Licensing proposed for short-stay providers

TEMISKAMING SHORES – City council is considering licensing residential properties that offer short-term accommodation to visitors and charging a per-bedroom fee.

The fees would help level the playing field between short-term providers and the hotel-motel sector, which is taxed at a commercial rate, explained Mayor Carman Kidd in an interview last week.

The new measures, if approved, would apply to dwelling units within a residential zone that are used for the temporary accommodation of travellers, for a rental period no more than 28 consecutive days.

In a February 1 report to city council, staff said short-term accommodation can take many forms.

They range from city residents who occasionally rent their home while they're away, to property owners who continually rent out their property as investment income.

The issue is not a new one.

The report noted that a policy was drafted in 2019, but council then directed that it be put on hold as the pandemic began to impact the tourism and small business sectors.

The policy is intended to help address issues related to land use compatibility, impacts on the local market and affordable housing, neighbourhood concerns, as well as noise and security, fire safety, parking and property standards.

Another goal is the standardization of regulations for all tourist accommodations in the municipality.

The proposed policy contemplates an application fee of \$250 and an annual fee of \$125 per licensed bedroom.

At some point, Kidd anticipated that a system will also be needed to bring fairness to water and sewer charges.

But before any new measures are adopted, council directed city staff to consult with people who would be affected by the new policy.

Free rapid testing kits being made available

TORONTO (Special) - Ontario is expanding access to free rapid testing kits for the general public for at-home use, the province has announced.

Ontario will be distributing five million rapid tests each week for eight weeks through selected pharmacy and grocery locations across the province, as well as 500,000 each week through community partners in vulnerable communities, the province stated in a release February 9.

In total, the province is making 44 million rapid tests available to the public free of charge over the coming weeks.

“As we continue to carefully ease public health measures, rapid tests are providing another layer of protection and offer the public an additional tool to confidently do the things they love, like visiting family or dining at their fa-

avourite local restaurant,” said Deputy Premier and Minister of Health Christine Elliott in the press release.

In addition to the millions of rapid tests deployed each week to support priority settings, including hospitals, long-term care homes and schools, the province is now working with retail and community partners to increase access to at-home rapid tests, the province stated.

Effective February 9, over 2,300 participating grocery and pharmacy locations can provide free rapid tests (while supplies last) with a limit of one box of five tests per household per visit. Participating retailers will receive additional supply from the province each week and have the ability to determine how tests are distributed in order to best serve the community, including through appointment book-

ings, at checkout or through online orders.

Ontario Chief Medical Officer of Health Dr. Kieran Moore stated, “while testing is a critical component in our response to COVID-19, vaccination remains the best defence against the virus and its variants. Over the next few months, we need to continue following the public health measures that remain in place and vaccinate those who have yet to receive their doses to protect our communities and health care system capacity.”

The province stated in its release that “Ontario continues to work closely with the federal government to address delays in shipments from Health Canada and is also directly procuring additional rapid

tests where possible to ensure continued widespread access to rapid antigen tests for Ontarians.”

If you test positive on a PCR, rapid molecular or a rapid antigen test, you are required to self-isolate.

Missed opportunity

As the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics play out in China, perhaps a few Canadians are wondering why the Games were awarded to China in the first place.

The International Olympic Committee (IOC) has missed an opportunity to stand up for human rights abuses around the world.

There are a great many people who feel China should not have been awarded the 2022 Winter Olympics because of its horrendous treatment of Chinese citizens.

The IOC has missed a chance to challenge China on its human rights violations.

Those violations hit home hard when China detained Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor after the arrest of Huawei chief financial officer Meng Wanzhou in 2018.

The two Michaels were arrested on phony charges and spent over 1,000 days detained in a Chinese prison.

It was painful for many Canadians to see how these men were treated while imprisoned in China.

So this brings us to the next question: why did Canada decide to participate in the Games when

we could have stood our ground as a country holding the ideals of humanity to its highest levels?

And why did we not send a clear message to China and the world that we will not tolerate human rights abuses?

The IOC has sold out the people of China as television rights and other monies flowing to the IOC and China are in the billions of dollars from the Olympic games.

The IOC says the Olympics "celebrate humanity" but even before the athletes arrived, Beijing celebrates inhumanity by denying them freedom of speech.

