Chariton-Dack look ahead

Reeve sees improvements in 2021, and plans for 2022

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack has seen continued benefits from its shared services partnership with the Township of Chamberlain.

Charlton-Dack Reeve Merrill Bond said in a telephone interview that the two municipalities, who have joined their administrative and public works staff, have managed to create an additional fulltime job, plus amalgamate the dump attendant

position for the two municipalities to create another full-time job with benefits for the dump attendant.

The two municipalities have also been working cooperatively to purchase equipment, and in 2021 a new excavator was obtained. Two plow trucks and a grader will be replaced under the same partnership, Bond anticipates.



BOND

He said the shared services arrangement between the two muni-

cipalities was reviewed in a joint meeting in 2021 and "everybody seems to be very much on board and very happy with the agreement."

He expressed the hope that the shared service agreement can be further expanded to the surrounding area in future years.

PLANT IMPROVEMENT

Funding was received in 2021 for the installation of a remote monitoring system at Charlton's water treatment plant. The system will be installed in 2022.

Bond said he would like to see progress made in 2022 toward the eventual installation of fire hydrants in Charlton.

He explained that a water tower would be required as part of that future development.

Three new lots were purchased by the municipality to expand the Janet Saunders Park adjacent to


DID YOU GET The Speaker THIS WEEK? Here are some January 5, 2022 stories...

Continued from Front the skating rink.

Bond said future hopes are to continue to purchase land around the area to create a large outdoor gathering place for the public.

The municipality's public beach was improved in 2021. Work took place on the waterfront with the removal of brush to triple the width of the swimming area. The Lions Club has installed some new playground equipment at the beach and in recent years the municipality renovated its washrooms at the site.

ROADS

In 2021, the Municipality of Charlton and Dack spent \$87,000 on roads, which included gravelling and culverts.

Bond said brushing and ditching took place in 2021 to improve roadsides, with particular focus on corners where vision was obstructed.

"We bought our own brush mower and it's been well used," he said.

Bond expects the municipality will be able to invest a similar amount of work on road improvements in 2022, and noted that funding has already been received from the province for more infrastructure work on roads.

"The roads will be up to snuff after next year," he said.

The township has been hearing requests for road expansions and is trying to make agreements with people who would be using those roads, and whether they would be willing to put money into the project they are requesting, he explained.

Bond said he wants to see improvements on Farah Avenue and Lakeshore Avenue. Lakeshore has a curve on the road where Bond said a new culvert is needed.

A tower was installed by Parolink behind the Charlton Heritage Centre in 2021, creating improved internet services for many residents of the community. Another tower was already located near the municipal fire hall.

The municipality has purchased a columbarium for the public cemetery and it will be installed in the spring.

The municipality has made an application for funding to assist with replacement of the existing cenotaph.

The Englehart and Area Fire Department's new fire chief, Bill Laurila, who is a resident of Charlton and Dack, applied for and was approved by council to fill the councillor's seat which was vacated by Jim Huff in late 2021.

Dear editor,

As someone who has volunteered with young girls, I have seen first-hand that outdated sexist comments like these are extremely harmful to children's beliefs about gender roles, and it is upsetting to see them printed. It is also important to note that apart from perpetuating hurtful stereotypes, the more pressing issue is the fact that adults read it and don't immediately see that there's a problem.

We need to do away with stereotypical gender roles and promote equality for all groups, and we need to be more vigilant and aware of offhand comments that may not seem to mean anything to one person, but can mean everything for someone else.

DISTRICT — MPP John Vanthof sees some missed opportunities but also some much needed relief, in the Ontario budget presented March 24.

The Timiskaming–Cochrane MPP, who is also the deputyleader for the New Democratic Party, says one area of concern was for more support to assist those working in long-term care institutions.

COVID-19 brought the long-term care issue to the public's attention.

"The tragedy that happened in long term care was a problem waiting to happen," said Vanthof in a telephone inter-

EDITORIAL

Homeless in Temiskaming

Having a roof over your head is fundamental to a human being's "must have" list, along with food and medical care.

