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

École catholique **St-Michel switches to** virtual learning

TEMISKAMING SHORES - St-Michel students will be learning online until the Christmas break begins next week.



Parents, guardians and staff were informed the previous day in a joint letter from Temiskaming's acting medical officer of health and the director of education with the Conseil scolaire catholique de district des Grandes Rivières.

École catholique St-Michel "continues to be safe for in-person learning and there has been minimal spread of the virus in the school," wrote Dr. Glenn Corneil and Sylvie Petroskie in a letter to parents, guardians and staff.

"However, with over 60 per cent of students absent due to exposure to COVID-19, a lack of supply staff which consequently results in operational safety issues and increasing evidence of COVID-19 in the community, a joint decision has been made to dismiss the entire school and shift from in-person learning to virtual learning."

The board's website lists seven active cases, leaving five classes at the elementary school in isolation. **PREVENTATIVE**

The move has been well-received by the community, said Richard Loiselle, the board's director of communications and accountability.

He said it was also preventative. He said it avoids

the risk of further cases in the days leading up to Christmas and the potential for family gatherings.

The Christmas school break begins December 22, with classes scheduled to resume January 5.

As of December 15, St-Michel was the only school in the board's jurisdiction that has been moved to virtual learning.

The students remaining at the school were sent home with their educational devices earlier this week.

Parents can pick up their children's devices if needed, as well as COVID-19 rapid antigen test kits, on December 16 and 17 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

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The Timiskaming Health Unit "will continue to follow cases and the school will work jointly to notify close contacts," the letter continued.


"We appreciate your patience and understanding as we work together to keep everyone safe. This pandemic has been very hard for children and families and the news of moving to virtual learning may bring a range of emotions," it went on.

"Maintaining learning and the safety of students, staff and our community is our priority. We ask everyone to be COVID-kind and remember to take care of yourself."



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

Province tightening rules in long-term care homes

ONTARIO (Staff/Special) -The provincial government is increasing regulations in long-term care homes in a bid to prevent the spread of COVID-19 into the facilities.

On December 14 the provincial government announced a number of measures to security increase against COVID-19.

"Effective immediately, all general visitors to a long-term care home will need to be fully vaccinated to enter," the province stated in a press release.

Effective Friday, December 17, testing of all staff, students, volunteers, and caregivers, regardless of vaccination status, will be required at least twice a week prior to entry into a home.

quired from all visitors and support workers who provide essential services to a resident or to the facility, unless they had a negative test the day be-

Caregivers will be required to be fully vaccinated, unless they have a valid medical exemption or are attending to a resident in a palliative endof-life situation.

"Caregivers will be required to have a first dose by December 20, and all required doses to be considered fully vaccinated by February 21. In the interim, designated caregivers who are not fully vaccinated would need to restrict their visit to the resident's room."


New restrictions will limit indoor visitors to a maximum A negative test will be re- of two people per resident at a time, and outdoor visitors will be limited to a maximum of four people per resident at a time.

Large social activities will be discouraged.

Social day trips for residents will be limited to only those residents who are fully vaccinated and if it is for a social reason, they will be required to be actively screened upon their return to the home. If they had a known exposure they will be isolated and tested.

"All residents, regardless of vaccination status, can continue to leave the home for essential reasons, such as medical appointments," the press release continues.

Overnight absences for social purposes are being suspended.

Shingles Vaccine

What is Shingles?

Also known as herpes zoster, shingles is an infection that can be very serious. The virus causes a painful skin rash with blisters on one side of the body. It can cause complications like loss of vision and debilitating nerve pain. The most common complication is long-lasting and severe pain where the shingles rash was.

Shingles cannot be passed from one person to another. However, the virus that causes shingles can be spread from a person with the shingles rash in the blister phase to another person who has never had chicken pox.

Who is at risk of getting shingles?

The risk increases as a person ages. About one in three Canadians will develop shingles in their lifetime and two out of three cases occur in people over 50 years of age. The severity and complications increase with age.

The shingles vaccine can reduce your risk of getting shingles and the long-term pain it can cause. There are two different shingles vaccines available with a cost to purchase the vaccine itself. Check with your pharmacy as to the cost of the vaccine and which one is best for you.

Two people were killed in a threevehicle crash south of Temagami on Highway 11 last week.

One of the vehicles involved in the crash was a transport truck.

Our hearts go out to the families and friends of the deceased and to all the Emergency Medical Services, Ontario Provincial Police and fire department personnel on the scene that day.

No doubt they have been traumatized by the incident.

There are so many transports using Highway 11 as a route across the north to haul freight to the western provinces.

Highway 11 is being chewed up as a result of that much truck traffic and some of the drivers of those trucks are not properly trained.

