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Broadband, planning on Temagami agenda in 2021

TEMAGAMI – Broadband and cellular improvements and finalizing various planning initiatives are expected to takeleading roles in Temagami in 2021.

Temagami Mayor Dan O'Mara said the municipality hopes to "have some good news" when it comes to rectifying its broadband and cellphone is sues in January.

"I continue to work with the other 15 communities in our area to seek approval of some of the newly announced government funding," he noted in an email interview.

"Applications are due in early January."

Work also will continue on finalizing the town's Service Delivery Review, Waste Management study and Strategic Plan.

"We plan on setting out some council priorities for the remainder of council's term," said O' Mara.

"Work will continue to finalize our review of our Official Plan."

TEMAGAMI DRY FUTURE

When it comes to economic development, O'Mara says Temagami hopes to have a new plan in place as to what it - as a community - is going to do with the Temagami Dry trademark.

"A small (ad hoc) committee has been set up and will be bringing something back

to council, hopefully later in January," he said.

The municipality purchased the trademark from Fortier Beverages of Cochrane in 2020 for \$7,500 thanks to donations from people within the community.

O'Mara is hopeful that owning the trademark will provide the town with different economic development possibilities.

WORKING COLLABORATIVELY

Continuing to meet and work with Temagami First Nation and the Teme-Augama Anish nabai "on a number of matters of joint interest" will also be a priority for Temagami in the new year, said O'Mara.

An advantage of that is that the members are able to use the building as a centre from which they can provide catering services, both inside and outside their building, Hall explained.

"We do other fundraising events and we give away most of the money we make."

The hall owned by the Rebekah Lodge is also rented out "just to help pay the bills or just to raise funds to donate to other clubs."

Schools, the library, hospitals, the museum and the Girl Guides are some of the organizations which might benefit from fundraising over the years, she continued.

Fundraising monies may also be donated to head office projects. Individuals who are ill may also benefit from their kindness with some food, for example.

The Lodge also maintains a small garden at the cemetery.

As with other organizations, the Rebekah Lodge in Englehart has had a challenging year, and has now extended its meeting suspensions further into the new year as it waits out the pandemic.

The hall is still available for rent, but most of the organizations that use it are not expected to be holding meetings for the foreseeable future, Hall commented.

O'Mara acknowledged that 2020 was "an interesting year" for the municipality.

He said that dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic will still create issues for the town but that they "hope this pandemic

"Meetings were cancelled and everything seemed to be put on hold until we found new ways to operate under the new conditions we faced," he noted.

From an operating standpoint, O'Mara said Temagami is "holding our own" and that hopefully it will end the year with a small surplus.

Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP looks back on 2020

Although the year 2020 started with concerns and predictions of possible COVID-19 restrictions, everything changed in March when Ontario went into a complete lock-

It was uncharted territory for all Ontarians and eight months later, protecting ourselves from the virus has become the new normal. Looking towards the future, the development of a vaccine is moving

forward and the chief medical officer of Health for Canada is projecting that a large percentage of the population will be vaccinated before the end of 2021.

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted each region of the province in a different manner. Although Timiskaming-Cochrane's case counts have remained low, our public health officials continue to encourage the wearing of masks, hand washing, social distancing and being overly vigilant in all situations.

In our region, forestry, mining, and agriculture were declared essential services so job losses in those sectors were held to a minimum. Unfortunately, the healthy and thriving tourism industry in Timiskaming-Cochrane was dealt a major blow when the Canada-US border closed. Closing the border denied many tourist camps access to their entire customer base and many of those same small, independent operators did not qualify for Federal or Provincial COVID-19 relief programs. Many small retailers, restaurants and service industry businesses were hard hit with the shutdown but many managed to develop creative revenue streams to keep themselves operating.

SOME GOOD NEWS

Fortunately, some sectors of our business communities are experiencing a banner year - home renovation, leisure products and real estate are all experiencing a huge increase in sales because people are grounded and cannot travel.

Constituents have asked me for my perspective on the Premier's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the first wave, the Premier did a creditable job, and for many, he exceeded expectations. He listened to health experts and as a result, most Ontarians (with the exception of long term care) managed the initial wave, the shut down and closures with understanding and resilience.

The second wave of COVID-19 presents a different story. The pre-pandemic Premier seems to have returned. More reactive than proactive and more concerned with business interests than the plight of people, the most tragic example is long-term care. There are long standing issues in our system that were brutally exposed by the COVID-19 pandemic. While other provinces prepared for the second wave by hiring and training personal support workers to manage the anticipated crisis, the Ford government hesitated, announcing action plans but failing to implement them. As a result, long-term care homes are being ravaged by the second wave of COVID with overworked staff and less of them.

The Ford government recently passed legislation which makes it difficult for families to assign

fault to long-term care facility operators or hold the provincial government accountable for tragedies that happen to their loved ones in long-term care. This was the most cynical piece of legislation I have witnessed in my nine years as an MPP, and for me, this atrocity is emblematic of the biggest weakness of the Ford government. The Premier is well known for saying "the buck stops with me," but in fact his actions prove the exact op-

posite. The NDP has put forward a detailed plan on what should be done to improve our long-term care system, with the emphasis of removing profit from the system.

Locally, although our offices were closed to the public, our caseload actually increased substantially. We are available through telephone, email, and by appointment. Everyone's stress level increased with the pandemic and for people who were facing large challenges before COVID, those challenges have multiplied many times over.

COVID-19 drew back the curtains on many dark corners. Lack of mental health services coupled with an increase in addiction related issues are proving to be a challenge across the province but especially in rural areas like ours.

INTERNET

One issue that came to the forefront during the pandemic is lack of access to high-speed internet for many rural residents. As virtual learning and virtual medical appointments became a necessity due to the pandemic, lack of internet moved from an inconvenience to a major obstacle in many people's lives. All levels of government have announced funding for better services but funding announcements do not guarantee results. I introduced Bill 226 - The Broadband is an Essential Service Act, and it has passed second reading and moved to committee. The goal of Bill 226 is to ensure that every Ontarian has access to useable, affordable internet by 2030.

Currently, one of our most important issues is winter road maintenance. We continue to push government to improve the level of maintenance. Our issue is not with the contractors or the operators but with the contracts themselves. The NDP maintains that the management of road maintenance should be returned to the Ministry. The current government is unwilling to make that change but we will continue to lobby for improved services within the parameters of the current contracts.

On a personal note, as the legislature has been operating on a socially distanced schedule, I feel it is my duty and a form of due diligence to refrain from visiting public places and events in the riding. So, if you are wondering where I am, I am playing it safe for the good of my riding and my family. Going to local events is the nicest part of being MPP and both Ria and I really miss meeting and greeting everyone, all across the riding.

The year 2020 has been a very challenging one for everyone but although Christmas was different this year, the spirit has not diminished. On behalf of my family, and staff, I hope you had a Merry Christmas and have a Happy New Year.







NOTICE PET OWNERS PET TAG LICENCE RENEWAL FOR 2021

Effective 2019, the City changed its Pet Licencing program to a permanent tag that is renewed annually. The fee for tag renewal is \$10 if paid by December 31, 2020. After this date, the renewal fee increases to \$20. If your pet has a tag that has a year identified (2018 and prior), then you need to get a new permanent tag, for a fee of \$20.






BUT HE DOES!
