Trees of Life pay tribute to loved ones

DISTRICT – Despite pandemic-related restrictions, a district organization that helps individuals in palliative care and their families reports that a seasonal initiative raised \$23,475.

The Tree of Life campaign, sponsored by the Timiskaming Hospice Palliative Care program, invites family, friends and colleagues to sponsor a light in memory of people they've lost.

Lights are installed on designated trees and then illuminated during outdoor ceremonies during the Christmas season in downtown New Liskeard, Centennial Park in Englehart and Kirkland Lake.

For the past two years, however, the lighting has been installed but pandemic concerns over outdoor gatherings shelved the in-person ceremonies.

The names of those remembered, however, are also inscribed on decals on indoor images of trees at the Temiskaming Hospital and Blanche River Health hospital sites in Englehart and Kirkland Lake.

Program director Betty Smallwood said she's been told that people are heartened by the chance to remember the loved ones and friends named in the tributes.


Scrolls listing the names are also available at Canada Post outlets throughout the area.

In a typical year, volunteers with the palliative care program spend some 2,600 hours visiting people in their homes and long-term care residences, under hospice care and in hospitals.

Staff and volunteers offer companionship, practical help, emotional support, and information to individuals and their families,"to help them navigate through whatever journey they're going through," Smallwood said.

The visits also provide some respite for caregivers. However, COVID-19 has prompted the program to move to virtual visits.

It's often through phone calls, because that's



what many elderly clients are most comfortable model can now be found in 17 hospitals across the with, she said.

But while use of technology has been beneficial, she said volunteers - who currently number 16 are anxious to resume in-person visits.

HOSPICE SUITES

The program, together with other community health care providers, was also instrumental in developing a palliative care suite as a pilot project at the Kirkland Lake hospital.

Suites were then established at the Englehart hospital and Temiskaming Hospital.

They provide a homier environment than a conventional hospital room for a patient in palliative care. They also offer additional space and amenities, such as a mini kitchen, where family members can spend time with a loved one.

Smallwood said the rural hospice co-location



Northeast, and receives provincial funding.

Donations to the Timiskaming program help with upgrades to the suites, such as new furnishings when required, she said.

The program itself receives provincial funding, support from the district's three hospitals, and corporate support.

But other support - from the Tree of Life campaign and general and in-memoriam donations - is welcome year-round, she said.

Reflecting on the Tree of Life campaign, she extended special thanks to the ministerial association; public works departments in Temiskaming Shores, Englehart and Kirkland Lake; Canada Post and employees across the district; the three hospital locations; the district's four funeral homes; and the program's volunteers themselves.


DID YOU GET The Speaker THIS WEEK? Here are some January 12, 2022 stories...

Winter waters pose additional dangers

DISTRICT (Special) - Winter weather provides excellent opportunities for outdoor activities, but caution is especially important around hydroelectric facilities.

Operation of hydro dams can affect both water flow and ice conditions, making it absolutely critical to follow signage and barriers around Ontario Power Generation's (OPG's) hydroelectric facilities. Even in very cold conditions, ice in these areas can be thinner than expected and less consistent, due to the way water flows around dams.

QUICK FACTS

• Many of OPG's 66 hydroelectric stations and 240 dams on 24 Ontario river systems are remote controlled, meaning there's no one there to warn you of imminently changing, potentially dangerous conditions.

- For your safety, do not snowmobile, ski, icefish or participate in any other activity around dams and generating stations.
- Drowning doesn't just happen in the summer: according to the Lifesaving Society, approximately 35 per cent of drownings in Canada occur from October to April when most people have no intention of going into the water.

"Water safety is a year-round concern," said Nicolle Butcher, OPG Senior Vice President of Renewable Generation and Power Marketing.

"Please respect signs and barriers around hydroelectric facilities."

Docs offer non-COVID winter safety tips

TORONTO (Special) – Winter is a great time for outdoor activities and adventures, but it also brings cold temperatures and wet conditions.

The Ontario Medical Association – which represents 43,000-plus physicians, medical students and retired physicians – offers the following to help everyone prepare for winter while staying healthy and safe.

