Bright future

Englehart Legion upgrades on display

ENGLEHART - The Englehart Royal Canadian Legion Branch 104 re-opened its doors October 28.

The upstairs area is ready for use again, although the basement area, where many of the renovations have been carried out, is still awaiting the final component of new flooring.

People are now being welcomed in on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 12 p.m. to 1 a.m., and on Sundays on special occasions. The upstairs hall is also now ready for those who would like to rent the space.

The wheelchair accessible building is a popular place for people to gather to play cards, or for dart games, and for seniors' suppers that have been regularly produced in the past. Coffee and tea are available and the bar is also open when bartenders are available. At times, there will also be music.

COVID protocols must be followed, including a proof of vaccination, mask, and social distancing.

Legion secretary-treasurer Lynn Racicot explained in a telephone interview that since the pandemic shutdowns were taking place, the Legion members decided to try to get some repairs done on the building.

They applied for a Trillium Foundation grant and were successful, using the funds to install new air-conditioning downstairs.

Windows in the building, which had been boarded up, have now been exposed and modified so that they can be opened.

"Now it's nice and bright," said Racicot. "It's just going to make it healthier and cleaner and brighter."

The Legion volunteers also used the funding to address a problem of running out of hot water with the installation of a hot-water-on-demand unit.

One toilet from the ladies washroom and one urinal from the men's washroom were removed, and the

washrooms were altered to make them wheelchair accessible, Racicot continued.

An area of the building's sewer pipe was found to have a collapsed lining which was slowing the flow of sewage from the building. That has now been repaired, she said.

The old carpet in the lower level has been removed and flooring is now being awaited.

NEEDLES AND POLLS

Racicot said the upstairs area of the Legion building has already been put into good use, providing a space for two vaccination clinics and as a polling station during the federal election.

She is hoping that the renovations will open up the building to more activities and more events.

"It will be a brighter venue for other people who

want to come in." One wedding has already been booked for next June, she noted.

She cautioned that the work is not yet complete.

"We still have quite a bit of work to do."

Fundraising is still taking place, and many personal contributions have been received.

"Some of the members were really generous with their donations," she commented.

When the flooring for the lower level is completed, legion members plan to hold a grand opening to thank the Trillium Foundation, and to officially welcome everyone to the newly renovated building, said

She also noted the work of volunteers whose labour helped keep the costs down.

"It's used by a lot of people," said Racicot. "A lot of organizations will hold meetings there."

NEED FOR VOLUNTEERS

Now that the Legion is reopening, Racicot also noted the need for more volunteers. The Ladies Auxiliary, which puts on meals for seniors and other events, especially needs more helpers for tasks such as shopping and cooking, she said.

Unfortunately, due to the extra work that would be required to meet COVID protocols, a luncheon will not be

held on Remembrance Day.

"The sandwiches would have to be wrapped individually and that's just a little too involved," Racicot explained. The outdoor ceremonies will still be held as usual, though.

"This COVID has really slowed everything down, but it gave

us the chance to get the work done," Racicot said.

The Legion hall is situated in an ideal location in the downtown area of Englehart, and the opening of its doors is expected to be well received.

"Slowly but surely we will be back to normal," said Racicot.



Minimum wage goes up to \$15 per hour

DISTRICT (Special) - The Ontario government has announced it will introduce legislation to raise the minimum wage in the province by 65 cents.

It currently sits at \$14.35 per hour and the legislation would increase it to \$15 per hour effective January 1, 2022.

Under the proposed changes, the special minimum wage rate for liquor servers would be eliminated and they would be entitled to the general minimum wage. Students under 18, homeworkers and hunting, fishing and wilderness guides would also see an increase in their special minimum wage rates.

"When we asked labour leaders what their priorities were, increasing the minimum wage was at the top of the list," said Ontario Premier Doug Ford.

"As the cost of living continues to go up, our government is proud to be working for workers, putting more money into their pockets by increasing the minimum wage."