New Democratic Party MPP, Guy Bourgouin, introduced a private member's bill aiming to make winter driving on Highway 11 and 17

He is asking that Highway 11 and 17 be classified the same as the 400 series of highways.

And the maintenance standards of Highway 11 have also been called into question with the government awarding contracts to the lowest bidder.

If the clearing of our roads is about money, the people of the north cannot accept a lower standard of maintenance, ever.

The government is directly putting our lives in jeopardy if they ignore what is happening on our roads during winter months.

But aside from all that highway angst, it was the people of Temagami who shone a light on kindness during this incident.

He brought motorists food, water and information on the crash.

This is the northern way and this is a feather in the cap of the people of Temagami.

Thank you to all who helped the stranded motorists during that horrific incident.

Road test: 2+1

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A test of a new road design intended to make Highway 11 safer is inching closer to reality.

The province has approved a pilot project that will test the 2+1 design on a stretch of Highway 11 between North Bay and Temagami.

It'll be three to four years, however, before construction of a test section of highway begins.

The first step is selecting the location.

At this point, two potential sites have been identified – a 14-kilometre stretch of Highway 11 between Sand Dam Road, about 20 kilometres north of North Bay, and Ellesmere Road; and a 16-kilometre span from Highway 64 north to Jumping Caribou Lake Road.

The public can offer feedback on the pilot locations until January 14.

The province will announce the locations later that month. THE MODEL

A 2+1 highway is a threelane highway with a centre passing lane that changes direction every two to five kilometres, separated by a barrier.

It provides double lanes and the opportunity to overtake another vehicle at regular intervals, and prevents passing when traffic is limited to a single lane.

The project, which will be the first in North America, has "a proven track record of success" around the world, said Transportation Minister Caroline Mulroney earlier this week.

The announcement was made December 14 in North Bay and live-streamed on the ministry's Twitter feed.

Mulroney credited the work of GEMS – the Going the Extra Mile for Safety committee under the Temiskaming Shores and Area Chamber of Commerce - for coming up with the 2+1 model.

She also offered a special thanks to GEMS member and researcher Mark Wilson "for being such a strong advocate for road safety in North America."

"With the 2+1 design, re-

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equals pilot project

gardless of the reason for a vehicle crossing the centre line, an icy road or a distracted driver, lives are saved by a median barrier," Wilson said at the North Bay announcement.

He said Sweden was spurred to act as it saw the number of deaths in head-on collisions and crashes caused as vehicles left the road.

It now has some 3,000 kilometres of 2+1 roads.

"Two-plus-one roads are a similar safety results.

prime example of safe system road design which makes our roads more forgiving and therefore improves our mobility and reduces the needless loss of life that happens too regularly on our Northern roads," he said.

He noted that the pilot project will be built on an existing asset and at a lower cost than some of Ontario's twinned highways, but will achieve similar safety results.

He thanked Mulroney's staff for being "very receptive" to looking at data on 2+1 and how it will "save lives, especially the lives of the many young people that die on our roads."

"It will be an important model for the future development of this important transportation corridor," he said.

The announcement is "a sign that we will no longer accept these tragic road deaths

as inevitable and that we will begin a new era of safer roads in Ontario and in Northern Ontario," he said.

Asked about the timeframe of the project, Mulroney said it will advance to preliminary design in January after the site has been selected.

Time will be needed, she said, for an environmental assessment and property acquisition.

But it'll take three to four


years to actually "build out the infrastructure," she said.

As to cost, that will range from \$1 million to \$3 million per kilometre, she said.

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Long-time municipal politician Earl Read steps down

THORNLOE – Thornloe Reeve Earl Read has stepped down from his office after extensive service in area municipal politics.

He had held the position of reeve since February 21, 2017, after the death of then-reeve Ron Vottero.

Read announced his decision at the November 16 council meeting.

Remaining council members are deputy reeve Pauline Peddie, Chelsea Maurer Huff, Cher Kiff and Allan Peddie.

Read, 88, and his wife Verna live on the outskirts of Thornloe, and have owned farm property in the municipality since 1961.

Municipal politics drew him

in, he said, because "I always had this thing that I wanted to see improvements."

Read began service on Thornloe Village council as councillor, then deputy-reeve in later years before becoming reeve in 2017.

In 2004 he was the recipient of the provincial government's Long-Standing Service Award which is given to those who have provided over 25 years of service to municipal politics.

Through his many years on council, he has seen the addition of a sewer system, the installation of rip-rap on a ditch on Younge Street within the last two years, and the extension of Lillie Street this year. With the support of surrounding municipalities, Read also successfully lobbied to have a major streetlight erected by

the Ministry of Transportation at the intersection of Highway 11 and Highway 562 which leads into Thornloe.

Read commented in an inter-

view at his home that "times are changing and it's time for me to retire." He added that he will "miss all the good friends that I made over the years on all the different committees that I sat on."

