No evictions

Provincial policy costs DTSSAB \$75 grand

DISTRICT - The District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board (DTSSAB), which administers social housing for the district, has written off \$75,187.27 in uncollected rents and maintenance

DTSSAB approved writing off the 2021 arrears at its regular meeting January 19.

Housing manager Lyne Labelle noted to the board that former tenants cannot live in social housing units anywhere in the province until their arrears are paid.

"This is a direct result of not being able to have any evictions in 2021," she said as she reported to the board.

"Some tenants took advantage of the situation and did not pay their rent." One reason this year's amount is so high is that one tenant alone owed almost \$20,000 for rent and maintenance.

"The housing services program works with tenants and often enters into repayment agreements to avoid eviction," said Labelle in an email interview.

Although there has been an increase in unpaid rents during the pandemic, there was not a dramatic change in tenant income, she said.

"Individuals made some bad choices by not paying their monthly rent on a regular basis, which resulted in accumulations of rent arrears that were unmanageable," she continued.

Tenants are also responsible for maintenance costs caused by negligence, she explained.

"Previous tenants who incur arrears are entered into a province-wide database," said Labelle.

"Arrears must be paid in full to the housing provider where the arrears were incurred to be eligible for housing anywhere in the province. In Timiskaming, individuals who enter into a repayment agreement can be added to the wait-list, however (they) will not be eligible for a housing offer until the arrears are paid in full."

Labelle commented that DTSSAB has on several occasions raised concerns to the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and

(LTB) hearings and rent freeze, and through the various provincial-municipal engagement tables in which DTSSAB participates. She added that the issue "is province-wide and

continues to have a negative impact on our financial and human resources as we navigate through LTB processes related to these issues for municipal service managers and district social services administration boards."

She added that DTSSAB plans for arrears in its annual budget "as we understand that not all tenancies will be successful regardless of the efforts we make."

Labelle noted that there has been an increase in efforts to assist people with housing during the pandemic, including prevention assistance for rental arrears and energy-related costs.




gency shelter solutions, increasing homelessness, rapid rehousing needs rising out of events such as home and apartment fires in 2021, and the period following as longterm housing is secured.

The rising cost of living, especially with food, and the low to no wage increases are also impacting people on the Ontario Works program and the Ontario Disability Support Program, she added.

"In addition, the social assistance rates have not increased since 2018."

She noted that DTSSAB has "recently implemented a 'functional by-name list' for individuals experiencing homelessness which helps connect them to available resources to help make them housing-ready."

DTSSAB is also advocating for, and providing support to, the development of Zack's Crib (a shelter in New Liskeard expected to open this spring), she noted.

Understanding and Managing Anxiety

Everyone feels tense, worried or nervous at times. This is anxiety and it's a natural response to stress.

In small doses, anxiety can be a good thing. It can motivate us and make us more productive. A little bit of fear may push us to study harder for that next exam or prepare for that job interview. And a burst of anxiety can even be a lifesaver when it helps us get out of the way of danger. But too much anxiety can be a problem. If feelings of tension, fear and worry are there too much of the time and get in the way of everyday activities, it could be the sign of an anxiety disorder. Like depression, anxiety disorders are a common problem. In fact, sometimes depression and anxiety occur together. Anxiety disorders may not go away by themselves, but they are treatable.

Treatment for Anxiety:

Some types of counselling along with certain medications, prescribed by a health care provider, can be helpful in dealing with an anxiety disorder. Specifically, cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) is often the first choice for treatment. Medications known as selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs) may be used in addition to therapy, if necessary.

Managing Anxiety - Self-Help Tips:

Take care of yourself:

- · Eat right, sleep right, be physically active!
- Avoid alcohol and street drugs. These may seem like a way to make yourself feel better, but in the long run, they can make things a lot worse.
- Know what triggers your anxiety and reduce stress where and when you

Learn how to chill out:

· Learning how to relax deeply can take time and practice. Some examples include deep breathing mindfulness meditation or yoga. These types of activities can help calm both body and mind. Some great apps you might consider trying are Calm or Headspace.

Stay connected with friends and family:

Too much time alone can allow worries and anxieties to grow. Connecting with others can give you a break from your worries. Staying connected also means that others can be there for you, to listen to your concerns and provide support. In-person connection throughout the pandemic has been a challenge but connecting virtually is a great alternative.

Spend time in nature:

Get outside -- there is more and more evidence that just being in nature is good for our mental health. And it's a great place for exercise and relaxation.

Interprovincial agreement supports Les Francophonie

DISTRICT (Special) – Projects and initiatives designed to promote growth for the Canadian Francophonie has the support of Canada's two most populous provinces.

The Ontario and Québec governments have declared their commitment to the Cooperation and Exchange Agreement with Respect to the Francophonie.