Liquor servers have previously received below the general minimum wage, based on the belief customer tipping can make up the difference. However, many of these workers have increasingly seen their tips pooled and redistributed among many staff, making it harder for them to make ends meet. If the legislation is passed, liquor servers would be treated more fairly and see an unprecedented 19.5 per cent increase in their minimum hourly wage, as it changes from \$12.55 per hour to the harmonized \$15 per hour minimum wage.

Special minimum wage rates are also proposed to increase:

• Students under the age of 18 who work 28 hours a week or less when school is in session, five consecutive hours in a day, or work during a school break or summer holidays would see an increase from \$13.50 to \$14.10 an hour.

- Homeworkers (those who do paid work out of their own homes for employers) would see an increase from \$15.80 an hour to \$16.50 an hour.
- Hunting and fishing guides currently have a minimum rate of \$71.75 for working less than five consecutive hours in a day, and \$143.55 for working five or more hours in a day. Their new proposed rate would be \$75.00 for working less than

and \$150.05 for working five or more hours in a day.

QUICK FACTS

- A full-time worker making the general minimum wage could see an annual earnings increase of \$1,350 in 2022 under the proposed legislation.
- From January-August 2021, there were 763,500 workers at or below the proposed general minimum wage of \$15 in Ontario (StatsCan Labour Force Survey, 2021).
- Most minimum wage earners are women and nearly 73 per cent of working 15- to

19-year-olds are at or below the proposed general minimum wage of \$15 per hour.

• The industries employing the most minimum wage earners are accommodation and food services, and retail trade.

• Nearly 37 per cent of workers at or below the proposed general minimum wage of \$15 per hour are in retail trade and almost 24 per cent are in accommodation and food ser-



Caution is needed

We've seen it in several places. People getting together in large crowds without masking, and people hosting events with vaccinated and unvaccinated people in attendance.

With the fourth wave of COVID-19 easing, and the entire province of Ontario sighing with relief, it is not time to let our guard down.

We see our northern neighbors, the city of Sudbury, with increased infection rates and we don't wish that to happen to any community.

But here's the irony: you can catch the virus even if you are double vaccinated.

With the flu season upon us, we have renewed reasons to be cautious.

While you don't have to live in a corner trembling, at the same time with all pandemic restrictions being lifted, caution is need-

COP is a flop

"Sometimes you have to anger people." Greta Thunberg



I called my daughter, who lives in Glasgow, Scotland, asking if she'd seen Greta Thunberg.

I should not have poked the bear.

The popular teen Swedish climate change activist arrived in Glasgow last week amidst much fanfare.

She arrived by train from London to the Glasgow-based 26th Conference of the Parties (COP26) climate change conference. The media said she was energy conscious in her travel choice.

I didn't know train travel existed from Sweden to Scotland?

It is this type of hypocrisy that is making Glaswegians very angry as climate change activists overtake their city.

My daughter is a pro-green energy person but she sees much hypocrisy happening in the climate change movement.

And with her boots-on-the-ground perspective, I learned that hypocrisy is rife in Scotland these days.

Glasgow is currently experiencing a garbage strike and half the city is covered in rotting garbage and rats are running all over the place.

Highlighting mental health and addictions response

NEW LISKEARD (Staff) – Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof and Timmins-James Bay MP Charlie Angus leant their presence to raise awareness of programs and services offered across the district through the CMHA.

The NDP politicians visited the New Liskeard branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association Cochrane-Timiskaming (CMHA-CT) October 14. The Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team (MCRRT)

service is a new collaborative partnership with the local detachments of the Ontario Provincial Police.

It's designed to "allow the Kirkland Lake and Temiskaming region communities access to much-needed additional community support services related to both addictions and/or experiencing a mental health crisis," CMHA stated in a press release.

Through the Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team, police services will be provided along with access

to a mental health worker for both on-site and for follow-up support.

Funding and resources for the MCRRT unit was made possible via the District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board, the CMHA-CT, and OPP in both Kirkland Lake and the Temiskaming region, said the mental health association.