Read has been a strong voice over the years on the Temisk-aming Municipal Association, bringing to the table his background and knowledge of the forest industry, mining and agriculture. He has also been a member of the Temiskaming Mayors' Action Group, the Earlton Airport committee, and community policing. He was also chair of the Community Pastures for many years.

His work experience outside of council has included a period of time with Rexwood.

He also worked with the Lands and Forests as a truck

driver, assistant scaler and in fire protection, and at Kerr Addison Mine, and says he started the first square set stope in the pillar, and was on diamond drills for ten years.

His work allowed him to see much of Northern Ontario, spending months on end at different locations, including First Nations reserves.

"I saw a lot of country," he said of those years.

When he actively farmed his property along with his wife, he used it to raise sheep and produce wool. He sold his flock in 2012 and rented out a large portion of the acreage, but is now considering getting goats to raise on the remaining acreage with his grandson.

"It's something to keep everybody busy," commented his wife Verna.



Chickadees' complex social system seen at marsh

HILLIARD TOWNSHIP - The number of black-capped chickadees at the Hilliardton Marsh has been rising dramatically in the past couple of years. On top of that, there seems to be two distinct flocks at the marsh.

One group seems to have a preference for the wilds of the back area where people rarely, if ever, get to. The other seems fine with being in the area where there are people.

Hilliardton Marsh coordinator Bruce Murphy thinks it is an interesting discovery, which has been made possible by a new form of banding which allows researchers to identify the movements of the individual birds around the marsh.

He is inviting comments from people who have expertise in chickadees.

Last year, chickadee banding in the more remote northern part of the marsh began, and it became evident that there are two completely separate flocks. Chickadees are territorial, says Murphy, but this distinctive behaviour could be something new.

A study conducted in the 1970s found "that chickadees have quite intricate social connections," said Murphy.

Discovering the group of chickadees that prefers the most remote part of the marsh requires a long trek by snowshoe, said Murphy, so they had been left to their own until quite recently.

"To get in there takes a lot of effort," he said. A new cabin in that area of the marsh now provides some shelter during these longer outings.

This year has been a good one for chickadees and "we have had a mini-eruption" in the population, said Murphy, although the reason is not clear. It does happen from time to time, though, he commented.

He is hoping volunteers can assist with, and increase, the tracking of the chickadees in the more remote part of the marsh in the months ahead so that more can be learned about their behaviour.



12 forliday fire safety

1. Water fresh trees daily

It's time to decorate the Christmas tree! If you're using a real tree, buy it fresh and keep the base of the trunk in water at all times. Keep your tree away from any sparks or heat source, such as fireplace, heater, or candle.

2. Make sure you have working smoke alarms

With family and friends spending extra time at your home over the holidays, it's extra important to check your smoke alarms. Replace them if they are over 10 years old. Remember that you need working smoke alarms on every story of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test your alarms to make sure they alert you and your family if a fire occurs, giving you the precious seconds you need to safely escape.

3. Check all sets of lights before decorating

Before you put those lights on the tree or around the front window, check the cords closely. Discard any sets that are frayed or damaged.

4. Make sure you have working carbon monoxide alarms

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odourless gas that can quickly kill you. Installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home will alert you to the presence of this deadly gas. Replace any carbon monoxide alarms over seven years old.

5. Make sure everyone is familiar with your home's fire escape plan

Develop and practice a home fire escape plan with all members of the household and make sure someone is prepared to help young children, older adults, or anyone else that may need assistance to evacuate. Agree that once outside, everybody stays outside, at which point you can call 911 from a cell phone or neighbour's house.

6. Use extension cords wisely

People often use extension cords for that extra set of lights or the dancing Santa in the corner. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection. Make sure cords never go under rugs, as this can cause damage to the cord and cause a fire.

7. Give space heaters space

If you are using space heaters to help take the chill off, remember to keep them at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.

8. When you go out, blow out!

Candles can set the perfect mood for a holiday celebration, but remember to always blow out candles before leaving the room or going to bed. Keep lit candles safely away from children and pets and anything that can burn, such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.

9. Keep matches and lighters out of the sight and reach of children

People often keep matches and lighters handy to light holiday candles. But matches and lighters can be deadly

in the hands of children. If you smoke, have only one lighter or book of matches and keep it with you at all times.

10. Watch what you heat!

The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year, which means it's easy to get distracted from what we are doing. Cooking fires most commonly occur when cooking is left unattended. Always stay in the kitchen when cooking, especially if using oil or high temperatures. If a pot catches fire, carefully slide a tight-fitting lid over the pot to smother the flames and then turn off the heat.

11. Encourage smokers to smoke outside

Careless smoking is the leading cause of fatal home fires. If you do allow smoking indoors use large, deep ashtrays that can't be knocked over and make sure cigarette butts are properly extinguished.

