



Market rents going up

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – As Riverside Farmers' Market prepares to open for another season, its rent is going up.

The New Liskeard market has been paying \$100 per booking at the municipally owned Riverside Place for "at least" the past seven years, wrote recreation director Matt Bahm in a report to city council last week.

The current non-profit daily rate for use of the facility is \$240.

Under a new lease, the market's rate would increase \$25 per booking each year until it reaches \$200.

At that time, a two per cent annual increase would apply until the end of the five-year agreement.

The market would also pay an annual fee of \$750 to store various items, including a commercial refrigerator and freezer and four outdoor kiosks.

The new lease also spells out the rights and obligations of the market and the municipality.

The lease also provides for additional Saturday bookings by the market November through April.

The arrangement is the latest that the city has drafted as it continues to negotiate formal arrangements with groups using municipal facilities.

Temiskaming OPP investigate death of a child

ARMSTRONG TOWNSHIP (Staff/Special) — The Temiskaming Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has revealed via a press release that an 8 year-old Armstrong Township youth is deceased.



On Tuesday, April 27, shortly after 5:30 p.m. members of the OPP, the OPP Crime Unit, the Northeast Region Forensic Information Services, the Armstrong Township Fire Department and the Temiskaming District Emergency Medical Service attended an incident where a child had fallen into a farm wagon. The child was then transported to hospital by EMS and was pronounced deceased a short time later.

The Temiskaming Crime Unit will continue to investigate the incident with the assistance of the Office of the Chief Coroner-Ontario Forensic Pathology Service.

A post-mortem examination is scheduled to take place at a later date, say police.

Vaccinations open to farm workers

DISTRICT (Special) – As essential workers, farmers and farm workers in Temiskaming can now book a COVID-19 vaccination.

But since vaccine supply is limited, it's not yet available to their household members.

To prove eligibility, provide a pay stub, a Farm Business Registration (FBR) number, or a letter from the employer, with FBR number included, attesting that the individual is a farm employee.

Montessori looking to open its doors in Latchford

LATCHFORD – A new Montessori school is aiming to establish itself within the Town of Latchford.

Latchford resident Leslie-Ann Thomas Lowe wrote a letter to the town, which was read at council's regular meeting April 15, explaining that she was looking to establish the Montessori where the former library used to be located.

The mother of three noted in her letter that she is both a certified Ontario Montessori and Ontario certified teacher.

"The Montessori school is called Temiskaming Shores Montessori School. Temiskaming Shores Montessori School is built on the foundation that each and every child is precious," Thomas Lowe writes in her letter.

"They are a curious sponge that soak up everything through their senses. Temiskaming Shores Montessori School was created to educate children and their families to foster a child's

independence and their natural curiosity. We accomplish this by providing a nature-based Montessori education that honours the individual gifts of the child growing and sustaining a strong passion for learning, preparing them for academic excellence in light."

Thomas Lowe added in her letter that while offering a nature-based education, the Montessori would also offer a bilingual education for the children.

"I have a true passion for Montessori and I would love to raise and teach my children in the same town that they also live in," she said.

BENEFITS

Thomas Lowe noted that one of the main benefits to Latchford having a Montessori school are that it would help to bring in younger families with children to the town.

"Families are looking to have their children attend schools that are within their communities instead of having to travel," she reasoned.

"This would be a major benefit because it would help fam-

ilies to cut down on their travel times and spend more time with their families. Having a school within our town will help to build more of a sense of community and togetherness, especially during these times, that is exactly what we all need."

Thomas Lowe also said the school will help to create jobs. She said that compared to public schools, the Montessori has smaller class sizes, more flexibility and one-on-one time with the students.

She stressed that the Montessori school would follow all COVID-19 protocols, as set out by the Timiskaming Health Unit, "keeping everyone safe."

MORE DETAILS NEEDED

Councillor Francine Blowe commented that typically Montessori schools in the cities are private schools, so she wondered what the registration fees would cost and questioned if the

residents of Latchford would actually be able to afford it.

