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## **Hospital** visitor policy sparks call for review

TEMISKAMING SHORES – A Temiskaming Shores man is urging Temiskaming Hospital to reconsider its ban on visitors to alternate-level-of-care patients.

Being isolated from loved ones is leading to despair and declines in their health, said Mark Brazeau in an interview earlier this week.

"And they don't have time to ride through this pandemic," said Brazeau.

Alternate-level-of-care (ALC) patients don't need hospital-level care, but are waiting for appropriate community care, typically a bed in a long-term care

Given a shortage of nursing home beds in the area, ALC patients currently make up about half of the hospital's patients.

But unlike the early days of the pandemic, Brazeau said the layers of precautions and protections against infection are now available.

"We know that this COVID isn't going away anytime soon. We do need to adapt and modify and change things to allow people some quality of life, especially in their ending days."

As of mid-week, more than 830 people had supported his online petition that calls on the hospital to revise its policy.

The ban on general visitation was a very difficult decision to take, said hospital CEO Mike Baker in an interview earlier this week.

All things being equal, he said it's best for all hospital patients to have family contact.

"Quite candidly, COVID has changed the balance of risk for us."

As an acute care hospital, he said it deals with patients who are already very vulnerable. They include the elderly, newborns, and people with com-Continued on 8

## Campaign hopes to stem the tide of highway crashes

TEMAGAMI — Flowers being sent to the Ontario Minister of Transportation's office aim to plant seeds of awareness about the dangers of northern roads and reduce deaths on Highways 11 and 17 during winter months.

Temagami resident John Shymko, who is also a Temagami councillor, has created a Facebook page called Flowers for Minster Mulroney's Office.

When a death occurs on a northern highway he will send flowers to the office of Minister Carolyn Mulroney.

"For every death I am made

aware of on Northern Ontario highways, I will be sending flowers in respectful memory of the victims' names to be signed for or refused by the Minister's office," said Shymko in an email interview.

"The flowers will only be sent after the names have been released in the media. This is not about politics, this is about policy and people's lives."

He has also started a Go-FundMe page so the flowers will be paid for by the people of Northern Ontario, who he savs need to have their voices heard about the dangers of travelling on winter roads.

The campaign began after a December 8 crash near Papa John's Road just south of Temagami when a three-vehicle accident claimed the lives of two travellers.

"Highway conditions were terrible at the crash site with glare ice on the pavement."

Shymko drove to the crash site on his ATV bringing food, water and information to the stranded motorists backed up on Highway 11 while the crash was being cleared and police were investigating.

#### **LEGION ASSISTS**

The Temagami Royal Canadian Legion assists stranded motorists by providing relief, sanitation and food for stranded motorists. They opened that night to help motorists on De-

cember 9 as the highway was closed in both directions overnight.

"Even our Legion in Temgami has been forced to formalize a plan to deal with the unnecessary deaths and road closures by opening when there is

no other options for drivers."

He asks why there is no comprehensive plan by the government to reduce highway deaths and injuries during winter months.

"I suggested that the reason there is no plan in place is because this issue is absent from the radar of the real decision makers. That these problems, snowplowing, driver training, road rule enforcement, etc. takes a back seat to issues that seem more present and real to these decision makers," explained Shymko.

Shymko says northern highways are death traps and he is holding the government accountable to do something about it.

"So I decided without any group endorsing me, except for anyone to share my voice, to let the Ontario Minister of Transportation's office know the names of anyone who died in a commercial vehicle accident on majority travelled Northern Ontario highways until a comprehensive plan is put forth."

As a parent, he is concerned for the welfare of people travelling on Highway 11 during winter months.

He has a daughter who trav-

els from Southern Ontario to visit him and his wife and he worries about her safety.

"So I decided enough was enough, enough of the blaming, enough of the stalling, enough of the politics. There are people dying, people with names, people with families

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

He wants the Ministry of Transportation to know the names of those who die in highway tragedies.

"These are not statistics, these are people."