12. There's more to responsible drinking than taking a cab home

With all the festive cheer this time of year, keep a close eye on anyone attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol. Alcohol is an all-too-common factor in many fatal fires.



ATTENDING A PARTY

If you're attending a holiday shindig, make sure to choose someone to be a designated driver. If this person ends up consuming drugs or alcohol, play it safe by calling a cab or using a ridesharing service. You could also plan to rent a room at a nearby hotel or sleep over at a friend's house to avoid getting behind the wheel.

HOSTING A PARTY

If you're hosting a holiday party, there are a few precautions you can take to make sure your guests don't drive while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. For example, serve plenty of food and provide alcohol-free beverages throughout the night. In addition, offer your spare bedroom or couch to anyone who wants to stay the night, or pre-arrange cab rides for those who need a lift.

TIPS FOR THE ROAD

When driving home from a holiday shindig, keep an eye out for the following warning signs that another driver might be under the influence of drugs or alcohol:

- They're making wide, abrupt or illegal turns
- They have a slow or delayed reaction time to traffic lights and signs
- They're driving unreasonably fast, slow or at an inconsistent speed
- They're continuously weaving, swerving or drifting out of their lane If you suspect you're driving behind an impaired driver, slow down, stay behind them and, when it's safe to do so, pull over and call 911.

Additionally, impaired driving accidents that result in fatalities are more likely to happen very late at night or early in the morning. Therefore, try to avoid being on the road between midnight and 3 a.m.

Every year, hundreds of people are killed and tens of thousands are injured in impaired driving crashes, affecting not only those in the crashes but all of their families and friends as well.

2 DAYS OF HOLIDAY FIRE and CO SAFETY SAFETY

- Water fresh cut trees daily. If you're decorating with a real tree, buy a fresh tree and always keep the base of the trunk in water. Keep your tree away from any ignition source such as the fireplace, heaters or candles.
- 2 Use the proper lights and check for worn or damaged cords. Make your festival of lights fire safe. Replace any string of lights with worn or damaged cords or loose bulb connections. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use. Use the appropriate lights.
- 3 Install and test smoke alarms. The holidays are a perfect time to check your smoke alarms. Smoke alarms give you the precious seconds you need to safely escape a fire. Install smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test your alarms monthly to make sure they will alert you and your family if a fire occurs. Replace smoke alarms if they are over 10 years old.
- 4 Install and test carbon monoxide alarms. Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odourless gas that can quickly kill you. Installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home will alert you to the presence of this deadly gas. Install alarms outside all sleeping areas and test them monthly, if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage. Carbon monoxide alarms don't last forever. Replace them according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Develop and practise a home fire escape plan with everyone in your home. Discuss with everyone in your home how each person will get out in a fire. Know two ways out of each room, if possible. Determine who's going to help young children, older adults, people with disabilities or anyone else who needs help escaping. Once outside, stay outside and call 911 from a cell phone or neighbour's house.
- 6 Extension cords are for temporary use. Overloaded outlets can overheat and start a fire. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection. Never run cords under rugs which can damage the cord and cause a fire. Avoid overloading a circuit with "octopus outlets". If additional outlets or circuits are required, have them installed by a licensed electrician.

- 7 Keep decorations one metre away from space heaters and other heating sources. Keep anything that can burn, such as holiday decorations, curtains and upholstery, at least one metre (3 feet) away from fireplaces, woodstoves and other heating sources like space heaters.
- 8 Go flameless use battery operated candles. Candles can set the perfect mood for a holiday celebration. Consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles. If you use real candles, always blow them out before leaving the room or going to bed. Keep lit candles safely away from children and pets and anything that can burn, such as holiday decorations, curtains and upholstery.
- Seep matches and lighters out of reach of children. Matches and lighters can be deadly in the hands of children. Store them out of the reach of children. If you smoke, have only one lighter or book of matches and keep it with you at all times.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop. The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year, which means it's easy to get distracted from what we are doing. Cooking fires most commonly occur when cooking is left unattended. Always stay in the kitchen when cooking. If a pot catches fire, carefully slide a tight-fitting lid over the pot to smother the flames and then turn off the heat.
- 11 If you smoke, smoke outside. Careless smoking is the leading cause of fatal fires. Encourage smokers to smoke outside, including outside garages. Always use large, deep ashtrays that can't be knocked over and make sure cigarette butts are fully extinguished. Do not extinguish cigarettes in plant pots, which may contain a mixture of peat moss, shredded wood and bark that can easily ignite.
- Don't cook while under the influence of alcohol or cannabis. To prevent cooking fires, you must be alert. You will not be alert if you have consumed alcohol or cannabis, which make you drowsy. Alcohol is all too often a common factor in fatal fires.
