"Bun" **Eckensviller**

Community Hall to be renamed for WWII veteran

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - A city building will be renamed to honour a resident who served his community and his country.

The New Liskeard Community Memorial Hall will be renamed the Lawrence "Bun" Eckensviller Community Hall.

He served with the Canadian navy during the Second World War, escorting convoys of merchant vessels and tankers across the Atlantic.

He was a leader of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 33 in New Liskeard for decades, and an advocate for local efforts to remember all who had served.

In January, Temiskaming Shores resident Kim Campbell asked city council to consider renaming the Whitewood Avenue building that houses Branch 33 as "a wonderful tribute to an amazing man."

"He served his country during World War II with the Navy with pride. Upon his return home he joined the legion, which has helped our community, through donations of money and time to make it a better place for everyone," she wrote.

Campbell described Eckensviller as an "outstanding" community member who volunteered his time on many committees. He was a lifetime member of Branch 33 and led the pipe and drum band, which performed "at numerous events put on by the city for decades."

City council approved the renaming February 1.

The ice is back at the Earlton arena

The Earlton arena ice surface has re-opened after being closed to the public throughout last winter due to COVID restrictions.

The rink's natural ice has been in place since January 31 and Armstrong Township clerktreasurer Amy Vickery-Menard says that there has been a good response with many skaters coming out every evening after school this week.

Angus demands help for seniors

OTTAWA (Staff/Special) – Timmins-James Bay NDP MP Charlie Angus is calling on the Liberal government to move quickly on a one-time payment for seniors to help them pay for basics like food and rent.

At issue is the fact that senior citizens who were eligible for the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) because they were working to supplement their income are now facing major clawbacks for having taken CERB, Angus explained in a press release.

This has led to seniors facing a serious crisis, and some are losing their homes, he is warning.

"The government has finally admitted that it was wrong to claw back the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS)," he said.

"They have promised to provide a onetime payment for seniors who have suffered from clawbacks, but this help won't come until May."

He states that the government needs to move now to help seniors.

"Seniors deserve better from this gov-

ernment. They were unfairly targeted with clawbacks and this is pushing them to the brink of poverty. It's absolutely unacceptable for the government to make them wait until May for help. The crisis is now. That's why we're asking the minister to get money out the door and into seniors' pockets as soon as possible," Angus stated.

He noted that for months he has been responding to seniors who are desperate for help, and the situation is worsening. He pointed out that Statistics Canada has reported that the country's inflation rate has risen to a 30-year high, and the price of groceries has increased by six per cent, which is the biggest gain in ten years.

"I have heard heartbreaking stories from seniors across the riding. They're living through an unprecedented global health crisis, they're already stressed and frustrated, and then the government cut the GIS support they rely on to survive. If that wasn't bad enough, the cost of necessities like food is getting higher and higher. Sen-

iors need help now more than ever," he said.

Englehart gives nod to **Sharpe Township proposal**

ENGLEHART (Staff) - Englehart council has given its nod of approval to property development in Sharpe Township which is located northwest of the town and Charlton.

Council received a letter from the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing noting that the ministry has received three formal applications for consent on lands in Sharpe.

A Thunder Bay company has made the applications.

As a nearby municipality, Englehart council was asked if they had any comments about the proposal.

Council noted the proposal

is different from the Boreal Forest Medieval Village project which is located west of Charlton on Long Lake.

The ministry stated in its notice that "the severed and retained lots described in the applications are all proposed to be used for resource-based recreational uses. They would also be suitable for residential dwellings."

The ministry went on to outline that "each of the applications proposes to sever one new lot, for a total of three new lots. Each lot would be approximately eight hectares in size, have 200 metres of frontage on the north-south stretch of May Road, and a depth of 400 metres. A fourth lot would be retained. It would also be approximately eight hectares in size, and is on a corner and so would have 200 metres of frontage on the north-south stretch of May Road and 400 metres of frontage on the eastwest stretch of May Road. The subject lands are currently vacant and mostly wooded."

Councillor Doug Metson expressed the opinion that there is nothing wrong with the applications.

Councillor Jerry Mikovitch also observed that the lots are all "decent sizes."

Temagami Family Health Team Submitted by Ellen Ibey What is Celiac Disease?

Celiac disease (CD) is a common disorder that is estimated to affect about one percent of the population. It is a condition in which the absorptive surface of the small intestine is damaged by a substance called gluten. Gluten is a group of proteins present in wheat, rye and barley and their cross bred grains. The damage to the intestine can lead to a variety of symptoms and result in an inability of the body to absorb nutrients such as protein, fat, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals, which are necessary for good health.

