

# Dry spring

## Rain is needed to counter low water levels

DISTRICT - A combination of low precipitation and rapid snowmelt has resulted in low water levels now being seen on Lake Temiskaming. It could possibly mean that the lake and tributaries will be lower than normal throughout the season, depending on factors such as precipitation and evaporation.

"Due to a lack of precipitation in late March and early April, lower than usual water levels are being experienced across the northeast region," commented Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry biologist Allison Bannister.

"Lake Temiskaming was fully drawn down to normal levels in the winter of 2020. In Spring 2021 a combination of low precipitation and rapid snowmelt have contributed to the current water level," she said in an email interview.

"Water levels in Lake Temiskaming are primarily influenced by the amount of water entering the system through upwellings and precipitation and leaving the system by surface evaporation, absorption and dam outflow.

"In years such as this year with below-average seasonal precipitation (in winter and spring), and higher evaporation (which is related to ambient temperatures), less water may be present in the system.

"Temporary changes the appearance and function of the lake, such as exposed shorelines, may impact the lake for all or part of the season, depending on precipitation and Continued on 3



- A guick ice melt on Lake Temiskaming was weeks earlier than in 2020, but did not set a record as the ice was deemed officially off the lake on April 12. NOTE: The record was actually established on March 31, 2012.

Once more vaccine supply is distributed locally, more appointment spots will get added. If there are no appointments left in your community, the site will direct you to the clinic closest to you.

# KL hospital discharges last COVID-19 patient

KIRKLAND LAKE (Special/ Staff) – With the discharge of a patient on the weekend, all COVID-19 patients admitted to the Kirkland Lake hospital in recent weeks are now out of hospital.

On the staffing side, the cases of all employees associated with the recent outbreak at the hospital have also been resolved.

In a press release April 13, Blanche River Health (BRH) announced that most of the affected employees have also been cleared to return to work.

An outbreak at the hospital was declared in mid-March.

**Continued from Front** evaporation in the weeks and months."

In response to a question about impact on fish spawning, she stated that "spring spawning behaviour in fish like walleye is dependent on water temperature, so when the correct temperature is reached, the fish will begin to spawn. Although walleye often exhibit site fidelity to a spawning site, if that site becomes unavailable (even temporarily) fish may spawn at other locations."

Other wildlife may also be influenced by the low water levels. "Seasonal patterns of temperature and precipitation may influence the distribution and concentration of animals who require these habitats for food and shelter," she stated.

In its update, BRH said the Kirkland Lake site will remain under outbreak status until 14 days have passed since the last positive case was recorded in a patient or employee.

It extended thanks to community partners for their help during the outbreak.

They included Kirkland Lake Gold, which provided access to its rapid testing devices and staff who assisted with the "significant" volume of routine test-

The Kirkland District Health Team provided staff to support the assessment centre and testing efforts as well as the hospicare.

The Englehart and District Family Health Team also provided clinical staff for the assessment centre and testing.

visitor restrictions, meanwhile, are still in place at both the Kirkland Lake and Englehart hospitals.

Emergency departments at both sites remain open 24/7.

Outpatient services are available by appointment, but some visiting specialist services have been temporarily suspended.




The Festival winds down on the Friday with a theatre play, presented by the theatre troupe Grouille ou Rouille, starting at 4 p.m.

# Mining operation digs deep for school boards

TIMMINS (Special) - The region's four school boards have received \$80,000, thanks to Glencore Kidd Operations.

The Glencore Community Support Fund has donated \$20,000 to each of the four school boards to help staff and students through the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Thank you to all of the teachers, educational support staff and administration teams across all local schools for your ongoing support to school safety," said Mark Furlotte, Glencore Kidd Operations general manager, in a media release.

"As schools continue to teach both in-class and remotely, this funding will help school boards purchase digital tools and supplies for ongoing virtual learning as well as COVID-19 related personal protective equipment to help keep school staff, students, families and our community safe."

# Alternate routes available to get to Aidie Creek

CHAMBERLAIN TOWNSHIP - Have no fear, there are still ways to get around the Aidie Creek Road bridge closure in Chamberlain.

Travellers heading to Aidie Creek Gardens from the north can take Wawbewawa Road to connect to the road. Those travelling to the south from Kirkland Lake can hook up with the road by taking Chamberlain Road 5.

