Staffing challenge Thornloe looking for new administrator

THORNLOE - The Village of Thornloe is seeking a new clerk-treasurer, or a municipality that would be willing to provide the administrative services for the community.

Clerk-treasurer Reynald Rivard wants to retire from the parttime position, but it is not clear how the administration will be handled in the future.

The municipality had been hoping for an agreement with Hilliard Township to take over the administration, but Thornloe received word in September that Hilliard had decided it would not do so.

Thornloe also approached Armstrong Township about whether they would be interested in taking over the responsibility, but that was declined at Armstrong's October 27 meeting, based on the time and needs of Armstrong's own population.

Thornloe had formerly approached Harley Township, and recently approached Harley again.

At Harley's November 9 meeting, council concluded they would consider it if Thornloe presented a formal proposal, but no decision has yet been reached. It was noted that Harley clerk-treasurer Jordan Kemp already has a significant workload with the four municipalities he currently administers – Harley, Casey, Hudson and Kerns.

Harley also discussed the possibility of amalgamating the Village of Thornloe, but Kemp commented that the move would mean a loss in provincial funding that Thornloe now receives. While the two individual municipalities can now each access funding for certain projects, one larger municipality would have to share the access to grants, meaning less overall. (Amalgamation has not been formally discussed between the municipalities, and *Continued on page 3*

Continued from Front was only being commented upon by Harley in response to a question about whether it was a viable option.)

Armstrong Township, where Rivard served as clerk-treasurer before he retired from that job, has been providing administrative support. **UNTIL 2022**

Armstrong had been prepared to turn its duties over to Hilliard at the end of 2021, but in light of Hilliard's decision not to proceed, Armstrong has agreed to continue providing its services until the end of June 2022, but no further.

The one-and-a-half to two-

day job for an individual turn it down if someone mainly requires bookkeeping skills, an understanding of the municipal tax system, and an ability to work with the provincial and federal governments, says Rivard.

He said in a telephone interview that Thornloe would prefer to receive services from a neighbouring municipality to maintain the convenience for residents to be able to access a municipal office to make payments in person, but the village would look at an arrangement with any municipality that might be interested in providing the service for the township.

"We definitely wouldn't

would offer the service at a reasonable rate."

The Village of Thornloe has about 50 ratepayers and a population of just over 100. While Armstrong provides the public works service under a contract, Kerns grades the roads twice a year. The landfill and the cemetery are both provided through a partnership with Hilliard Township.

"To get (administrative services) done through another municipality is definitely the best way to go," said Rivard. He envisions such an arrangement would ensure stability for Thornloe.

November is Lung Cancer **Awareness Month!**

In Canada, lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in men and women.

What raises your risk of getting lung cancer?

Although anyone can get lung cancer, many factors can raise your risk. If you have any of these risk factors, speak with your health care provider about lung cancer screening:

- Using tobacco, such as smoking cigarettes, cigars, or marijuana.
- Being around smoke from another person smoking cigarettes, cigars or marijuana - also called secondhand exposure
- Living or working in a building that contains radon
- Having a job where you are exposed to cancer-causing chemicals
- Having a family history, such as a parent, brother, sister, son or daughter
- Having a **history of lung disease** such as COPD, chronic bronchitis and emphysema, or pulmonary fibrosis with lung tissue scarring

Did you know:

Based on highlights from the Occupational Disease Surveillance System (ODSS) in Ontario, workers employed in construction, transport equipment operating (e.g., truck drivers) and mining occupations have a higher risk of lung cancer than workers in other occupations.

Approximately 15% of lung cancers diagnosed in Canada each year are caused by exposure to known lung carcinogens in the workplace. Exposure to asbestos, crystalline silica, diesel engine exhaust, and metal fumes (i.e., chromium and nickel compounds in welding) are primarily responsible for occupational cases of lung cancer.

Efforts to reduce workplace exposures along with improved screening and prevention efforts in clinical settings can help reduce the burden of lung cancer for workers in hazardous industries.

Speak with your health care provider about your risk of lung cancer, what you can do to lower your risk and whether you should have lung cancer screening.

Playing with fire

The Ford government will not introduce a province-wide vaccine mandate for health care workers.

But we know the data around the COVID-19 pandemic surely points to vaccinations protecting health care workers, the unvaccinated and vulnerable patients in hospital settings.

The Science Advisory Table and the Ontario Medical Association say requiring hospital workers to be vaccinated is a policy that will protect Ontarians.

Ford claims only 15 per cent of Ontario's health care workers are unvaccinated.

He says creating a mandatory vaccine policy in hospitals could result in fewer health care workers when hospitals are already experiencing staff shortages.

A number of hospitals in the province have not waited for the Ford government to show leadership on this important issue, they have gone ahead and created their own policies requiring workers to be vaccinated.

And a number of health care workers have been placed on unpaid leave as a result of the mandatory vaccine requirements.

The Ford government has gone ahead and created a mandatory vaccination policy for workers in long-term care homes.

Given the province's backlog of surgeries and the number of people who have missed cancer and heart screenings and other important medical procedures due to the COVID pandemic, they may view the premier's decision as being a good one.

You would think the province would want as many people to get vaccinated as possible. We know the vaccines are the ticket to a stronger economy and we all wish to get back to normal.

One rule of the virus - if left unchecked it will spread like wildfire and keeping it in check requires vaccinations.

Taken too soon



There was drumming, singing ceremony and offerings at a sacred fire held this week in Latchford to help a young Indigenous woman on her spirit journey.