Survey says: inflation is stressing out Canadians

DISTRICT (Special) - Inflation is a major concern of a majority of Canadians.

A survey conducted by PolicyMe, a digital life insurance innovator, found that inflation is weighing heavily on their minds.

As Canada's inflation rate soared to an 18-year high, increased cost of living is a source of financial stress for two out of three (67 per cent) Canadians - more than double that of any other financial stressor.


Following inflation, the top financial stressors include saving for retirement (30 per cent), inability to absorb unforeseen expenses (25 per cent), unpredictability of investments (25 per cent), inability to save as much as pre-pandemic (22 per cent), and high-interest consumer debt (17 per cent).

"We're approaching the end of 2021, a year that many were looking to with optimism, but Canadians are feeling anxious about the highest inflation rate we've seen in a long time," said Andrew Ostro, CEO, PolicyMe.

"Whether it's keeping up with the rising food, fuel, or housing costs, people are stressed about the increased cost of living - and parents are feeling it the most."

Parents of children under 18 report being more stressed on five of the six top personal finance stressors, compared to Canadians without dependent children.

CARBON MONOXIDE AWARENESS WEEK

Hello everyone

This week is Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week, and we would like to present you with some safety tips. Should you have any questions, please contact the Fire Dept. Office.

Carbon Monoxide Alarm Tips

Testing and Replacing

- Landlords are responsible for installing and maintaining carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in their rental units
- · Landlords are required to test CO alarms in rental units annually and when the battery is replaced, changes are made to the electric circuit or a change of tenancy occurs.
- It is against the law for tenants to remove the batteries or tamper with CO alarms in any way.
- Test CO alarms every month by pressing the test button.
- · Replace batteries every year.
- · Replace CO alarms according to manufacturer's instructions.

Know the Sound of the CO Alarm:

- · Your CO alarm sounds different than your smoke alarm. Test both alarms monthly and make sure everyone in your home knows the difference between the two alarm sounds.
- Know the difference between the CO alarms' low-battery warning, end of life warning and an emergency alarm consult the CO alarm manufacturer's instructions.

What to do if the CO Alarm Sounds:

- · Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea and dizziness, as well as confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness and death.
- If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants suffer from symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Then call 9-1-1 or your local emergency services number from outside the building.
- If your CO alarm sounds, and no one is suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning, check to see if the battery needs replacing, or the alarm has reached its "end-of-life" before calling 9-1-1.



Immunization Protects Everyone!

Vaccines have improved the lives of every Canadian. For instance, before tetanus immunization was available, the fear of tetanus hovered over every cut and puncture wound. Older adults will easily recall how frantic parents were to disinfect every childhood scrape to protect against lockjaw and memories of family or friends paralyzed by polio and summers spent in fear. In the last 50 years, immunization has saved more lives in Canada than any other health intervention.

Immunization is necessary for two reasons: to protect individuals and communities. Vaccines protect an entire population by preventing the spread of disease from one person to another...the more people immunized, the less chance there is for disease to spread.

Prevention of infection by immunization is a lifelong process — it does not stop in childhood! Childhood immunization programs have significantly reduced vaccine-preventable diseases among children, but Canada's population has an increasing number of adults who remain vulnerable to these diseases. All adults should be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, measles, mumps, rubella and varicella. Additionally, adults 65 years of age and older and those with conditions that increase their chances of complications should receive one dose of pneumococcal vaccine and yearly Influenza vaccine.

Thinking of travelling? Be sure you are protected against illnesses such as hepatitis, typhoid, meningitis, yellow fever or Japanese encephalitis depending on where you are going. If you're not sure what you might need and have access to a computer, you can go to http://www.phac-asoc.gc.ca/ tmp-pmv/index-eng.ohp to learn about any travel advisories that may be applicable.

As you grow, you don't outgrow your need for immunization. Whether you are a parent, a young adult or a senior, talk to your health care provider about being up-to-date on your immunizations.


