Past is future

More support needed for Heritage Silver **Trail**

COBALT - Cobalt's liaison to the Cobalt Historical Society is warning that the Town of Cobalt and the Township of Coleman need to intensify efforts to protect the future of the Heritage Silver Trail.

Cobalt Councillor Pat Anderson spoke at the town's regular council meeting September 21 and advised that there is a need to focus on the trail's future.

The Heritage Silver Trail runs through the Town of Cobalt and Coleman Township spanning many kilometres and featuring a number of historic sites relating to the history of the Cobalt Mining Camp.

Several standing headframes, buildings, open cuts, adits, foundations and the iconic Nipissing lookout are featured at approximately 20 sites

- · Wednesday, September 29, marked the 25th anniversary of the disappearance of Melanie Ethier as new leads were uncovered this year because of a podcast.



October is Occupational Therapy Month

What is Occupational Therapy?

Occupational therapy is a type of health care that helps to solve the problems that interfere with a person's ability to do the things that are important to them.

An Occupational Therapist (OT) may check:

- Your physical abilities like strength, balance and coordination
- Your mental abilities like memory, coping strategies, organizational skills
- What materials or devices you use to participate in activities like furniture, utensils, tools or clothes
- What social and emotional support is available to you at home, school, work or in the community, and
- The physical setup of your house, classroom, workplace or other environment

Depending on the problem, the OT can help you solve it by:

- 1. Helping you overcome your disability. OTs do this by:
- educating or instructing you on how to do things with the abilities you have - e.g. getting around your community in a wheelchair
- suggesting activities that will help you improve or maintain the abilities you have - e.g. improving your coping strategies
- 2. Adapting the materials you use. OTs do this by changing the things you use:
- around the house e.g. a special key holder to make turning keys easier
- in sports or leisure activities e.g. a playing cards holder
- at work or school e.g. special tools that help prevent injury to hands and back
- to take care of yourself e.g. special bath or toilet seats
- to get from place to place e.g. car modifications such as one-handed steering wheels
- 3. Recommending changes to the environments where you do your everyday activities. OTs do this by recommending that you:
- change the physical layout of your workplace, home or school – e.g. lowering/raising desktops, countertops or cupboards
- find out about the supports in your community e.g. specialized public transportation
- work with the people in your community e.g. providing education about a disability to the teacher or employer
- work with the government to encourage health living e.g. request funding for special equipment



They travel at night when there are fewer predators and they can navigate by the earth's magnetic field.

The geese remind me of the Mary Oliver poem called *Wild Geese*.

Her words inspire me: "You do not have to be good. You do not have to walk on your knees for a hundred miles through the desert repenting. You only have to let the soft animal of your body love what it loves. Tell me about despair, yours, and I will tell you mine....

Meanwhile the wild geese high in the clean blue air are heading home."

I feel the poem sums up what we've experienced during the pandemic after a year of chronic sucker punches.

You know what got me through the year so far? My canoe, a northern lake, friends, reading obits (yes, they are mini-memoirs), poutine at The Fry Pit, sunsets on Bass Lake and a sighting of a yellow rumped warbler outside my office window.


- 1. Smoke alarms save lives. Since this beeping device lets you know if there's a fire, every home needs working smoke alarms on every floor and near each bedroom.
- 2. Get outside, stay outside. If you hear a smoke alarm, you must immediately stop what you're doing and find the safest and quickest way out of the house.
- 3. Practise fire drills at home. Families should review where the exits are in each room and where the outside meeting place is at least twice a year.

The theme for this year's event is Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety, which aims to better educate the public about the sounds smoke alarms make, what those sounds mean and how to respond to them.

- 5. Stay away from hot things. This can include bath water, a stove, soup, matches, a fireplace and lighters. If you're not sure if something is hot, check with a grown-up.
- 6. Follow the one-metre rule. There should be a kid-free zone around stoves, space heaters and other hot devices. Anything that can burn should also be kept one metre away.
- 7. Know when to stop, drop and roll. If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop to the ground (remember to cover your face with your hands) and roll over until the flames are out.






BUT HE DOES!

"This case is unique as Melanie seemed to vanish without a trace. The OPP believes someone out there has the information that is required to solve this case and look to the public for further information. All leads will continue to be investigated by the members of the Temiskaming Detachment and the OPP Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP's Criminal Investigation Branch.

"The OPP prides itself on investigative excellence and has a long-standing tradition of conducting thorough and detailed investigations. This is certainly the case with the disappearance of Melanie Ethier."



More support needed for Heritage Silver **Trail**

Continued from Front throughout the area.

A self-guided tour is available for visitors to guide them to the well-marked sites.

However, more focus is needed to promote the trail and to address concerns, Anderson emphasized.

In the past, Cobalt decided to shift its tourism focus to support the Lake Temiskaming tour project, she said, but "trail issues and advertising for our own Cobalt trail has been ignored."

The matter has now come "to a critical junction. Cobalt and Coleman have got to refocus on the trail or we are very soon going to lose it completely," Anderson said.

Most of the trail sits on Agnico Eagle property, and "a whole new generation of people" are now at the mining company, with company supporters now slipping into retirement or deceased, she pointed out. In the past, Agnico Eagle has worked to keep the main historic sites standing so they can be viewed by visitors to the trail, she continued.

The government mandate is to have old mining sites decommissioned and returned to the environment, and support is needed to ensure the historic sites are left available for public viewing, said Anderson.

If the Heritage Silver Trail is lost, "what have we got left in this town?" she asked. "A town full of stories but there's nothing for the tourists to see. We don't have the old prospectors and the miners on the streets that used to stop tourists and regale them."

Anderson noted the importance of tourism to support the small number of businesses that do exist.

She also pointed out that the Temiskaming Shores and Area Chamber of Commerce, which provides an area information centre, hears tourists mainly asking for information about Cobalt.

"The majority come to see Cobalt, to see our mining heritage."

She said the Cobalt Historical Society plans to make a presentation at Cobalt council's next meeting Tuesday, October 12.


