THU warns of potential COVID-19 exposures

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – With case counts on the rise in Temiskaming, the public has been advised of potential exposures to COVID-19 in two public settings in the Tri-Town area.

On November 16, the Timiskaming Health Unit said there had been a potential exposure to the virus on Temiskaming Transit on Saturday, November 13.

It urged anyone who took the bus at the following times and locations to monitor themselves for symptoms:

- the northbound bus between Cobalt and downtown New Liskeard, between 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.
- Route A between downtown New Liskeard and the Temiskaming Hospital, between 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.

The health unit advised of another potential low-risk exposure at the Cobalt LCBO.

Anyone who visited the outlet on Thursday, November 11, through Saturday, November 13, is also asked to monitor themselves for symptoms.

In Facebook postings, the health unit advised: "If symptoms develop, reach out to your local Assessment Centre for testing. You do not have to go for testing if you do not have symptoms."

"If you are unsure of whether or not you should be tested, call the Timiskaming Health Unit for screening at 1-866-747-4305, extension 7."

It said it's working closely with management at both the Cobalt LCBO and Temiskaming Transit "and all necessary COVID-19 prevention measures are being followed."

As of noon November 17, the district was reporting 17 active cases. One individual was in hospital, and the rest were self-isolating.

The latest numbers bring to 271 the number of COVID-19 cases in Temiskaming to date. Three people have died.

100 Women Who Care meeting in person November 24

— The final 100 Women Who Care-Temiskaming Shores and More meeting for 2021 will be an in-person meeting at the New Liskeard Golf Club on Wednesday, November 24 beginning at 7 p.m.

“We are meeting on November 24 in person with COVID protocols in place at the NLGC. Doors are open at 6 p.m. with the meeting to start at 7,” said 100 Women Who Care steering committee chair Laurie Wilson in an on-line interview. “We are looking forward to returning to our original format. As always new members are more than welcome to attend.”

New members can pre-register at www.100wwctemshores.ca/forms.

The 100 Women Who Care have raised a staggering \$85,000 in 21 months since their inception in November of 2019.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, several of the 100



Women Who Care meetings have been held virtually.

People attending the meeting need only bring a mask, proof of double vaccination and identification.

Wilson encourages members to begin thinking of not-for-profit beneficiaries in the region who could benefit from the money raised during each meeting.

There is a list of past nominees on the 100 Women website for ideas on who to nominate.

The 100 Women Who Care fundraising concept is simple, in one hour one hundred women or more donate \$100 each, or two people can team up to donate \$50 each as a team.

A minimum of \$10,000 is raised from the meeting, which

is then donated to a charity nominated by the members.

Three nominations are accepted during each of the four meetings held per year and people who nominate those charities have an opportunity to explain why the donation should be given to that particular group or charity.

Charitable tax receipts are given out with donations.

Some of the past beneficiaries of the 100 Women Who Care funds are The Northdale Manor, the Community Bike Exchange, the Temiskaming Hospital, the Rotary Splash Pad, the Temiskaming Nordic Ski Club, and more.

Symptoms of pancreatic cancer

Pancreatic cancer may not cause any signs or symptoms in its early stages. Signs and symptoms often appear as the tumour grows and causes changes in the body. Other health conditions can cause the same symptoms as pancreatic cancer.

See your health care provider if you have these signs or symptoms:

- yellowing of the skin and the whites of the eyes (called jaundice)
- pain in the upper abdomen or upper back
- fatty stools that are light coloured, bulky and float in the toilet
- unexplained weight loss
- loss of appetite
- fatigue
- nausea and vomiting
- indigestion
- feeling full after a small meal
- bloating
- gas
- diarrhea or constipation
- itching
- dark urine
- fever and shivering
- swelling of the legs

Known Risk Factors

Tobacco
Obesity
Diabetes
Family history of pancreatic cancer
Certain genetic conditions
Chronic pancreatitis

Possible Risk Factors

Alcohol
Physical inactivity
Eating red and processed meats
Occupational exposure to chemicals

Based on this information, your provider may refer you to a specialist or order tests to check for pancreatic cancer or other health problems. CT scan is the most common imaging test for pancreatic cancer.

EDITORIAL

Climate emergency

The conference on the climate crisis in Glasgow from October 31 to November 12 has ended.

The conference was a litmus test of how world leaders could collaborate to avoid the worst outcome for the planet—the collapse of life on earth.

Was the conference merely a gathering place for the world's elite to wine and dine amongst themselves with countries issuing platitudes about reductions in green house gas emissions?

Or was it the turning point we so desperately need to reduce green house gas emissions and limit global warming to 1.5 Celsius?

