



Sounding off Latchford preparing new noise bylaw

LATCHFORD - Latchford town council is preparing a noise bylaw with noise constraints between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.

The proposed bylaw was discussed at Latchford's regular council meeting Thursday, June 17.

Councillor Scott Green initiated the discussion on the proposed bylaw after it first appeared before council without clear time constraints.

"It's basically saying you can't have loud music on your property at any particular time during the day," he commented bylaw. "It's pretty vague," he said.

The bylaw as originally presented suggested that "if anyone is hearing any noise on your property they can call the bylaw officer and you will be fined," Green pointed out. The bylaw would make more sense if it required noise to be turned off at a certain time after dark, he said.

Mayor George Lefebvre agreed with Green that his suggestion made sense.

Councillor Sharon Gadoury East noted that most municipalities have a cut-off time of 11 p.m.

It was agreed that council would delay passing the noise bylaw until the next council meeting to allow details indicating times could be inserted in the bylaw.

The council also discussed the fine rates. The originally proposed bylaw suggested a \$100 fine for noise infractions.

Green suggested the fines should be increased so "we're not actually losing money every time there's a call."

Council noted that it would be its municipal bylaw officer who would be responding to calls about noise infractions, and the municipality pays the officer for the times he is called out. However, the fines are collected under the Provincial Offences Act, and collected revenue is then redistributed with participating municipalities receiving a share.

The council agreed that because of that arrangement, consideration was needed to ensure the town is not losing money when noise complaints are acted upon by the bylaw officer.

"We don't want to be losing money on it," said Lefebvre.

Clerk Jaime Allen pointed out that the fines could be increased if council wished and council agreed to a \$300 fine for an infraction.

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Road rules for those “other” vehicles

DISTRICT (Special) – E-bikes, motorized wheelchairs, scooters and golf carts – where can they legally be driven?

The OPP outline the following rules of the road:

ELECTRIC BIKES

To operate an e-bike on Ontario’s public roads:

- E-bikes, including the battery, can weigh no more than 120 kilograms.
- Operators and passengers must be at least 16 years old.
- Operators and passengers must wear approved bicycle or motorcycle helmets.
- The motor cannot be modified

to permit it to exceed a power output more than 500W and a speed faster than 32 km/h.

- E-bikes can be operated only on the right side of the road, travelling with traffic, and as close to the curb as is practicable (within about one metre). Driver’s licence requirements:
- You cannot legally operate an e-bike if your licence has been suspended because of a conviction that resulted in a driving prohibition under the Criminal Code of Canada.

WHEELCHAIRS AND MEDICAL SCOOTERS

- Can be driven by muscular power or other types of power;
- Are designed for and used by people whose mobility is limited by a condition or functional impairment;
- Wheelchairs do not require registration, licence plates,

a driver’s licence or vehicle insurance. Anyone at any age can ride a wheelchair.

- A sidewalk should be the first choice for someone using a wheelchair or medical scooter. Check with your local municipality to see if the bylaws allow their use on sidewalks. When there is no wheelchair-accessible curb, return to the sidewalk at the first available opportunity.
- If there is no sidewalk available, you should: travel along the left shoulder of the roadway facing oncoming traffic and look for a way to get onto a sidewalk safely and as soon as you can.

People operating motorized wheelchairs are treated as pedestrians. You must obey all the rules of the road that apply to pedestrians under the Highway Traffic Act (HTA).

GOLF CARTS

Golf carts are not considered low-speed vehicles and are not permitted on roadways.

Anyone found operating a golf cart on a road could be charged with a number of offences under the HTA, including:

- Operating a vehicle on the roadway with no automobile insurance (\$5,000 fine);
- Operating a vehicle without required equipment;
- Operating a vehicle with no vehicle permit;
- Operating a vehicle on a roadway with no driver’s licence (applicable to youth with no driver’s licence);
- No odometer.

Golf carts can be used only where the HTA does not apply, such as private property. Operation on or across highways or city streets is strictly prohibited.

Ontario Family Fishing! Go Fishing with your family!



Ontario Family Fishing Event is a province-wide opportunity for Canadian residents to fish Ontario waters without the otherwise mandatory fishing version outdoors card. The Ontario Government has designated this period throughout the year as license-free:

July 3 – 11, 2021

(12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday).

During all other time periods, Canadian residents between the ages of 18 and 64 years must purchase a valid fishing license to legally fish in Ontario.

There has never been a better time to go fishing with your family!

