Pilot pilot project Transit service launching stat holiday runs

TEMISKAMING SHORES – It's a new year and there are some new tweaks to the Temiskaming Transit service.

A pilot project will offer transit service on some statutory holidays this year.

The additional service responds to requests from the public but even more from employers whose workers rely on transit, said Chris Oslund, Temiskaming Shores' city manager and administrative support to the transit committee.

The first holiday when bus service was available was Boxing Day.

Service will also be available on Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Boxing Day 2022.

Oslund has not yet seen rider numbers from its first outing on December 26.

The additional service will mean higher costs for the transit service overall, he said, because drivers are paid double-time on statutory holidays under the contract with the provider, Stock Transportation.

But if the pilot project demonstrates use, he said service on holidays will be continued.

In other developments, the transit service has now reinstated a route on Joyal Drive in Haileybury.

For much of last year, the bus service had travelled instead along Morissette Drive and Meridian Avenue, given rough conditions on Joyal and the installation of stop signs that had slowed the bus.

But the switch raised concerns over the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and users of recreational amenities on Morissette.

There were complaints from residents along the new route of noise and disruption caused by the transit buses, and parking on the road during funeral services at three cemeteries was also cited.

The transit committee recommended that the Joyal route be restored. But the city first had to agree to resurface the street, and the work was done last fall.

The transit committee, meanwhile, has decided to maintain two stops in Cobalt.

Oslund said it had considered discontinuing stops at White Mountain Publications and the



Golden Age Club.

But after feedback from the public and Cobalt council urging that the stops be retained, the committee agreed to make no changes.

The new year did see individual ticket prices increase by 25 cents on January 1 to \$3.50 for students and seniors aged 55 and up, and to \$3.75 for adults.

The cost of monthly passes remained the same, at \$70 for students and seniors and \$90 for adults.

Oslund acknowledged that fare increases are not popular, but the transit service's costs are also rising.

District sees fourth death linked to COVID-19

(Special) – The district has recorded its fourth death linked to COVID-19.

The Timiskaming Health Unit confirmed the death – a man in his 80s, who died at the Kirkland Lake site of Blanche River Health – January 19.

"As we mourn another member of our community, my thoughts are with the friends and family of the person who has passed," said Dr. Glenn

TEMISKAMING SHORES Corneil, the district's acting medical officer of health and CEO of the health unit, in a news release.

> The health unit said it would release no further details out of respect for the family of the deceased.

Corneil said the district's latest death "is a reminder of the unfortunate effects of COVID-19 and how we all need to keep working together in the fight against it."

He noted that the pandemic has now been going on for two years.

"Understandably, it has taken a toll and people are tired," he said.

"We ask that everyone continue to follow public health measures and be COVIDkind. Be patient with your friends and neighbours, the businesses you visit, and especially people who are ill or vulnerable"

Poll finds overwhelming support among seniors for more home care funding

HAMILTON (Special) - The global COVID-19 pandemic has changed the view of Ontario's seniors towards health care, according to a study conducted by Campaign Research Inc. on behalf of Home Care Ontario.

The research, conducted in September 2021, found that 86 per cent of seniors believe the pandemic has made Ontario's home care system more important than ever.

"This is a sea change," said Sue VanderBent, CEO of Home Care Ontario, an association whose members employ an estimated 28,000 health care staff.

"COVID-19 has clearly made home care a top priority for Ontario's seniors. And that's sad, given the government's track record on investments in our sector recently."

In the last provincial budget, the Ontario government announced billions in new

funding for institutional care – including hospitals and longterm care. Over the same time, the province invested no new dollars in its home care sys-

tem, despite an exodus of staff and indications many Ontarians are not getting the care they need at home.

Physical Activity and Mental Health

The Canadian Mental Health Association estimates that 1 in 5 Canadians will experience a mental health crisis or be diagnosed with a mental illness. By age 40, that ratio increases to every 1 in 2 Canadians. While the benefits of physical activity on physical health are well known, being active can also be an effective pathway to good mental health.

According to the World Health Organization, mental health is "a state of wellbeing in which an individual realizes his or her own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and is able to make a contribution to his or her community". The fast pace of modern life can sometimes throw off our mental balance, which is why it's important to find simple and effective strategies to keep it steady. Physical activity is one of them.