The good news is the world's second biggest emitter, the United States, is back on board on the subject of climate change with President Biden leading the charge.

Former US president Donald Trump said he would not attend the Glasgow conference and pulled the US out of the Paris agreement.

We can no longer deny the climate crisis is here with extreme weather patterns and disasters happening globally, involving floods, wild fires and droughts.

If we are going to reduce global heating to 1.5 degrees we need to reduce carbon emissions to eventually achieve net-zero emissions.

The United Nations climate conference hoped world leaders would agree to reach net-zero emissions within 30 years.

This would mean little investment in fossil fuels, which we know are the biggest human caused contributions to global warming.

We know that fossil fuel multinational corporations will not sit idly by while the world talks fossil fuel emissions.

Coal is the biggest contributor to manmade climate change and yet we know India persuaded the conference to water down its language about coal production.

One benefit of these large-scale climate conferences is that for a brief period of time, the news is all about climate change and that can only be viewed as beneficial with more people understanding the urgency of global warming.

Cobalt incorporates new traditions into November 11

COBALT – The hallmarks of Remembrance Day ceremonies could all be found in Cobalt this year – two minutes of silence, the reading of the names of the fallen, the playing of the *Last Post* and *Reveille* as flags were lowered and then raised.

But new elements – from the past – were also incorporated into the observance of November 11.

As each name of the war dead was read by historian Ken Riley, Cobalt Mayor George Othmer tolled a small bell.

The silver bell was atop a trophy-type base bearing the names of presidents of the Temiskaming and Cochrane Firemen's Association, dating back to 1941.

"We were looking for a bell for Remembrance Day," said Othmer.


"I remembered this bell, and I remembered how nice it sounded."

The memento had been stored at the Cobalt-Northern Ontario Firefighters Museum, which is currently closed.

Othmer said the bell had been rung at the annual regional fire convention in memory of firefighters who had died that year.

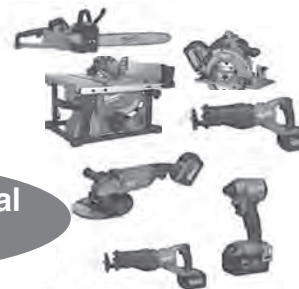

Ontario hitting Green Button for energy use info

LONDON (Special) – Ontario is providing families and businesses more control over their electricity and natural gas bills with the introduction of a new Green Button standard that will allow them to track their en-

ergy use, reduce bills and save money.

In a news release, the Ontario Ministry of Energy said studies have found that easy access to energy data, which Green Button along with smart home

devices can provide, can help consumers make informed decisions and achieve energy savings of up to 18 percent.

Ontario will become the first province in Canada to mandate the standard.

“Families and businesses want to be in the driver’s seat when it comes to their energy bills,” said Energy Minister Todd Smith in the release.

“Green Button is part of our commitment to give consumers

more choice when it comes to their energy use and will enable easy and quick access to their consumption data through smartphone or computer apps so they can find customized tips to reduce energy use or switch electricity price plans to save money.”

As of November 1, 2021, the government is requiring nearly all regulated Ontario electricity and natural gas utilities to provide Green Button to their customers within 24 months.

Green Button lets customers download their natural gas and hourly electricity data in a standardized format from their utility and authorize the secure transfer of this data to applications of their choice.

This real time data can then be accessed on their smartphone or computer.

By including it in the Remembrance Day service, “it’s reliving its purpose,” he said.

Meanwhile, the public also had a chance to see for the first time in decades a stone slab that had been part of Cobalt’s original cenotaph.

The stone bears the names of those who died in the First World War and had been an insert in Cobalt’s original Great War Memorial.

After the new cenotaph was

built, the engraved stone was saved, and eventually ended up at the town’s public works site.

“It had long been forgotten. I only found out it was there about five years ago,” said Riley in a phone interview earlier this week.

Renovations to the building led to efforts to put it back on display.

It returned to the public eye last week, and Riley said there are plans to secure it in the downtown park.

How do I keep myself and my loved ones safe?

- To prevent cooking fires, you must **be alert**. You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- Always stay in the kitchen while cooking.** If you must leave, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that burns—*oven mitts, cooking utensils, dish cloths, paper towels and pot holders*—a **safe distance from the stove**.



- Keep a **proper-fitting pot lid** near the stove when cooking. If a pot catches fire slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove. Do not move the pot until it has cooled completely.

- Loose-fitting clothes can come into contact with stove burners and catch fire. **Wear short sleeves, tight sleeves or roll them up** when cooking.

