

TEMISKAMING SHORES – An association of Northeastern Ontario municipalities is urging the provincial government to open the door to new tax revenue to help them pay for infrastructure.

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) has asked Queen's Park to empower all municipalities to collect a municipal land transfer tax.

"The province will admit that we need more money for infrastructure," said Danny Whalen, president of FONOM which represents some 110 municipalities.

But it must then give municipalities "the tools to generate more money," said Whalen, also a Temiskaming Shores councillor, in a phone interview last week.

Under FONOM's proposal, a municipality could choose to charge a land transfer tax – renamed the Land Transfer Infrastructure Support, and based on the property's selling price – when a property is sold.

First-time home buyers would be exempt, and the imposition of the tax would be at municipalities' discretion.

But if they choose to collect the new tax, "the municipality can't spend it on anything other than infrastructure," Whalen said.

At this time, only the City of Toronto has the authority to charge what's called the Municipal Land Transfer Tax. It's linked to the sale price of the property, and is on top of the Ontario Land Transfer Tax

that's paid to the province.

FONOM said Toronto collects some \$800 million a year from the tax.

If all municipalities could do so, it calculated it would generate almost \$2.68 billion to help them address their growing infrastructure deficit.

The deficit is the gap between the funding municipalities have – for such things as water, sewer and waste services, roads and bridges and facilities – and what's needed for their repair.

FONOM cites the Association of Municipalities



of Ontario in estimating the annual province-wide municipal infrastructure deficit at \$6 billion.

Every municipality is falling "further and further behind," Whalen said.

#### PUSHBACK

However, there has been pushback against any new taxes related to land sales.

The Ontario Real Estate Association has lobbied against any extension of the Municipal Land Transfer Tax, and calls for it to be repealed in the City of *Continued on 10*

We thank you for your continued patience as we work through this challenging time.



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

Bless you Nicole for your incredible "joie de vivre" and thank you for all you did to promote this region.


You were a visionary, a renaissance woman and an incredible human being.

#### **Temagami Family Health Team** Submitted by Ellen Ibey **Tips to Avoid Seasonal Depression**

Many people feel a little sad when summer comes to an end and a long season of cold weather is approaching. Seasonal depression or seasonal affective disorder (otherwise known as SAD) is a type of depression that happens at certain times of the year, usually in the fall and winter.

The symptoms of SAD:

- · Depressed mood
- · Negative thoughts
- Fatigue
- Hypersomnia (Sleeping too much)
- · Increased intake of carbohydrates/weight gain
- Social withdrawal/hibernating

There are a few things you can do to prevent SAD from getting worse and make yourself feel better.

#### **Get Plenty of Exercise**

Exercise not only helps to improve your physical health and reduce your risks for a number of chronic diseases, but it's been shown to be a great mood booster.

#### **Try Light Therapy**

This has been tested as an effective treatment for SAD because it tricks the body into thinking the days are longer and brighter than they really are. It involves sitting under a special bright light for a certain amount of time each day. You could ask your health care provider about this or just try to get as much sunlight as you can outdoors every day (20 to 30 minutes a day as a minimum) and keep your curtains and blinds open to let the light in.

#### Socialize (within public health guidelines)

A common treatment for depression is to engage in social activities and spend time with friends or family. If you tend to make excuses for not going out in the fall and winter, you need to get yourself out of that habit. Keeping to yourself will only make you feel lonely and that's what you're trying to avoid so pick up the phone and call a friend or family member - make plans to go out for lunch and/or for a nice walk.

If you think you're experiencing SAD and it's affecting your ability to get through your day, focus on work and maintain relationships, you should follow up with your primary care provider. If you're a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team and would like to schedule some time for light therapy, please call the office at (705) 569-3244 to make arrangements.



#### Toronto.

In its 2021 Provincial Issues Guide, the association describes it as "a punishing tax that pushes home ownership further out of reach for aspiring homeowners."

The association has also called on the province to remove that tax for first-time home buyers. They're now eligible for a rebate of all or a portion of the Land Transfer Tax, but the association argues they can still be out of pocket thousands of dollars.

Real estate agents earn a commission when a property is sold, Whalen said.



pipes and pavement every year? Probably not a lot," he said.

He added that the housing shortage is also an issue in Northern Ontario, and there are examples of houses being allowed to sit vacant after being sold.

Given the recent interest in relocation to the North from Southern Ontario, he said developers have purchased properties and "just sit on them."

"That's detrimental to everyone," he said.

He added people can sell their homes in Toronto for \$1-million plus, and purchase new houses in Northern Ontario for far less.

However, he said they expect municipal services comparable to those in Southern Ontario.

"Somebody's got to pay for that," he said.

Asked if the province is likely to move on FONOM's request, Whalen pointed to the recent plan to transfer the blue box program to producer responsibility.

He said he'd been involved with that issue on the municipal side for some 12 years.

"You've just got to keep pushing," he said.