But housing has perhaps slipped under the radar of many organizations and government agendas as the COVID-19 pandemic unfolds and we are faced with an opioid crisis in the north.

Without adequate, affordable housing, hope goes out the window and that can lead to despair, addiction and crime and worse, even death.

The District of Temiskaming Social Services Administration Board (DTSSAB) has just completed a Timiskaming Counts 2021 Enumeration survey of the homeless population in South Temiskaming done between September 12 to 18, 2021.

The survey determined the level of homelessness as freely reported by individuals living in South Temiskaming.

The count of sheltered and unsheltered people involves those who are either couch surfing, homeless or living in an emergency shelter.

The survey took in 23 municipalities across the Temiskaming region with 65 people identified for the survey with 20 completing it.

The people identified as having inade-

quate housing listed as their top reasons: rent is too high, lack of employment and loss of housing due to conflict.

A staggering 75 per cent of people reported their lives were negatively impacted by mental health and addiction.

This survey should be viewed as a road map forward to provide the necessary resources in our region for those who need it the most.

Governments should put more resources towards mental health and addiction treatment.

Government and even entire communities will say there isn't enough money to tackle the issue of homelessness, addiction and mental health in the north.

But that would be a mistake.

Because not tackling these issues results in ruined lives, so much heartache and bigger problems with bigger costs.

Thinking beyond the bottom line is crucial in helping people in our communities solve homelessness.

Those who are thinking outside the box includes the Zack's Crib group which has taken it upon itself to make a difference by creating a men's and women's shelter in South Temiskaming, assisted by DTSSAB funding and resources.

Booster mentality

During the Christmas holidays I had the good fortune of receiving my booster shot for COVID-19.

I felt crappy from the booster. I had a high fever, I threw up and I was in bed for most of New Year's Day.

But I am very much alive.

I am thankful for all the life lessons 2021 taught me, but not one bit sorry to see the year go out the darn door.

I was talking with a friend who lives in Southern Ontario who is dealing with a major depression.

Her sister was at death's door and the holidays had ab-

solutely no lustre for her.

I tried to ease her pain with kind words, while I never once said to her "get over it".

Because that is the worst thing you can tell a person who is suffering from depression and fear is to "get over it."

We don't get over depression, we go through it.

January is a month that contains the most depressing day of the year, Blue Monday, the third Monday in January.

I handle the dark days of the month by getting outside for a little ice fishing, reading good books and enjoying a game or two of football. We saw Tampa Bay Buccaneers player Antonio Brown have a meltdown last weekend in the middle of a game against the Philadelphia Eagles.

He was benched during the game, he became upset and took his jersey off and walked off the field in a defiant manner, thus quitting on his team.

People were quick to tackle this player for his actions.

But Buc's quarterback Tom Brady pleaded for people to cut Brown some slack and to be compassionate towards him.

Certainly the fact many football players have CTE, a

condition caused from hits to the head, goes without saying.

Ninety nine per cent of the brains of deceased football players studied show huge holes from concussions.

Brain injuries must be treated the same as bodily injuries, without the massive stigma.

Folks who suffer from depression are wracked with pain and depression that has them in a super tight headlock. They need a booster shot of love and understanding.

We have all experienced bouts of darkness due to the pandemic, feeling our way forward in this fresh New Year.



It is important to lift people up, as we are all going through things we may not talk about on the outside.


We are all made of magic and beauty and no social media post, lockdown or bullying can change what is inside of us.



Employers can apply to Canada Summer Jobs program

DISTRICT (Special) - Applications are now open for employers who want to hire students under the Canada Summer Jobs program.

Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota recently announced details of the 2022 program.

The long-standing federal program strives to help young people between 15 and 30 find their first summer work expe-

It provides opportunities for youth to develop skills in a variety of settings in small businesses and the not-for-profit and public sectors.

In 2022, Rota said the program wants to create up to 100,000 full-time summer job opportunities for young people.

That's up 40 per cent from

pre-pandemic targets.

"Young people of Nipissing-Timiskaming are the future," said Rota in the release.