Participants fishing without a license must fish under the Conservation fishing license limits which are set out in the current Ontario Recreational Fishing Regulations Summary. With the exception of the licensing requirement, Ontario fishing regulations, fees and limits continue to apply during license-free days. Printed copies of the summary are available at licence issuers and ServiceOntario Centres



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Police urge public to Lock It or Lose It

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – A recent spate of thefts from vehicles has spurred police to remind the public of steps to protect their property.

In a news release, the Temiskaming OPP said a professional thief can steal a vehicle in just 30 seconds – without the key.

Police endorsed the Lock It or Lose It program, a proactive crime prevention initiative that encourages drivers to take a few precautions to protect their vehicles and contents from theft.

- Keep valuables out of sight.
- If you must leave them in the

vehicle, put them in the trunk before you park at your final destination.

- Always park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Never leave your vehicle unattended while it is running.
- Lock your doors at all times.

In the upcoming days, police and members of the Temiskaming OPP Auxiliary Unit will be conducting patrols while running the Lock it or Lose it program.

They’ll be checking for insecure vehicles and reminding the public that the first

line of defence is to secure your vehicle and your property.

Police urge the public to report all suspicious activity. Try to collect as many details as possible while ensuring your own safety, and do not interfere with a crime scene.

Information can also be passed on anonymously through Crime Stoppers, at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477).

The organization’s civilian board of directors may pay up to \$2,000 for information leading to an arrest.

NL fire station getting new rescue truck

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – The New Liskeard fire station is getting a new vehicle to replace its aging rescue truck.

Temiskaming Shores council approved the \$430,085 purchase May 18.

The new Freightliner truck will carry firefighters’ self-contained breathing apparatus as well as other gear and supplies.

A new truck had been on the city’s wish-list for some time, but it was dropped from spending plans in 2019 and again in 2020.

The new vehicle – a heavy fire rescue truck –will be custom-built by Dependable Emergency Vehicles of Brampton, with delivery expected by May 1, 2022.

The final cost is about \$15,100 over budget.

To cover the shortfall, the fire department will defer an alarm project and draw on a fire equipment reserve. That reserve fund recently received \$7,800 from the Ministry of Transportation for auto extrication services provided by the service.

Canadians plan to spend more time in nature this summer

DISTRICT (Special) - With Canadian provinces beginning to emerge from recent stay-at-home orders and warm weather finally approaching, there is no better time to get outside and be immersed in nature. A new survey has found that Canadians enjoy spending time in nature and 90 per cent agree it is “great” for their mental and physical health. Although time spent in nature has decreased per week since the onset of COVID-19, Canadians aspire to spend 18 hours a week outdoors this summer.

H+K Strategies accessed Leger Opinion’s (LEO) online panel to survey 1,000 Canadians over the period of March 3 to 8.

Other findings from the survey include:

- 87 per cent of Canadians agree that being in nature reduces their stress levels and 68 per cent agree it increases their productivity.
- Walking or hiking is the most popular outdoor activity among Canadians (81 per cent).

- Those who identify as female are more enthusiastic about spending time in nature than those who identify as male. They are also more likely to enjoy outdoor recreation activities like walking or hiking (85 per cent), going out on a lake, river or ocean (54 per cent) and picnics (51 per cent).
- Canadians spent less time in nature during COVID-19: seven hours per week, down from 10 hours pre-pandemic
- Lack of motivation (35 per cent) and not having enough time (35 per cent) are the biggest barriers to spending time

in nature for Canadians.

Benefits to spending time in nature include:

- Improves sleep: Sleep is the only time our bodies and brains have to recover from the stresses of the day. Exposure to sunlight (even behind grey clouds) during the day increases our melatonin production at night - a natural hormone that is produced in the brain, which helps regulate our sleep cycle and promotes consistent, quality rest.
- Reduces stress: Being in nature calms our senses. There is less stress on our nerves, our nervous system and our

brain when we connect with nature, and therefore less stress on our body. With our nervous system calm, it means our bodies are in “Rest and Digest” mode, which offers key benefits such as improved digestion, immunity, cognitive health, memory and mood.

- Improves focus and productivity: The brain is like a muscle, it needs to be trained in order to stay fit. With new things to see, smell, touch, hear, and maybe even taste, nature provides an opportunity to experience an entirely different environment.

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

Canada Day celebrations will have a slightly different feel to them on July 1.

In fact, some communities are cancelling Canada Day celebrations to show respect for Indigenous people who are mourning the discovery of unmarked children's graves at former residential schools.