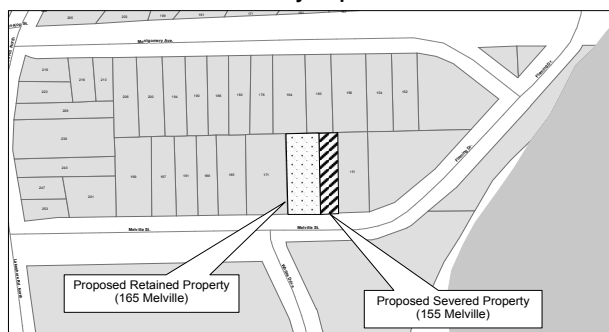

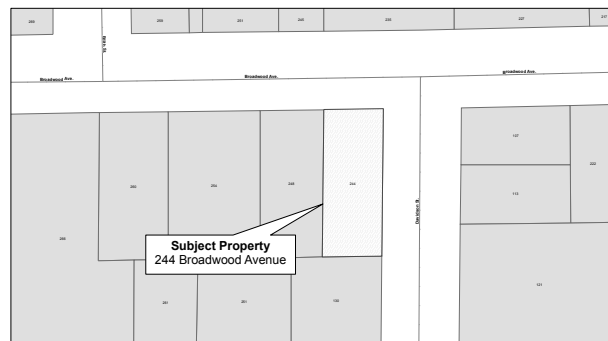

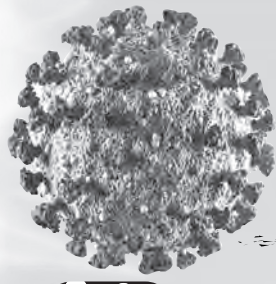

Do I have to worry about any long-term effects of the vaccine? Dois-je m'inquiéter des effets à long terme du vaccin ?

Doctors and scientists are confident in the long-term safety of the COVID-19 vaccines for several reasons:

First, this is not new vaccine technology. Scientists have been studying and working with mRNA vaccines for decades, including for flu, Zika, rabies, cytomegalovirus (CMV), and cancer treatments. Decades of studying mRNA have shown no long-term side effects.

Second, negative effects generally occur within six weeks of receiving the vaccine, and regulators in many countries required at least eight weeks of safety data. The vaccines have now been in use for many months with billions of doses administered around the world.

Third, we are very confident in the track record of Canada's vaccine approval and safety monitoring system. This means that the end data and safety tests for COVID-19 vaccines are the same as other vaccines that have been approved in Canada over the last several decades. Canada's system has proven time and again that the data necessary to get through the approval process is sufficient to prove safety, even for the long-term.

When considering long-term risks, a COVID-19 infection is a much more serious concern. The virus can cause long-term damage to lungs and other organs, as well as many other complications. This is called post-COVID-19 syndrome, or long COVID, and it's one of the reasons why doctors recommend getting vaccinated.

Les médecins et les scientifiques ont confiance en la sécurité à long terme des vaccins contre la COVID-19 pour plusieurs raisons :

Premièrement, il ne s'agit pas d'une nouvelle technologie vaccinale. Les scientifiques étudient et travaillent avec des vaccins à ARNm depuis des décennies, notamment les vaccins contre la grippe, le Zika, la rage, le cytomégalovirus (CMV) et les traitements contre le cancer. Des décennies d'études de l'ARNm n'ont démontré aucun effet secondaire à long terme.

Deuxièmement, les effets négatifs se produisent généralement dans les six semaines après avoir reçu le vaccin, et les régulateurs responsables, dans de nombreux pays, ont exigé un minimum de huit semaines de données pour la sécurité. Les vaccins sont maintenant utilisés depuis plusieurs mois avec des milliards de doses administrées dans le monde.

Troisièmement, nous sommes très confiants des antécédents du système canadien d'approbation des vaccins et de la surveillance de l'innocuité. Cela signifie que les données finales et les tests d'innocuité des vaccins contre la COVID-19 sont les mêmes que ceux des autres vaccins qui ont été approuvés au Canada au cours des dernières décennies. Le système canadien a prouvé à maintes reprises que les données nécessaires pour passer à travers le processus d'approbation d'un vaccin sont suffisantes pour prouver sa sécurité, et ce, même à long terme.

Lorsque l'on considère les risques à long terme, une infection de la COVID-19 est une préoccupation beaucoup plus grave. Le virus peut causer des dommages à long terme aux poumons et à d'autres organes, ainsi que de nombreuses autres complications. C'est ce qu'on appelle le syndrome post-COVID-19 ou COVID longue, et c'est l'une des raisons pour lesquelles les médecins recommandent de se faire vacciner.