Councillor Jo-Anne Cartner said those were her thoughts as well and wondered if Latchford had the number of children needed to attend such a school.

"Francine's right. They're usually not as expensive as regular private schools, but there is a fee," she noted.

Mayor George Lefebvre said the town would not be able to discount the Montessori's school taxes, "they would be paying both."

Councillor Sharon Gadoury-East wondered if the school were to open, where the children would play.

"I'm sure they would have their times and it being against Dr. (Mary Gretchen) Roedde's office, how would she be with having all the kids around?"

Lefebvre said that also was his concern.

"I'd really like to have Dr. Roedde involved in any discussions before renting out that room for this kind of thing," he said.

"She always knew what was going to happen with respect to renting it out for used clothing stores or whatever, but this is a noise factor for her."

Clerk-treasurer Jaime Allen said he felt that council should "get some kind of plan with her or meet with her in person" once COVID restrictions ease.

"If she's going to open the school, she's going to need some funding from somewhere," he said.

Council agreed that they would need more details from Thomas Lowe about the Montessori and that they would need to speak with Dr. Roedde to get her thoughts on the potential school.

May is Bladder Cancer Awareness Month

DID YOU KNOW?

- There are more than 80,000 Canadians living with bladder cancer
- Bladder cancer is the fifth most common cancer in Canada
- 8,700 Canadians will be diagnosed with bladder cancer this year
- The biggest warning sign of bladder cancer is blood in the urine
- Smoking is a common risk factor, as is age and work related exposure to specific chemicals

SYMPTOMS:

The most common symptom of bladder cancer is blood in the urine. The colour may vary from pale yellow-red to bright or rusty red. Blood may always be in the urine, or it may come and go. Sometimes the blood can only be seen with a microscope or found with other urine tests.

Other symptoms include:

- The need to pee often (also called urinary frequency)
- An intense need to pee (also called urinary urgency)
- Trouble peeing
- A burning sensation or pain when you pee
- Back, pelvic or groin pain

Because the disease may have progressed unnoticed, it is critical to see a health care provider once you begin to experience symptoms. Since many symptoms are similar to other medical conditions, bladder cancer is often misdiagnosed as, for example, a urinary tract infection. If you are concerned, ask your health care provider for a referral to a urologist to rule out bladder cancer.

If you are a patient of the Temagami FHT and are having symptoms, please call to schedule an appointment with your primary care provider— (705) 569-3244. It may very well **not** be bladder cancer, but these symptoms could be the result of a urinary tract infection which also needs to be diagnosed and treated accordingly.

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has received one application for consent being **Application No. 54-C-207686**. This application is in respect of lands located at Lot 2, Concession 1 in Sharpe unincorporated township, District of Timiskaming. The lands are described as PIN 61266-0116 (location of proposed easement) and PIN 61266-0117.

Application 54-C-207686 proposes to create an easement to provide access over lands described as PIN 61266-0116 (servient lands) to a lot described as PIN 61266-0117 (dominant lands). The servient lands are accessed via Sharpe Concession 2, which the applicant has indicated is maintained year-round. The dominant lands are currently landlocked, but have frontage on Long Lake. The easement would serve to provide access to Sharpe Concession 2 for the dominant lands.

The proposed easement would be approximately 20 metres by 30 metres and is vacant. The dominant lands are currently vacant, no new buildings or structures are currently proposed. The applicant indicated that the dominant lot would possibly be used as a trailer camping site.

New conversion proposal approved for former church

TEMISKAMING SHORES – A proposal to transform a former Haileybury church into apartments has been revived.

Temiskaming Shores council has approved a site plan for the project, which would convert the former St. Andrew's United Church at 522 Georgina Avenue into five residential units.

The building is owned by Lawrence Coulis of Waterloo.

It's not the first time that a developer has proposed turning the former church into rental housing.

In 2011, the then owner of the building drafted a plan for 11 apartments.

Neighbouring property owners objected to the scale of the proposal.

