## Health Unit sees COVID cases rise by two

DISTRICT - The Timiskaming Health Unit says that it was contacted September 29 about two positive cases of COVID-19 from individuals currently living outside of the district.

Their cases have been added to the local case count.

The health unit states in the press release "although both of these individuals currently have home addresses in the Timiskaming district, they are currently out of the area and have not been in our district for some time. There was no risk of local exposure from these two cases. The two cases do not have an epidemiological link between them and both are contacts of known positive cases."

The total cases for the Timiskaming district now sits at 18, the health unit added. The previous 16 cases have now been resolved.

"We must continue to closely follow all public health measures and provincial orders," said Acting Medical Officer of Health Dr. Glenn Corneil in the press release. The guidelines are to: limit your immediate social circle to a maximum of 10 people and keep the same 10 people in it; wear a mask or face covering in public spaces and when six feet of distancing between people who are not in your immediate social circle is not possible; limit private gatherings to a maximum of 10 people indoors and 25 outdoors, as ordered by the province of Ontario; wash your hands often and/or use alcohol-based hand sanitizers.

The health unit said, "group gatherings continue to be a source of local concern. You must limit your number of close contacts and follow the province's updated guidelines on gatherings. People who host a gathering in excess of these maximums may be subject to fines up to \$10,000."

## **One-time funding announced for THU**

TEMISKAMING SHORES -The province has announced additional funding for the Timiskaming Health Unit of more than \$600,000 for this year and again next year.

That should offset the increased costs that municipalities will face for public health services as the funding formula switches, said Carman Kidd, the mayor of Temiskaming Shores and chair of the Timiskaming Board of Health.

But in an interview earlier this month, he anticipated that municipalities will be asked to shoulder those costs in the future.

The province is changing the way public health costs are shared. In the past, it has covered the full cost of some programs provided by health units. Municipalities paid 25 per cent of mandatory programs' costs.

Beginning this year, municipalities are paying 30 per cent of most program costs.

Thes province recently notified Kidd that it would provide \$636,400 in one-time funding in 2020-21 to avoid increases in what Temiskaming municipalities must pay.

In 2021-22, that'll drop slightly to \$600,500.

The province has also launched a review of public health organization in Ontario.

At one time, it proposed consolidating the province's 35 existing health units into 10.

But it shelved that proposal as it began consultations on the modernization of Ontario's public health system.

No decisions have been announced, and the province and public health sector has been focused on managing the COVID-19 pandemic.

Health Minister and Deputy Premier Christine Elliott said an additional \$100 million has been earmarked for the public health sector's response to COVID-19.

Elliott said the ministry will

## New welcome signs approved for Earlton

EARLTON – Earlton will be getting new municipal welcome signs.

The old signs were becoming faded and worn and Armstrong Township wanted to replace them ahead of its Centennial celebrations next year.

At the September 23 regular meeting, council approved the purchase of two signs from Northern Signs.

The signs are eight-foot by eight-foot reflective billboards, each costing \$1,450 that will sit atop a two-structure frame. The frames cost \$750 apiece.

"The total (for the project) would be \$4,400 before HST," Mayor Jean Marc Boileau, who also sits on the Centennial Committee, told council.

An installation date is still to be determined, he noted.

#### **Osteoporosis and Bone Mineral Density Testing**

It's a condition that causes bones to become thin and porous, decreasing bone strength and leading to broken bones, especially the hip, spine, wrist and shoulder. Osteoporosis is sometimes confused with osteoarthritis. Just to be clear, osteoporosis is a bone disease and osteoarthritis is a disease of the joints and surrounding tissue.

#### Fast Facts:

- Osteoporosis can strike at any age and affects both men and women
- Building strong bones during childhood and adolescence can be the best defence against developing osteoporosis later in life
- Both men and women begin to lose bone in their mid 30s. As they approach menopause, women lose bone at a greater rate, from 2-3% per year
- At least 1 in 3 women and 1 in 5 men will suffer from an osteoporotic fracture during their lifetime
- Over 80% of all fractures in people 50+ are caused by osteoporosis

#### Testing

Bone Mineral Density (BMD) testing is very important. This test is safe, painless and accurately measures the density of your bones. A BMD test can tell you whether or not you have osteoporosis and how likely you are to develop it in the future. It can help you to make decisions that may prevent fractures or further bone loss.