It is a time to honour all lives lost to racism in Canada and to learn to live together as one nation, under one flag.

Canada is a country built on its colonial past and the cultural genocide of Indigenous people.

Reconciliation cannot happen without truth and it is long past a time when Canadians take a long look at the truth of how Indigenous people have been marginalized and discriminated against.

To this day Canada continues to inflict harm on its

Indigenous people by withholding bare minimum resources like clean drinking water, proper housing and sovereign access to their own lands.

Ontario Northland buses returning to normal schedule

NORTH BAY (Staff/Special) - Ontario Northland has announced that it will be resuming all regularly scheduled motor coach routes and adding two new Toronto area stops beginning on July 4.

The announcement was made Tuesday, June 29, by Ontario Minister of Transportation Caroline Mulroney and Minister of Economic Development,

Job Creation and Trade (Nipissing MPP) Vic Fedeli. "As the province safely re-opens, our government is providing more transit options for Ontarians," said Mulroney in a

press release. "Ontario Northland resuming all regularly scheduled bus routes and adding two new stops in Toronto demonstrates that our government is on the right track as Ontario safely re-opens."

Bus passengers travelling to Toronto will now be able to stop at Toronto's Union Station Bus Terminal and the King City GO station. These two new stops will provide easy connections to the GO train, subway and regional transit, and complement existing stops at four major hospitals in Toronto, the Highway 407 Terminal and Yorkdale.

"Improving transportation options for the people of Northern Ontario has always been a

priority for our government," said Fedeli.

"Today's updates will ensure underserved northern communities are connected and people have access to jobs and critical services."

"We're always looking for ways to enhance the customer experience for our passengers," said Ontario Northland chief executive officer Corina Moore.

"A King City GO Station stop and a Union Station Bus Terminal stop provide passengers with options to easily connect to rail, subway and regional transit when accessing Toronto, a popular destination for many northerners traveling for tourism, education, work and medical appointments."

SITE LOCATION MAP

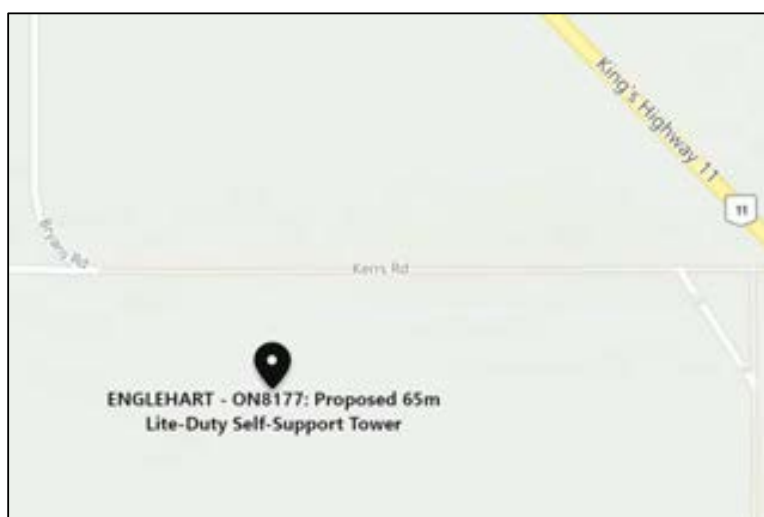
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COMMUNITY NEWS

Council Meetings: The next Regular Council meeting will be held on Monday, July 12, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. This meeting will take place electronically. Details of the meeting will be posted in advance of the meeting. Anyone interested in listening in on the meeting can call the Office for details.

By-law No. 16-35 outlines that during the summer months of June, July and August, there will be one (1) regular monthly meeting only. During the 2021 summer season, the regular council meeting schedule for July and August is as follows:

- Monday, August 9, 2021

Municipal Office: The Office will be closed on Thursday, July 1, 2021 in observance of Canada Day. The Office remains closed to the public for in-person transactions until further notice. This is to minimize non-essential travel and in-person visits to the office to help keep staff and the public safe and to help reduce the spread of COVID-19. Recycling: Next June collection date will be on Tuesday, June 29, 2021. Collection dates in July are on July 13 and 27, 2021.

Burning Permits - Reminder: No fire permits for open air burning will be issued during the months of July and August.

