# Rising rates City insurance bill up another 20 per cent

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The city's insurance bill is rising again, this time by more than 20 per cent.

The city has renewed its agreement with BFL Canada

for municipal insurance and deductible for flood damage councillors. risk management services, at a premium of \$594,031.

That's up \$113,600, or almost 24 per cent, from 2020.

And it's more than double the \$247,770 the city paid in 2018.

for properties in some areas - including Riverside Drive, Whitewood Avenue and May Street in New Liskeard – is increasing to \$200,000.

"We're not alone in this," city manager Chris Oslund At the same time, its told Temiskaming Shores

He said rates for Northeastern Ontario municipalities are increasing on average by some 20 per cent.

"These are concerning numbers," he said at the July 13 meeting.

This year's insurance ex-

penditure represents roughly 4.5 per cent of the property taxes collected by the city.


# **DID YOU GET The Speaker THIS WEEK?** Here are some August 4 edition...

# Slower speeds, safer streets

Re. "Over the Limit," Weekender July 30, 2021

I've been hit by a car two times. But that's not what this letter is about - it's about the fact that I am here to write about it. I've also fallen in the middle of one of Toronto's busiest intersections at rush hour. I've hit my hand on the

hood of a car to get the attention of a driver who hadn't seen me in an intersection more times than I can count. This last one has happened as much while walking as cycling, and yes, it's happened in Temiskaming Shores as much as anywhere else.

In his recent presentation to City of Temiskaming Shores council, local road safety advocate Mark Wilson reminded us that streets need to be designed for people who make mistakes. Mistakes happen. And when they happen, where there is a 5,000 pound-plus vehicle in the mix, it's the momentum (and size - but that's another discussion) of the vehicle that will decide the fate of those involved. Every time I've walked away from an interaction with a vehicle, it was because the driver was not going so fast as to cause severe injury or death.

Slower speeds mean everyone can use the streets safely and a few seconds off of a commute is not worth the risk of someone's well-being.

I've shared my experience to help us consider how driving speeds might impact people of all ages who might be using our streets - walking, cycling, playing nearby - and what might happen if anyone makes a mistake. I support speed limits that minimize the risk of injury or death, and encourage others to do what they can to be mindful of speed and support our community's efforts toward safer road design.

# **Overdose Awareness**

An overdose means having more of a drug (or combination of drugs) than your body can handle. All drugs can cause an overdose, including prescription medication. It's important to know the right amount and the right time to take your medication. It's also extremely important to know what drugs should not be mixed, and to get help if you feel you are not in control of your drug use.

# **Depressants and Opioids**

A depressant is a drug that slows the vital activities of the body including breathing and heart rate. Depressants may also be known as sedatives. Opioids (such as heroin and pharmaceutical opioids like hydrocodone), medications like Xanax or Valium and alcohol all slow the central nervous system to produce a calming effect. When taken in large amounts or in combination with other medications and/or alcohol, these medications can weaken normal functions like breathing and lower heart rate until breathing and heart rate eventually stop, resulting in death.

Usually people don't think of alcohol when they think of an overdose, but alcohol is a depressant and it is possible to overdose on it. Acute alcohol poisoning, usually a result of binge drinking, is an example.

If you drink a large amount of alcohol quickly, the level of alcohol in your bloodstream can become dangerously high. Alcohol poisoning could stop you from breathing, stop your heart or cause you to choke on your own

# **Stimulants**

It is possible to overdose on amphetamines. Adderall and Dexedrine are both examples of prescription stimulants. Amphetamine overdose increases the risk of heart attack, stroke, seizure or drug-induced psychotic episodes.

### When to Call an Ambulance

Seeking emergency help isn't just for when someone is unconscious. You should also seek help when someone is:

- Having a seizure
- Experiencing severe headache
- Experiencing chest pain
- Having a hard time breathing
- Extremely paranoid, agitated and/or confused

It is not necessary for someone to have all of these signs or symptoms for them to be overdosing. Showing signs of one or more could still mean they are in trouble and need emergency help.

Always call an ambulance if you suspect someone has overdosed!!

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# EDITORIAL

# We must do better

The federal and provincial governments have given out monies through the Canadian Infrastructure Program in recent weeks to municipalities across the north for upgrades to arenas, sewer and water facilities and recreation infrastructure.

This money is being handed out because the federal and Ontario governments say the COVID-19 pandemic has placed undue strain on Ontario's 444 municipalities.

The irony surrounding those funding grants to many people is reflected in how our First Nation communities struggle with longterm boil water advisories.

There are 32 Ontario First Nation communities with long-term boil water advisories in place.

The Neskantaga First Nation community, along the James Bay coast, has been under a boil water advisory since 1995.