Let's give a gold medal to China for its trumped up orders for global athletes to stay quiet about human rights abuses.

If we take a long look at ourselves in the mirror, Canadians may not have the best track record on human rights either when we consider the treatment of Indigenous Canadians.

Moving forward, it is incumbent on world nations to hold the IOC accountable for how it awards the games by adhering to the United Nations Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights.

Cobalt councillors look for ways to keep track

COBALT - Cobalt Councillor Doug Wilcox has recommended to council that they should be including a list of action items on their agendas.

Wilcox explained that it was a tool that was used "quite successfully" when he was mayor.

He said this council "can point to any number of items recently where things have not progressed as well as we would have liked."

Examples include the delay in painting the town's handrails; the council was surprised that an application had been made for funding for an elevator at the community hall; and grassy medians in the town were paved.

Wilcox said an action list on the council agenda would provide "a means of keeping track of projects. It basically just helps us get our job done and it doesn't let things get away from us. It's a very useful revision and I have no problem at all recommending it to council. I hope we pass this as soon as we can."

Councillors Pat Anderson, Bill Gabbani, and Angela Adshhead all commented favourably about the proposed addition to the council agenda.

Ontario's federal electoral districts to be reviewed

LONDON (Staff/Special) - The Federal Electoral Boundaries Commission for Ontario has announced that it will be beginning a review of the province's federal electoral districts, following the 2021 decennial census.

The three-person commission is headed by the Honourable Justice Lynne Leitch with commissioners Karen Bird and Peter John Loewen.

The Ontario commission will use the 2021 census population counts made available by the Chief Statistician of Canada on February 9 to review the boundaries of Ontario's 122 federal electoral districts.

"While population growth and shifts since the last decennial census in 2011 will be taken into account, readjusting Ontario's federal electoral boundaries is not simply a mathematical exercise where-

by each district is assigned roughly the same number of people. The process is instead a balancing act that must consider a district's communities of interest or identify along with its history and geographic size," the Ontario Commission stated in a press release.

"The Ontario Commission will publish its proposal on the new electoral map in a few months. It will also hold virtual and, if possible, in-person public hearings to hear from those who wish to express their views. Advance notice of these hearings will be published in local media, on the redistribution website and on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram," the press release continued.

The public is being invited to send the Commission comments and suggestions by mail or email no later than Tuesday, March 1, 2022.

"Consulting the public be-

fore we draft our proposal is not mandatory, according to the Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act, but we consider advanced consultations to be crucial for making informed decisions when we start to redraw the electoral map of Ontario. This undertaking is a very important democratic exercise, and public input is key to a transparent, impartial and rigorous process," Leitch stated in the press release.

Kidney Disease – Early Detection and Prevention

Kidney disease usually progresses silently, often destroying most of the kidney function before causing any symptoms. There are two key tests used to detect kidney damage and to assess how well your kidneys are working.

Blood Test:

A blood test is used to measure your serum creatinine level. This helps to identify how well the kidneys are filtering the blood. Creatinine is a waste product made from muscle use and the breakdown of the protein you eat.

Urinalysis

Simple lab tests such as urinalysis (a urine dipstick), which looks for blood and a protein called albumin in the urine, are also useful in detecting kidney damage at an early stage. The filters of the kidney do not normally allow protein (albumin) in the urine so if protein is detected, it is a sign that the filters of the kidney are being damaged.

Symptoms

Uremia is a Greek word that means “urine in the blood”. Uremia develops as the kidneys fail. Signs and symptoms that may occur with uremia:

- Weight loss
- Weakness
- vomiting
- loss of appetite
- shortness of breath
- leg cramps
- itching
- chest pain
- easy bruising
- swelling in ankles and legs
- Fatigue
- nausea
- bad taste in the mouth
- restless legs
- forgetfulness
- difficulty sleeping
- cold intolerance
- skin color changes
- decreased sexual desire

Steps to Help Prevent Kidney Disease

- Have your blood pressure checked regularly. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can speed up the natural course of any underlying kidney disease.
- If you suffer from diabetes, make sure that it is under control. A growing number of kidney patients are people with diabetes.
- Be very careful about taking non-prescription medications, particularly pain killers. Discuss all over-the-counter medications with your health care provider or pharmacist before taking them.

