# **Thornloe Cheese** tops Royal spread

TORONTO (Staff) - A butter produced in Temiskaming using milk from grass-fed cows reigns again at the Royal Winter Fair.

Temiskaming Valley Grass Fed Butter took home first place in the grass-fed or organic unsalted category at the recent competition.

It's produced by Thornloe Cheese, using milk from Temiskaming dairy farms.

To meet the grass-fed criteria, a specific proportion of cows' diet must come from forages and grass, and cattle must also have access to outdoor grazing for at least part of the year.

The latest honour follows wins in 2018 and 2019, when the unsalted variety was named the Grand Champion butter at the Royal.

That title went this year to a Lactantia cultured variety produced in Eastern Ontario.

The Royal Fair, traditionally held in Toronto each November, describes itself as the world's largest combined indoor agricultural fair and international equestrian show.

Fairs in the recent past have attracted some 300,000 visitors.

But this year's Royal, like the 2020 edition, was forced to scale down and focus on online activities as a result of the pandemic.

However, many of its agricultural competitions went ahead.

In other dairy categories, Thornloe Cheese's Temiskaming Valley variety placed sixth in the class for grass-fed or organic salted butters.

Another Northeastern Ontario dairy company scored a Royal win.

Saganash, a sheep's milk variety produced by Fromagerie Kapuskoise in Kapuskasing, placed third in a category for cheeses made from goat, sheep, water buffalo and mixed milks.

Quebec, meanwhile, scored a bucketful of wins.

Fromagerie La Vache à Maillotte is located in La Sarre, about 80 kilometres north of Rouyn-Noranda.

Its Braséo variety was judged first in a class for cow's milk cheeses with grilling properties, and its salted butter placed fifth in its class.

It also won a seventh in the cow's milk flavoured cheese class and two eighth place finishes, one for its semi-soft surfaced Fredondaine variety and the other for its Allegretto sheep's milk variety.

As for next year's Royal, organizers hope to return to the traditional in-person event in 2022, when the winter fair marks its 100th anniversary.





In the spirit of the season, admission to the farm will be non-perishable foods for area food banks.

Willard Bus Lines has loaned a bus for the event which is available to receive and transport donated items.

Even though there has been an upsurge in the number of active COVID cases in the region, as of The Speaker's deadline the event was still scheduled to proceed.

Consultation with the Timiskaming Health Unit has resulted in some modifications to the event, but people are still being welcomed. However, they are being asked to book first, and one-hour visits will be slotted to control numbers and ensure safety.

People can book a visit 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The day's last visit will end at 4 p.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus and the Grinch and elves will be available for socially distanced photographs with the children.

Visitors will also be able to say hello to the many farm animals that will be available for petting over the fence.

Cindy Craig Rosborough and her husband Paul Rosborough are owners of the farm, and are being assisted by Tracy Morrison.

tained since 1906."

The Weekender started out in December of 2001 as a publica-


tion delivered free to district households.

# **Government marks 100th** anniversary of insulin discovery

TORONTO (Special/Staff) - Insulin was discovered at a Toronto lab 100 years ago.

Diabetes Canada describes it as "the most revolutionary Canadian medical breakthrough of the 20th century."

On November 12, the Government of Canada commemorated the anniversary, unveiling a plaque at the University of Toronto's Myhal Centre for Engineering Innovation and Entrepreneurship that recognizes the discovery of insulin as an event of national historic significance.

"Today, we recognize and honour one of Canada's most ground-breaking medical discoveries, and the role of Canadian researchers who helped save millions of lives around the world over the last 100 years," said Brampton-South MP Sonia Sidhu in a statement.

The plaque and commemoration reflect "the rich and varied history of Canada and provides an opportunity for Canadians to discover and connect with our diverse heritage," Sidhu said.

Up until the early twentieth century, diabetes was a fatal disease.

In 1921-1922, a Canadian team of researchers at a University of Toronto laboratory - Frederick Banting, Charles Best, John J.R. Macleod, and James Collip – succeeded in producing extracts of pancreas that contained an effective anti-diabetic

They named it insulin and presided over its development, revolutionizing the treatment for the once fatal disease.

In 1923, Banting and Macleod received a Nobel Prize in medicine for their work on the discovery of insulin, stimulating further medical research in Canada.

Diabetes Canada notes that one in three Canadians are living with diabetes or at risk of developing it, and some will experience serious and even life-threatening complications from diabetes in their lifetime.







# **How to prevent** impaired driving over the holidays



The number of impaired driving collisions dramatically increases over the holiday season. Here are a few tips to make sure neither you nor the people you care about get behind the wheel while under the influence.

### ATTENDING A PARTY

### TIPS FOR THE ROAD

When driving home from a holiday shindig, keep an eye out for the following warning signs that another driver might be under the influence of drugs or alcohol:

- They're making wide, abrupt or illegal turns
- They have a slow or delayed reaction time to traffic lights and signs
- They're driving unreasonably fast, slow or at an inconsistent speed
- They're continuously weaving, swerving or drifting out of their lane If you suspect you're driving behind an impaired driver, slow down, stay behind them and, when it's safe to do so, pull over and call 911.