It remains a national disgrace that so many Indigenous communities don't have access to clean drinking water.

And yet the provincial and federal government hands out significant monies during the pandemic to upgrade municipal drinking water systems, sewer facilities and recreation infrastructure.

The fact that many First Nation communities don't have access to clean, safe drinking water at this time remains a dark spot on our collective Canadian conscience.


The platitudes of "we must do better" continue to ring empty as Indigenous communities deal with a clean water disparity.


The federal government has, to its credit, ended several Indigenous drinking water advisories that had placed First Nations people's health in jeopardy for decades.


With renewed talk of truth and reconciliation in the face of the over 1,000 recently discovered Indigenous children's graves at residential schools across the country, we continue to be defined by shame.

Let the government wash away the stain of inadequate clean drinking water for Indigenous communities as a sincere step towards truth and reconciliation.

You know what, at the end of the day, I fell into bed exhausted and able to count each and every day as a blessing.



# Hospital patients can access diagnostic imaging files

TEMISKAMING SHORES formation, share it with any (Staff/Special) - You can now access the X-ray of your broken arm or your latest mammogram.

Temiskaming Hospital has partnered with PocketHealth, which describes itself as "a secure, online storage hub" for medical imaging records.

In a news release, the hospital explained that the PocketHealth platform lets patients view their own imaging records and reports.

They can download the in-

health care professional, and electronically request their imaging files from any other participating clinic and hospital in Canada.

The new service allows patients "to have more control over their health information and who they share it with," said hospital CEO Mike Baker.

It will reduce "unnecessary challenges for providers, patients and staff" in safely sharing a patient's diagnostic imaging information with patients can register online, providers in "a timely manner and facilitate patient access to their health information," said Erin Montgomery, the hospital's chief nursing executive and vice-president of patient services.

Patients can request any diagnostic imaging studies performed at Temiskaming Hospital, including X-rays, ultrasounds, CT scans, mammograms, and bone density

To access the new service,

at www.pocket.health/en-US/ TEMISKAMING.

Once enrolled, a patient will receive an access email with a secure link to their imaging history from Temiskaming Hospital as well as other hospitals in the North Eastern Health Services Alliance.

There's a fee of \$5 per transfer, which includes all available imaging records at the time of registration as well as any imaging done in the next 14 days.

Imaging performed after that 14-day grace period will automatically be added to the patient's PocketHealth account, with the option to purchase another transfer.

The fee applies only when patients are requesting access to their files for their own use, explained senior radiology technologist Natalie Rivet in an email.

There is no fee when files are transferred between specialists and institutions, she said.

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# Temiskaming tree planting hits new record

ord number of trees have been planted in Temiskaming this year, thanks to a not-for-profit initiative.

Forests Ontario's partners have planted more than 68,000 seedlings in the district in 2021 under the 50 Million Tree Program.

That brings the program's local total to almost 170,000.

And across Ontario, Forests Ontario said it has facilitated the planting of more 34 million trees since 2008.

Forests Ontario is a notfor-profit charity dedicated to re-greening, through tree planting, reforestation, stewardship and education.

In a news release, it said the 50 Million Tree Program makes planting easier and more affordable by providing technical and financial assistance.

"Once eligible landowners apply to the program, we connect them to a local planting partner to create and carry out

DISTRICT (Special) – A rec- a site plan that suits their property and objectives," said Rob Keen, a registered professional forester and Forests Ontario

> "By connecting them with experienced forestry professionals and significantly reducing the cost of tree planting, the 50 Million Tree Program is a unique opportunity for those looking to green their properties."

> The program also emphasizes long-term monitoring and

They include the creation of wildlife habitat, improved soil quality, increased property value, enhanced opportunities for recreation such as hiking and snowshoeing, and climate

change mitigation.

Landowners with a minimum of four hectares (9.88 acres) of forested land may also be able to take advantage of Ontario's Managed Forest Tax Incentive Program.

It offers a reduction of up to 75 per cent on property taxes for eligible portions of the property.

Applications are now open for 2022.

Applicants must have space for at least 500 trees in order to qualify for the 50 Million Tree Program.

For those with smaller lots, Forests Ontario's over-thecounter program offers trees at a discounted rate.

- Be alert and remain focused at all times. Distracted driving is one of the leading causes of collisions in Canada.
- Drivers are urged to check their mirrors and blind spots before turning, changing lanes, passing or merging.
- Be predictable and use your turn signals or hands to show your intentions, and always obey traffic signals and signs. Two-way communications between a driver and a cyclist can save
- Stay aware of your surroundings when opening doors or biking by parked cars to avoid collisions.