Cobalt and Coleman Lions angling for derby

DISTRICT (Staff) - The Smith Classic - Ice Fishing Derby, being organized by the Lions Club of Cobalt and Coleman, will be taking place March 5 and 6.

Participants will be able to fish on all lakes in the area surrounding Temiskaming Shores, and will include a category for the longest overall walleye and the longest overall fish of any species.

One of the organizers, Pete Gilboe, explained in a Facebook message that “because there are four different Fisheries Management Zones in our area that have different size limits for certain species of fish, the organizers will provide information in the registration confirmation email to ensure participants are familiar and comfortable knowing where the different Zones are, and their separate regulations before fishing.”

The event will not be a catch-and-release. Gilboe explained the reason that fish brought to the weigh-in will not be released into the water in Lake Temiskaming is “because entrants are allowed to fish in any local waters (and) we cannot risk having live fish being transported and released in other lakes as that would violate the fisheries regulations.”

Rick Shaver, also an organizer, further outlined

in a Facebook message that “The derby is unique in that we are not restricting the management unit or lake and we will be providing an area with predrilled holes near the Haileybury Marina for people who are not able. The derby has a unique category of largest overall fish that includes all species open according to each Fisheries Management Zone.”

Kyle Audette outlined that the prizes for adults will be a percentage of the total funds made from adult registration, and the fish will be measured by length. All participating youth will receive a prize for registration.

People can register by sending their payment to cobaltcolemanlionsclub@hotmail.com with the angler’s registry information, including their name and age, or in person on March 5 between 8 a.m. and noon in the pavilion at the Haileybury Harbour when the angler’s registration deadline ends, outlined Audette, also an organizer.

The funds will go towards the Cobalt-Coleman Lions Club and its ongoing efforts in the community organizing events, Audette stated.

“The fishing derby is by far the most frequently requested activity and this event is about bringing the community together with a popular activity.”

Anderson stated she would like to be kept up to date on all projects that are in progress, “because for some of the things, it has been months since we have seen them, so it would be really helpful.”

Gabbani commented, “A list of action items would be a

great thing. At least we would have something to fall back on and not get caught like we have on some things.”

Adshead also supported the change to the agenda.

“We definitely need this,” she said. Because councillors are not reviewing the projects every day, and may only hear

about them once every several months or even less frequently, it is hard to remember some things, she said. An action list would ensure councillors are not losing sight of the projects, “so we’re doing what we were elected to do to move the town forward in certain areas.”

Mayor George Othmer clarified that the painting of the handrails has not been completed because the town had no summer students available last year.

Wilcox responded that it would be “great” if the town could use student labour for the project, but because the pandemic is still occurring, it could be possible that the town will not have summer students this summer either. Meanwhile “the handrails continue to deteriorate.”

He said, “It’s a really sad and unnecessary statement about our town and it’s an easy fix, even if we have to pay cash money.”

Tax tips:

What students need to know this tax season

DISTRICT (Staff) - Students may have many questions about taxes as they prepare to file their income tax returns in the coming weeks.

Students have unique personal and financial situations so they need to be vigilant about the benefits and credits they are entitled to, says the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA).

The filing deadline for personal income tax returns is April 30, 2022.

Since that date falls on a Saturday, an income tax return will be considered filed on time by the CRA in the following situations: They receive your return by May 2, it is postmarked before May 2 and/or if you or your spouse or common-law-partner are self-employed, then the deadline is extended until June 15, 2022.

The payment deadline for those who owe the government money is April 30, 2022.

And if you have a balance owing the payment is still required on April 30.

Students are being encouraged to file

their income tax returns on time ensuring their benefit and credit payments are not interrupted. Even if tax is owing, don't risk having your benefits interrupted by not filing.

If someone is unable to pay their balance owing, the CRA does have payment arrangements.

LEARNING TOOL

The CRA is launching a new online tool to help students learn about taxes and empower them to do their taxes on their own. The free online learning tool provides lessons to help students understand what taxes are, why we pay them, how to read your pay stubs and income tax slips, and finally how to do your taxes.

Following each lesson are tests and quizzes to test yourself.

By signing up for direct deposit students can receive their refund faster and without delays.