When city council rejected the rezoning required for the proposal to go ahead, contrary to the advice of the municipality's own planner, the owner appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board and won.

However, that development did not proceed.

City council approved a site plan agreement with the new owner April 20.

Cost factor for road improvement

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack will form a committee to meet with two local farmers to discuss options for a road in the rural area of the municipality.

The municipality has been considering closing the road. The road requires a new culvert. There is also a creek at the location.

The road southeast of the community of Charlton was discussed at the April 7 meeting of council. A cost of \$50,000 for the project was estimated, with another possibility posed that the cost could be as much as \$100,000.

The proposal was the subject of a presentation at Charlton-Dack council on Wednesday, April 7. Two local farmers and a former councillor appeared before council to discuss the future and long-term value and importance of keeping the road open. Council also was presented with options that might reduce the municipality's costs for the project.

Council heard the argument

that it should proceed with the project because it has likely been many years since the municipality invested in that section of road. It was also suggested that there could be means to reduce the cost of the project.

Councillor Clem Yantha explained that "our tax dollars can't afford \$50,000 for a culvert.... We have to justify it."

It was noted that new farmers are moving into the area who would like to build on old roads that haven't been opened for years.

The farmer who wishes to build at the location stated he is willing to work with the municipality to "to see what we can do." He added that he doesn't "want to be a burden to you guys."

Reeve Merrill Bond noted that "once we start a road, it has to be up to grade."

The municipality will approach the Ministry of Fisheries and Oceans to discuss the issue of the creek which crosses the road at the point of the culvert, to determine what concerns there would be.

New cannabis store set to open in Temagami

TEMAGAMI – A new cannabis store is looking to spark up Temagami's economy.

Temagami Cannabis Company, owned and operated by Barry Graham, is set to open for curbside pick-up and online orders on Saturday, May 8, at its 6 Lakeshore Drive location.

It's a business venture that has been in the works for over a year.

"We began the process over a year ago and it has been an arduous undertaking with meeting all of the demands of AGCO (Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario) and trying to find a bank because the big banks don't touch cannabis stores," explained Graham in a telephone interview.

Graham explained that the partnership to run the cannabis company includes himself and Karen Warzondk.

He said that he felt there was a need for a cannabis dispensary in the Temagami area because there was "an awakening with the positive effect of natural cannabis products," as opposed to pharmaceuticals.

"I've been using (cannabis) for years. I make my own CBD oil and it has relieved my sleeplessness, it's relieved my arthritis, so I felt with its legalization that Temagami being isolated from

any other community that there's certainly a known demand within this community, why not make it convenient for them," he said.

EARLY RECEPTION

Graham said that the early reception to the new cannabis store has been positive.

"We've had no negative feedback whatsoever," he noted.

"In fact, people keep asking 'When are you opening? When are you opening? When can we buy?' from every legal age group. We have seniors wanting CBD products as well as THC products."

Graham said that his long-term goal for the business is to provide "a needed service" within the Temagami community.

"It's no different than a pharmacy or liquor store or convenience store, or grocery store. It's a needed commodity," he reasoned.

"So we're here to provide that for the public."

Graham said the business would have an official grand opening once COVID restrictions ease enough and the public can gather once again.

"We would still operate under COVID protocol," he stressed.

"We have markers (on the floor for physical distancing) and only two customers at a time in the store."

Englehart finds DTSSAB overbilled by \$11,000

ENGLEHART - The Town of Englehart has been overbilled \$11,041 by DTSSAB since 2019 so there will be an adjustment in the board's 2021 billing.

The amount represents an overpayment made by Englehart to the District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board (DTSSAB).

An error was made in determining whether Ontario Works clients are truly from Englehart as stated on their identification or in their mailing address.

However, identification cards may use the nearest municipality as the main portion of the address when a person lives in an adjoining municipality or unincorporated township.

Englehart treasurer-deputy clerk Malorie Robinson identified the problem and pointed it out to DTSSAB which responded in a letter March 25.

DTSSAB advised that a full review of all cases identified as clients residing in Englehart from 2019 to present was conducted.

