Latchford Volunteer Firefighters' Association, the department was now good to go ahead with the expansion project.

The concrete pad was poured this spring and the construction was carried out over the summer months.

Beaupre said that if all went well with the project the fire department would be able to move into the new hall this fall.

Temagami water projects delayed until next spring

TEMAGAMI – Work to repair Temagami's water towers has been delayed until the spring of 2021.

Each year, the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA) provides recommendations regarding capital repairs to Temagami's water and wastewater systems.

With the amended Environmental Compliance Approval being approved by the Ministry of the Environment Conservation and Parks, the municipality is required to have its ultraviolet filtration system operational by April 30, 2025.

There are also repairs needed at both the north and south water towers, which brings the municipality up to a cost of \$1,650,000.

The repairs were originally expected to be carried out in October, but in his report to council at their September 17 regular meeting, treasurer-administrator Craig Davidson said that they now will be completed next spring.

"OCWA has brought in another company to review Landmark Municipal Services' reports and they're doing a couple of comments and they did a brief site visit and one of the first comments they had is if we're looking at an October time for the (repair) job, that it might not give enough time to when we have freeze-up," Davidson explained.

"The present plan now is to spend some time this fall and early winter to make sure that we are looking at the work that needs to be done and then complete it in the spring. That way, the paint has more time to cure inside the towers. Where the paint was bubbling, this company said that probably last time there wasn't enough time for the paint to cure before it got refilled, so that's why it was blistering."

LONG-TERM DEBT APPROVED

In the absence of external funding or the acquisition of long-term debt, some of the repair projects were beyond the ability of Temagami's water and wastewater systems to pay.

Council agreed at their August 6 meeting for the municipality to apply for long-term debt through Infrastructure Ontario, which Davidson said at the Sept. 17 meeting had been approved.

But prior to any debt being accessed, Davidson noted that there will need to be a bylaw considered by council.

"There will be a bylaw (that council will have to pass) at some point in time, but we don't need to look at a bylaw until we're going to be requesting advances in the money," he said.

"It hasn't left the radar screen, it's just now if we're not going to be doing the water towers next month, we don't necessarily have to pass the bylaw but we do have the approval in place."

Parents staying positive in early days of school

DISTRICT — As teachers and students headed back to school last week, there were mixed feelings about safety and security due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Personally, I think the return to school plan has gone fairly well," said New Liskeard parent Chuck Durrant.

Cobalt parent Shannie Christo said her daughter Irelyn is happy to be back in class in Grade 6 at St. Patrick School.

"She said she was very happy to be back. She missed her friends a lot. Wearing the mask hasn't seemed to bother her. So overall, it's been successful for her and hoping it stays that way."

Ontario was the first province to shut down schools last March as a precautionary measure due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

A substantial number of parents have opted for virtual learning.

Elementary school students who have returned to classes have seen class sizes unchanged and some high school students will follow with a hybrid model of in-class and online learning available.

Durrant believes the back-toschool process has been good for his daughter Brynn who is in Grade 10 at Timiskaming District Secondary School.

However, he has concerns about busing and overcrowding.

"It will be interesting to see how the Octomester system is going to work out for the majority of high school students."

Such a system would see students take one subject all day for up to 20 days.

"I think some will flourish and others will flounder under the compressed system," said Durrant.

"My main worry for students of this area is busing.... We're lucky that our daughter's school is on the way to work. But I feel that buses will have no choice but to be overcrowded," he said.

"As the year goes on and we

head into cold and flu season and the second wave, it will be interesting to see how robust the safety measures put in place actually are. We have been fortunate to have so few cases so far. But always in the back of my mind, is that it takes one person not following protocols to cause our area to become a hot spot. I'm hoping it doesn't begin in a classroom."

NORMALCY

Parent Jamie Lindsay believes the staff at New Liskeard Public School (NLPS) are doing their best under some challenging circumstances where her son Gerard is in Grade 3.

