



Band together Marsh research centre open to public

HILLIARDTON - The Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre continues to investigate the world of birds and related topics in nature.

The fall bird banding season began on August 3 and the banders are seeing as many as 100 birds a day landing in their nets. After a brief inspection and banding, if required, the birds are quickly released again.

Head bander Bruce Murphy noted that this year many people are observing a large number of purple finches in the region.

The Cape May warbler is also in the area, taking advantage of the beginning of a spruce budworm breakout in the region. There has already

been a small outbreak of the insects in western Quebec.

Others, such as the sharp-shinned hawk, also known as the songbird shadow, are here.

Flycatchers are also present.

On September 15, the centre will begin its annual capture and banding of owls. The late evening event is a big attraction for people who wish to get a little closer to these

great nocturnal birds.

One of the banders this year has been Douglas Manners, who this summer has been the lead for the Stewardship Youth Ranger crew.

Over the summer, the crew has been carrying out some contract work for the Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry, and also for Ducks Unlimited, said

Manners.

Their work has included monitoring of the water levels within the water cells at the wetland to ensure the water is not getting too low or too high. Water levels impact vegetation and duck nesting, he explained. The crew has also been ensuring the upkeep of the marsh, getting all the net lanes ready for the banding season, and set-

ting up the nets.

They have also been preparing for the owl-banding season.

Manners' work at the Marsh now includes a year of observations.

EARLY MIGRATION

While it seemed there were less birds this spring, Manners expects more birds to pass through the boreal

EDITORIAL

Vaccine passports?

As Ontarians and Temiskaming residents prepare to travel internationally and to send their children back to class this coming September, the issue of vaccine passports is being talked about more and more.

Ontario premier Doug Ford has rejected the notion of vaccination certificates or mandating immunizations in the workplace.

But if the government doesn't set the parameters surrounding proof of vaccination, then the private sector will, and there is no telling the problems this will reveal.

Can an employer tell a worker to stay home if they aren't fully vaccinated?

Many can and will make a strong case for mandating employee vaccinations in health care settings such as long term care homes, hospitals, medical clinics, dental offices and on and on.

Quebec has just said it will require proof of immunization for some non-essential services.

Manitoba is also rolling out a vaccine pass-

port requirement in the coming days.

Doug Ford believes in the constitutional right of Ontarians to chose immunization or not.

While vaccine passports don't force people, they may encourage people to get vaccinated as seen in Quebec where vaccine bookings shot up after Premier Francois Legault's announcement.

Perhaps, as the Delta variant travels where people travel, and a fourth wave of COVID-19 looms, and with Quebec, our next-door neighbour endorsing vaccine passports, Ford will feel an impulse to jump on the vaccine passport bandwagon.

The good news in our region is that as of August 5, almost 78 per cent of our population aged 12 and up have received a first dose, and about 68 per cent are fully vaccinated.

The Temiskaming Health Unit continues to offer walk-in vaccination clinics and vaccinations can also be had at local pharmacies.

The Canadian women's gold medal soccer game,

where Canada defeated the powerhouse American squad, ranked number one in the world, in the semifinal on the path to their final victory against Sweden.

Goaltender Stephanie Labbé came up big with some brilliant saves in the shootouts to help her team win gold.

And of course, team captain Christine Sinclair finally got her gold medal.

Canadian women athletes won 18 of the 24 medals we brought home, making a definite statement about women's sports.

It was so refreshing to watch the games rather than hearing the tired old narrative about whether quarterback Aaron Rodgers would be returning to Green Bay this fall.

Yawn!

Despite overall less television coverage for women's sports, less funding and less headlines and front-page stories, the women came, they saw and they dominated in Tokyo.

Hats off to the Canadian Olympic Committee's Own the Podium program, headed by Anne Merk-

linger, who values the importance of women's sports and the need to fully fund it as well.

The Canadian women were on fire.

Equally, sprinter Andre De Grasse and heptathlon sensation Damien Warner also gave spectacular performances winning gold medals for Canada.

I teared up a couple of times during the Olympics when our national anthem was being played, especially when De Grasse was on the podium.

It's been a long haul for our world-class sprinter and he did us proud.

The power of sport can and did bring us together for a brief period of time this summer despite the COVID-19 pandemic.

But the feeling that the International Olympic Committee (IOC) forced these games on us and the people of Tokyo because of broadcast revenues and big egos will linger long after the Olympic flame goes out.