DTSSAB explained that "the Ontario Works program is administered through a program called

the Social Assistance Management System (SAMS) which requires both a mailing address and physical address. The Province also has four-digit codes that correspond to municipalities, townships and unorganized territories that must be manually entered. The physical address and its municipal code contribute to data that are used in the apportionment formula calculation. The internal review identified 37 cases with a mailing and physical residence address in Englehart, 14 of which included an incorrect municipality four-digit code." This resulted in Englehart being overbilled by \$11,041.

"A resolution was passed at (DTSSAB's) March 24 regular meeting that will apply an adjustment to the Town, in that amount, to the remainder of the 2021 billing. The adjustment to your billing will not negatively affect the billing to the other Municipalities in the District, as the amount of the adjustment will be withdrawn from the DTSSAB reserve account," the letter from chief administrative officer Kelly Black stated.

Englehart council thanked Robinson for bringing the error to everyone's attention.

Equipment subsidy amended to include all seasons

TEMAGAMI – Temagami council has passed a motion to direct staff to update the winter equipment subsidy, that was passed on March 4, to include all season recreation equipment for youth in the community, offering a maximum of \$55 to offset the cost.

The subsidy will be funded by Temagami's Phase 1 COVID-19 funding.

“Just with the timing, by the time March rolled around winter had almost passed this year, so staff are wondering if council would be interested in offering an equipment subsidy, no matter the season, at the same level,” said treasurer-administrator Craig Davidson at council's regular meeting April 15.

In past years, Temagami has hosted its annual Shiverfest event during the month of February. However, with COVID-19 restrictions the festival was unable to take place this year.

Councillor John Shymko had originally brought forward a notice of motion at council's regular meeting January 21 that he would like

municipal staff to explore the possibility of offering area families a subsidy for winter sport/recreational equipment through funds normally used to host Shiverfest.

Staff then conducted a cost analysis study on the equipment subsidy, which Davidson discussed at council's regular meeting on March 4.

Staff discovered that through the municipality's Phase 1 COVID-19 funding, council could provide a subsidy for winter recreational activities.

In order to determine the subsidy allocation for each family, Davidson said they used the enrolment for the Virtual Breakfast with Santa event that took place over Christmas as a guide, with 54 participants at a \$55 maximum subsidy per child. The total available would be \$2,970, which is close to the target amount of \$3,000.

The equipment subsidy will be available for those between the ages of two and 13.

Barbecue Safety

Grilled to Perfection Every Time!



USE BBQS OUTDOORS ONLY! They produce **carbon monoxide**, a poisonous gas that can lead to unconsciousness and even death. Never use or store propane cylinders inside any structure, including garages.

Take these steps when starting a BBQ:

- Open the hood.
- Turn on the gas release valve on the tank.
- Turn on the grill controls or heat settings.
- Take a step back.
- Push the igniter button.
- If there is no igniter button, insert a long match or BBQ lighter through the side burner hole first, then turn on the heat control knob.
- If the burner does not ignite right away, turn the gas off and wait five minutes, keeping the hood open, before repeating the procedure.

At the start of the BBQ season, do this THREE-STEP SAFETY CHECK of your BBQ:

- 1 CLEAN** Use a pipe cleaner or wire to ensure burner ports are free of rust, dirt, spider webs or other debris.
- 2 CHECK** Examine the hose leading from the tank to the burners. Replace it if cracked or damaged.
- 3 TEST** Find leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to propane cylinder connections and hoses. If bubbles appear, tighten the connection and/or replace the damaged parts and retest.

Stay Fire Safe!

Never leave the BBQ unattended when in use.

Make sure grease does not build up on the burners or at the base of the BBQ. This could cause a grease fire.

Never throw water on a grease fire – this will only spread the flame.

DO NOT place the BBQ close to wooden fences or walls, vinyl siding, or anything that can burn. The area behind your BBQ must be free of anything that can ignite – this is where hot gases escape.

Keep loose clothing away from a hot BBQ.