"As far as NLPS is concerned, the staff have been wonderful. They're trying their best to monitor the students, schedule their day and still follow protocols surrounding COVID-19," said Lindsay.

"Gerard came home on day one and although he was incredibly nervous to go back, he had a great day. They're doing their best to keep us parents informed. They are respectful of all of us approaching them with our concerns at varying standpoints on the return to school," she explained.

But she hasn't had issues so far with how it has all gone for her son.

"I'm happy with everything so far. District School Board Ontario North East has some dedicated educators and staff in their roster. I'm grateful for all of the individuals that make Gerard's day any easier. It's a whole new world for everyone behind those doors."

She believes the school year will resemble a roller coaster ride in that children will be sent home if they are exhibiting any symptoms of COVID-19.


"Obviously a necessary precaution but a hurdle for the parents for sure. We take it day by day. Any shred of normalcy we can extend to our kids right now, I'll take it. School being one of them."

She is hopeful the rest of the school year will be a positive experience for her and her son.

FedNor support announced for Northern ag

DISTRICT (Staff/Special) – A Temiskaming agribusiness is among the recipients of FedNor support to Northern Ontario's agricultural sector.

A repayable contribution of \$420,000 was recently announced for Reliable Elevators in Harley Township to purchase and install a high-capacity grain handler dryer.

In a news release, FedNor said the equipment will respond to consumer demand in the Earlton and New Liskeard areas while enhancing yield quality, increasing exports, and creating jobs.

Collège Boréal was also awarded FedNor funding for crops research.

It will receive \$363,170 to hire an agronomist and agricultural technologist for a three-year period to assist with projects developing and selecting plant varieties suited to Northern Ontario's climate.

The Town of Cochrane received almost

\$661,000 for construction of a grain handling and storage facility to support expansion of the district's agricultural sector.


They were among 13 agriculture-related projects across the North that are getting more than \$3 million from the federal regional economic development initiative.

"The well-being of all Canadians – physically, socially and economically – begins with a safe food supply," said Mélanie Joly, the minister responsible for FedNor, in a news release.

"Northern Ontario's farmers and agri-food businesses are essential to this, and we're here for them.

"These important measures will help them scale up and support good jobs by improving productivity, increasing yields and ensuring the security of the safe, nutritious food supply we all rely on."



The Fire Department would like to advise all residents that no member

of the public will be permitted to enter the office unless they are wearing or the public will be permitted to enter the office unless they are wearing a mask or face covering in a manner that covers their nose, mouth and chin. Also, during this time, only one member of the public at a time will be permitted to enter the Fire Department Office until further notice. The City and Fire Department will continue to follow the directions of our Medical Officer of Health in order to help reduce the spread of COVID 40 and the appreciate value perspective consenting these COVID-19, and we appreciate your everyone's cooperation during these difficult times.

Residents requiring a new Burning Permit may once again obtain a burning permit at City Hall in Haileybury or at the Fire Department Administration office at the Dymond Fire Station at no cost. Those residents who obtained a Burning Permit in 2019 may still continue to burn in accordance with the conditions as outlined on the open air-burning permit.

Residents are also reminded that you may only burn if conditions allow the fire to burn safely and all necessary steps are taken to control and extinguish the fire. All other conditions as outlined on the burning permit must be followed. Please ensure you adhere to the following burning safety tips so you can enjoy your fire and help reduce the risks to our Firefighters:

No Day Burning - You may only burn from 6pm – 8am.
Only Burn Dry, Woody Type Materials - Household trash, plastic or tires are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or leaves or anything that

are illegal to burn. You may not burn grass or reaves or anyuring trial may cause excessive smoke.

Always Stay with Your Fire - A responsible person of 18 years of age or older must be present to supervise the fire at all times.

Respect Your Neighbour - Don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways or hamper visibility.

Control Your Fire - Only burn what you can effectively control. Don't