"(The township is) working on some (road) signs at this point, they're sort of waiting on my answer on what kind of signs we'd like," said Aidie Creek Gardens manager Jeff Warner in a telephone inter-

"They're willing to help us with the cost of them. They're not just going to put up anything we want anywhere, but they're willing to help with some of the cost, which is kind of nice."

A crack had appeared and was growing on a wingwall at one end of the bridge's foundation.

a crack-monitoring device on the bridge, they discovered the crack had grown in the interval.

The decision was then made to close the bridge.

Engineers have been investigating the crack and will report to Chamberlain council with a suggestion for a next step.

"Right now it's in the engineer stage, they've got a company hired to design something," said Warner of the bridge's current status.

"They think they have an idea of a way to fix it rather than replace it."

Warner said the expected impact on his business is that customers may come up to the road closed sign and then be confused about how to get to Aidie Creek Gardens, thus resulting in a potential loss of business.

"They don't even know there's another way in. So the main sign probably will be where the road closed sign is saying how to (get here)," said Warner.

He said after talking to Jon Schenk, the public works super-

When engineers went to place intendent for Chamberlain and Charlton-Dack on April 12, Warner had just posted directions on Aidie Creek's Facebook page.

> "It turns out Jon saw it, too, so he said 'I'm going to use that on the signs.' I said 'Sure, go ahead.""

> Warner said the township would "hopefully" post some sort of signage to let people know of the closure.

> 'We're just hoping (our customers) take the time to drive around," he said.

> "It sounds like a fairly quick repair (to the bridge) but does quick mean two months? Or does quick mean the summer and it would be done by the fall? I don't know what 'quick' means."

> It's not known at this time how long the Aidie Creek Bridge will be closed to the public.

- Think differently. This may be easier said than done, but realize there are some things you can't control, such as rising case numbers or the behaviour of other people. Instead, focus on the things you can control, for example, restricting your grocery shopping to once a week.
- **Practice mindfulness and meditation.** This allows you to be in the present moment and not worry about the future or the past. It can be done any time and anywhere and the more you practice, you better you
- Give yourself a COVID break. Limit how and when you consume news about the pandemic and that includes social media! Also avoid getting into online arguments with people who have different views. It's unlikely to change their minds and may cause you to feel angry.
- Turn COVID precautions into a habit. Write down your commitment to new behaviours such as always having a mask and hand sanitizer when you go out. Set up cues in your home such as a basket for clean masks by the front door, to remind you and turn those behaviours into a habit.

While the pandemic may be a challenge for some time to come, please don't give up. Check the dates of the upcoming COVID vaccination clinics and if you're priority group has opened for booking, make that call and get your appointment scheduled. Please continue to remain vigilant and stay safe.





## **Lionel Venne book** project now underway

DISTRICT - Work is now underway to create a book on the life and works of Elk Lake artist Lionel Venne.

Felicity Buckell of Temiskaming Shores has been attempting to obtain Ontario Arts Council funding for the project since 2018 and has now been successful.

The \$7,000 grant will be applied to artists' costs in the creation of the book.

The project is being done in partnership with the Temiskaming Art Gallery and Le Centre Culturel ARTEM. The book will be published with both English and French text.

Buckell said she made her first application for funding for the project in 2018 when Venne's retrospective exhibition was held at the Temiskaming Art Gallery. Buckell had hoped to be able to produce a book in conjunction with that exhibition, she said in a telephone interview, but funding at that time was unavailable.

She applied again in late 2020 and recently learned that her application was successful.

Buckell said it was one of eight projects approved by the Ontario Arts Council out of 42 applications received.

Buckell will be writing, researching and gathering information for the book.

She says the project is in the early stages, and while she doesn't want to promise the publication date, her original timeline was to have it out by Christmas.

Proceeds of the sale of the books will be donated to the Temiskaming Art Gallery.

"We're doing well," Buckell said of the project that has just gotten started. The research component has already started, and Venne now has a new website and Facebook page which Buckell is administering.

Anyone who owns artworks by Venne is asked to contact Buckell at felicity@lionelvenne.com.

She said she has already heard from at least 20 people in the community who own some of Venne's works. "People love Lionel and they're excited," she said of the response.

She related that someone commented this can be viewed as a community project. She added, "It's so clear to me Lionel is such a big part of this community. He's a part of the fabric of our community for sure."
