Community hub taking shape in Earlton

EARLTON - Work continues on building a community hub for Earlton.

With new beams, freshly reconstructed walls now awaiting drywalling, foam insulation, and a clear drawing of the floor plan, the Coeur du Village is taking shape.

The Earlton Lions Club, the Fondation Communautaire du Temiskaming, and the Club de l'Age d'Or, have jointly purchased the former Grocery King building in downtown Earlton and have been working at renovating it since, mainly with volunteer labour.

"We want it for the community," said Earlton Lions Club past president Francois Gauthier.


Plans for the new Coeur du Village include a room for ten looms that have been in the basement of Paroisse St. Jean Baptiste.

The new facility will be wheelchair accessible, creating greater ease for seniors and others with mobility challenges to get together with others for crafts, games, meetings, and celebrations, explained Gauthier.

People of all ages will be welcomed into the building.

"It will be a gathering place," said Gauthier.

The floor plan includes a conference room, accessible washrooms, a kitchen, bar, a retail space for those who wish to set up an area for items they

are selling, and the weaving room. People will also be able to gather to watch a game on television, or to

break into smaller groups for a board game, for example.

Gauthier hopes to have the centre

fully open by January, with work bees planned to take place through the month of September.



Englehart museum future to be discussed

ENGLEHART - The Englehart and Area Historical Museum will be the subject of an analysis by the Town of Englehart.

At Englehart's August 25 council meeting, Councillor Jillian Plaunt, who chairs the museum committee, suggested that a meeting should be held to discuss the cost of the museum.

"It hasn't been open the past two seasons," she noted to council.

"I think we have to make a decision what's happening in the future with it."

Later she outlined in an email that the town is looking at doing a cost analysis at this time "before any decisions are made."

She continued that "after we have completed the cost analysis, we will determine our next steps and ensure that we have notified our residents."

Plaunt commented in her emailed statement that a yearly decline in memberships has been noticed, so that will also be taken into account.

Boréal offering free micro-certification in supportive care

SUDBURY (Special) – In an effort to fill long-term care jobs, Collège Boréal is running a free six-week online course across Ontario offering certification as a supportive care assistant.

The fully subsidized micro-certificate in both French and English is part of a national initiative to address what's considered critical labour shortages in the long-term care sector.

Online training begins September 7.

Upon completion of the online course, students will do a four-month paid work placement.

"This internship is offered thanks to the collaboration of long-term care centers throughout Ontario," said the college in a news release.

It said the six-week course can speed the next step to becoming a fully certified personal care provider.

"We are proud to offer this micro-certification and to have been chosen by Colleges and Institutes Canada to provide quality training throughout Ontario," said Julie Nadeau, the college's director of business development, in a statement.



Finnish housing is unconditional: people pay rent from their housing benefits and work closely with social service providers.

All Nordic countries have exceeded global life expectancy levels, due in large part to progressive socialist policies.

Socialism is often termed "public power" and we could use more of it.

Hats off to the Zack's Crib group and the district social services agency for working

to provide men and women in our region with a safe place to sleep and a warm bed.

The homeless and needy should not be judged on the misfortunes they have had in life.

Housing is a human right.



Voter information cards coming in the mail

DISTRICT (Special) - Elections Canada has started mailing a personalized voter information card to each registered elector.

The card tells electors when and where to vote and has information about the accessibility of their polling station.

All registered electors should receive their card by September 10. Cards are sent as polling locations are confirmed. Some traditional polling locations are not available during the pandemic. Elections Canada's priority is to offer safe and accessible polling places.

The vast majority of electors are registered and can expect to receive a voter information card at their current address. All electors can check now if they are registered or register or update their address by using the Online Voter Registration Service.

Electors should contact the Elections Canada office in their electoral district if:


- the name on their card contains an error
- they receive a voter information card for a deceased person or someone who does not live at their address
- Due to unforeseen circumstances, the location of some polling stations may change after the voter information cards are mailed. Whenever possible, electors assigned to such polling stations will receive another voter information card with the words "Replacement Card" printed on the bottom right corner.
- To vote, electors must show proof of identity and address. The voter information card may be used as proof of address at the polls. Electors must use it with another piece of accepted ID to prove their identity.
- Electors do not need to bring their voter information card to the polls in order to vote, but we encourage them to do so for faster service.