Symptoms

- Common (typical) symptoms include:
- Abdominal pain Malabsorption
- Chronic diarrhea Weight loss
- Less common (atypical) symptoms include:
- Anemia
- Extreme fatigue
- · Liver enzyme abnormalities
- Infertility
- neurological problems

*Children can present with short stature, irritability and vomiting

Diagnosis

(1). Screening

The IgA-tissue transglutaminase (TTG) antibody is the currently recommended test for screening. You must be on a regular (glutencontaining) diet at the time of testing to make the results valid. (2). Biopsy

The definitive diagnosis of CD is made by a small intestinal biopsy. The biopsy is performed via endoscopy. Again, it is important that gluten not be removed from the diet before the biopsy is completed as it may impair the confirmation of the diagnosis.

Treatment

At present, there is no permanent cure for CD but it can be effectively treated with a gluten-free diet. Gluten-free diet can be challenging and complicated and a consultation with a registered dietitian with expertise in gluten-free diet is essential. Careful label reading each time when buying products is important.

If you think you may have celiac disease and your primary care provider hasn't raised the possibility, don't be afraid to bring it up yourself. You are an important member of your health care team.



Dangerous intersection

In about a month's time, cars on two separate occasions collided with freight trains at the train track crossing on Whitewood Avenue, near Jaffray Street in New Liskeard.

Thank goodness both people involved in these serious collisions were not seriously hurt or killed.

It is obvious that there is a problem at that intersection. Whether it is the train warning lights, the lack of protective arms or just the way the intersection is aligned that is putting people in harm's way.

Let's not forget, the employees on the trains are also traumatized when the train collides with vehicles and injuries occur.

And the emergency service providers such as police, fire and ambulance workers are also negatively affected when they have to attend those mishaps.

Perhaps it is time Ontario Northland or the Ministry of Transportation takes a good long look at the conditions at this intersection - before a life is lost. Train mishaps don't happen as frequently as highway mishaps, so perhaps there is a tendency to view them as not a serious threat.

This would be a mistake because train mishaps often result in serious injuries and even deaths. The common causes of train and car collisions are human error, mechanical failure, speeding trains and reckless drivers.

Trying to beat a train is the worst kind of judgment error anyone can make.

Trains cannot stop on a dime and even if a train engineer is aware of a car at a crossing, they are unable to stop the train in a timely fashion, thus avoiding a collision.

Perhaps a better way of warning drivers when the train is arriving at the Whitewood Avenue intersection is to have higher visible warning lights and gates.

The freedom of a democratic society is measured by the extent to which all people are free.


So long as Indigenous people are treated unfairly in this country we will continue to fall short of freedom.

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Report tabled on the federal election

GATINEAU (Special) - About other stakeholders who worked in advance polls during the pre-62.5 per cent of registered Canadian voters cast a ballot in last fall's federal election.

And more voters than ever chose to do so early, and by mail.

They're among the findings in the recent report on the 44th general election, which was recently tabled in the House of Commons by Stéphane Perrault, Canada's Chief Electoral Officer.

The report provides an overview of the events that took place during the election period.

Later this year the Chief Electoral Officer will provide Parliament with a report on recommended changes to the Canada Elections Act.

"I would like to recognize and thank the more than 195,000 election workers, returning officers, field liaison officers and

in particularly difficult circumstances to ensure that their fellow Canadians could safely exercise their democratic rights to vote and run for office in the 44th general election," said Perrault in a news release.

Among the highlights:

• Despite the challenges of a pandemic election, 2,010 candidates appeared on ballots in the 44th general election.

• 17.2 million Canadians, or 62.5 per cent of registered electors, cast a ballot in the 44th general election. Of those, more than 16 million chose to vote in person - more than 5.8 million at advance polls and 10.2 million on election day.

• The more than 5.8 million electors who voted over the four days of advance polls represent an increase of approximately 21 per cent from the nearly 4.9 million Canadians who voted vious general election.

• The agency received more than 700,000 special ballots by mail, an increase from the roughly 55,000 received in the 43rd general election in October 2019.

• Elections Canada mailed more than 27 million voter information cards to individuals whose names appeared on the preliminary lists of electors.

• Compared with the 43rd general election, there were three per cent fewer advance polling places and seven per cent fewer election day polling places.

Overall, the reduction of polling places due to restrictions related to the pandemic proved to be manageable; however, in some instances, the large number of polling stations resulted in bottlenecks and lineups.

Ducks Unlimited marks World Wetlands Day

DISTRICT (Staff) – Ducks Unlimited Canada (DUC) is proud of the fact they have surpassed a milestone of one million acres of wetland protection in Ontario.

February 2 marked World Wetlands Day, the adoption of the Convention of Wetlands, which took place in 1971, providing a framework for wetland usage around the world.

Since 1974, DUC has completed more than 5,000 conservation projects in Ontario, while conserving one million acres of natural habitats such as wetlands, grasses and forests. These habitats help make up functioning ecosystems that help nurture birds and wildlife.

Ducks Unlimited is inviting Ontarians to take a stroll in nature.

"We're inviting Ontarians to bundle up and enjoy a winter wetland together. There are a million reasons to get outside in a winter landscape," said Lynette Mader, DUC's manager of provincial operations for Ontario.

"Fresh air and special times together, that's what many of us are looking for these days," she said in a release to the media.