#### Who Should Get a BMD test?

- all women and men 65 years or older
- postmenopausal women and men 50-64 with risk factors for fracture including:
  - · low bone mass identified on x-ray
  - parental hip fracture
  - high alcohol intake
  - current smoker
  - low body weight, i.e. less than 132 lbs or 60 kg
  - rheumatoid arthritis younger men or women (under 50) with a disease or condition associated with low bone mass or bone loss:
    - high risk medication (steroid use, aromatase inhibitors,
    - androgen deprivation therapy)
    - uncontrolled hyperthyroidism
    - early menopause (younger than 45)



The cinematography is amazingly beautiful and the storyline will see you tearing up by the time the ending arrives. This film is educational as eryone!



## "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!™"

## Fire Prevention Week runs from October 4-10, 2020

With Fire Prevention Week just around the corner, the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department is urging everyone in Temiskaming Shores and the surrounding area to take some simple steps to prevent kitchen fires in their home. This year's theme of Fire Prevention Week, which runs from October 4-10, is

This year's theme of Fire Prevention Week, which runs from October 4-10, is "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!™"

The theme is very timely as cooking fires continue to be the leading cause of home fires in Ontario. It focuses on the prevention of cooking fires and staying fire safe in the kitchen.

Simple steps to serve up fire safety in the kitchen include:

- Always stay in the kitchen when cooking and turn off the stove if you must leave the kitchen .
- Keep a proper fitting lid near the stove. If a pot of oil catches fire, slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove. Do not move the pot. Never throw water on a burning pot.
- Keep anything that burns plastic utensils, dishcloths, paper towels a safe distance from the stove.
- Cook responsibly. To prevent cooking fires, you must be alert . You will not be alert if you have consumed alcohol or drugs .
- Wear tight-fitting or rolled up sleeves when using the stove. Loose, dangling clothing can easily catch fire.
- Keep young kids one metre away from the stove. Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge so they can't be easily knocked off.
- If you burn yourself while cooking, run cool water over the wound for three to five minutes. If the burn is severe, seek medical attention.

"Often when we're called to a fire that started in the kitchen, the residents tell us they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. But that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. Help keep our community safe by preventing fires from starting in the first place ." - Fire Chief, Steve Langford

KIRKLAND LAKE - Beaverhouse First Nation youths took part in the 14th Annual Wabun Youth Gathering in August at the community's Dorothy Lake traditional grounds near Kirkland Lake. The gathering brought together several local youths over a two-day event to take part in sharing lessons and stories with elders, craft making and games.

The annual Wabun Youth Gathering is normally held every summer as a large

event that brings together many youths from several participating Wabun First Nations. Due to the ongoing pandemic, this year's event was held in multiple stages in the Wabun territory with a new reduced format to protect youth and participants.

"Thanks to our staff at Wabun Health, our executive director Jason Batisse, our Chiefs and Beaverhouse leadership we managed to continue with Wabun Youth Gathering in a limited way during this pandemic," commented Jean Lemieux,

Normally, Wabun Health hosts the events at a central gathering for two different age groups every summer but due to the requirements of physical distancing, keeping gatherings to a minimal size and favouring outdoor activities, the format of this year's gathering was changed. The organizers instead opted for hosting several smaller gatherings in Wabun's member communities.

Organizers instituted the wearing of masks or face coverings, maintaining physical distancing as much and as often as possible, spacing everyone six feet apart during all activities and encouraging and teaching youth to regularly wash hands and use hand sanitizer.

Tribal Council First Nations in educational workshops on culture, heritage, outdoor activities as well as presentations on mental health and wellness. This year's event welcomed youth to take part in soapstone carving activities as well as sharing in personal teachings and storytelling from elders and presenters. Naveau explained that the event was also an opportunity for everyone to speak and share their stories, thoughts and feelings in a safe environment.

Wabun Tribal Council is a regional territorial organization which represents the six First Nation communities of Beaverhouse, Brunswick House, Chapleau Ojibwe, Flying Post, Matachewan and Mattagami in Northeastern Ontario and it is directed by its respective chiefs.