The CRA will issue a notice of assessment (NOA) within two weeks of receiving a return online. Due to CO-

VID-19 delays, the CRA may take 10 to 12 weeks to process paper returns.

Online filers may get their refund in as little as eight to 10 days.

COVID-19 BENEFITS

If you received benefits issued by the CRA in 2021, such as the Canada Recovery Benefit, a T4A information slip will be mailed to you by the end of February 2022. T4A slips from the government may also be provided online for COVID-19 related benefits and are also available through the "Auto-Fill my return" service.

Because of when NOA benefits were paid, some tax was withheld at source and this may result in more tax owing and therefore a larger payment could present financial hardships.

Then the CRA can arrange a payment plan giving more time and flexibility to pay amounts owing.

A tuition tax credit could reduce the tax you pay if you paid tuition fees to a post-secondary school or an educational institution certified by the fed-

eral Minister of Employment and Social Development to develop skills in an occupation.

You may be able to transfer your unused tuition to your spouse or common-law partner or your spouse's parents or grandparents.

You may be able to claim a Canada training credit for fees paid to an eligible educational institution in Canada for courses you took in 2021 or for fees paid to certain bodies related to an occupational trade or professional examination taken in 2021.

Eligible moving expenses can be claimed if you moved for school. You are required to include scholarships, fellowships, bursaries, certain prizes and research grants in your tax returns.

You may be eligible for the Goods and Services Tax/harmonized sales tax with tax-free payments four times per year.

If you have a child you may be eligible for a Canada child benefit. If you paid someone to care for your child those expenses can be claimed.

