District enjoyed the return of the Englehart Fall Fair

ENGLEHART - The Englehart Fall Fair was small but well received.

As it kicked off Thursday evening, September 9, Englehart Mayor Nina Wallace congratulated the Englehart and District Agricultural Society "for getting an actual fair up and running."

Fairs across the country have been keeping their doors closed throughout the pandemic, with virtual fairs being the alternative through the past 18 months of lockdowns.

The familiar scents of freshly cut flowers, tempting trays of baked goods, crafted garments, quilts, toys, and treasured mementoes of a nostalgic past all were there for the in-person event September 9 to 11.

Farm equipment and livestock, including rabbits, ducks, pot-bellied pigs, alpacas, goats and more, attracted young and old to touch and enjoy throughout the event.

There were also inflatables for the enjoyment of the kids, horse and wagon rides, a chip stand and food stand, music and even a baby contest.

The harvest dinner was also a bonus for many who enjoyed sitting down to a traditionally cooked meal.

In her opening remarks, Wallace expressed the hope that next year's fall fair can be held without COVID restrictions in place.

Timmins-James Bay federal election candidates were also on hand, enjoying the opportunity to meet people in-person and simply to be able to experience the ambience of an old-time fair, country living, and community.

- The rate of vaccinations in the district is continuing to rise, and the goal of the Temiskaming Health Unit is to see the district uptake reach at least 90 per cent, which is the provincial objective at this time.

- For Nipissing-Timiskaming New Democratic candidate Scott Robertson, people's concerns have been quite consistent throughout the campaign and across the riding.
- With the majority of their roster made up of new players this season, the New Liskeard Cubs are hosting development camp sessions in hopes of attracting the best young Triple A Under 18 players to the lineup.
- The Northern Ontario Hockey Association has sent out a press release detailing their COVID-19 vaccination policy.



ENGLEHART - The Englehart Area Artists and others are emerging from the past year-and-a-half pandemic with lots of work that has not yet been seen.

While comfort levels are not to the point of having fully open doors, as was the case with past annual fall Open Door Studio tours, the group is holding an exhibition at the former Charlton-Savard school on Highway 573, north of Charlton.

The event, still going under the name of Open Door Studio Tour, will be taking place Saturday, September 18, and Sunday, September 19, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

In past years the artists had individually opened their doors to the public, creating an opportunity to tour the area and drop in to the homes of some of the area's most creative people. Englehart and Area Historical Museum, the Charlton Heritage Centre and the Chamberlain Township hall were also on that tour in the past.

A decision was made to hold the event in one space, and the Charlton-Savard school offered a solution.

"There is a nice big open space" at the former school building, said Englehart Area Artists president Linda Mustard.

"We will be able to social distance."

A large variety of works will be on display.

"Many of us are painters and collage workers." There will also be pottery, weaving, crafts, jewellery, sewing and preserves. Well-known and popular artists like Mustard, Berdina Beaven, Greg Martin, Bell Williams, Karen Pilch, Jane Corr and others will be presenting their works which have emerged through the pandemic period.

"A lot of these are paintings nobody has seen," pointed out Mustard.

This exhibition will be "a chance to get it out there."

Protect Against the Flu

Getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever this year to protect yourself, your family, and your community from flu.

What is the Difference between the Flu and COVID-19?

Influenza (Flu) and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses. COVID-19 is caused by infection with a new coronavirus (called SARS-CoV-2) and flu is caused by infection with influenza viruses.

Both COVID-19 and the flu can have varying degrees of signs and symptoms, ranging from no symptoms (asymptomatic) to severe symptoms. Common symptoms that COVID-19 and flu share include:

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue (tiredness)
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle pain or body aches
- Headache
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

Because many of the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone, and testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis.

Tips to Avoid Getting and Spreading the Flu and COVID-19:

- Wash your hands often
- Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- Don't touch your face
- Stay at home when you're sick
- Wear a mask when unable to maintain a 6-foot distance from anyone outside your bubble
- Clean (and disinfect) surfaces and shared items

Flu shot clinic dates will be held in various locations throughout the District of Temiskaming – watch for further details from the Temiskaming Health Unit. The Temagami Family Health Team will be hosting drive-thru flu clinics in October. Watch for further details specific to dates and times. Appointments will be required so please call the office at (705) 569-3244 to schedule yours.