# Ontario supporting ID, commemoration of burial sites

DISTRICT (Special/Staff) – The Ontario government has pledged \$10 million to support the identification, investigation, protection and commemoration of Indian Residential School burial sites across the province.

In a news release, the province said the funding will also ensure that culturally appropriate, trauma-informed mental health supports are available for Indian Residential School survivors, their families and Indigenous communities.

The funding was announced after the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation announced that the remains of 215 children had been found on the grounds of a former residential school in British Columbia.

Soon after, 751 unmarked graves were detected by ground-penetrating radar at the site of a former residential school in Saskatchewan.

"Like all Ontarians, I was heartbroken by the news of a burial site containing the remains of 215 Indigenous children at the former Indian Residential School in Kamloops British Columbia," said Ontario Premier Doug Ford in the announcement June 15.

"That is why our government is partnering with Indigenous communities to address the loss of generations who are no longer with us, and the continued loss experienced by residential school survivors and their families.

"As we advance meaningful reconciliation, it is important that all of us continue to deepen our collective understanding of the legacy of the Indian Residential School system."

In the news release, the government said more than 150,000 Indigenous children across Canada were forcibly removed from their families and communities and sent to

Indian Residential Schools between 1870 and 1996.

According to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, there were 18 Indian Residential Schools in Ontario. The last school closed in 1991, and some sites have since been repurposed, abandoned or destroyed.

The commission estimated that at least 426 children who attended Indian Residential Schools in Ontario are known to have died, while an unknown number are still missing.

Its research identified 12 locations of unmarked burial sites in Ontario, and the province said there are likely more.

In its announcement, the government said it's working in collaboration with Indigenous leaders to establish processes that will guide the work related to residential school site identification, investigation, protection and commemoration.

Indigenous communities will have the option to work in conjunction with Ontario specialists, such as those provided by the province's Centre of Forensic Sciences and the Office of the Chief Coroner/Ontario Forensic Pathology Service.

"Our little ones need to be



found, named, and where possible, returned to their families and communities," said Roseanne Archibald, the outgoing Ontario Regional Chief, in the news release.

"Memorial sites must go up across Ontario to remind us that we can never let this happen to our children again, ever," said Archibald as she thanked the premier and Ontario Indigenous Affairs Minister Greg Rickford "for joining us and supporting us in this healing journey."

"Survivors have long shared the truths about the missing children. The province is now listening," said Alvin Fiddler, outgoing Grand Chief of the Nishnawbe Aski Nation, in a statement.

"Our Nations must lead this important and sacred work with the support from the province. We require access to funding, technical expertise, mental health supports and justice. We want to find our chil-

dren and bring them home."

"Many in the Métis community attended residential and day school institutions, creating pain that rests with us to this day," said Margaret Froh, president of Métis Nation of Ontario.

"This funding will help our communities address the intentional harms of those institutions and their legacy, and more importantly, help our communities move towards true closure," Froh said.

# City insurance bill up another 20 per cent

Association of Municipalities of Ontario executive committee, has been looking into the issue.

But the rising costs are "going to have a real impact on a lot of municipalities."

In an interview following the meeting, Oslund said the local rates are being driven not by claims, but by the hardening of the insurance market for municipalities.

In a report to council, city staff say the trend identified a couple of years ago is continuing. It is marked by fewer insurers in the market, higher premiums and deductibles, and restrictions on coverage.


City staff say it's still too early to assess the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the

municipal insurance sector.

It cited the figures from insurer Lloyd's, which estimates the overall cost of the pandemic to the global property and casualty insurance industry at more than \$100 billion.

Domestic insurers, meanwhile, now consider water damage, caused by flooding for example, as the biggest peril, ahead of fire.

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# **Camping** advice to bear in mind

DISTRICT (Special) - Going camping this weekend?

Don't forget to pack some long ropes, a whistle and bear

The Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry is reminding the public that they're in natural bear habitat when they're enjoying Ontario's campsites, lakes, forests and hiking trails.

It offers the following tips to avoid conflicts with bears while camping:

- Plan your trip with safety in mind by learning how to avoid attracting a bear.
- Teach children how to be Bear Wise and to never approach or run from a bear. Keep children between adults while hiking.
- Pack food carefully.
- Look for signs of bear activity near your campsite.
- Keep dogs on a leash. A bear may follow a dog back to its
- Follow the advice set out by Ontario Parks or the private campground.
- Use bear-resistant containers or sealed plastic bags to store food when camping or in the backcountry.
- Use the ropes you packed to hang food at least four metres (13 feet) above the ground and three metres (10 feet) from tree limbs.
- Never eat, cook or store food, cooking equipment or toiletries in your tent.
- Clean fish away from your campsite.
- Burn scraps and fat droppings.
- Drain dishwater.