- Before you head outdoors, check the weather forecast for any advisories or warnings. If there is a significant wind chill, limit the time you spend outside.
- Dressing in layers with a wind- and water-resistant outer layer will help to keep you warm when temperatures dip. Don't forget a hat, gloves and scarf to prevent frostbite.
- Slips and falls can happen at any time, but winter conditions can be especially hazardous. Give yourself extra time so you do not need to rush. Choose a route that's less icy and better lit.
- Wearing the proper footwear can also reduce your risk of slipping and falling on ice in harsh winter condi-

tions.

- Shovelling snow cannot only hurt your back, it can also be hard on your heart. It's important to go slowly and take breaks when needed.
- To help protect your back, use a smaller shovel and take many small loads of snow instead of fewer heavy ones.
- While driving, take weather conditions into consideration. Wet, icy or snow-covered roads can make driving dangerous. Drive slowly and leave plenty of distance between vehicles.
- On dark evenings, drivers should pay extra attention to cyclists or pedestrians who may be harder to see.
- Stock your vehicle with an emergency kit that includes water, gloves, booster cables, a small shovel, windshield wiper fluid, first aid kit, flashlight and non-perishable energy foods.
- If you have one, carry a fully charged cellphone so you can call for help, and if possible let family members know if you are going on a journey, even a long hike.

"Gerry Dee was a superb host, he really put us at ease and he is good at what he does," said Gauthier. "He made it fun for us."


The Rivard sisters had all expenses paid to Toronto to the CBC headquarters where the show is filmed.

Mapping Canada's place in the world

OTTAWA (Special) – A new perspective on Canada and its place in the world is now available.

The 2021 Atlas of Canada World Map updates the version produced a decade and a half ago.

"Its new design and wealth of information offer Canadians an extensive look at the geography of Canada and the world. I encourage all Canadians to take a look," said federal natural resources minister Jonathan Wilkinson in a news release announcing the new map's release.

It was produced by the Canada Centre for Mapping and Earth Observation (CCMEO).

And what's new?

There are new countries – South Sudan, Kosovo, Montenegro and Serbia.

There are new place names in Canada – the former Cape Dorset is now Kinngait, and the former Queen Charlotte Islands are Haida Gwaii.

And there's a new ocean – the Southern Ocean, located just north of the Antarctic Circle, is a colder, less salty body of water that Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) describes as highly un-

Electra signs contract with Glencore

NORTH COBALT (Staff/Special) -Electra Battery Materials Corporation, formerly First Cobalt, which owns and is developing the refinery east of North Cobalt, has announced that it has signed a five-year tolling contract with Glencore, and amended the previously concluded five-year cobalt hydroxide feed purchase agreement.

Electra states in its December 30 announcement that it "intends to produce a traceable, low carbon battery grade cobalt product for the electric vehicle market and the parties will market the Canadian-made cobalt sulfate as a premium brand product that is sustainably mined and refined with renewable hydroelectric power."

Electra anticipates that it will have its first production of battery grade cobalt sulfate in the last quarter of 2022, and will have "an annual production target of 5,000 tonnes of cobalt, subsequently increasing to nameplate capacity of 6,500 per year."

The agreement between Electra and Glencore will give Glencore "an option

to toll approximately 1,000 tonnes of contained cobalt at Electra's refinery and Electra will have an option to purchase an additional undisclosed quantity of cobalt hydroxide feed material from Glencore, each on an annual basis for a five-year term."

The announcement adds that "the feed purchase agreement largely reflects the original cobalt hydroxide purchase agreement and is for the remaining quantities from the original contract that are not part of the tolling arrangement."

Electra added in its announcement that "a third-party life cycle assessment supports the view that Electra's refinery will have the lowest carbon footprint in the global automotive supply chain, resulting in the world's most sustainable cobalt for the electric vehicle market."

Electra also stated that it "intends to join the Fair Cobalt Alliance and adopt the Cobalt Institute's Cobalt Industry Responsible Assessment Framework."

usual and unique on Earth.

In the news release, NRCan said the new, modern reference map conveys "the latest information on world geography from a Government of Canada perspective."

The 2021 edition, it said, combines the latest scientific and geopolitical data with profound cartographic expertise, resulting in a modern, digital reference that is freely available to anyone to view and download.