He launched his Facebook page on December 17, and says he wants to see a plan in place from the government addressing snowplowing, enforcement, proper driver training and licensing, lane expansion and proper budgeting for northern highways.

"In other words, a plan, a real plan, non-political, life saving plan."

He is asking people to join the Facebook page at www. facebook.com/flowersfortheminister or people can contact the minister's office themselves.

"Sadly, I sent my first flowers today," said Shymko, after a person was killed on Highway 11 west of Geraldton.

promised immune systems who are seeking chemo and transfusion therapy.

"So we have to have more stringent infection control than any other segment of society and any other sector in health care."

Baker said a combination of factors - high COVID-19 case counts in the community, hospital occupancy rates exceeding 100 per cent, and staffing shortages - created "the perfect storm."

"And we still are working our way through what would be considered the perfect storm."

#### **POLICY**

The visitor restrictions took effect November 30. They're among the measures the hospital has taken to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 entering the facility, and include mandatory vaccination for all hospital staff and the suspension of volunteer services.

Under the hospital's policy, only designated care partners may visit in-patients in end-of-life, obstetric or pediatric care.

Brazeau first saw the impact of visitor restrictions on his father, who has Parkinson's and is in the early stages of dementia, in the spring.

He said his father's primary caregivers – his wife and daughter – could not visit for a period of five to six weeks.

When they did see him, they noticed a big decline in his health, he said.

They know that's due to being isolated and away from social interaction, he said.

In the petition, he writes:

"The current policy further deepens the negative impact of the pandemic.

"These negative effects include, but are not limited to the sense of isolation, abandonment, hopelessness and despair that come from a lack

of basic access to the families for these individuals with matured and often degrading states of health."

The hospital has a virtual visiting program, in which a social worker connects patients with family members using iPads.

But Brazeau said that doesn't work for patients with cognitive issues, and many older people are uncomfortable using the unfamiliar technology.

He said nursing homes now have measures in place, such as rapid testing and proof of vaccination requirements, to permit visitors.

Other hospitals in the region have not restricted visitors to the extent that Temiskaming Hospital has, he

He proposed that steps could be taken to reduce the risk, such as scheduled visits, limits on visitor numbers, and designated space and entrances for visitors.

In an interview, Baker said he's "very empathetic" to people who have been impacted negatively by the policy.

But he said hospitals are the only institutions that invite people with COVID-19 into the building.

"They need us to provide care for them, so that they can survive this infection."

As the hospital was developing the policy, he said the district was topping the province in terms of cases on a per-capita basis.

While the pace of new cases has slowed, he said its case counts are still among the top six in the province.

The hospital's occupancy rate hit a high of 128 per cent on a couple of days in November, and it has brought in as many as seven nurses from the Toronto area to cope with

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
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# 12 forliday fire safety

#### 1. Water fresh trees daily

It's time to decorate the Christmas tree! If you're using a real tree, buy it fresh and keep the base of the trunk in water at all times. Keep your tree away from any sparks or heat source, such as fireplace, heater, or candle.

## 2. Make sure you have working smoke alarms

With family and friends spending extra time at your home over the holidays, it's extra important to check your smoke alarms. Replace them if they are over 10 years old. Remember that you need working smoke alarms on every story of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test your alarms to make sure they alert you and your family if a fire occurs, giving you the precious seconds you need to safely escape.

## 3. Check all sets of lights before decorating

Before you put those lights on the tree or around the front window, check the cords closely. Discard any sets that are frayed or damaged.

## 4. Make sure you have working carbon monoxide alarms

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odourless gas that can quickly kill you. Installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home will alert you to the presence of this deadly gas. Replace any carbon monoxide alarms over seven years old.

## 5. Make sure everyone is familiar with your home's fire escape plan

Develop and practice a home fire escape plan with all members of the household and make sure someone is prepared to help young children, older adults, or anyone else that may need assistance to evacuate. Agree that once outside, everybody stays outside, at which point you can call 911 from a cell phone or neighbour's house.

#### 6. Use extension cords wisely

People often use extension cords for that extra set of lights or the dancing Santa in the corner. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection. Make sure cords never go under rugs, as this can cause damage to the cord and cause a fire.