Although you won't often see "more physical activity" written on your prescriptions, it's often recommended as a way to counteract and manage many diseases. Mental illnesses such as depression and anxiety are no exception.

Regular physical activity can help:

- · Boost your mood and energy levels.
- Inspire a feeling of pride, self-esteem and general wellbeing.
- · Improve your ability to concentrate and accomplish day-to-day tasks.
- · Reduce your stress and improving your ability to manage it.
- · Help you get better-quality sleep.
- · Additionally, if you are living with mental illness, including exercise in your daily routine can help reduce your symptoms and help you cope.

The Ideal Level of Physical Activity

You don't have to become a top athlete to see the benefits of physical activity on your mental health. Getting moderate-intensity (and especially aerobic) exercise for at least 15 to 30 minutes a day can be enough to see changes in your mood and wellbeing. smarter, taller and more alive than ever.


We are here to stare up at a million stars in the night sky, to hear the loon calling in a far off bay at dawn and hear spring birdsong sounding like the word, "hallelujah."

Poll finds overwhelming support among seniors for more home care funding

The polling shows that 85 per cent of seniors disagree with the government's deci-

SUBSCRIBE NOW SPEAKER PRINTING PUBLISHING Speaker.northernontario.ca sion not to allocate new funding for home care in the last budget, with a full 58 per cent strongly disagreeing and 27 per cent somewhat disagreeing.

At the same time, 97 per cent of seniors polled said it was either very important (73 per cent) or somewhat important (24 per cent) the government increase funding to the home care system.

"Neglecting home care is wrong – and seniors know it," said VanderBent. "Home care plays such a vital role in keeping people out of hospitals and long-term care homes. On top of that, home is where seniors want to be."

Since the pandemic began, Ontario's home care system has lost 3,000 nurses, hundreds of skilled therapists and thousands more personal support workers. Home Care Ontario is calling on government to make an urgent \$600 million investment to help stabilize the system by attracting and retaining health care workers.

The polling, which interviewed 1034 Ontarians over the age of 55, revealed a deepseated desire by Ontario seniors to age at home. Of those who have thought about where they would live in their later years, 96 per cent of respondents plan to stay in their own home or apartment as long as possible.

The study also highlighted near-universal support, or 91 per cent, for a new home care tax credit. The tax credit would help seniors and families who fund additional home care services for themselves or their loved ones.

"People are being pushed

to the brink," said Vander-Bent. "Affordability is one of the biggest issues on people's minds these days after COV-ID-19 and Ontario seniors are looking to the government to provide tax relief so they can stay healthy and safe at home." **KEY FINDINGS**

• If seniors were destined to move into a long-term care facility but additional supports could be provided to keep them at home or living with a family member, 91 per cent of seniors would prefer to stay at home. Only two per cent would prefer to move into long-term care, while seven per cent responded they did not know.

• 67 per cent of Ontario seniors believe that professional caregivers, such as personal support workers and skilled therapists, should be paid at the same rates regardless of whether they work in home care, long-term care or in hospital, while 19 per cent believe they should be paid differently based on their workplace setting and 14 per cent were unsure.

• If seniors had an operation and were able to recover safely at home faster with the help of increased home care, 87 per cent would prefer to recover at home as soon as possible, while nine per cent would prefer to stay in the hospital and four per cent were unsure.

• A full 87 per cent of seniors are either very concerned (43 per cent) or somewhat concerned (44 per cent) that the home care system says it needs \$600 million to recover from the effects of the pandemic, to attract and retain staff back into the home care sector.



Electra signs agreement with Japanese conglomerate

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff/Special) - Electra Battery Materials Corporation, which owns the refinery east of North Cobalt, has announced that it has signed a battery recycling and cobalt sulfate supply agreement with Japanese conglomerate Marubeni Corporation.

Memorandums of understanding encompass sourcing of black mass derived from recycled lithium-ion batteries for Electra's refinery and marketing of Electra's cobalt sulfate in Japan, Electra stated in a release.

"Marubeni's wide network of battery recyclers in Asia and elsewhere will assist in the sourcing of lithium-ion battery material for Electra's hydrometallurgical recycling operation," Electra stated.

"Electra intends to market a portion of its cobalt production into existing lithium-ion battery supply chains in Japan that are serving the North American market, as the company develops its domestic battery materials park," Electra continued.