# Another step achieved toward recommissioning refinery

NORTH COBALT (Staff/ Special) - First Cobalt, which is developing the refinery in North Cobalt for the electric vehicle battery industry, has announced that it has received the second of three permit amendments needed to recommission the site.

The Air and Noise Environmental Compliance Approval has been obtained from the Ontario Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks. The refinery is being developed to produce North America's only supply of battery-grade cobalt for the electric vehicle market, the company states in an October 14 press release.

The third and final permit amendment has undergone community consultations, and has been submitted to the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks for review and approval.

The company stated in its press release that the \$60 million (U.S.) facility expansion remains on schedule to be commissioned in the fourth quarter of 2022.

First Cobalt president and chief executive officer Trent Mell stated in the press release that "in the first half of 2021, sales of electric vehicles in the U.S. were up more than 130 per cent and that trend could accelerate with several new EV (electric vehicle) models hitting the market. With financing in place, receipt of this latest permit keeps us on schedule for Phase 1 of our North American Battery Materials Park strategy. By the end of 2022, we will be the only producer of battery-grade cobalt sulfate in North America.

"In 2023, Phase 2 will entail commercial-scale battery recycling from the same facility, leveraging existing personnel and infrastructure. In Phase 3, we will set our sights on building a nickel sulfate plant, once again becoming the sole North American supplier of an important raw material for the EV industry."

The refinery is considered a critical asset in the development and manufacturing of batteries for electric vehicles, the company stated.

Along with the refinery, First Cobalt owns several cobalt and silver properties in the Cobalt Mining Camp, as well as an Iron Creek, Idaho property.

DISTRICT (Special) - To keep Ontarians healthy this flu season and prevent unnecessary visits to the hospital during the fourth wave of COVID-19, the Ontario government is launching one of the largest flu immunization campaigns in the province's history, with the flu shot available to all Ontarians starting in November.

"It is safe to receive the CO-VID-19 vaccine and the flu shot at the same time, so if you're receiving your flu shot and still have yet to receive a first or second dose of the CO-VID-19 vaccine, now is the time," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health.

Last year, uptake of the flu vaccine by Ontarians was the highest in recent history. Building on this success, Ontario is investing over \$89 million this year to purchase over 7.6 million flu vaccine doses, which is 1.4 million more doses than last year. This includes a total of 1.8 million doses specifically for seniors.

To protect the most vulnerable, Ontario's initial supply of flu vaccine was prioritized for long-term care home residents and hospital patients beginning in September, and flu shots are now available for seniors and others most at risk for complications from the flu.

Starting in November, the flu shot will be available for all Ontarians through doctor and nurse practitioner offices, participating pharmacies, and public health units. To further improve access and convenience to the flu shot and based on demand in recent years, pharmacies will receive approximately 40 per cent of the allocated doses, up from 36 per cent last year. "The annual flu shot is the best defence against the flu this season," said Dr. Kieran Moore, Chief Medical Officer of Health. "As we head into the fall and begin gathering indoors more often with family and friends, it is even more important to get your flu shot, in addition to following public health measures, to protect yourself and those around you."


Each flu season, Ontario receives its supply of flu vaccine in multiple shipments from manufacturers over several months starting in mid- to late-September based on the schedule negotiated between the federal government and manufacturers. Distribution and the ability for locations in Ontario to re-order additional supply of flu vaccine are based on the timing of shipments from manufacturers and the replenishment of the provincial supply. Ontarians are encouraged to be patient as it may take time for shipments to arrive to their local flu shot locations.

To help stop the spread this fall, Ontarians should continue to follow COVID-19 public health measures and advice in public settings, including wearing a face covering indoors, frequent handwashing, and maintaining physical distance from those outside their household.

#### **QUICK FACTS**

• Based on available data, flu vaccine uptake was closer to 40 per cent last season. In previous seasons, the uptake has been around 30 per cent.

• Last year, flu cases per the national and Ontario surveillance systems were historically low, with less than 25 cases of laboratory confirmed cases of influenza reported. This



• The flu shot will be available at doctor and nurse practitioner offices, public health units and participating pharmacies for anyone two years of age or older. Children six months to two years old can get their flu shot from a doctor, nurse practitioner or local public health unit. Visit Ontario. ca/flu to find out when to get your shot.


• The flu vaccine is offered free of charge to anyone over the age of six months who either lives, works, or goes to school in Ontario.

• The National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) now recommends that COVID-19 vaccines may be given at the same time as the flu vaccine.

• The flu shot is especially important for children under five, people who are pregnant and those 65 years and older who are at higher risk of hospitalization and flu-related complications, such as pneumonia, heart attack or, in some cases, death.

• Symptoms of the flu can include fever, cough, muscle aches, sore throat, headache and tiredness. If you or your children develop flu symptoms, contact your primary care provider.

• Some symptoms of COV-ID-19 are similar to the flu and it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone. Take the COVID-19 self-assessment to help you determine if you need to get tested and for guidance on next steps.



# Tips on meeting the demands of weather

DISTRICT (Special) - Weather today can be challenging, and the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) reminds home and business owners that it's important to make sure you have the right outdoor power equipment on hand and are prepared before a storm or flood.