Reminder: Open air burning is considered to be any fire set outside, other than a small confined fire for obtaining warmth and cooking. Small confined fires for cooking and warmth, that comply with the regulations and are contained to your own property, or a property in which an individual has permission to use, are exempt from requiring a Fire Permit under the Open Air Burning By-law. No. 13-23. There are size limits, clearance requirements, and provisions respecting fire control measures that you must have in place, if you decide to burn.

Plant health protection rooted in prevention

OTTAWA (Special) – As summer begins, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) would like to remind Canadians what they can do to protect plant health.

In a news release, the CFIA stressed the importance of preventing the introduction and spread of invasive insects, plants, molluscs and diseases to maintain Canada's precious plant resources.

Invasive plant pests are most active in Canada during the summer months.

The CFIA encourages Canadians to join the plant health movement and go outdoors this summer to check the trees, parks and gardens in their community.

Check vehicles, equipment or other things you have stored outside, especially before heading out across the country or across the border so that you don't bring along uninvited "guests," such as European gypsy moth, weed seeds and soil.

Become familiar with invasive pests in your area and report sightings that may be new, like the spotted lanternfly.

Some pests, like the emerald ash borer, might hitch a ride if you transport firewood.

When heading camping or on a trip to the cottage this summer, be sure to buy or gather your firewood where you'll burn it.

Everyone has a role to play in safeguarding Canada's forests, agriculture and environment.

The CFIA's plant health hero activity books are a great way to have fun and help teach kids about how plants are the basis for all living things.

A full list of invasive pests that the CFIA is monitoring is available online.

The CFIA's invasive pest cards and pest facts sheets provide more information on what to look for and what to report.

Report insects or unusual tree damage using the CFIA's website or social media channels, or via apps like iNaturalist and EDD-maps.

The United Nations had designated 2020 as the International Year of Plant Health.

"Spread the word about plant protection so that together we can protect our forests, agriculture and food security," said Marie-Claude Bibeau, Canada's minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, in the release.

"While we may be saying goodbye to the International Year of Plant Health, we say hello to a renewed appreciation for our green spaces, working together and protecting our plant resources."

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Provinces falling short on conservation measures

DISTRICT - Lack of adequate conservation measures by provinces and territories is to blame for Canada failing to meet its international conservation target, according to a new report by the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society (CPAWS).

According to the report, Quebec and the federal government stood out as conservation leaders, however Ontario, Alberta, Newfoundland and Labrador, and Saskatchewan were severely lacking. Alberta and Ontario scored the lowest and were judged to have actively undermined conservation.

The report graded provinces, territories, and the federal government based on their efforts to conserve at least 17 per cent of Canada's land and 10 per cent of its oceans by 2020, and 30 per cent by 2030.

Quebec came the closest to success with 16.7 per cent of its land protected. The feds fell short of the 17 per cent goal, with only 13.1 per cent of land and inland waters protected by the 2020 deadline.

The ocean protection target of 10 per cent was surpassed with 13.8 per cent protected but the report cites concerns about the quality of conservation measures in some areas.

"The report demonstrates clearly that we need action by all provinces and territories to hold and reverse the critical

decline of biodiversity, particularly if Canada is going to meet our current pledge to protect at least 30 per cent of land and ocean," said Sandra Schwartz, national executive director of CPAWS.

The report will be used as a baseline to track progress made by each jurisdiction towards the 2025 and 2030 biodiversity targets. CPAWS plans to release subsequent report cards.

The report assigned letter grades to provinces, territories, and the federal government based on their progress towards reaching Canada's conservation goals, support for Indigenous-led conservation, and protected area management. Prince Edward Island and Nunavut were not graded because CPAWS doesn't have an on-the-ground presence in those regions.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT: LAND A- AND OCEAN B+

The federal government has made two historic investments for terrestrial conservation, one in 2018 committing \$1.3 billion over five years and another \$2.3 billion in 2021.

"The federal government does stand out as a leader right now," said Schwartz. "That's significant funds to help provinces and territories get action on the ground and included funding to support Indigenous-led conservation."

As of right now, it is uncertain exactly how much of the \$2.3 billion will be used for Indigenous-led initiatives.

Although the federal government can't create terrestrial protected areas without support from the provinces, territories, or Indigenous governments, 14 new federal or co-governed protected areas have been created since 2010, protecting 0.5 per cent of Canada's total land area.

The federal government's \$175 million Canada Nature Fund currently supports 62 initiatives to create protected and conservation areas and/or help recover species at risk.