Keep children and pets at least one metre (three feet) away from a hot BBQ.

When finished barbecuing, turn the gas valve off first, then turn off the burner controls so no gas is left in the connecting hose.

Allow the BBQ to cool completely before closing the cover.

If you live in an apartment or condo building, check with the building owner or property manager, or the Condominium Act of your building, regarding the use of BBQs on your building's balconies.

Here at the health unit, we've received many calls from individuals who want to know if they can continue helping others, such as elderly parents or neighbours, during shutdown. We understand that the current shutdown is a difficult situation for many families.

Under the stay at home order, you may deliver goods or provide care or other support or assistance to an individual who requires it. There are many reasons that people may need support, such as mental or physical health, help with groceries, and rides to appointments.

While helping others, you can minimize the risk of spreading COVID-19 by providing support outdoors if possible, maintaining a distance of 2 metres, and wearing a mask.

Social gatherings are now prohibited both indoors and outdoors. However, providing support is considered essential under the stay at home order and may continue.

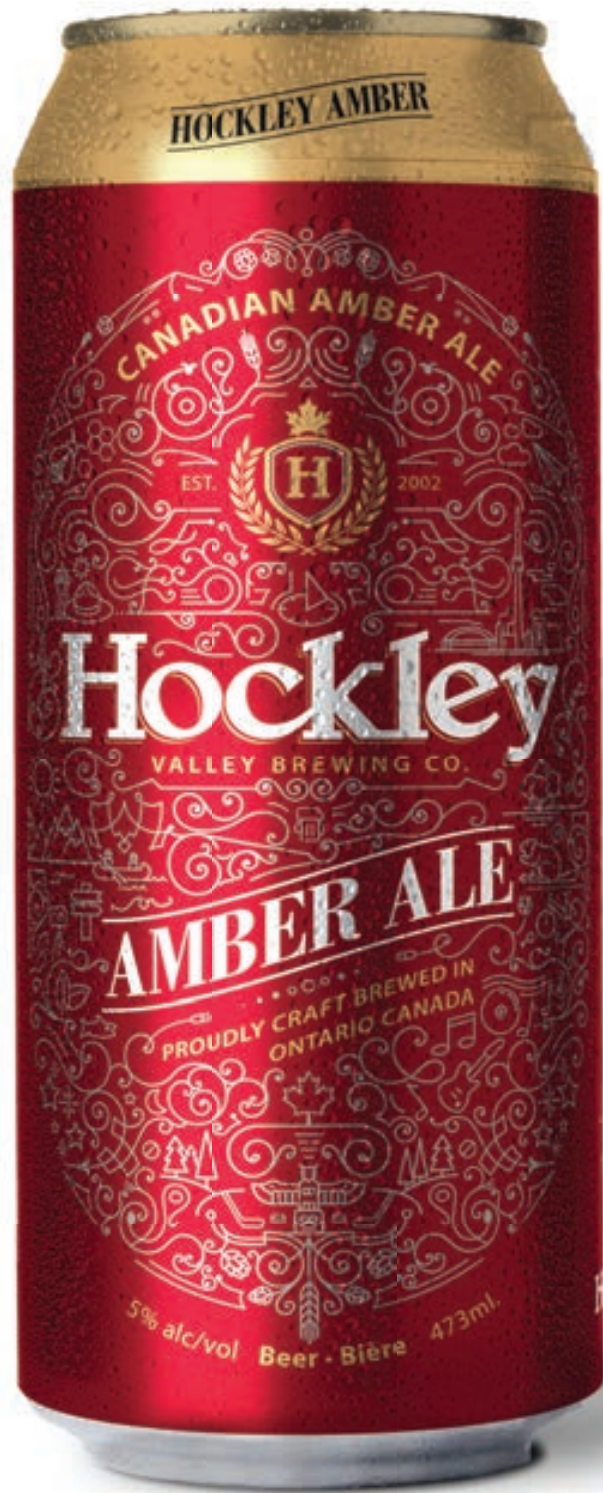