OPEI offers the following tips:

• Make a list of what you need to clean up. Survey your property. Consider the damage a storm might cause and make a list of what tools might be needed for repairs. You might need a chainsaw, pole pruner, water pump, portable generator, snow thrower, or utility vehicle.

• Take stock of your outdoor

power equipment. Make sure equipment is in good working order. If needed, take your equipment to an authorized service center for maintenance or repair.

• Find your safety gear. Avoid the scramble for sturdy shoes, safety goggles, hard hats, reflective clothing and work gloves, which should be stored in an accessible area with your equipment.

• Review the owner's manuals for your equipment. Read product manuals to ensure you know how to operate your equipment safely.

• Have the right fuel on hand. Gas stations may be closed after a storm, so it's important to have the proper fuel for your equipment. Store your fuel in an approved container. Use the type of fuel recommended by your equipment manufacturer.

• Use common sense when using outdoor power equipment. After the storm, take time to think through a strategy for clean-up efforts, and use the appropriate equipment for the job. If necessary, call a professional landscape contractor or tree care service.

• Keep batteries charged. Make sure batteries for your equipment are fully charged in advance of a storm, and only used manufacturer-approved charging systems. Keep a couple of extra batteries on hand to keep equipment running.

• Trim trees safely. Keep both feet firmly on the ground, and observe the safety zone, which means keeping bystanders and power lines (those above you and any that might have fallen down) at least 50 feet away from your work area.

• Ensure portable electric generators have plenty of ventilation. Generators should never be used in an enclosed area or placed inside a home or garage, even if the windows or doors are open. Place the generator outside and away from windows, doors, and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to come indoors. Keep the generator dry, and make sure you have adequate lengths of extension cords. Before refueling, turn the generator off and let it cool down.

WEEKENDER

• Drive utility vehicles (UTVs) with caution. Keep the vehicle stable and drive slowly. Do not turn the vehicle mid-slope or while on a hill.

• Be aware of others. Keep bystanders, children and animals out of your work area. Do not allow other people near outdoor power equipment when starting the equipment or using it.

• Listen to your body. Storm cleanup can be draining. Do not operate power equipment when you are tired, drink plenty of water and take regular breaks.







# Hilliardton owl banding demonstration was a hoot

HILLIARD TOWNSHIP — A small group of about 10 people had a rare opportunity to view Northern Saw-whet owl banding at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre (HMREC) on October 8 with birders Bruce Murphy and Julia Turner.

"We started owl banding on September 8 this year and have had great success," said Murphy.

During the fall migration, saw-whet owls migrate through the Temiskaming region on their way to the United States.

The centre is a registered owl banding station and this year could see its 9,000th owl banded at the marsh, noted Murphy.

Saw-whet owls are one of the smallest owl species in North America, about the same size as a pop can.

Beginning in early September, the birders at the Marsh begin banding these tiny, nocturnal raptors as they migrate at night.

Saw-whets can lay up to four and five eggs in one year and find the Boreal forest the perfect place to breed during the summer months.

#### SUCCESSFUL BANDING

Murphy told the attendees that there are three factors that can result in successful owl banding: the phase of the moon, wind speed and the temperature of the air.

Typically, saw-whet owls won't move if the temperature is above 5 C, or if it is too windy or when there is a full moon.

It just so happened last Friday there was no moon, it wasn't windy, but the air wasn't that cool.

Murphy couldn't promise that they would catch any owls in their mist nets, but two were caught during the banding demonstration, held outside the main banding office because of COVID-19 protocols.

"Warm weather is not good for owl banding. Owls prefer dense air, which is cooler air. Our best owl banding nights are when we put on the wood stove."

The two owls caught were both females and hatch-year birds, meaning they were born this year.

Turner showed what the owls looked like up close by holding them in her hand and moving them close to the adults and children.

Though saw-whets are raptors and feed mainly on mice, *Continued on 23*

they are not aggressive when caught, explained Murphy.

The number of owls in any given area is dependent on available food sources.

The way to determine an owl's age is to place the bird under an ultra violet light. The older owls have a pigment called porphyrin that glows under the UV light.

Pinker feathers indicated both owls were younger birds, with one female weighing in at 94 grams and the other at 100.

Murphy collected other data about the owls including determining their sex, overall size and wing measurements.

"Male saw-whets are smaller than females, "said Murphy.

After the banding process, owls are placed on the branch of a tree and left to adjust to the different lighting conditions before they fly away.

#### DATA

Banding owls provides valuable data such as when they migrate, migration routes, what kind of habitat they choose and ratios of males to females.

The Marsh is part of an owlbanding network across North America called Project Owlnet that determines the timing, intensity and pace of migration of the Northern Saw-whet owl.

"We banded 1,020 owls in our best year."

At the end of each banding season, the Marsh birders send in a banding report to Project Owlnet, which the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Management Centre has used for important tracking data on the tiny owls,