"With this agreement, Electra and Marubeni are committing to providing electric vehicle manufacturers and battery cell makers with high quality, low carbon and traceable battery materials," Electra said.

"Electra will benefit from Marubeni's expansive network of battery cell recyclers worldwide to secure a stable source of black mass and other recyclable materials for the company's recycling operation, which is slated for commissioning in 2023. Electra will also leverage Marubeni's strong presence in Japan and Asia as a preferred facilitator of battery raw material flows into the regional EV supply chain. Electra remains on track to commission its near-zero carbon cobalt refinery in late 2022, positioning the company as the only producer of battery grade cobalt in North America. The cobalt facility is the first of a fourphased project that will result in North America's only integrated battery materials park, refining cobalt, nickel and black mass and converting the material into cathode precursor material for lithium-ion batteries," the press release added.

"Marketing a portion of our cobalt production in Japan will lay the groundwork for further expansion opportunities as the North American market develops," said Electra chief executive officer Trent Mell.

"This partnership with Marubeni reflects the strong demand for North American battery materials as an alternative to legacy supply chains."

Electra vice-president commercial Michael Insulan stated, "The Japanese lithium-ion battery industry is very well established and will continue to grow. Marubeni's wide network of industry contacts in the battery cell and materials space, as well as in the recycling community, will help Electra to diversify its black mass sourcing options for our lithium-ion battery recycling operations."

Economic recovery hinges on health-care recovery: survey

DISTRICT (Special) – When asked to identify the issue that was most important to them, 40 per cent of Ontarians surveyed by Ipsos chose addressing COVID-19, followed by 10 per cent who said access to health care/long wait times/understaffed hospitals.

Seven per cent said economic growth should be the government priority.

Ipsos conducted the survey for the Ontario Medical Association (OMA) online between December 7-13, 2021.

Younger Ontarians (ages 18-39) expressed more interest in mental health issues, suggesting a significant and growing generational divide. Housing affordability and climate change have risen greatly as priorities for Ontarians over the past eight months.

An overwhelming 96 per cent of respondents said they supported the five pillars of the OMA's Prescription for Ontario, a five-point plan for improving the health-care system. Reducing the backlog of 20 million health-care services is the top priority of that plan, which the OMA hopes all political parties will adopt.

The survey of 1,000 Ontarians was conducted in December before the Omicron variant swept through the province and the government paused non-emergency surgeries and procedures.

"Ontarians are sending a clear message that we have to have a strong health-care system if we want to have a healthy economy, and Ontario doctors agree" said OMA President Dr. Adam Kassam.

"This will require collaboration among the public, health-care providers and all levels of government, including a significant investment from the federal government through the Canada Health Transfer to the provinces to cover 35 per cent of all health-care costs, up from the current 22 per cent."

When asked to choose which was a higher priority to them, Ontarians most often chose the backlog in surgeries - 51 per cent of the time, followed by improving and expanding long-term care

facilities for seniors, which was chosen 47 per cent of the time. Both of these were chosen more often than stimulating economic growth, which was chosen 39 per cent of the time.

The survey also found that one in 10 Ontarians have not been vaccinated against COVID or have received only one dose. Seven per cent said they did not plan to get vaccinated. They are more likely to be millennials (people born between 1981 and 1996) or Gen X women (born between 1965 and 1980).

Twenty-four per cent of survey respondents who are not vaccinated or do not plan to be vaccinated - almost one in four - said they were afraid of side effects, with the same proportion saying they did not trust information coming from government. Others said they had made a personal choice to wait, don't believe the vaccine is effective, dislike needles, have medical reasons, or were not sufficiently concerned about getting COVID-19 to get their shots.

"This survey shows that Ontarians are

deeply concerned about the pandemic backlog and other cracks in our healthcare system," said OMA CEO Allan O'Dette.

"It shows they are aligned with a plan by Ontario's doctors, *Prescription for Ontario: Doctors' 5-Point Plan for Better Health Care*, that can be adopted by government to address these issues and build a strong health-care system for the future. This plan was the result of the broadest consultation in the OMA's history, including outreach to the public, stakeholders and our members."

The representative sample survey of 1,000 Ontario residents aged 18 and older is considered accurate to within 3.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.