He encouraged not-for-profit organizations, public-sector employers and small businesses to apply for funding through the Canada Summer Jobs program.

"Help us build our community by providing young people with the tools and opportunities they need now to succeed."

He said the Nipissing-Timiskaming priorities focus on:

- Local and regional tourism development;
- Agricultural, forestry, fishing, and hunting projects;
- Projects supporting the skilled trades;
 - Support for projects in

the arts, entertainment, and recreation;

• Projects supporting small businesses.

But all eligible employers – not-for-profits, public-sector employers, and private-sector employers with 50 or fewer full-time employees – have until January 25 to apply for funding.

Not-for-profit employers will be reimbursed up to 100 per cent of the provincial minimum wage.

Public and private-sector employers will be reimbursed for up to 50 per cent of the provincial minimum wage.

Full-time job placements will take place during the summer of 2022, and last between six and 16 weeks.

Employers are also invit-

ed to submit applications that complement this year's national priorities, which want to ensure that young people who face barriers are given equitable opportunities to find meaningful summer work.

The national priorities focus on supporting employers that intend to hire youth who have not completed high school or are not currently enrolled in an education or training program, as well as Black, Indigenous and racialized young people, and youth living with disabil-

Small businesses and notfor-profit organizations that self-report as having leadership from groups that are under-represented in labour market will also be supported.

Federal officials say youth were hard hit by pandemic-related job losses.

Unemployment reached a record high of 31.4 per cent in May 2020. By November 2021, they'd recovered to pre-pandemic levels, with an unemployment rate of 9.7 per cent.

But under-represented youth in the labour market continued to struggle to find work.

In November 2021, unemployment rates for visible minority youth were 12.9 per cent; Indigenous youth not living on a reserve, 15.5 per cent; immigrant youth, 10 per cent.

Employers can submit their applications electronically via the online fillable application or the Grants and Contributions Online Service (GCOS).

"A lot of the problems were pre-existing. They were well known by many levels of government."

While long-term promises are being made by the government, action is needed now, said Vanthof. By not acting immediately, "the danger is that the public attention may once again face away from the long term care once the pandemic is over."

Live streaming will allow the public to watch the meetings online as they are occur-

There will be a third-party monitor for the process so the public can interact with the council under the agenda guidelines. The monitor will also have the task of ensuring the technical aspect of the meeting will proceed smooth-

Councillor Pat Anderson pointed out at the regular meeting of council March 16 that the public will have to be told how to access the online broadcast, "so that they will be able to watch the meeting."

Because of the red zone restrictions enacted March 26, the restrictions placed on ice users at the Shelley Herbert-Shea Memorial Arena prompted the city to remove ice there as well.

Englehart museum staying closed through 2021

ENGLEHART — Englehart council has approved a motion to keep the Englehart and Area Historical Museum closed for the 2021 season.

Mayor Nina Wallace read the motion at council stating that the fixed cost of the museum continues to increase, while the number of users continues to decrease.

For that reason the proposal was made to keep the museum closed for 2021 to provide time for the museum board to look at viable options.

They join existing board members Emma Laughlin, Amy Lemoine, Colleen Mc-Naught, Doug Wilcox and Maggie Wilson.

As year three of pandemic nears, OMA urges vaccinations

TORONTO (Special/Staff) – On December 31, 2019, China began reporting that cases of what would become known as COVID-19 were being treated in Wuhan City.

The virus spread rapidly around the world and the World Health Organization declared a pandemic on March 11, 2020, with no end in sight.

The Ontario Medical Association recently reflected on the two-year anniversary of the virus that has affected all facets of daily life.

In a recent news release, the association – which represents more than 43,000 physicians, medical students and retired physicians – noted that Ontario's first case was reported January 25, 2020.

There have since been more than 750,000 cases with a death toll of more than 10,100.

While Ontario's high vac-

cination rate of more than 80 per cent of those eligible and public health measures significantly slowed the virus in the latter half of 2021, the highly contagious Omicron variant has led to record numbers of infections.

As the province nears year three of the pandemic, Ontario's doctors are offering reassurance that the experience and expertise gained over the past two years will enable the province to navigate this next phase as well.

