back to the former town of New Liskeard and commemoration of its 100th anniversary in 2003. The policy sets standards for trees, benches and plaques and establishes a process for their location.

Any requests for memorial items must be made between January 1 and April 15.

The cost of the materials and their installation is to be covered by donors, with fees set at \$2,000 for a memorial bench and \$500 for a tree.

The city is responsible for general care and maintenance, and reserves the right to remove any tree or bench deemed unsafe, unsightly or in the way of operations.

But Temiskaming Shores council recently took a moment to show its appreciation to the city's 60-plus firefighters, their families, and the employers who permit the volunteers to respond to emergencies.

"These are the people that provide our fire protection service that is second to none for all our residents and businesses in the city," said Mayor Carman Kidd at a recent council meeting.

Ending stigma of substance abuse and mental illness

DISTRICT (Staff/Special) -The Timiskaming Health Unit lenges individuals to reframe (THU) has launched two complementary campaigns to help end stigma related to substance use, and also to promote mental health.

The THU said in a press release that, along with the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) Cochrane-Timiskaming, they are launching a campaign by stating that "while one in five of us will live with mental illness, we all have mental health."

CMHA director of service Tyler Twarowski said that "it is important to distinguish that mental health does not mean mental illness. Mental illness refers to a disturbance in thoughts, feelings and perceptions that are severe enough to affect day-to-day functioning. These can include such things

addiction. The campaign chaltheir perceptions of people who use drugs, that people who use drugs are real people.

"A substance use disorder is a health condition, and people should not be defined by their illness or health condition. Stigmatizing language is inaccurate, hurtful, and disempowering."

THU director of community health, Kerry Schubert-Mackey, stated "we know that anyone can use drugs, and that addiction can affect anyone. Stigma impacts people who use substances, their families, and the community. Stigma is one of the biggest barriers to seeking support, whether that's health or treatment services, or even talking about it with friends and family, and stigma also impacts sustaining recovery."

Fireworks on lakeshore to light up New Year's Eve

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The year's been a quiet one, thanks to COVID-19.

But a Temiskaming Shores business owner hopes to end 2020 with a bang.

Marc Dessureault is coordinating a 'round-the-bay fireworks display at 8 p.m. on New Year's Eve.

He's giving participating residents a "fireworks cake," which fires off multiple effects with a single lighting.

Some 80 homeowners on Lake Temiskaming, stretching from city hall in Haileybury to Dawson Point, will be taking part.

Dessureault, co-owner of the North Cobalt Flea Market, has launched a new online enterprise, DealCrashers.ca.

At Temiskaming Shores council earlier this month, Dessureault said that, while he

wants to promote the new venture, he also wants "to showcase the area."

"We've got a beautiful lake, and I feel we haven't been taking advantage of it."

The event will also honour his sister-in-law, Angele Dubois in Chelmsford, who has recently received good news in her battle with cancer.

All profits from any additional fireworks sales to lakefront residents for the New Year's Eve show will go to Community Cancer Care and the Canadian Mental Health Association. Online donations can also be made directly to both organizations through links on the business' site.

The fireworks display will be filmed by a drone for live streaming on the DealCrashers Facebook page.

Dessureault is encouraging participants to begin festivities in the afternoon.

He's booked a helicopter to

make a tour of the bay at 3 p.m. to capture images of families at play outdoors, be they snowshoeing, skiing, ice fishing, or simply enjoying a bonfire.

That too will be livestreamed.

"Then at eight o'clock is the big show," he said.

On December 1, city council approved the use of fireworks for the New Year's Eve event. (By municipal bylaw, consumer fireworks are typically permitted to be discharged only on Victoria Day and Canada Day.)

The municipality is also purchasing about \$1,000 in fireworks to join in the display and will purchase footage of the event, at \$1,500.

The fireworks display will let people celebrate while staying physically distanced, said Councillor Jeff Laferriere.

"I can't wait 'til New Year's Eve. I think it's going to be a great event and thanks for taking the initiative," he said.

"Stigma is any attitude, belief or behaviour that discriminates against people and often emerges in the form of derogatory language that shames and belittles people," said the THU.

"The anti-stigma campaign aims to create awareness around the stigma experienced by those who use drugs, and language associated with substance use and addiction, as well as challenge the stereotypes of people who use drugs and/or live with