The application period opened January 19 and closes on February 16, 2022. Selected initiatives must be implemented between April 1, 2022 and March 31, 2023.

Under this interprovincial agreement, both governments are together investing up to \$500,000 to support projects developed jointly by Francophone organizations in Ontario and Québec that contribute to life in French in Canada.

The joint selection committee will consider projects from all sectors, but priority will be given to initiatives related to economic development, culture, education, and tourism.

"Thanks to this important cooperation agreement, the Ontario and Québec governments reaffirm their determination to work together to strengthen the economic and cultural ties they share for the greater benefit of the Francophones in both provinces," said Caroline Mulroney, Ontario's Minister of Francophone Affairs.

"The 2021 call for projects was a great success and we look forward to building on this momentum to support the implementation of new projects that will promote synergies and closer ties between our two Francophonies."

"The excellent collaboration between our two governments demonstrates that the Francophonie is an invaluable asset," said Sonia LeBel, Québec's Minister Responsible for Canadian Relations and the Canadian Francophonie.

"By acting together to promote a strong, united and committed Francophonie, we are also developing partnerships in many areas. These partnerships have concrete and positive benefits for Francophones, support the vitality of the French language and contribute to closer ties between Québec and Ontario."

QUICK FACTS

- Applications must be submitted through the Government of Québec website (available in French only). The application period is from January 19 to February 16, 2022. Projects must be implemented between April 1, 2022 and March 31, 2023.
- Franco-Ontarian and Québec organizations must partner to develop an eligible project and create a profile in the partner registry on the Government of Québec website (available in French only).
- The Québec portion of the funding is administered through the government of Québec's Programme d'appui à la francophonie canadienne (available in French only).
- As announced in the 2021 Budget, Ontario is investing \$250,000 annually over three years to support interprovincial projects as part of the Ontario-Québec Cooperation and Exchange Agreement with Respect to the Francophonie.
- The joint selection committee composed of representatives from Ontario and Québec will assess the applications and make recommendations to determine which projects will be supported by both provinces equally.
- 19 projects were jointly funded through the previous call for submissions, which was held between June 9 and July 16, 2021.



Pandemic worsens working conditions for paramedics

DISTRICT (Special) - The union representing most Ontario paramedics is calling on the provincial government to address the mental health of emergency medical services staff amidst gruelling working conditions through the pandemic.

"Paramedics and dispatchers have struggled with heavy workloads for years. But the sharp increase in call volumes and lengthier offload delays at hospitals during the pandemic has worsened working conditions. Paramedics and dispatchers are burning out and desperately require better mental health supports," said Niko Georgiadis, an active paramedic and chair of the CUPE Ambulance Committee of Ontario, which represents nearly 6,000 paramedics and dispatchers across Ontario.

The union is calling on the Ontario government to standardize mental health benefits for emergency medical services workers across the province to eliminate regional disparities, and to provide paramedics priority access to mental health providers.

In a survey conducted last October, responses by 1,440 of CUPE's emergency medical services members across 22 regions revealed that chronic

understaffing and crushing workloads were having a profoundly negative impact on their health: 92 per cent said they did not have enough staff to meet the needs of their communities; 97 per cent said their workload has increased during the pandemic; 91 per cent work overtime regularly. About half of them say they log anywhere from 13 hours to over 36 hours of overtime a month; 84 per cent said their workload is impacting their mental and/or physical health; 73 per cent said their employer is not doing enough to address their mental health; 67 per cent said their workload has resulted in headaches/migraines, with 66 per cent saying they have experienced anxiety and/ or panic attacks.

Sledding within the law

DISTRICT (Special/Staff) – The OPP are reminding snowmobilers of the law.

In a news release, Temisk-

aming OPP say concerns have been raised over snowmobilers travelling on pedestrian walkways and on private property without permission.

There have also been complaints about snowmobilers causing excessive noise and paying insufficient attention to pedestrians and other vehicles.

Police remind snowmobile operators that they can be charged under the Trespass to Property Act for entering a premise when entry is prohibited.

Police say signs do not have to be posted to advise the public of no trespassing.

"You should never ride on private property without the permission of the landowner," said Inspector Joel Breault, commander of the detachment, in the release.

Snowmobilers operating on municipal streets or roads must also heed the following:

- Do not drive a snow machine more than 20 km/h on a highway where the posted speed limit is 50 km/h or slower.
- A snow machine operator along a highway must be at least 16 and hold a driver's licence or snow machine operator's licence.


- A snow machine must have a muffler in good working order and it may not be removed, modified or rendered inoperative.
- Do not consume alcohol or drugs when operating a snow machine. Penalties are the same as those for operating any vehicle while impaired, including immediate licence suspension or losing driving privileges.

Breault said the OPP are committed to ensuring a safe, enjoyable experience for all snow machine operators on not only Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs (OFSC) trails but also roadways, private property and non-maintained trails.