Sacred fires take place over the course of four days. The fires are used by Indigenous people as a wellness approach involving spirituality as a way for people to heal and bond together.

The people who created this sacred fire did the same thing for Nicole Geurtin when she passed away recently.

It is an incredible act of kindness, goodness and love helping people on their spirit journey. Sometimes when we listen to the news of the day we may think the world is filled with sociopaths, but in reality, it is filled with kindness.

Thank you, miigwetch to the fire keepers.

I believe Indigenous knowledge is what may save this incredibly beautiful, but broken world.

The young Indigenous wolf woman who died this week at 23 had her whole life ahead of her.

She was given her Indigenous name Wolf Woman of the Bear Clan at a Pow Wow a couple of years ago.

A lot of good, decent people are no longer with us because

the same old foe, cancer, keeps taking them from us.

My question: why is cancer so prevalent in this region?

We do indeed realize cancer is not just a disease of older women when a 23-year-old dies from breast cancer.

We know from the Team Shan campaign advocating for awareness of breast health in young women that too many young women are being misdiagnosed.

The cancer is often only detected when it reaches Stage Four, and by that time it is terminal.

When will cancer awareness and early detection of can-

cer in adolescents and young adults be a routine part of a medical check up, part of high school curriculums and part of public health mandates?

We need broader system changes, as Team Shan's Lorna Larsen says. We cannot continue to see young women ravaged by this disease.

There is a silver lining to the cancer cloud and it involves the Bikers Reunion and the Community Cancer Care program.


The young woman's family thanked the Community Cancer Care program for helping her deal with the costs of managing the disease. We don't realize how important this one-of-a-kind cancer program is. There is not another program like it in Canada helping cancer patients financially and emotionally deal with the disease.

Thank you to the Bikers Reunion providing the bulk of the funding for the Community Cancer Care Program and thanks to the volunteers who run the program.

Be kind, be generous, share life's goodie bag and for heaven's sake, do not leave anything unsaid between those you love and cherish.

TEMISKAMING SHORES — Dan Bilodeau, who grew up in Haileybury and attended high school in the area, has written and self-published a book called *Mother's Bones*.

He is a graduate of the University of Ottawa and is employed in the field of intelligence and security, having worked for the federal government in various roles.

Although he is no longer based in the north, where his book is set, he visits fam-

ily and friends here and has a special affection for the region.

"I have fond memories of my childhood in the Temiskmaing area and do miss it very much," said Bilodeau in an email interview.

He has written two previous novels, *Hunter* in 2007 and *The Shepherd* in 2011. In terms of the writing process, Bilodeau says he continues to hone his craft and understands the writing process better with each book completed.

"I find that with each project, you get better in your craft and every book has been an improvement over the last," he said.

"Judging from the feedback I have gotten, in terms of *Mother's Bones*, is by far my best work and I hope to keep improving."

He acknowledges a great deal of his time is taken up with being the father of two young boys and that takes him away from his passion for writing.

SUBJECT OF THE BOOK

The book is about a man in his late 40s, Dale Chabot, who is searching for his mother who disappeared 30 years earlier

in his hometown of Temiskaming.

After receiving a tip late one night from his sister, Mandy, who told him that a local man revealed to her the identities of those responsible for his mother's disappearance, he sets out on a journey to return to his hometown in order to follow the lead.


He wishes to keep his presence in the region a secret due to unfortunate dealings with law enforcement.

The trails lead him to drug and human traffickers and corrupt police officials who are trying to keep the truth about his mother's disappearance from being revealed. He learns those responsible for his mother's disappearance are holed-up in the Northern Ontario wilderness and he vows to get to the bottom of the truth and get justice for his family.

He began writing the book in 2018 after joining an online group dedicated to solving the disappearance of Melanie Ethier.

The author has dedicated the book to the memory of Ethier writing, "For Melanie...and for all those for whom we seek answers."

Pope to visit Canada on "historic pilgrimage of healing and reconciliation"

OTTAWA (Special) – The Catholic Bishops of Canada have expressed gratitude that Pope Francis has accepted their invitation to visit Canada on a pilgrimage of healing and reconciliation.

In anticipation of this visit, the planned delegation of Indigenous survivors, elders, knowledge keepers and youth will travel to Vatican City in December.

In a news release, the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) said the delegation will have the opportunity to speak to Pope Francis about the timing, focus, and themes in preparation for his future pilgrimage to Canada.

"The bishops of Canada have been engaged in meaningful discussions with Indigenous peoples, especially those affected by residential schools, who have shared stories about the suffering and challenges that they continue to experience," said CCCB president, the Most Rev. Raymond Poisson, in the release.

"We pray that Pope Francis' visit to Canada will be a significant milestone in the journey toward reconciliation and healing."

The Canadian bishops recently pledged to work with the Holy See, which is the government of the Roman Catholic Church, and Indigenous partners on the possibility of a pastoral visit to Canada by the Pope.

This delegation to the Holy See will take place from December 17 through 20, and is being planned with national Indigenous organizations and other partners.

"We will invite the delegation of Indigenous survivors, elders, knowledge keepers, and youth who will meet with Pope Francis to open their hearts to the Holy Father and share both their suffering as well as their hopes and desires for his eventual visit to Canada," Poisson said.

Details about Pope Francis' pilgrimage to Canada, as well as the Rome delegation will be announced by the CCCB as details are confirmed.







While the COVID-19 vaccine is highly effective, booster doses are being offered to these groups based on evidence of gradual waning immunity six months after receiving their second dose and a higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19.