"Significantly updated, the 2021 World Map features the most recent global geopolitical data, a clean new design and a modern map projection that more accurately captures the perception and location of different continents. "The colours and type used throughout the map were inspired by the look of aged paper maps and the printing technology of early Atlas of Canada folios. This version replaces NRCan's 2005 map of the world.

"Canada is no longer depicted in the centre of the World Map, as in earlier versions.

"This reorientation not only provides a comfortable geometry and a formal symmetry for the map but also emphasizes the role of Canada as a partner and collaborator in the larger global context at a time when environmental and economic challenges require global solutions.

"Like previously published world maps, the 2021 World

Map continues to show inhabited places by population range and depicts physical features including terrain relief, sea ice extent, glaciers and ice shelves.

"The sea ice extent shown in the northern circumpolar region represents the median sea ice extent derived by CCMEO scientists from Earth observation data collected by CCMEO over the last 20 years."

The 2021 map is fully bilingual in English and French.

It can be downloaded for free through the Government of Canada's portal for open geographic data and information, Open Maps. Licensed resellers across Canada stock and sell the full-sized wall map.

Temagami Family Health Team Submitted by Ellen Ibey Foods that Can Lower your Blood Pressure

Have you ever heard of the DASH diet? DASH stands for Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (high blood pressure). It's a way of reducing blood pressure through changes in what you eat. It focuses on fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean meats and low-fat dairy.

Green leafy vegetables: Eat spinach, broccoli, kale, or collards for a potassium boost. The mineral helps flush sodium out of your body and relaxes your blood vessel walls. *Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (raw leafy* vegetables)

Berries: The pigments that give blueberries, strawberries, and blackberries their rich colors also come with a benefit for your blood vessels: anthocyanin. It can help artery walls become wider and more flexible to lower your blood pressure and improve your heart health. *Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (fresh or frozen)*

Yogurt: Calcium is a key player for good blood pressure because it helps your blood vessels tighten and relax when they should. *Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (yogurt or milk)*

Fatty Fish: Another good source of calcium is bone-in fish, like canned salmon or sardines. Oily fish are flush in omega-3s, the fatty acids that boost health and help your heart. *Recommended daily serving: 3-6 ounces (fish, lean meat, poultry)*

Seeds: Unsalted seeds are a source of vital minerals like magnesium, which helps control your blood pressure and relax your blood vessels. *Recommended daily serving: 1 to 1.5 tablespoons*

Garlic: Garlic can add more than just flavor to your dishes. It may also have a hand in boosting your nitric oxide levels, which dilates blood vessels. *Recommended daily serving: 1-2 cloves*

Unsalted pistachios: Unsalted tree nuts can be a great source of healthy fats that help your heart. But for high blood pressure, your best pick is pistachios. They seem to have the strongest effect on lowering both your top and bottom blood pressure readings. *Recommended serving:* **1**—**2** *cups per week (nuts)*

Olive Oil: Protective antioxidants in olive oil improve blood vessel health and help them stay elastic. Recommended daily serving: 2-3 teaspoons (oil, may or salad dressing)

Dark chocolate: Dark chocolate (at least 50% to 70% cocoa) can give you a boost of a plant compound called flavanol. This antioxidant can make your blood pressure drop a notch. *Recommended serving: An occasional nibble*

Food bank use hits record high

TORONTO (Special) – A recent report has found that record numbers of Ontarians turned to food banks last year.

According to the 2021 Hunger Report by Feed Ontario, a record 592,308 people accessed emergency food support last year, up 10 per cent from the previous year.

That's the largest annual increase since 2009.

There were also 3.6 million visits to food banks, an increase of 12 per cent from 2019.

"Like gasoline on a fire, COVID-19 only compounded income security and affordability issues in Ontario," said Siu Mee Cheng, interim executive director of Feed Ontario, in a news release.

"This includes the province's insufficient social safety net, the rise in precarious employment, and increasingly unaffordable housing and living costs."

Feed Ontario describes itself as the province's largest collective of hunger-relief organizations.

It describes its mission as feeding Ontario "by creating opportunities and solutions, and uniting local food banks to eradicate hunger and poverty."

Its 2021 Hunger Report notes that while pandemic response measures, like the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB), helped many Canadians avert crisis, some of the province's most vulnerable citizens still fell through the cracks.