#### 7. Give space heaters space

If you are using space heaters to help take the chill off, remember to keep them at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.

#### 8. When you go out, blow out!

Candles can set the perfect mood for a holiday celebration, but remember to always blow out candles before leaving the room or going to bed. Keep lit candles safely away from children and pets and anything that can burn, such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.

## 9. Keep matches and lighters out of the sight and reach of children

People often keep matches and lighters handy to light holiday candles. But matches and lighters can be deadly

in the hands of children. If you smoke, have only one lighter or book of matches and keep it with you at all times.

#### 10. Watch what you heat!

The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year, which means it's easy to get distracted from what we are doing. Cooking fires most commonly occur when cooking is left unattended. Always stay in the kitchen when cooking, especially if using oil or high temperatures. If a pot catches fire, carefully slide a tight-fitting lid over the pot to smother the flames and then turn off the heat.

#### 11. Encourage smokers to smoke outside

Careless smoking is the leading cause of fatal home fires. If you do allow smoking indoors use large, deep ashtrays that can't be knocked over and make sure cigarette butts are properly extinguished.

## 12. There's more to responsible drinking than taking a cab home

With all the festive cheer this time of year, keep a close eye on anyone attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol. Alcohol is an all-too-common factor in many fatal fires.

#### What should I do if I host or attend a holiday gathering? | Que dois-je faire si j'organise ou assiste à un rassemblement des Fêtes?

If you choose to host or attend a social gathering, such as a gift exchange or holiday party:

- Follow gathering limits. Social gathering limits in Ontario allow for a maximum of 10 people indoors and 25 people outdoors.
- Require guests to stay home if they have symptoms, even if they are mild.
- All attendees 12 years of age and older should be
- · Gather outdoors where possible. If you are indoors, increase ventilation, for instance by running HVAC systems and opening windows.
- Have handwashing supplies available.
- · Consider participating virtually or not attending the event if you are immunocompromised or at higher risk of severe disease.
- Create a list of guests attending the gathering in case THU needs it for contact tracing.
- Note that different restrictions are in place if you host your gathering in a restaurant, meeting and event space, or workplace.



# Hospital visitor policy sparks call for review

Continued from 8 staffing needs.

#### **STAFFING**

If the hospital experienced a COVID outbreak, he said it could lose many of its staff, and then have to decide which services it could offer.

It has recently had two COVID patients through its intensive care unit, he said, which was a first for the hospital during the pandemic. It has also had COVID patients in its medical-surgical unit.

"Our risk is significantly higher, and the COVID consequences for several segments of our population are significant if it gets inside our building," he said.

It could cause delays in surgeries and potentially life-saving therapies, he said, and patients may have to be transferred to other jurisdictions.

It may well be that other hospitals have not instituted the same restrictions, "but we have to look at our situation," he said.

He said the hospital considered "a whole pile of scenarios" before implementing the policy, but considers the current approach "the safest" for the hospital's entire population.

It also had an ethicist from Ottawa review the policy and its application prior to implementation, he said.

He noted that it has made provisions for some visitors, including in end-of-life situations.

"No one will die alone in our hospital because of this policy. Somebody will be with them," he said.

He said the hospital reviews its decision weekly in light of the latest data and in consultation with public health, the Ministry of Health and the Ontario Hospital Association.

But at this time, and in light of the risk posed by the new Omicron variant, Baker does not anticipate that the hospital's policies will be relaxed in the near future.

As for Brazeau, he was able to resume visits with his father on the weekend because he was transferred into end-of-life care.

"The deterioration in that short period of time, which was the rest of his life, was unbelievable," he said.

"Our journey is going to end soon, as far as visitation. But there's still somewhere between 30 and 40 people who are still left alone, locked up."

He said he understands that the hospital has difficult decisions to make.

But he plans to take his concerns over the policy to the Ontario Ministry of Health and political decision-makers.

"It's not going to help myself but I'm hoping it'll help the others," he said.