Elections Canada is an independent non-partisan agency that reports directly to Parliament.

Le ministère du Développement du Nord, des Mines, des Richesses naturelles et des Forêts (DNMRNF) de l'Ontario vous invite à examiner le plan de brûlage dirigé approuvé par le DNMRNF pour les résidus de coupe, qui sera exécuté dans la **unité de gestion de Temagami**. (voir la carte).



Dans le cadre de nos efforts soutenus pour régénérer et protéger les forêts de l'Ontario, des endroits où des coupes ont eu lieu récemment ont été sélectionnés pour faire l'objet d'un brûlage dirigé conformément aux lignes directrices énoncées dans le *Manuel sur le brûlage dirigé* du DNMRNF. Le brûlage dirigé permettra de réduire la zone recouverte de résidus de coupe tout en augmentant la superficie de la forêt qui pourra être régénérée et en diminuant les risques d'incendie. Le brûlage devrait être lancé entre le **1 octobre 2021** et le **24 décembre 2021**.

Le plan de brûlage dirigé approuvé, qui indique les endroits où le brûlage aura lieu et qui comprend des cartes de ces endroits, peut être consulté par le public, par voie électronique, en communiquant avec First Resource Management Group Inc. et en visitant le Portail d'information sur les richesses naturelles <https://nrip.mnr.gov.on.ca/s/fmp-online?language=fr>, et ce, jusqu'au **31 mars 2022**, date à laquelle le Calendrier annuel de travail expirera.





Shifting focus to understanding, preventing drug overdose

DISTRICT (Staff) – According to preliminary 2020 data, 51 cases of suspected drug overdoses turned up at hospital emergency departments in Temiskaming.

At least 11 people in the district – and more than 2,380 across Ontario – died in substance-related fatalities that year.

The numbers were cited by the Temiskaming Health Unit in a media release to mark International Overdose Awareness Day August 31.

The day is intended to raise awareness of overdose, reduce the stigma of drug-related death, and spread the message that overdose deaths are preventable.

It also acknowledges the grief of family and friends who remember those who have died or suffered permanent injury.

“Addiction can happen to anyone, yet stigma is one of the biggest barriers for people who use drugs in accessing services and treatment,” said Kim Peters, public health promoter at the health unit, in the release.

“Whether from our upbringing or society, our attitudes and beliefs about substance use can either help or deter someone and their family from getting the help they need,” Peters continued.

The health unit explains that

overdose occurs when there’s more of a single drug or a combination of drugs than the body can cope with.

Overdoses can be fatal or non-fatal, and usually occur accidentally.

The words “poisoning” or “toxicity” are now being used by some in an effort to destigmatize overdoses.

The health unit notes that overdoses can be caused by all drugs, including alcohol and opioids.

Opioids are pain-relieving drugs that may be made from the poppy plant, such as morphine, or synthesized in a lab, such as fentanyl.

The health unit describes accidental opioid-related overdose deaths as “a growing public health crisis” driven by factors that include an increasingly toxic street drug supply and barriers to accessing treatment and harm reduction services.

An opioid overdose can temporarily be reversed by naloxone, which is available in a product called Narcan. The individual must then get medical help.

Free naloxone kits are available at many locations in Temiskaming, including health unit offices and many pharmacies.

The health unit encourages

anyone who uses opioids or knows someone who does to pick up a free kit.

It said the kits – together with not using drugs on one’s own

and calling 911 when an overdose occurs – can help prevent overdose deaths.


To learn more about overdose, treatment and support, Peters

Inspection of NDMNRF-Approved Prescribed Burn Plan for Slash Pile Burning for Temagami Management Unit

The Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry (NDMNRF) invites you to inspect the NDMNRF-approved prescribed burn plan for slash pile burning that will be carried out in the **Temagami Management Unit** (see map).



As part of our ongoing efforts to regenerate and protect Ontario’s forests, some recently harvested areas have been selected to be burned under the guidelines of the NDMNRF’s *Prescribed Burn Manual*. The prescribed burn will reduce the area covered in slash piles while increasing the area available for regeneration and reducing the fire hazard. The burn is scheduled for ignition between **October 1, 2021** and **December 24, 2021**.