Funding can be accessed by not-for-profit and Indigenous organizations, provinces and territories, and others. Most of the projects will become Indigenous Protected and Conserved Areas (IPCAs) and push Canada to 17 per cent protection when completed.

Even though it fell short of the 17 per cent target for land and inland water, the federal government's ambitious targets, support for Indigenous-led conservation and significant funding earned it an A-.

The federal grade for marine protection is a B+. In 2015, less than one per cent of Canada's oceans were protected and in six years the federal government managed to surpass the 10 per cent target by protecting 13.8 per cent. They didn't get a higher grade because, despite exceeding the target, there are concerns about the quality of the protective measures.

In 2018 and 2020, licenses for oil exploration were awarded in

the Northeast Newfoundland Slope marine refuge, raising questions about protection standards the Department of Fisheries and Oceans is now working to revise, said the report.

"We remain quite hopeful that we'll see some changes made to marine protection standards," said Schwartz.

ONTARIO F

Like Alberta, Ontario dropped its 17 per cent land protection target in 2018 and has protected less than one per cent of Ontario's land in the last decade. Most of this limited progress resulted from community-led land use planning in 2011 and cannot be credited to the provincial government.

No new protected areas have been added since 2017 and key elements of environmental law

and policy have been weakened or dismantled. However, after receiving backlash for special zoning orders the Ontario government has said it plans to expand the Greenbelt and recently announced it would hand over a slice of land to the local conservation authority.

The Progressive Conservative Government exempts forestry companies from Ontario's Endangered Species Act and allows developers to destroy endangered species habitat for a fee.

The Ford government's COVID-19 Recovery Act also altered the Environmental Assessment Act so that a full assessment is now only required if the minister deems it necessary.

Why We Need More Vitamin B12 As We Age

It's estimated that up to 20% of people aged 50 and older may be low in vitamin B12, with this deficiency becoming more common as people get older.

The Most Common Problems Related to Low Vitamin B12 levels include:

- Memory problems
- Heart disease
- Unhealthy blood cells
- Loss of feeling in the hands or feet

As a result, Vitamin B12 deficiency can impact the quality of life of older adults.

Where Do We Get Our Vitamin B12?

We get it from eating meats, eggs, and dairy products. Health Canada recommends that anyone over the age of 14 get 2.4 micrograms per day – a tiny but important amount. Studies show that older adults are generally eating enough B12, yet about 1 in 4 have a vitamin B12 deficiency. This could be because as we age, our bodies are less able to absorb the vitamin B12 we eat. This is especially true when certain medications are taken, such as antacids and Metformin (used for diabetes).

Why Vitamin B12 Deficiency is Often Missed in Older Adults?

Because the symptoms – fatigue, anemia, neuropathy, memory problems, and walking difficulties – are quite common in older adults and can easily be caused by something else. Also, Vitamin B12 deficiency tends to come on very slowly, so people often go through a long period of being mildly deficient.

Vitamin B12 deficiency is quite treatable – you just need to make sure it's detected and then make sure the treatment plan raises the Vitamin B12 levels and keeps them steady.

How Can we Make Sure we are Getting Enough B12?

The good news is that it is generally thought that you can't eat too much Vitamin B12. It's safe to eat much more than the recommended daily allowance. Besides meat, eggs and dairy products, Vitamin B12 fortified foods are also good sources – for example, cold breakfast cereals, soy milk or other non-dairy milks. Vitamin B12 supplements are also available in drug stores – your health care provider or pharmacist can help you decide on the right dose for you.

If you have any of the problems noted above and you're concerned you might not be getting enough Vitamin B12, ask your health care provider for a blood test to check your B12 level.

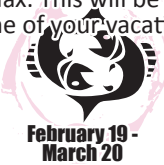

Fireworks Safety Tips

The Office of the Fire Marshal offers the following fireworks safety tips:

- To minimize the risk of fire and burn injury, the fire service recommends that everyone attend public fireworks displays organized and monitored by fireworks experts (for example, displays organized by your local municipality).
- Backyard or family fireworks displays are not recommended.