Council Meetings: Council meetings will be going back to the regular schedule of every 2 weeks beginning in September. Monday, September 6, 2021 is Labour Day and the office will be closed. The next Regular Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 7, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. Details of the meeting will be posted in advance of the meeting. Anyone interested in attending the meeting can call the Office to register as there is a capacity limit for indoor gatherings.

Municipal Office: The Office is open to in-person transactions with limitations. 1 person or members of the same household are allowed in the reception area at a time to access services. This will allow staff an opportunity to disinfect between customers in accordance with Public Health Guidelines. The Province has moved into Step 3 of the Roadmap to Reopen on July 16, 2021. The Township continues to encourage the use of internet payments through your financial institution, or by mailing cheques to the Municipal office. Municipal Waste Site: Hours of Operation Tuesday and Saturday - 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Closed: Statutory Holidays All garbage deposited at the Municipal Waste Site is subject to applicable tipping fees.

Garbage: A maximum of three (3) regular sized garbage bags of household garbage will be picked-up weekly. Please ensure your garbage is out by 7 am.

Fall Amnesty Week: Landfill Site: The amnesty program (no tipping fees) at the Coleman Landfill site will

occur from **Tuesday, September 7 to Saturday, September 11, 2021 from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.** Vehicle access within the landfill site will be restricted to support physical distancing. Names and addresses from those depositing material will be required.

Curbside Collection: Collection of bulky items will occur from **Wednesday, September 8 to Friday, September 10th, 2021.** Please have waste set out for collection no later than 7:00 a.m. on September 8, 2021; no return trips will be made.

- All small or loose materials must be securely bagged or bundled/tied appropriately to facilitate efficient collection.
- No brush or construction material will be collected.
- As outlined in the Clean Yards By-law, No. 12-06, **no** Freon containing appliances will be collected, unless the Freon Gas was removed by a qualified technician and the appliance is tagged.

Recycling: The next collection date is on Tuesday, August 24, 2021.

Building Permits are required for all construction in the Township of Coleman. Please allow sufficient

processing time for your application.

By-law Enforcement: To report a property standards issue or if you want to report some illegal dumping or other by-law infraction, please contact the municipal office or Pete Gilboe directly at 705-648-3750.

Animal Control: For emergency animal control services, please contact the Animal Control Service Provider at 705-648-4583.

Burning Permits - Reminder: No fire permits for open air burning will be issued during the months of July and August.

Reminder: Open air burning is considered to be any fire set outside, other than a small confined fire for obtaining warmth and cooking. Small confined fires for cooking and warmth, that comply with the regulations and are contained to your own property, or a property in which an individual has permission to use, are exempt from requiring a Fire Permit under the Open Air Burning By-law. No. 13-23. There are size limits, clearance requirements, and provisions respecting fire control measures that you must have in place, if you decide to burn.



Cervical Cancer—What You Should Know

Each year in Canada, more than 1,300 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer and over 400 die from the disease. Almost all cases of cervical cancer are caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV), which is preventable through the HPV vaccine. The publicly funded vaccine is provided to male and female students in every province and territory through school-based programs. Regular screening of adult women is also vital as cervical cancer caught at an earlier stage has a high survival rate. Most cervical cancer (67%) occurs in women aged 30-59.

Risk Factors

The main risk factor for developing cervical cancer is the sexually transmitted human papilloma virus (HPV) that infects the cervix.

Other risk factors for developing cervical cancer include:

- Becoming sexually active at a young age; having many sexual partners or having a sexual partner that has had many sexual partners.
- Smoking.
- The use of birth control pills for a long period of time.
- Giving birth to many children.
- Having taken diethylstilbestrol (DES), or being the daughter of a mother who took DES.

Who Should Be Screened:

- Women 21 and older who are or ever have been sexually active, should be screened regularly for cervical cancer.
- Based on the latest clinical evidence, most women should be screened every 3 years.
- Regular screening can stop at the age of 70 if a woman has had 3 or more normal tests in the previous 10 years.

If you are due or overdue for cervical cancer screening, call your primary care provider today to schedule an appointment. Screening is the only way to find the early changes that might lead to cervical cancer.

Steel bars on the way for Larose Bridge

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP - The reconstruction of the Larose Bridge has been awaiting the arrival of some steel bars. The beams are now expected at the end of August or early September, commented Coleman Township Councillor

Mitch Lafreniere.