DUC has unveiled a new interactive map of 17 public wetlands in Ontario found at ducks.ca/winterwetlands.

The featured wetlands are all conservation projects carried out by DUC on public lands owned by the province of Ontario, the Government of Canada or local Conservation Authorities.

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
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The risk factors and symptoms of heart failure

Heart failure is a condition that develops after the heart becomes damaged or weakened. The term doesn't mean the heart has failed or stopped working. Rather, it refers to a heart that works inefficiently and doesn't pump blood as well as it should.

This condition often affects people with high blood pressure or who've had a heart attack. However, several other conditions and lifestyle habits are linked to heart failure, including:

• Bloating or a feeling of fullness





Ontario launches Long-Term Care Homefinder

TORONTO (Special) – As part of its plan to fix long-term care, the Ontario government has launched the new Long-Term Care Homefinder.

In a news release, the province says the new website and search tool provide prospective residents and their families with a one-stopshop to find and compare long-term care homes across the province, along with other resources to help people make an informed choice when considering long-term care.

"Our government has a plan to fix long-term care and a key part of that plan is strengthening accountability, enforcement, and transparency in the long-term care system," said long-term care minister Paul Calandra in a statement.

"Our new LTC Homefinder brings together all the information families need to make informed decisions about long-term care so they can choose a home that will best meet the needs

of their loved ones."

Each long-term care home has a profile page with helpful information about waiting lists, staff vaccination rates, amenities, inspection reports, contact information and more.

The new site also provides information that can help people decide if long-term care is the best option for them and, if so, how to choose a home, apply, and move in.

Future phases of the website and search tool will include more information on each home's profile pages as well as other new features based on public feedback.

The new website can be accessed at ontario. ca/longtermcare.

User testing, underway soon, will inform the second phase of the website, with further updates expected to launch in spring, 2022.

In 2021 Canada set a record for most immigrants in a year

OTTAWA (Staff/Special) - The story of new technology and brought more proimmigration fills many chapters in the history of Canada - including the most recent one.

The Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, recently announced that Canada has reached its target and welcomed more than 401,000 new permanent residents in 2021 as part of the 2021–23 Immigration Levels Plan.

Reaching that goal "is a historic moment for our country as we welcome the highest number of newcomers in a century," said Fraser in a release.

"I want to thank all the employees in my department, especially our Operations Sector who made this possible. Canada is built on immigration, and we will continue to safely welcome the immigrants that Canada needs to succeed. I can't wait to see the incredible contributions that our 401,000 new neighbours make in communities across the country."

This number surpasses the previous single year record set in 1913.

The achievement is particularly significant in the face of the pandemic's many challenges. From closed borders to domestic lockdowns, global migration has been upended by COVID-19. In spite of those challenges, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) processed a record half a million applications in 2021. To achieve this, IRCC added resources, utilized

cesses online. These changes are all permanent improvements to Canada's immigration system.

The majority of these new permanent residents were already in Canada on temporary status. New programs were launched to engage essential workers, health care professionals, international graduates and French-speaking newcomers. Family reunification is another pillar of the Canadian system, and spouses and children were reunited while enabling more families to sponsor parents and grandparents.

One in three Canadian businesses is owned by an immigrant, and one in four health care workers is a newcomer. Business, labour market experts and economists all agree that immigration creates jobs, spurs innovation and helps address labour shortages.

NOTES

• The number of permanent residents Canada welcomes each year is based on the annual Immigration Levels Plan, which was tabled in Parliament on October 30, 2020.

• In 2019, Canada welcomed more than 341,000 permanent residents. Canada also admitted over 184,500 new permanent residents over the course of 2020.

• Immigration accounts for almost 100 per cent of Canada's labour force growth. Roughly 75 per cent of Canada's population growth comes from

immigration, mostly in the economic category. By 2036, immigrants will represent up to 30 per cent of Canada's population, compared with 20.7 per cent in 2011.

• Immigration addresses labour shortages in key sectors such as health care. Immigrants make up 37 per cent of pharmacists, 36 per cent of physicians, 39 per cent of dentists, 23 per cent of registered nurses, and 35 per

cent of nurse aides and related occupations.

• The Economic and Fiscal Update proposes new measures to support a robust and resilient recovery, including an \$85 million investment to reduce backlogs in Canada's immigration system, speed up the process of citizenship, reunite families, and welcome people who can help address Canada's labour shortages.





Install **smoke** and carbon monoxide alarms on every storey of your home.

How do I keep myself and my loved ones safe?

- To prevent cooking fires, you must **be alert.** You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- Always stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that burns-oven mitts, cooking utensils, dish cloths, paper towels and pot holdersa safe distance from the stove.



Keep a proper-fitting pot lid near the stove when cooking. If a pot catches fire slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove. Do not move the pot until it has cooled completely.

Loose-fitting clothes can come into contact with stove burners and catch fire. Wear short sleeves, tight sleeves or roll them up when cooking.