Possible funnel clouds seen over area August 25 and 29

DISTRICT - Thunderstorm activity across the region ramped up to produce serious storm activity and tornado watches on both August 25 and August 29.

However, no definitive evidence was observed to qualify either of the events as tornados.

Ontario Storm Prediction Centre meteorologist Steven Flisfeder said videos and photographs from both storms were observed but there is nothing to confirm more than severe thunderstorm activities.

On August 25, a thunderstorm passed through the area north of Earlington.

“As far as we know there was no damage,” said Flisfeder in a telephone interview.

“There were definitely severe thunderstorms

going through the area and there were a couple of possible funnel clouds.”

However, there is no other evidence to suggest tornados. He noted there was a video circulating at the time about tornado activity near Charlton, but it was concluded the video was from a few years earlier.

On August 29, a photograph was taken near Latchford during a thunderstorm which showed a downward form.

“It looks to be a funnel cloud,” but the image was not clear enough to definitively confirm that it was a tornado, he said.

“We did see a lot of thunderstorm activity this year,” he said of the region overall, but it is hard to quantify whether this year’s potential for tornados in this region was higher than in other years, he concluded.

A tornado watch was issued for the region by Environment Canada on Sunday, August 29. At 8 p.m., this funnel cloud formed in the area between Temagami and Latchford, and travelled east into Quebec. Highway 11 south of Latchford was closed for a time while downed trees were removed. (Photo courtesy Sarah Snedden)





What is Gout and What Can You Do to Better Manage or Prevent it?

What is Gout?

Gout is a type of arthritis caused by a surplus of uric acid in the body. This excess can trigger the formation of urate crystals in joints, cartilage, tendons, and bones, causing inflammation, swelling and pain.

While many people associate gout with being overweight, and this does increase your risk, but gout is also linked to kidney disease, drinking large amounts of alcohol, and eating foods that are high in purines (e.g. meats, seafood, peas, beans, lentils, spinach). The risk of getting gout increases with age and men are at a higher risk than women.

Treatment options

Treating gout involves a two-pronged approach that combines medications and lifestyle changes. Medications for gout ease the pain and inflammation of acute attacks and control uric acid levels to prevent future attacks.

Self-Care

Adopting healthy lifestyle habits is a key part of an effective gout treatment plan. Eating a healthy diet, getting regular physical activity and losing weight (if needed) can lower your risk of repeat gout attacks, as well as the chances of developing heart disease, which is common in people with gout.

Diet

Developing a lifelong eating strategy that focuses on following a heart-healthy diet should be the goal for people with gout. This diet includes all of the food groups, especially vegetables, whole grains, plant proteins such as nuts and legumes and low-fat dairy.

The following foods are known to trigger gout attacks:

- Red meat and organ meats (liver, tongue and sweetbreads)
- Shellfish such as shrimp and lobster
- Sugary beverages
- Excessive alcohol (more than one alcoholic drink for women and two for men within 24 hours)

Physical Activity and Weight Management

Being physically active is an important part of managing weight, but getting started on losing weight or being active isn't always easy. A health care provider can help set realistic goals and choose appropriate exercise.



Safety council launching vaccine education program

DISTRICT (Special) - The Canada Safety Council is creating a vaccine education and awareness program, consisting of a video course and supporting materials, to be delivered in schools with the support of teachers across the country.

Three versions of the program are being developed, corresponding with the three elementary grade divisions - one each for Primary (grades 1-3), Junior (grades 4-6) and Intermediate (grades 7-8) levels.

The program, which will receive funding from the Public Health Agency of Canada's Immunization Partnership Fund, will launch in schools across Canada in late September for the Junior and Intermediate levels. The Primary level will be released in October. Teachers will be provided with further details on how to acquire program materials, including a teacher's guide and a video presentation for use in class with students.

"Providing information en

masse has been effective in helping Canadians make informed decisions on vaccination," said Gareth Jones, president and CEO of the Canada Safety Council.

"In this next phase of the pandemic our reach can be extended with targeted and tailored communication that provides information to specific audiences," he said.

"By addressing children directly with materials written in a language they can easily understand, it is our hope that this program will not only ad-

dress fears surrounding COVID-19 vaccination but fears surrounding vaccines in general."

The program will be made

available to the public at large in due time, though the focus will initially be placed on integrating the program into the school system.