"We have had some tough days in 2021, but we have learned how to combat the disease as it continues to change," said Dr. Adam Kassam, president of the Ontario Medical Association.

"We need to stay vigilant and resilient and we will get through this together.

"The single most important

thing everyone can do to help is to get vaccinated and get their children vaccinated. If you have questions, ask your doctor or local public health unit."

Looking ahead to 2022, Ontario's doctors say we should be prepared for a "steady state" of the pandemic for the foreseeable future.

That means, it said, that Ontarians will have to wear masks, show vaccine certificates and maintain physical distancing so the healthcare system is not overwhelmed by a surge in cases.

The Ontario Medical Association recommends:

- Get yourself and your children over the age of five fully vaccinated as soon as possible, and everyone should get a booster when eligible.
- Keep indoor gatherings small

and limit the number you have. Don't attend if you are ill or have been exposed to a confirmed case of COVID.

- Before gathering indoors, be aware of everyone's vaccination status. It's not only OK to ask, it's the responsible thing to do.
- Weather permitting, open

windows during indoor celebrations. Consider virtual or outdoor celebrations.

- Wear the best quality mask you can find and wear it properly, covering your nose and mouth.
- Take care of your mental health. Connect with others who may be lonely.

FROM THE APRIL 16 ISSUE:

Rain is needed to counter low water levels

DISTRICT — A combination of low precipitation and rapid snowmelt has resulted in low

water levels now being seen on Lake Temiskaming. It could possibly mean the lake and its tributaries will be lower than normal throughout the season, depending on factors such as precipitation and evaporation.

"Due to the lack of precipitation in late March and early April, lower than usual water levels are being experienced across the northeast region," commented Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry biologist Allison Bannister.

Lionel Venne book project underway

DISTRICT — Work is now underway to create a book on the life and works of Elk Lake artist Lionel Venne.

Felicity Buckell of Temiskaming Shores has been attempting to obtain Ontario Arts Council funding for the project since 2018 and has now

FROM THE APRIL 23 **ISSUE:**

THU announces uptick in **COVID** cases

TEMISKAMING SHORES A COVID-19 outbreak has been declared at Green Tractors in Earlton.

The Timiskaming Health Unit declared the workplace outbreak at the farm and construction supplier April 20.

It advised anyone who visited the business, located on Poupore Road, between April 12 and 19 to monitor themselves for COVID-19 symptoms.

"If symptoms develop, reach out to your local Assessment Centre for testing," it said in a bulletin.

City firefighters upgrading online training

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Technology upgrades are coming to the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department to help members continue training despite pandemic restrictions.

The department is receiving \$7,000 from a one-time pandemic provincial fund intended to help municipal fire services deliver training and virtual inspections.

Ministry controls use of Jake brakes

ENGLEHART — Englehart has no control over whether truckers are using jake brakes on the highway, and the matter falls under the responsibility of the Ministry of Transportation.

That was the position of Englehart clerk-treasurer Shawn LaCarte in responding to a letter from a resident requesting a bylaw be put in place to control truckers from using Jake brakes within town limits.

APRIL 30:

Cost factor for road improvement

CHARLTON-DACK — The Municipality of Charlton and Dack will form a committee to meet with two local farmers to discuss options for a road in the rural area of the municipal-

The municipality has been considering closing the road. The road requires a new culvert. There is also a creek at the location.

The road southeast of the community of Charlton was discussed at the April 7 meeting of council. A cost of \$50,000 for the project was estimated, with another possibility posed that the cost could be as much as \$100,000.

Vaccinations open to farm workers

DISTRICT - As essential workers, farmers and farm workers in Temiskaming can now book a COVID-19 vaccination. But since the vaccine supply is limited, it's not yet available to their household members.

To prove eligibility, provide a pay stub, a Farm Business Registration (FBR) number, or a letter from the employer, with the FBR number included, attesting that the individual is a farm employee.

Equipment subsidy amended to include all seasons

TEMAGAMI — Temagami council has passed a motion to direct staff to update the winter equipment subsidy that was passed on March 4, to include all season recreation equipment for youth in the community, offering a maximum of \$55 to offset the cost.

