Northern College launching free health care programs

Continued from Front

It said the formation of the project advisory committee will see a "talent pipeline" take shape with Timmins and District Hospital, which will help train and support student placements and potential employment for graduates.

Two weeks of training will support workplace retention.

The college said the program includes wraparound support for the unemployed and the precariously employed, including those receiving Employment Insurance benefits, without impacting the funds they currently get.

Support will continue after graduation, with connections and outreach to employers.

Over the next two years, Northern College will offer four different programs to students considering careers in health care or a related field.

students to study without the need to relocate.

They include newly designed programs for health care support service workers, food service workers and personal support worker assistants, as well as Northern's longstanding personal support worker program.

"This is an incredible opportunity for those seeking an education at a time where support has never been greater," said Heavens.

Making the commitment to pursue college-level education "can be difficult," she said.

"Nevertheless, this project is focused on helping students eliminate previous barriers to goal attainment.

"These programs are designed for maximum effectiveness, meaning that students can gain accreditation in a program like Health Care Support in 300 hours. How-

Each will enable qualifying ever, not all programs will be accelerated."

> In addition to these funded learning opportunities, students will also graduate with all work-related accreditation required to enter the workforce.

> The college noted that the Far Northeast Training Board has identified a need in Northern Ontario for health care workers.

Almost 400 professionals are reported to be needed now, with projections for the next decade showing even larger gaps and an increased need for care as the population ages.

Northern College's programs will begin as early as this summer.





Ontario Family Fishing! Go Fishing with your



Ontario Family Fishing Event is a province-wide opportunity for Canadian residents to fish Ontario waters without the otherwise mandatory fishing version outdoors card. The Ontario Government has designated this period throughout the year as license-free:

July 3 – 11, 2021

(12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday).

During all other time periods, Canadian residents between the ages of 18 and 64 years must purchase a valid fishing license to legally fish in Ontario.

There has never been a better time to go fishing with your family!

Participants fishing without a license must fish under the Conservation fishing license limits which are set out in the current Ontario Recreational Fishing Regulations Summary. With the exception of the licensing requirement, Ontario fishing regulations, fees and limits continue to apply during license-free days. Printed copies of the summary are available at licence issuers and ServiceOntario Centres

Tips for a great summer road

To make the most out of your next road trip, CAA South Central Ontario (CAA SCO) reminds drivers to plan, prepare and always keep safety top of mind.

"Road trips can be a safer alternative and an excellent option this summer, but it's important that we take the proper precautions before hitting the road to ensure a safe trip," said Tony Tsai, CAA SCO vice president, communications and services, in a media release.

"Planning your itinerary and preparing your car for the summer road trip will help to prevent delays and breakdowns."

It offers the following tips to get your car road-trip ready:

• Check your tires. Ensure the tire pressure meets the manufacturer's recommendations to improve your vehicle's cycle of your tires.

- Wash your car. Give your vehicle a thorough scrub. Don't forget to clean your windshield, inside and out, and replace worn wiper blades.
- Top up your fluids. Consider packing extra summer washer fluid and change your oil if you are close to your regularly scheduled appoint-
- Clean your windshield. Clean any debris inside and out, and replace worn wiper blades.
- Check your lights. Make sure your headlights, brake lights and turn signals are working properly. If you have kids, teach them about road safety by involving them in the process.
- Test the battery. Intense heat can cause just as much havoc on your car battery as the frigid cold. If your battery is older than three years, have a professional test your car battery and replace it. CAA

Battery Service will test, boost or replace your battery.

• Pack an emergency roadside kit. Whether you buy a pre-assembled kit or create your own, it should include a few essentials including a flashlight, jumper cables, working jack, cell phone battery charger, water and non-perishable food.

To plan and prepare for stress-free travel:

- Book flexible accommodations. When looking for places to stay, search for hotels with free or flexible cancellation policies.
- Monitor local public health updates and local news. Information related to COVID-19 can change rapidly. Check for updates before leaving and while on the road.
- Be ready for a sudden change of plans. Double-check the website of your destination. Some cities or regions may still have restrictions or closures in place for people out of the area.

• Come prepared. Pack extra face coverings, gloves, and cleaning supplies – like disinfecting wipes and hand sanitizer – plus a thermometer. Bring plenty of food and water in case of breakdown.

• Have a food plan. Research local restaurants, call ahead to find out hours of operation and COVID procedures or consider curbside pick-up.

Optimizing Snacking

Food not only provides us with the energy and the fuel we need but also produces enjoyment, identifies culture, holds tradition and creates community. Every time we eat offers an opportunity to nourish our bodies and enrich our lives.

Snacks are an important part of our daily eating habits and can help us to receive all of the nutrients we require. Incorporating delicious, nutrientdense snack options can therefore help us to meet our daily nutrition needs and provide us with adequate energy. Below is a list of tips to help improve snacking as well as some snack ideas.

Tips for Snacking:

- Choose a "Veggie Song". Cutting up vegetables and fruits ahead of time allows for easy 'grab and go', nutrient-dense, snack options. This task however can feel cumbersome. Choosing a 2-4 minute song, that you enjoy, allows you to set a couple of minutes aside to accomplish the task while listening to a favourite tune.
- Store individually. Pre-portioning non-perishable items such as wholewheat crackers, roasted chickpeas, rice cakes and trail mix, increases the convenience of these high-fiber or protein packed options. Consider storing muffins, and/or pancakes individually in the freezer for an easy 'grab and go' snack to enjoy later.
- Incorporate what you love. This will look different for everyone and may include exploring new flavours, including cultural favourites, sharing ideas with family and friends or finding creative ways to modify old-time favourites based on health motivators.

Snack Ideas. A whole grain muffin and an orange; a hard-boiled egg and a pear; pumpkin seeds and berries on yogurt; apple slices and cheese; egg salad or labneh spread (a soft Middle Eastern cheese made from strained yogurt) on whole grain crackers.


Anyone **12 and over** can book an accelerated **second dose!**

If your first dose was:

- Moderna or Pfizer: you can get either Moderna or Pfizer when you are eligible and it's at least 28 days after your first dose. You can switch between Moderna and Pfizer safely.
- AstraZeneca: you can get AstraZeneca, Moderna, or Pfizer for your second dose when you are eligible and it's at least 8-12 weeks after your first dose with informed consent.





TEMISKAMING SHORES – Another leg of the STATO trail will be completed this summer.

The city has been awarded almost \$100,000 from a federal-provincial program to build a 450-metre stretch of the trail in Haileybury for cyclists, pedestrians and other non-motorized users.

"This project is being fully funded through the provincial and federal governments with no municipal contribution," said Matt Bahm, Temiskaming Shores' recreation director, in an email.

It'll cover an extension of the trail from city hall to Albert Street along the east side of Farr Drive.

The tender was released last week with a completion date of October 1, "but is likely to be finished before then," Bahm said.

Funding comes from the COVID-19 resilience stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program.

The federal government is contributing \$79,806 and the province, \$19,952.