• If you choose to have a backyard or family fireworks display, the following safety tips should be followed:

- ✓ purchase your fireworks from a reliable source;
- ✓ always read and follow the label directions exactly;
- ✓ adults must supervise the lighting and handling of fireworks at all times;
- ✓ always keep water handy (a garden hose or bucket of water);
- ✓ discharge fireworks away from combustible materials, including buildings and trees;
- ✓ keep children a safe distance away from fireworks when the fireworks are discharged;
- ✓ light only one firework at a time;
- ✓ never re-light a "dud" firework (wait 15 to 20 minutes, then soak it in a bucket of water);
- ✓ never give fireworks to small children, including sparklers. While sparklers are often considered harmless fun, they can burn twice as hot as a typical kitchen oven (they can burn at 650 C or 1,200 F), can ignite clothing, and cause eye damage and burns;
- ✓ dispose of fireworks properly by soaking them in water and then disposing of them in a metal garbage can;
- ✓ if someone gets burned, run cool water over the wound for three to five minutes.

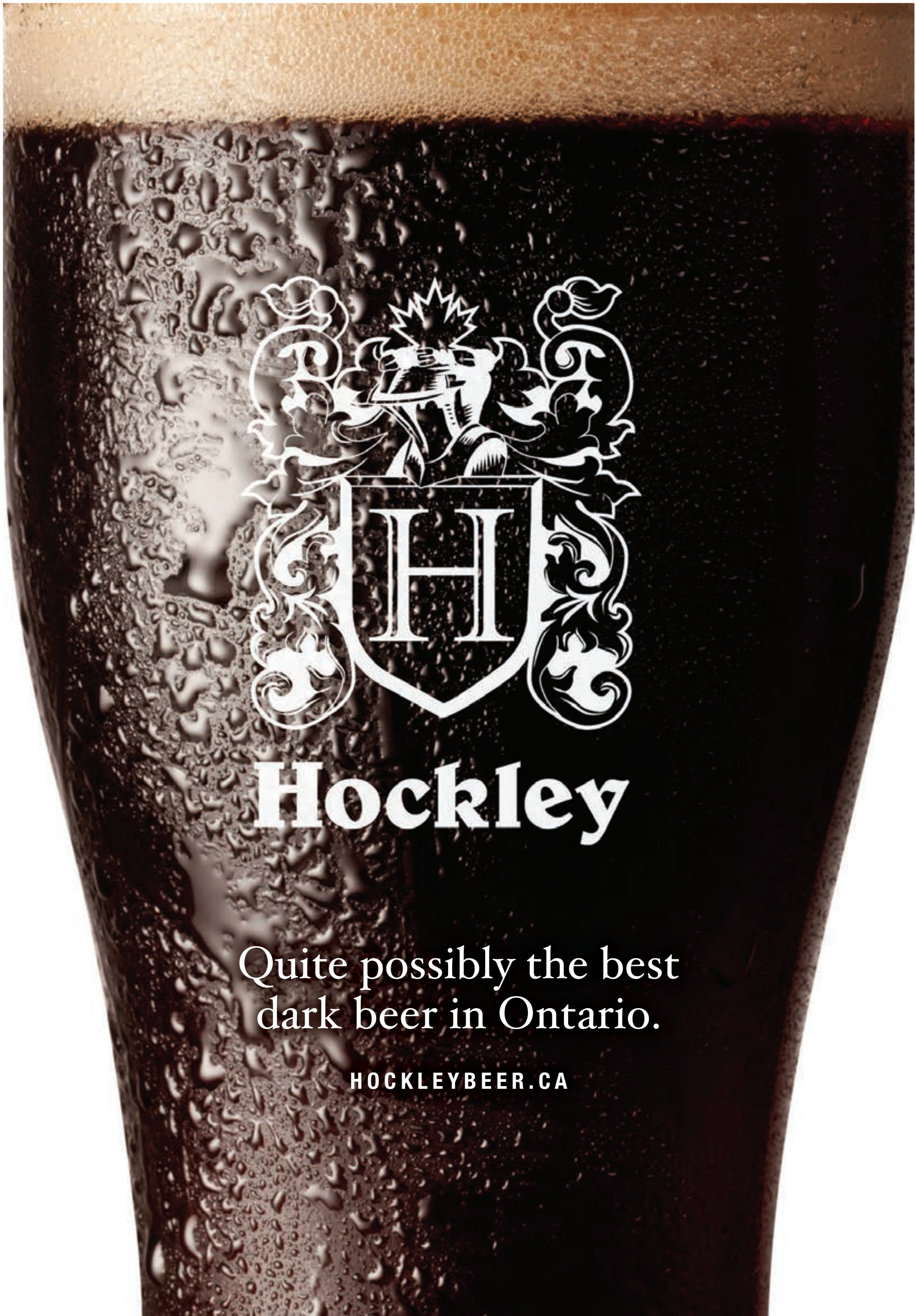