He was speaking at the August 9 meeting of Coleman Township.

The bridge, which is within the municipality, was removed last January.

The bridge is located at the north end of Cobalt Lake and connects Coleman Township with the Town of Cobalt and Lang Street.

The project has been delayed while steel bars are awaited.

Council was advised that it is expected the bridge can be reopened this winter if everything comes in on schedule.

However, the project in-

cludes waterproofing of the deck, and if that stage is reached too late in the season, making it too cold for the deck to be waterproofed, reopening of the bridge might be delayed until the spring, council heard.

Province has plans for more French teachers

DISTRICT (Special) - The Ontario government is introducing a new four-year strategy to recruit, train and retain more French teachers.

The strategy will help to address the ongoing shortage of French teachers and ensure continued access to high-quality French-language education in the public education system for working families by investing \$12.5 million over the next four years.

Access to a supply of French-language educators is a problem facing jurisdictions across Canada. Informed by recommendations from the Working Group on Teacher Shortage in the French-Language School System, and feedback from other sector partners and stakeholders, Ontario's strategy focuses on:

- Building awareness of teaching pathways, including

recruitment efforts in French-speaking jurisdictions abroad;

- Removing barriers to teacher training programs;

- Improving flexibility of teacher training programs, and

- Ensuring supportive teaching environments.

"Our government recognizes that the French-language education system in Ontario is essential to the vitality of our province's Francophone community," said Minister of Education Stephen Lecce.

"Whether quickly upskilling those already working in the education system or supporting individuals looking to start their training, we have world-class French language colleges and universities ready to help increase the supply of well-trained French teachers," said Ross Romano, Minister of Colleges and Universities.

The strategy will create more professional learning opportunities for teachers, provide new culturally relevant resources and supports, and includes a robust data collection exercise to better understand factors contributing to the teacher short-

age. The strategy will leverage work already underway, including projects funded in part by the federal government under the Teacher Recruitment and Retention Strategy in Minority French-Language Schools and the Canada-Ontario Agreement on Minority-Language Educa-

tion and Second Official-Language Instruction.

The strategy will also have positive impacts on French as a Second Language (FSL) programs in the English-language education system, which has been experiencing similar shortages.

forest this fall.

Manners noted that a British Columbia bird-banding lab has reported that the fires in that part of Canada have negatively affected the banding there.

"They have seen very low numbers of a lot of their species."

While there are fires in Northwestern Ontario, the Hilliardton Marsh's bird numbers do not seem to have been affected, he said.

The fall migration seems to have started earlier though. Manners thinks this is due to warm temperatures.

“I think the warmer weather has sped the migration up. Birds are moving a little bit faster.”

The centre’s fall banding begins on the first day in August after the holiday, but Manners thinks that a few species may have been missed because they have already moved through.

“We’re starting to be in the prime of our banding season for the fall, which I think is a little early.” Ordinarily, that would be about August 20, he said.

“We’re getting a really good diversity of species right now,” he commented.

Along with the birds, visitors are also returning to the Marsh’s research centre which has reopened its doors to the public now that COVID restrictions have been relaxed. The Marsh research centre is open to the public Monday to Saturday from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. each morning. There is an admission fee of \$10 while children under 10 are free.

Visitors will be able to watch the measuring and banding process, and may even be able to hold and release a bird. They will also be able to explore the butterfly garden and nearby berms which provide wetland habitat for waterfowl and other species.



Plans for in-person Englehart Fall Fair

ENGLEHART - Plans are now firmly in place to hold the Englehart Fall Fair in person this year.

Englehart and District Agricultural Society president Brian Smith commented in a telephone interview that the 2021 fall fair will be “similar to previous years,” but this year there will be COVID-19 protections in place.

attention on the weekend.

“We’ll have geese and sheep showing in the barn,” said Smith.

There will also be inflatables in the parking lot outside the arena.

“We’re looking for volunteers,” he said. Students looking for volunteer hours, or adults are being sought to help out.

“A lot of people are getting really excited about getting out to see other people again,” he said.

The Small Animal Buy, Sell and Trade and the yard sale have been attracting people. The bi-weekly event is being held to raise money for the Englehart Fall Fair.



The upgrades will include new public washrooms, including an accessible washroom.


“Right now we don’t have an accessible washroom on the site,” Councillor Lois Perry noted at council’s August 9 meeting.