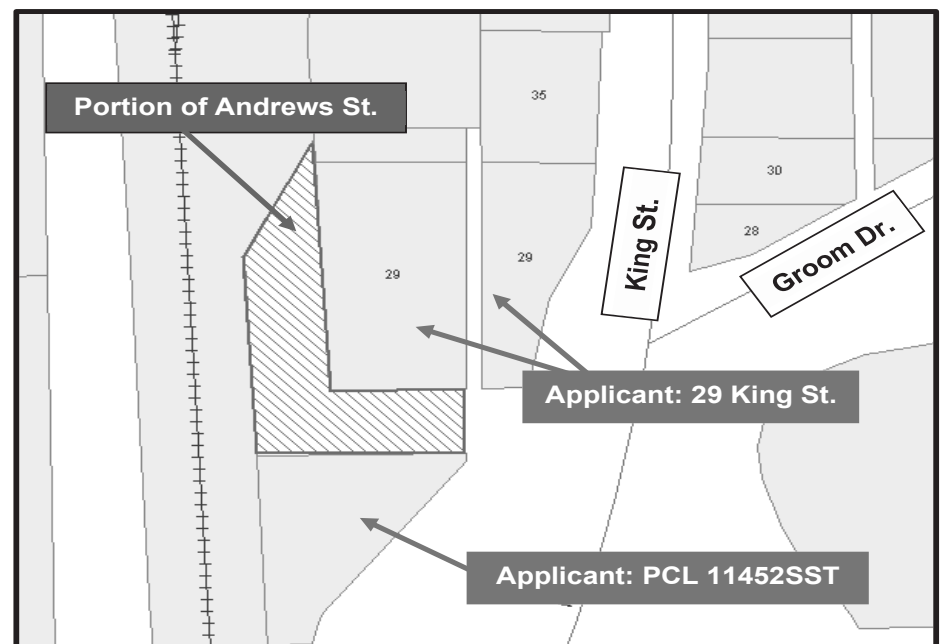

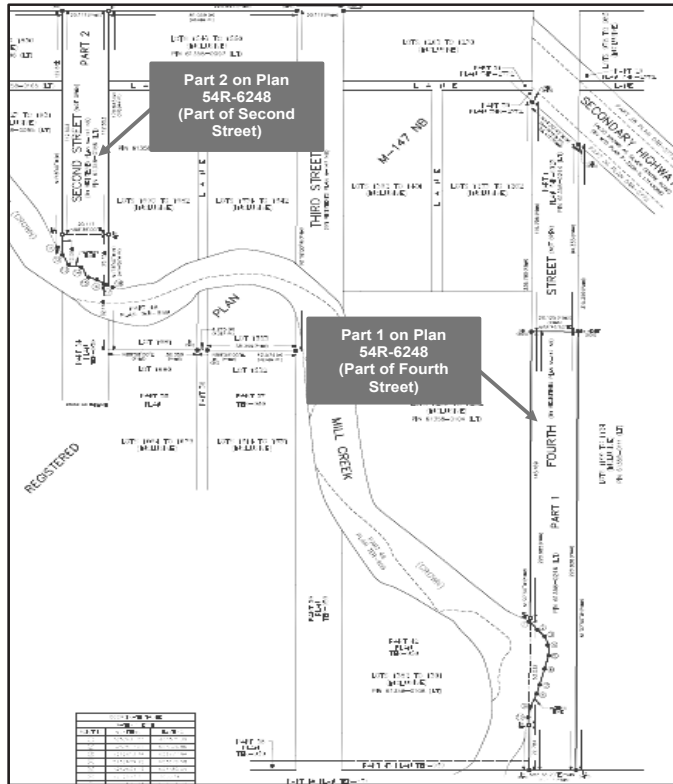

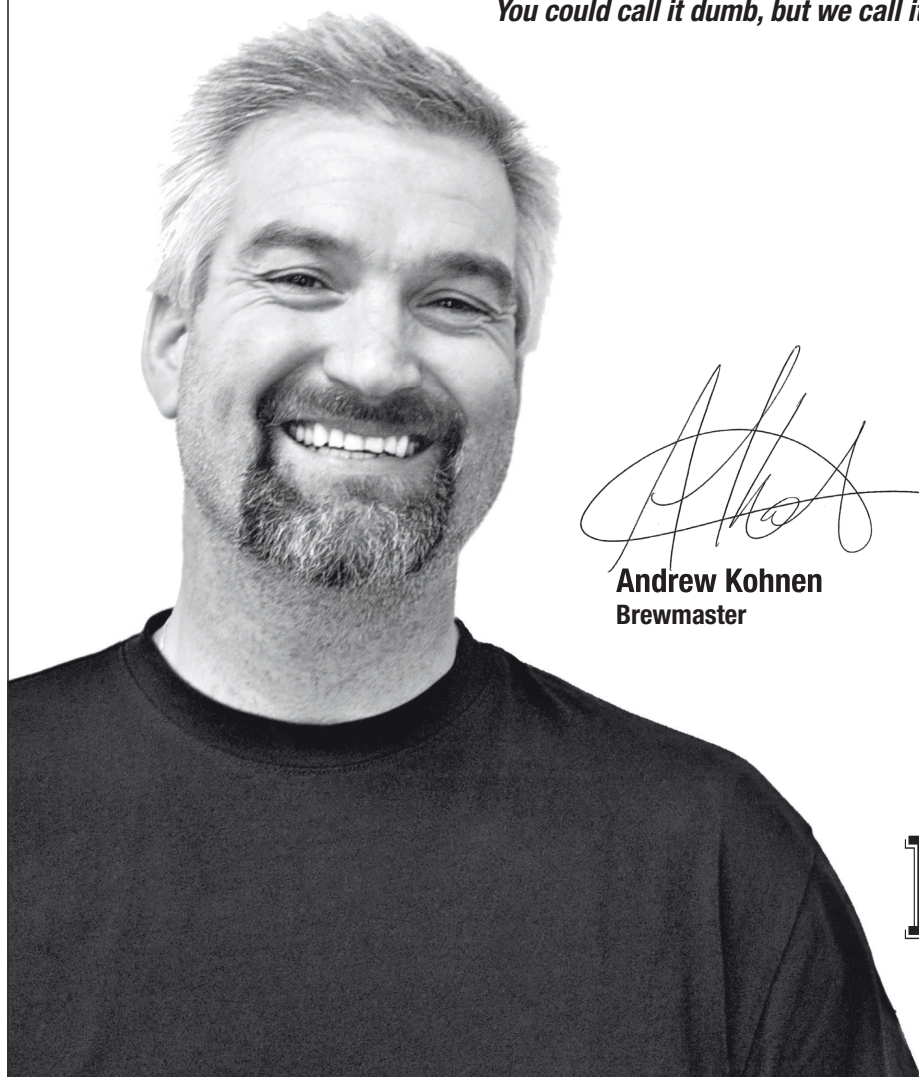


BUT HE DOES!