Fire Safe Student Housing

TOP TIPS for staying fire safe at college or university



COOKING is the leading cause of home fires

- **Stand by your pan**—always stay in the kitchen and stay alert when cooking.
- Keep **anything** that burns—*pizza boxes, dishtowels, paper towels, wooden or plastic spoons and pot holders*—a safe distance away from the stove.

ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT—overloaded circuits and octopus wiring are dangerous

- Use power bars with a **circuit breaker and surge protector**. Ensure the power bars have the logo of an accredited product safety testing agency such as **CSA** or **ULC**.
- Avoid using extension cords as permanent wiring.
- Making sure electrical cords are not covered by carpets or rugs where they can be easily damaged.

CANDLES can add ambiance—they also can lead to a fire

- **Never leave a burning candle unattended.** Blow out all candles before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Consider using **battery-operated flameless candles**.
- Place candles in sturdy, safe candle holders that will not burn or tip over.
- Keep candles at least 30 centimetres from anything that can burn.
- Avoid using candles in bedrooms.



SPACE HEATERS NEED SPACE

- Keep space heaters at least **one metre away** from anything that can burn, such as paper, bedding, furniture and curtains.
- Turn off space heaters before going out or going to bed.

SMOKING is the leading cause of fatal fires

- Encourage smokers to smoke **outside**.
- Keep **large, deep ashtrays** on hand.
- If anyone has been smoking, **check for cigarette butts**, especially under pillows and cushions — sofas and chairs can burn fast!

SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS—It is the law to have working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in your home:

- **Test alarms monthly** by pressing the TEST button and notify the landlord immediately if they are not working.
- It is **against the law** for tenants to disable or tamper with a smoke or carbon monoxide alarm.
- If a smoke alarm activates due to steam from the shower or cooking on the stove, oven or toaster, ask the landlord to move the alarm to a different location, or to install a smoke alarm with a hush feature.



HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLANNING—When the smoke alarm sounds, everyone must know what to do and where to go. Make a plan!

- Know **two ways out** of every room, if possible. The first way out would be the door, while the second way could be a window that can be exited safely. All escape routes must be accessible and free of clutter.
- Leave the building as quickly as possible. **Never re-enter a burning building.**
- Call **9-1-1** from outside the building using a cell phone or a neighbour's phone.

Keeping property safe from bears

DISTRICT (Special) – You’ve spent the summer at the cottage, but now you’re only there occasionally or planning to close it up for the season. How do you protect it from bears?

Bears are attracted by smells and will return to an available food source, says the Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry.

In a recent news release, it urged cottage owners to keep their property clear of bear attractants.

That list includes open garbage bins, grease and food residue on barbecue grills, ripe fruit fallen on the ground, meat scraps and food in the compost, bird feeders, pet food, and outdoor beverage fridges.

It offers the following tips:

- Remove garbage or drop it off at a waste disposal site.
- Eliminate odours by disinfecting garbage and recycling bins and removing scented products from the outdoors.
- Clean the barbecue.
- Remove open food from inside the cottage.
- Close and lock all windows

and doors.

• Have neighbours check the property if you’re away for an extended period of time.

And if you do encounter a bear in a non-emergency situation, the ministry advises the public to contact the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line, at 1-866-514-2327.

It offers the following examples of non-emergency encounters.

A bear moves through a yard or field but does not linger. It roams the neighbourhood, checks garbage cans, or breaks into a shed where food is stored. It may tear down a bird feeder, knock over a barbecue, or climb a tree.

The line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30. Staff can provide advice about bear behaviour, how to avoid human-bear interactions, and managing attractants on your property.

In an emergency, when a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety, call 911.

Threatening or aggressive behaviours include entering a school yard when school’s on; stalking people; entering or trying to enter a residence; wandering into a public gathering; or killing livestock or pets and staying at the location.