The subsidy will be funded by Temagami's Phase 1 CO-VID-19 funding.

FROM THE ISSUE OF FROM THE MAY 7 ISSUE: **Englehart wants different** approach to overcharge

ENGLEHART — Englehart council wants DTSSAB to take a different approach to resolving the matter of overcharges by the board to Englehart since 2019.

In March, the town advised the District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board (DTSSAB) that they believed the board had overcharged Englehart \$11,400 for Ontario Works (OW) clients who had Englehart addresses.

Englehart treasurer/deputy clerk Malorie Robinson pointed out the error, which developed because some Ontario Works recipients had the name of Englehart in their addresses but had physical dwellings outside the town's boundaries.

DTSSAB rechecked its information and agreed with Englehart's conclusion and offered to compensate them with funds drawn from its reserves.

Latchford to apply for economic development intern

LATCHFORD — The Town of Latchford will be applying through FedNor's Economic Development Initiative (EDI) for an economic development intern for a 20-month term.

The motion was approved at council's regular meeting April 15.

Mayor George Lefebvre noted, if approved, the contract would pay the intern \$35,000 of which \$3,500 a year would be Latchford's share to pay.

The intern would be responsible for the economic development of Latchford's business industrial park and other projects that the town came up with that the intern could work on.

Seasonal half-load bylaw recommended for Latchford LATCHFORD — A seasonal half-load bylaw is need for the Town of Latchford, says public works foreman Roger Clark.

Clark informed Latchford council in his report at their regular meeting April 15 that there are a lot of fully loaded dump trucks working around the town and he said "the roads won't hold up to that kind of traffic when the frost is just coming out of the ground."

He noted that most municipalities have such seasonal bylaws in place to protect the roads and he feels that Latchford needs to do the same.



Cobalt council votes to maintain council size

COBALT — Cobalt council will not be proceeding with a review of the size of council.

A resolution was put before council at its meeting of Tuesday, May 18, whether to seek public input on the proposal to reduce the number of councilors from six to four in the next term of council.

However, council defeated the motion. Councillors Joe Dube, Pat Anderson, Matthew Johnson, Doug Wilcox and Angela Adshead all supported the existing council structure of six councilors and a mayor.



Six month hazards study anticipated for Cobalt sites

COBALT — Ontario Northland anticipates a hazards assessment on mine site properties and a portion of a trail in Cobalt will begin in June and take six months to complete.

On March 18, Ontario Northland barricaded the area around the Rightof-Way mine site and headframe at the north end of Cobalt Lake, and has also blocked off the Townsite and Glory Hole at the southeast corner of

More recently, Ontario Northland has blocked off a portion of the Keevil Trail near the Right-of-Way.

Cobalt councillor Bill Gabanni noted the closure of the trail at Cobalt's May 18 meeting and questioned the reason for it.

"This has always been a nice little trail for people who want to walk around the lake and now it's blocked and it doesn't sit too well with me," said Gabanni.

He stated that he wanted to know the reason for the blocked trail.

Ontario Northland spokesperson Renee Baker told The Speaker that portion is on land that belongs to Ontario Northland.

Englehart has plans to open recreation

ENGLEHART — The Town of Englehart is planning to offer as many recreational activities as it can this spring and summer while following guidelines from the Timiskaming Health Unit and Ontario government.

Recreation coordinator Alex Regele said the town is planning on opening the Lee Pool when it gets approval from the Health Unit and province.

"We will be following all rules set out to us by the Timiskaming Health Unit when the inspections are completed," he noted in an email interview.

Increased summer jobs funding for youths

DISTRICT — The federal government has substantially increased its funding levels for the Canada Summer Jobs Program for the Nipissing-Timiskaming region.

Over \$2 million is being invested towards youth summer employment with the Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ) Program in Nipissing-Timiskaming, which will see 602 jobs created among 167 businesses.

"This investment will help young people in Nipissing-Timiskaming develop their skills and gain paid work experience to successfully transition into the labour market," noted Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota in a press release.