It found that CERB recipients represented less than one per cent of food bank users.

However, the number of senior citizens turning to food banks rose 36 per cent.

"The rising number of older adults relying on food banks for assistance is a trend that we have been monitoring closely since 2017," said Cheng.

"While there are a number of contributing factors to this trend, the most significant is how the growing lack of affordability associated with housing and the cost of living have become, particularly for those on a fixed income and low-income earners."

Another demographic highlighted in the report are people with disabilities, who represent a third of all food bank users in Ontario.

Based on a sample of eight food banks, it found that over 60 per cent of people who self-identified as having a disability had less than \$100 left per month after paying for housing and utilities. One in five respondents indicated their monthly expenses currently exceed their monthly income.

"Ontarians with a disability continue to be left behind," says Cheng.

"The financial support provided through the Ontario Disability Support Program falls significantly below the poverty line, making it difficult for recipients to afford the basic necessities without turning to food banks to address their food needs each month."

Looking ahead, the 2021 Hunger Report provides a preliminary analysis of current food bank use and finds that the record high does not appear to be reversing course and that this trend may very quickly become "the new normal."

It said that projection is supported by visitor data in September 2021, which found that food bank visits were 32 per cent higher than the September average for 2017-2019.

"What this preliminary data tells us is that the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is still unfolding," said Cheng.

"It is critical that the province address this crisis by implementing immediate income security measures and supports to address affordability issues today."

Feed Ontario recommends strengthening the social safety net by aligning rates with the poverty line; connecting people to quality employment opportunities by improving labour laws and supports for workers; and ensuring that the cost of living remains affordable by investing in more supportive housing options.

"As the province moves towards its next election, it is essential that all political parties develop strong income security and affordability solutions, and commit to working together to address food insecurity and poverty in Ontario," Cheng said.

"It is only by working together that we will be able to reverse this troubling trend and build a future where no one goes hungry."





Since the end of December, the Timiskaming Health Unit has experienced an unprecedented increase in cases.

These confirmed cases are just the tip of the iceberg. These case numbers are an underestimation of the true number of COVID-19 cases in the community, due to changes in testing eligibility that took effect on December 31, 2021. PCR testing at Assessment Centres is now limited to the most vulnerable people and people in highest risk settings. Rapid Antigen Tests are more widely used by the general public and these results are not reported to public health.

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – Science – with a dash of local arts, culture, and food – will take over the New Liskeard waterfront for two days this summer.

The Great Northern Ontario Roadshow is coming July 16 and 17.

Coordinated by Science North in Sudbury, the touring



exhibition was launched in the fall of 2021 and continues in 2022, with plans to visit more than 50 communities across the North.

When it stops by Temiskaming Shores, Science North as well as local arts and culture organizations will offer entertainment and demonstrations.

A market will feature local food vendors and creative types.

Tourist operators, local businesses and representatives of regional attractions will also have a chance to promote their offerings to the public at what's called a "Staycation Expo."

"This event will assist in bringing people back to the community to support our tourism sector partners," wrote James Franks, the city's economic development officer, in a recent report to Temiskaming Shores council.

He said economic development staff have been working with Science North for the past year to coordinate a weekend stop in the municipality for the travelling festival.

"A committee of local partners is being created to assist in coordinating the event and to ensure that all members of our diverse community are included as part of the activity," he said.

Science North received \$1.4 million from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund to develop the Great Northern Ontario Roadshow as well as new promotional materials and a province-wide marketing strategy.

But the roadshow is not the only attraction scheduled to visit the city next summer.

It will also host for five to six weeks a 1,000-square-foot exhibit focused on the ingenuity of Canada's Indigenous populations.

"There will be activities and information for families to join in as well as some local content to be organized in partnership with our local Indigenous organizations and community groups," Franks said.

The exhibit is a collaboration between Indigenous Tourism Ontario and Science North, and was developed with \$1 million in provincial support.

It made its debut at Science North and the Thunder Bay Art Gallery last year.

Temiskaming Shores is one of some 20 communities that will host a version of the exhibit.

At each stop, local Indigenous tourism operators and businesses will be able to promote their enterprises, stage events, and offer programs.
